## Like Won't Force Forces Against Steel Strike End Before Red Visit

GETTYSBURG, Pa., Aug. 12 (UPI)—President Eisenhower today said the government should give settlement of the steel strike before Soviet Premier Khrushchev comes to the United States on Sept. 15. He told a news conference that such a suggestion was shallow thinking. Why shouldn't Khrushchev see that free citizens of this country have a right to strike? The president asked. The steel industry manager told ABE, suggesting publicly that Eisenhower might intervene in the deadlocked steel talks in order to settle the strike before Khrushchev's arrival.

## Khrushchev To See Arms If He Wishes

GETTYSBURG, Pa., Aug. 12 (UPI)—President Eisenhower today said Khrushchev is being invited to see some military installations during his visit to the United States if he wishes. The Soviet leader will be given a wide range of choice on the kind of installations open to him, the president said. He does not want to see any establishments, that's okay too. He will see the Washington area beginning in mid-September. Eisenhower said he intends to tell Khrushchev that the U.S. has no arms and are purely defensive and threaten no one. The Soviet leader, Eisenhower said, to ask why Khrushchev does not permit progress in improvement of East-West relations during Eisenhower's visit. ## Idaho Parents Sue Polio Vaccine Firm

OAKLAND, Calif., Aug. 12 (UPI)—The parents of five Idaho children, one of them dead, yesterday brought a \$1,200,000 suit against Cutter Laboratories. The firm is charged with negligence and faulty manufacture of Salk polio vaccine. All five children contracted polio in April, 1956, after injections with Cutter's vaccine. One of the children, Susan Pierce, Pontolite, died at the age of 7 as a result of the disease. Her father, Lester Pierce, is asking for \$50,000 damages. Other parents in the suit are Rex Crans, Preston, asking \$300,000; Dan and Lynn Garner, Paul, \$250,000 on behalf of his daughter, Janine, 10; Kenneth Turner, American Falls, \$250,000, for his son, Terry, 8; and Jessie Singleton, St. Anthony, \$250,000 for his 10-year-old daughter, Linda Lee.

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# Khrushchev Starts Campaign On A-Tests; French Watched

Nikita Khrushchev has already launched his propaganda campaign to prevent the western powers from resuming nuclear tests this fall as the end of the current one-year moratorium.

In two statements made public this week he repeated the old line that the Soviet Union is ready to sign an agreement banning such tests, and says she will not be the first to take up the race where it left off.

He takes occasion, of course, to accuse the West of holding back on an agreement. He doesn't mention that his government has consistently refused to establish safeguards against violations.

There is in the text his situation, however, something akin to the stalemate which has developed over the threats against West Berlin.

The threats, while they have been repeated, have not been implemented during active negotiations.

If test ban negotiations continue, it is not likely that Britain and the United States will resume nuclear testing.

Since this is a natural part of disarmament discussions, news that the big four plans to resume its studies of possibilities in that field lies in directly with bomb testing, regardless of what happens to the long stalemate of the Geneva conference.

Khrushchev's promise not to be the first to resume testing can be read as a threat to do so if anyone else does.

French situation and whether Khrushchev would consider a French test as a part of the allied effort, meaning any assurance to Britain and the United States. France is eager to become a member of the atomic club regardless of any agreements which might be possible thereafter. It would give her a voice in any such arrangements, as well as a greater share in allied strategic planning. She has denied reports of a unilateral test, but she is understood to be about ready.

The effect of a French test on the world situation would be important. It would emphasize the general fear of what will happen if the club keeps expanding, increasing the danger that someone will set off a war which would become unlimited.

And if the Soviet Union chooses to resume testing on such an excuse, then the United States and Britain will have to follow.

In the meantime, there is a good chance that none of the big three will take it upon themselves to end the moratorium, even if it becomes de facto after Oct. 31.

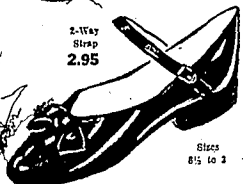

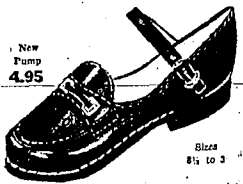

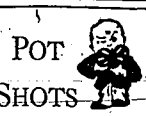
WASHINGTON—For the first time since their disastrous rout in the 1958 elections, the Republicans are beginning to show signs of life.

They are crawling out of their political doghouse they built for themselves after the Democrats' sweep of the congressional and gubernatorial elections less than a year ago.

President Nixon's successful encounter with Russian and Polish communists, and his direct intervention in "cold war" negotiations which inspired this new confidence in the party, has given the Republicans a morale boost.

GOP strategists realize that the more aggressive approach may lead to no clear agreements or results. So, they are basing their higher hopes on a more practical and pragmatic survey of their prospects.

# WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON—(NEA) — Exposed fireworks and explosions are both expected at the fifth meeting of the Organization of American States (OAS) in San Juan, Puerto Rico.

But to practically all Latin American countries, General Trujillo is a dictator who has suppressed democracy in his own country and seeks to destroy it in the Caribbean.

Trujillo is accused of buying arms all over the world and hiring mercenaries to build up his army, bringing them into his country as immigrants.

In blunt language, Trujillo's enemies are out to get him—overthrow his government, kick him out of the Organization of American States, or something.

The question is, when and how, without violating the terms of the convention of 1952, which bans the organization of expeditions in one state to attack another?

There was a grand preliminary row in Washington's Pan American Union building July 30, during the five-hour meeting of the OAS council to adopt an agenda for the Santiago foreign ministers. Very little about this was carried in U.S. press media, but it was big stuff in Latin America.

The two items finally adopted unanimously in brief: (1) International treaty in the Caribbean area in its general and special aspects and (2) effective exercise of representative democracy and respect for human rights.

That diplomatic language covers a multitude of sins.

A third item was offered by Cuba to cover "economic underdevelopment and political stability." This was turned down by a vote of eight in favor, four opposed and nine abstaining, after a long red-hot argument.

Most of the council members agreed that the Cuban item should be brought up under item one. But Cuba refused to accept this. Instead, she walked out of the meeting, reserving the right to attend or stay away from the Santiago conference. The Cubans are expected to join Venezuela and others in opposing the Dominican Republic.

# TIME FOR ACTION

As debate time approaches in the U.S. House on the issue of labor reform, a few things perhaps need to be kept in mind.

First, the country has shown strongly that it wants reform, without delay. There can be no excuse for congress going home without having satisfied this general demand.

Second, the business of legislating does not mean acting in haste. Getting the best bill imaginable or none at all. Those who assail the senate-approved Kennedy bill appear to miss this point.

Getting the best bill possible, in the light of all the factors and forces at work, is what we need to do within the time frame. Those who expect perfection, 100 percent, the whole ball of wax, are doomed in virtually every instance, to permanent disappointment.

The 1959 labor reform bill, to be useful, to serve as a big step along the way, does not have to incorporate within its bounds features to combat every conceivable transgression charged to racketeering labor. Congress is not going home for good, just for the fall.

# LABOR POLITICAL OWNER WANTS

A Nixon or a Rockefeller must run on the administration's anti-inflation record, and with Eisenhower campaigning actively, the former should stand at least neutral on this front. Hopefulness here, of course, is based on the assumption that wages remain high and prices fall.

Another line lies in the fact that labor's political owner has wanted since depression and war years. Every known union opposed the AFL-CIO's fierce opposition to the Kennedy bill. In a view of the Hoffa-Beck revelations, and also the AFL-CIO's fierce opposition to the Kennedy bill, it is not surprising that labor's endorsement will carry less weight in 1964 than it did against Taft or Stevenson.

Eisenhower recognized this trend in delivering a television appeal for a stronger control measure than is wanted by George L. Meany, Walter Reuther and their ilk. He did so by Hoffa, Dioguardi and their ilk. No president in 40 years has dared to bear the nation's union hierarchy so boldly.

# VIEWS OF OTHERS

**SENATOR CHURCH OF IDAHO**

A century and a half ago Henry Clay took his seat in the senate though he was still several months under the constitutional age of 30. But in that time, the "old man" has been a newspaper editor rather than important member of the upper house. Rush Holt of West Virginia arrived in a blaze of publicity and walked outside for his birthday birthday before taking the oath. He soon departed into political oblivion. Russell Long arrived at thirty three. But his record was not outstanding.

The current senate baby, however, is something else again. Now in his third year in Washington, possibly he will be thirty-one on July 25. He is still mistaken by visitors for a senate page boy, and he speaks in the stilted manner of the school boy who has just made his first congressional speech. This young man, Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson, the national American Legion oratorical contest and a \$4,000 scholarship at Stanford University was a high school senior in his first few months of wartime experience in the infantry in India, Burma, and China delayed his law degree but did not rob the youthful appearance from his face.

Church is a senate liberal, but not a senate radical. His biography here was idealistic when Jim. William P. Borah. But there Borah was an isolationist, Church is an internationalist. And where Borah often backed his party leadership, Church has a man whom the majority leader, Lyndon Johnson can usually count on.

Two years ago Church was tapped by Johnson to pay forward and argue for a compromise on the jury trial issue in the then pending civil rights bill. Earlier this year he helped push through the Johnson compromise regarding "Borah's" filibuster rule. In both cases he showed himself an effective middle-of-the-roader.

More and more this year Church has begun to speak up on international affairs. He has been able to do so because he was given a seat on foreign relations committee making him the youngest and most junior senator in a long time to win such a coveted post.

Church has joined that little band of senators, including Humphrey and Gore, who pay some attention to disarmament. Young enough to be an expert on jet, old enough in years to be practical, he has tried to find a middle ground between Humphrey's almost all-out support of a nuclear test ban and Gore's relationship to a test ban on tests in the atmosphere that a total ban inhibit American weapons development—Atlantic Monthly.

# LESSON IN AMERICANISM

We sneaker at the communists' occasional outbursts of self-criticism, but we are the most self-critical nation on earth. We do not protest ourselves seeking torments for our dogmatic delusions as the Reds do, but we heap plenty of criticism on our economy, politics and our leaders.

Since the demise of the Fourth of July orator, even our oratorical speeches have been filled with the ways we could be better. About the only time we hear unqualified praises is at the normal political conventions where leaders are speaking about their own party's record. As a result, Americans aren't as articulate about the advantages of Americanism as they should be.

The communists, on the other hand, have spent a good deal of their ideological life on the defensive, making a reputation against themselves. These arguments may be fallacious, but they have their ready for use.

Our senate internal security subcommittee has prepared a 52-page booklet to help push our provisions closer to the tip of our tongue. It provides statistics on U. S. wages, jobs, ownership of homes and automobiles to show the fruits of our industrial expansion. It challenges Soviet teachings. It zig-zags questions that will put communists on the defensive.

These leaflets should be made available through libraries so that Americans who travel abroad can brush up a bit on their own country.

At the risk of being self-critical, it might be said that a society shows a weakness when its members must be taught how to argue in favor of it.—Salem Statesman.

### Metals Mine Strike Front Is Enlarged

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 12.—The metals mining strike front was enlarged last night when the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers said it would strike the Anacosta company's Montana and Utah operations Aug. 19.

Mine-Mill struck Monday against the nation's largest copper producer, Kennecott. Copper, cobalt and two other copper firms in the United States.

Others struck Kennecott in the western Steelworkers of America, the International Association of Machinists and other smaller unions also are on strike against Kennecott and the other firms.

No negotiating sessions have been scheduled.

The union announced the strike threat against Anacosta after a "most unproductive" meeting with the company last night. The meeting would involve properties in Salt Lake, Mo., and Tooele, Utah, which handle copper, lead and zinc.

Tolley Told Mine-Mill said it would deny entrance to Kennecott supervisors of Utah mine facilities and other plant units they are controlled by deputy assistants U. S. District Judge A. Sherman.

The union moved to get a court order to allow supervisors to enter the Utah properties. The union said it is willing to enter and departes are willing and able to go to any part of the world, Mexico and Arizona courts have issued orders allowing the union to go through the plant gates.

### Philippines Angered by U.S. Attacks

TOKYO, Aug. 12 (UPI)—The Philippines is the only country in Asia built in the American image and many of its people are hurt, baffled and angry over attacks at the hands of the leading nations which brought them into the modern world.

The most popular factor among the many Americans who travel in Asia is attacking graft, crime and laziness in the Philippines. Prominent experts deplore the sad state of these islands and in some cases the papers find themselves denounced for their statements and disapproval on the Philippines.

One Senator Forgiven Without minimizing the faults of the Philippines, most "experts" play the nation for an underdog. The Philippines is most truly the most important.

The press is so free that many newspapers are so free that some of the stories in the newspapers (always the opposition) are of course, too many. The politician's private lives make for some lurid reading, for example, the scandalous life of the late Ferdinand Marcos.

With these freedoms, also go freedom to graft. And grafters do appear to be plentiful in the Philippines. A recent visitor to Tokyo showed a letter from a customs official who was broken through to smell out exactly what he wanted to clear some goods.

Another complaint frequently heard is that everyone is getting graft now—whereas it used to be that you paid the "head man" and that was that.

But the Philippines also point to the unprecedented corruption that spread the United States during the prohibition era—corruption that hasn't been entirely wiped out from police forces.

And then there was the Trappist Dome scandal.

Testamentarian Gates During the past few months, Asia has seen Pakistan, Burma, Thailand and Indonesia take steps toward testamentarianism. South Viet Nam, the Republic of China, and Korea are also moving toward "testamentarian" governments.

In that time there has been scarcely a whisper of any such thing in the Philippines although earlier this year there were reports of a military plot against President Carlos Garcia. The "plot" came to nothing.

The Philippines—indeed most of the countries of Asia—have the time to prepare for the tough problems of democratic government. That perhaps is why you see so little of it.

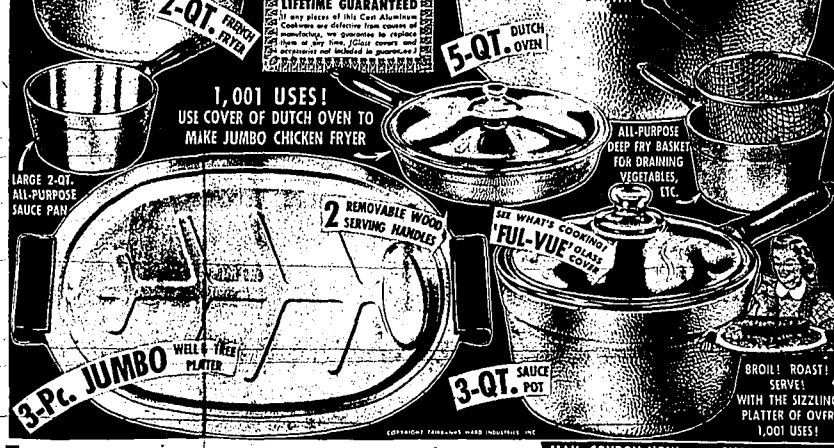

### Steel Strike's Effects Begin To Hit Market

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—The month-old steel strike is beginning to take its toll in the stock market.

The deadlocked labor dispute is one of the uncertainties that trips the market. It ranks only second to the popularly credited unsettling factor: The change of a show in the cold war.

Both are feeding the urge to cash in paper profits after the long price rise in stocks or what market pundits like to call a technical correction—meaning that price levels look shaky.

Allied Industries Hit

The steel strike itself has yet to hurt the over-all economy. Its effects are felt in communities where steel mills are closed. Allied industries, coal and railroads, are slowed. The hurt shows up in lower retail sales. In time it may show up in decreased delayed payments on time purchases.

The strike shows signs of spreading throughout the metal industries, with copper mines closing and aluminum plants facing labor troubles.

If the steel strike lasts past Labor day—as many in Wall street now believe it may—the effects on other industries may mushroom.

Some Inventories Small

Many firms have built up steel inventories to last for some time, but some companies haven't been

able to, and shutdowns will be part of the story—news in September.

What seems to worry the stock market most is that the chance of an early settlement of the steel strike seems dim. Both sides in the dispute have taken firm stands and show little indication of yielding.

Most market analysts are on record as believing that the current business boom won't be halted if the steel strike ends in September. After that, they aren't so sure. And the stock market, always sensitive to uncertainties, has reflected that fear.

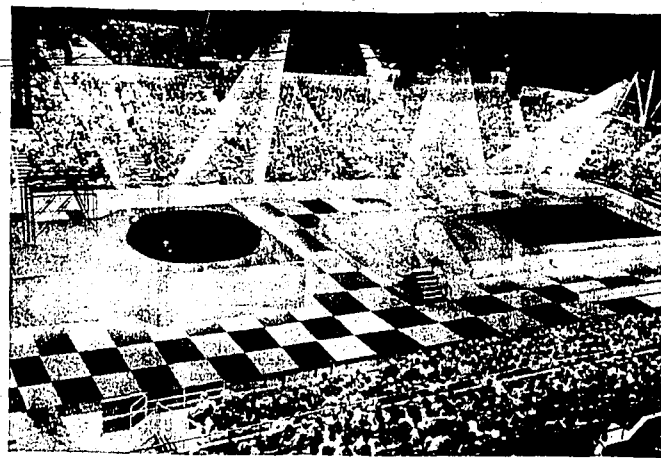
There will be no lunch program for the first week. Registration fees will be the same as last year.

McDonald stepped out on negotiations temporarily after last Friday's session, and is now touring strike centers. He commented that the industry's negotiators were not of high enough rank.

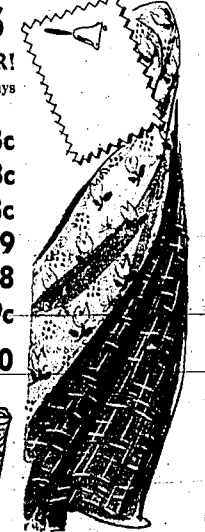

HAVANA, Aug. 12 (UPI)—An American-born revolutionary helped finish a gigantic plot against Fidel Castro by pretending to join the conspiracy and then trapping its leaders at a secret midnight meeting, it was reported today.

Informed sources said that William Morgan, Ohio, a commandante of the Cuban rural police, was used as an undercover agent with Army Commandante Eloy Gutierrez Menoyo.

They played along with the conspirators and passed the information to Castro.

## Radiation Survey Planned in State

IDAHO FALLS, Aug. 12 (UPI)—A routine radioactivity survey is being undertaken in southeastern Idaho by the U. S. geological survey.

The survey, part of a nationwide study of major nuclear facilities of the atomic energy commission, is designed to determine present environmental levels of radiation which result from the natural low-level radioactivity of surface soils and rocks.

About seven weeks will be required for the survey, covering the national reactor testing station and the area within a 50-mile radius of the atomic installation. Survey flights will be made over parts of Bingham, Blaine, Bonneville, Butte, Clark and Jefferson counties.

Data obtained will make it possible to detect future variations in radiation from test programs, reactor operations or other contamination projects.

BOISE, Aug. 12 (UPI)—The Ada county Civilian committee has asked for cancellation of a half-cent mill levy for the district school district today.

### Idaho Parks Need Fixing, Official Says

BOISE, Aug. 12 (UPI)—Idaho doesn't need more state parks right now, it just needs more of the old ones to keep the tourists coming and the natives satisfied.

In brief, that's the opinion of Land Commissioner John Walters, whose office is in charge of the state's 27 parks.

The secretary is fine at all of them, according to Walters, but the accommodations at many are far from adequate. Only 13 are equipped for tent camping and 12 for trailer parking—the two common ways out-of-state tourists live while in the outdoors.

Lack of money is holding things back, said the commissioner. The last legislature appropriated \$150,000 for park maintenance for the biennium. Walters thinks it should be closer to \$500,000 to be adequate.

"People keep comparing Idaho with Oregon," says Walters. "But they have a \$100,000,000 appropriation there. By any comparison, they certainly should have good parks."

Nonstate campgrounds have a real dollar value to the state, he thinks. Walters says that about 20 percent of the state's income is derived from the tourists who "bring it," there's a lot of money that stays in Idaho when they leave.

"They've got to buy food somewhere and they're usually in one place longer—often two days in one place—if they camp."

But the additional water with a portable tent wants more than snow-capped mountains and green forests to attract them to the road. And he'll just keep going if there are no adequate places to stay.

"There are even some parks which are difficult to reach because of roads. An example of this problem is a small part in the Clearwater national forest that has cedars as large in diameter as the giant redwoods of California."

The parks are for the full-time residents of the state, too, providing just another reason for call for money, Walters says.

The group wanted it but the general public didn't support it. Then came the great entertainment competitor—radio and television—followed by other factors working adversely, some of which were of our own making. I refer to radio-telephony as an industry competing in every phase of the entertainment field. "The psychology of the American public has changed in the past few years. It wants to go to the class. It wants to see the top attraction and bypass what is regarded as the poorer attraction. Major league baseball is advertised as the top. It is the best baseball entertainment. Consequently major league games absorb the public interest and by so doing lessen the interest in minor league baseball. "The broadcasting of major league games, both in and out of minor league territory has created this appetite, but we must remember that if it were not for the income from the sale of tickets, the major league clubs could not possibly afford to subsidize the minor league clubs if they are not subsidized."

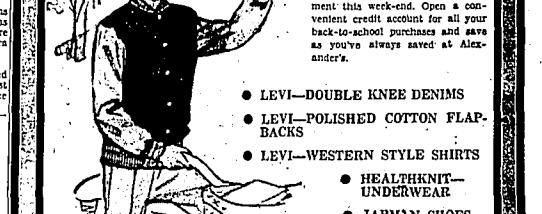

### Atomic Waste Dumps to Be Made at Sea

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12 (UPI)—The Atomic Energy commission today announced yesterday that it plans to issue a license for disposal of low-level atomic wastes off the coast of Virginia, Massachusetts, New Jersey and California.

It said the waste to be dumped at a minimum depth of 6,000 feet is low in radioactivity.

License to be issued  
The AEC said a license would be issued to the navy's military sea transportation service (MSTS) Aug. 25 unless a request for a formal hearing is filed before then.

The wastes on the West coast would be dumped about 165 miles west-southwest of Los Angeles, and 115 miles west of San Francisco.

The navy's disposal operations would be limited to the handling of waste materials generated in federal laboratories and installations including those operated by commission contractors.

Wastes to Be Packaged

The wastes would be packaged by AEC contractors and government agencies and delivered to MSTS vessel at port. From there the operation would be under control of the MSTS commander.

The AEC said the types of waste to be handled generally consist of residual solutions from experiments, contaminated paper, cloth, glassware and equipment. Animal carcasses and solid sources of radioactivity which have been reduced to unusable levels by the

### Interest Rate Is Higher for Home Loan; Outlook Cloudy

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12 (UPI)—Interest rates on new home loans are expected to be higher for some time to come, according to two industry reports.

James E. Best, president of the 50-member National League of Real Estate Savings Associations, said that in most sections conventional loans now cost borrowers 5 1/2 or 6 per cent.

"And by fall, a six per cent rate will be dominant," Best told United Press International.

As for a long run forecast, Best and other experts say the outlook is clouded by uncertainty about whether congress will grant a higher interest rates on government bonds.

In another report, the National Association of Real Estate Boards said interest rates generally have risen a quarter of a point in the past three months.

But some of the increase reflects loans for longer terms and of a higher rate to compensate the association said in a report on the summer survey of credit conditions in 25 areas.

"The general money market is

The NAEB report said the upward trend of interest rates for loans on new homes is reflected in the increase in the number of areas with a present rate of 5 1/2 or above and the decline in the share with 5 or below.

The June survey found 43 per cent of the 225 areas with six per cent or more, up from 31 per cent in March. The 1 1/2 per cent market dropped from 25 per cent of the areas in March to 12 per cent in June.

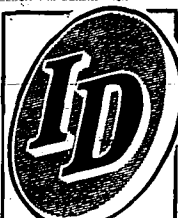

But, perhaps surprisingly, the majority of letters writers to the editor in this issue favor showing the Soviet leader the great American house from top to bottom - not only the spotless kitchen and living room, but also the debris in the attic and the leaky corner in the basement. They want him to see us with our best foot forward, true, but they also have a vaguely honest wish that he see the bad about us as well as the good. The defects we know we have and have not yet corrected. Behind this attitude lies a wholesome and sturdy desire to prove to Khrushchev - or any one else who comes along - that above all Americans are not hypocrites. "What could you show him that would give him a real feeling about America?" Here are stops on one man's latest itinerary for this. The New York Stock Exchange. No Soviet leader's life is complete without a visit to Wall street. A Sunday drive through any neat suburban town anywhere in America, just as the churches are jangling out. A big annual family reunion picnic at any small farm in the Midwest or South. He could count the cars. New England town meeting, to show him that in America democracy and government spring from the individual. An integrated public school in New York. The public school is the place where, above all, the melting pot melts all races and creeds into Americans. Any strike-bound town, such as Homestead, Pa., to show him that labor in America is not a total prisoner of either capital or government. 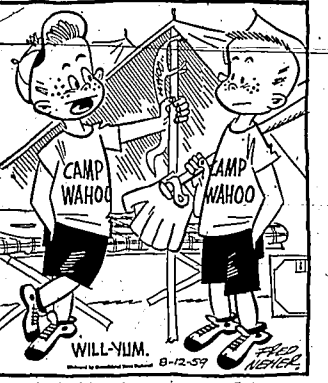

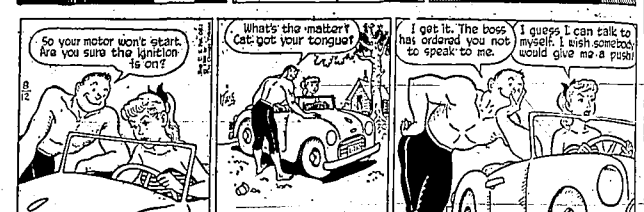
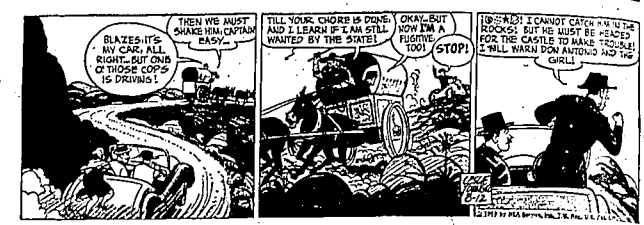

### Chinese May Be Preparing Laos Trouble

TOKYO, Aug. 12 (U.P.)—Communist China, eager to sit at any future summit table, may be preparing to deepen the military crisis in the little southeast kingdom of Laos.

This could be at least one more link of the sharpened propaganda tone by both Peking and Communist North Vietnam, which has lost and its big western protectors, particularly the United States.

The Chinese might hope to promote a limited jungle war in northern Laos, and thus fan world fears of a renewal of the Indochina conflict that ended in 1954. This could make their presence at any summit conference a matter of urgency.

Peking took a similar step last year, stirring up the Pormean crisis by bombarding the offshore nationalist Quemoy islands.

This followed Mao Tse-tung's apparent disapproval of a summit meeting at the United Nations—where Communist China would not have been represented. The meeting was never held.

The Chinese are not likely to become involved directly with their own armed forces in Laos. They probably would continue to rely on troops from North Viet Nam and the communist-led Pathet Lao in northern Laos.

Frenchman Van Donge and his vice minister of defense, Tsuan Dun, issued week-end statements warning they would consider North Viet Nam's security threatened if any foreign power should intervene in Laos.

Such warnings were sounded yesterday that the United States was getting more deeply involved in Laos.

A small war in the jungles of northern Laos, with the North Vietnamese taking part, would help Peking assuage American policy toward Indochina now that New Hands guide the U. S. state department.

It could also tell the Chinese whether the Sino-Soviet Treaty organization really means to keep its pledge of protecting Laos. The communists have been riding BEATO as a "paper tiger" for years.
