Wool Men to Cast Vote on Referendum

SHOSHONE, Aug. 13.—Ballots for the September referendum on the lamb and wool marketing development program are being mailed to producers in Lincoln county, says chairman Eugene Alexander of the county agricultural stabilization and conservation committee.

The referendum will determine whether or not deductions will continue to be made from producers' payments earned under the wool incentive program. Funds collected are used by the American Sheep Producers council to carry out a program of advertising, promotion and related activities under an agreement with the secretary of agriculture.

The agreement, which has been effective since 1955 marketing year, will be extended for three years if approved in the September referendum. Producers having two-thirds of the volume of production represented in the referendum must approve if the agreement is to be extended.

Deductions from wool and lamb payments under the new agreement would not exceed one cent per pound for shorn wool and five cents per hundredweight for unshorn lambs. Deductions at these rates have been made from payments for each marketing year since 1955.

Producers may vote throughout September. The entire month has been designated as the voting period to encourage as large a turnout as possible. Any producer who believes he is eligible to vote and does not receive a ballot within the next few days should get in touch with the county ASO office.

To be counted, ballots must be received by the county ASO office no later than Sept. 15. Also, under urged producers to mark and return their ballots as soon as they are received.

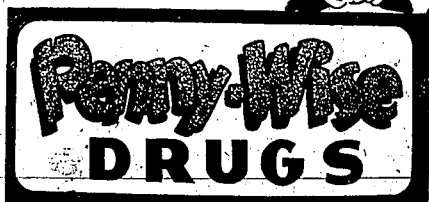

Editors Asked To Seek After Bright Minds

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 13 (UP)—A journalism school director asked editors today to step up their competition with engineering, science and medicine for the brightest young minds.

There's an acute shortage of qualified people in newspaper editing, according to William J. Kierle of the school of Journalism, Ohio State University, reported at the convention of the Associated Press Managing Editors association.

Show us Kierle
"The rising star of science stole the glamour show from journalism, the traditional tool of so many of our capturing people," Kierle's report said.

He urged editors to sell the profession to the community and to the college and high school students who will be the reporters and editors of tomorrow.

Kierle's report was part of a manpower study by the APMS. Other speakers included William J. Kierle, Washington, D. C. Star.

Sports Coverage Said Better
In another discussion, a baseball executive and an editor agreed the public is getting better sports reports than ever before.

But the baseball man, George R. Blyde Tobolski, Milwaukee Braves, suggested newspapers continue to do too far in publishing details of athletes' private lives.

Youngsters who reverent athletes may get an erroneous impression, Tobolski said, if they read that their heroes have human feelings.

Migrant Workers Hearings Are Set

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 (UPI)—Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell has scheduled public hearings Sept. 16 and 17 on his proposals to amend the regulations covering migrant farm workers.

Mitchell's new rules would prevent any tax-supported facility from hiring migrant workers at less than prevailing wages.

The proposals also would bar the facilities from providing control working conditions or inferior transportation.

Super Roads Are Held up In 20 States

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13 (UP)—More than 20 states already have stopped new appropriations for interstate road projects or have stopped awarding new contracts, and the list is growing steadily.

The states are doing this on a temporary basis. They will wait and see what congress does about highway financing before they tackle new projects.

Congress now is deadlocked on reauthorizing the highway trust fund which pays roadbuilding bills. President Eisenhower wants to do this by lowering the three-cent federal gasoline tax to 2 1/2 cents.

The extra money has to be raised because the highway law requires that the program be kept on a pay-as-you-build basis. It is now headed into the red because states have cut orders and spending, as an anti-recession move, without providing more money.

States which have halted the letting of new superhighway contracts include Idaho, Oregon, Washington, Colorado, Utah, New Mexico and Wyoming.

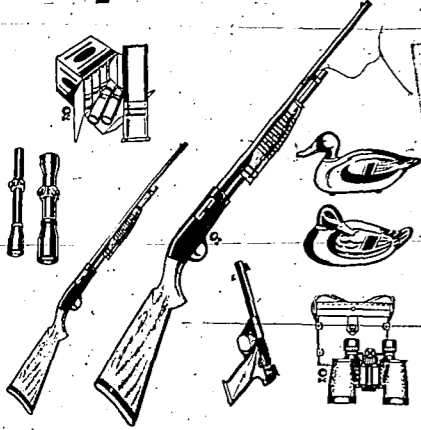

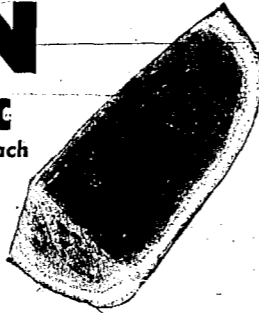

Corn Support in Lincoln Is Told

SHOSHONE, Aug. 12. — Prices for the 1969 crop of corn will be supported in Lincoln county at an average of \$1.21 per bushel, says Eugene Alexander, chairman of the county agricultural stabilization and conservation committee.

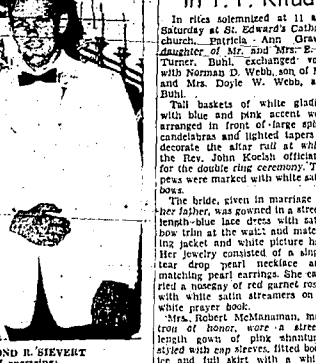

Son of Local Couple Leaving To Be Korea School Adviser

Dr. Burton C. Newby, son of Mr. and Mrs. Newby, Twin Falls, will leave this week for Korea where he will serve as an adviser in secondary education to the Korean government.

He has taken a two-year leave of absence from the University of Nevada, Reno, to serve with the international cooperation administration. His functions will be to work with the Korean officials in an advisory capacity to help in the further development of the school system.

Schools in Korea have made tremendous strides since the war because of the Korean desire to learn. Dr. Newby has written his parents. The problems, however, have been great. Korea now has a system of secondary schools but is interested in the comprehensive high school such as those in America, he notes.

He and his wife, the former Ella Stone, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. T. Stone, Gooding, will be stationed at Seoul where both are required to take two months of intensive study of the Korean language.

"Of course, we won't learn it all but we will learn something about the language and have a basic vocabulary," the teacher notes. "Occasionally we'll spend the next two years studying the language further."

In his work, he will have with him all the time a Korean who will study at the University of Newby and also will act as an interpreter when necessary. They will travel throughout South Korea, studying the schools and working with the administrators and teachers.

Korea currently has many academic high schools and vocational schools, Dr. Newby says. "It is surprising to me when you consider the problems of war they have had."

Korea has the biggest international cooperation administration mission in the world, according to Dr. Newby. The agency is anxious for members of its missions to develop some ability in the language of the country where they serve.

Born in Twin Falls 40 years ago, Newby attended Twin Falls schools for five years and was graduated from Glenns Ferry high school in 1927.

He attended Albion State Normal school and his first teaching job was at the Falls City school near Jerome. He entered the army signal corps in January 1943, serving two years in Iceland.

After the war he returned to college, graduating in 1946 from the College of Idaho at Lewiston, where he met his wife who also graduated there that year. He received his master's degree in English at Montana State University in 1949.

Newby taught English at Occoee high school while his wife taught commercial subjects in Bliss. He received his doctorate at the University of Oregon in 1952.

At the University of Nevada, where he has taught seven years, Dr. Newby was chairman of the department of secondary education and has been primarily con-
