Light Night Earthquake Rocks Area

Varying reports were received from throughout Magic Valley Tuesday concerning effects of the earthquake recorded at 11:40 p.m. Monday. No damage was reported by sheriff's offices throughout the area, but in Rupert a wall suddenly went dry and a wall of a Heiburn warehouse collapsed. Many persons in the Burley and Rupert areas said they felt nauseated or dizzy for a few seconds after the quake. Many were getting ill. Blaine and Camas counties apparently experienced a stronger tremor than did the counties to the south. At Fairfield, several persons said their chimneys began rattling loudly and others were awakened by the movement of the house. At Boise, residents said Monday night's earthquake was the hardest ever felt in Idaho.

Idaho Misses Big Damage, Aid Offered

BOISE, Aug. 18 (AP)—Idaho missed a big defense communication facilities today to aid in any way possible as the result of an earthquake which apparently hit the state last night. The Idaho State Communications Director, James S. Krell, said that no reports of serious damage were received from any community in Idaho.

Krell said the state was prepared to send from the Yellowstone national park area of assistance to the center of the disaster.

Krell said a civil defense emergency hospital had set up in Idaho Falls with facilities to handle 200 patients.

The mobile transmitting units operated by Idaho radio amateurs are operating in the park, Krell said.

They were standing by to assist in any way we can," Krell said.

The quake was felt in Boise at 11:40 p.m. yesterday. It rattled windows and caused the furniture for a number of homes were set off at a number of places.

Earl H. Harolds, a resident of the Boise area in the southern foothills of Boise, said he just finished filling his 400-gallon swimming pool when the quake struck. He said the water level in the pool fell a foot or more, and he had to pump it back up.

Although police said they had confirmed reports of any actual damage, the quake was reported to have occurred every area in the state.

The Idaho highway department said it had checked all bridges on U.S. Highway 191 at Elgin in eastern Idaho and travel on the road was not interrupted by the quake.

Zoning Changes Are Eyed by City Board

The item taking the most discussion before reaching a vote by the commissioners was the new proposed C-2 zone previously referred to as neighborhood businesses limited.

Hebgen Dam Cracked and Treatering to Collapse; 150 Campers Are Caught

WEST YELLOWSTONE, Mont., Aug. 18 (UPI)—A series of mighty earthquakes smashed into southern Montana last night and early today tumbling an 8,000-foot mountain and killing a reported 16 persons. Montana state Highway Patrolman Robert Spears said there could be 25 dead in the main slide and the toll "could go even higher." Mayor Charles Bowen, Ennis, a community about 50 miles downstream from Hebgen dam, told United Press International he thought the death toll would be between 60 and 75. Six persons were reported injured at Rainbow point near Hebgen lake. The slides struck over an 8,000-foot mountain tumbling down, tumbling to shatter a dam on the Madison river and endanger upwards of 150 campers in the river valley.

Helicopters from all over the western states, some carrying paramedics, were sent to "chop" near the Idaho, Montana and Wyoming boundaries.

Helicopter pilots are expected to fly to safety the campers marooned downstream below Hebgen dam and trapped by the 300-foot slide that closed off the box canyon to safety from the west.

Four of the reported dead were members of the Purley-Bennett family, Cour d'Alene, Ida., buried when the quake split the mountain in two.

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Montana Man Finds Survivors Of Family Hit by Huge Slide

WEST YELLOWSTONE, Mont., Aug. 18 (UPI)—Lloyd Verlanic, Anaconda, Mont., was the first to reach Mrs. Purley Bennett, Cour d'Alene, whose husband and three children were buried in a slide caused by an earthquake. A fourth child survived. Verlanic found Mrs. Bennett and her son, Phil, 16, in the middle of a dry creek bed. Mrs. Bennett was nude. Verlanic said, "She was crawling on all fours. She looked up at me, her face a mass of blood and said, 'Oh, thank God! I've been crawling and praying all night. My children, oh my God, my children. I wish I could find my children.'"

Verlanic said that when the mountain crashed down into the canyon, the water from the Madison river sent air swooshing up on both banks with such force it tore the hair out of campers.

Mrs. and Mrs. D. G. Gilstad, Helena, Mont., were parked about a mile from the landslide and were among the first to reach the injured.

"The roar sounded like the end of the world," Gilstad said. "We were sleeping in the car. It felt as if the roof of our car was being lifted up. We were jumping on the bumper."

Alford Warrant Officer Victor Jensen, 46, of Ogden, Calif., was parked in his trailer about 75 yards from where the main slide hit.

"I heard a terrible rumble and looked up," he said. "I saw the whole damn mountain crumbling. It was a roar. I saw a lot of lightning during World War II but it was worse, were jumping on the bumper."

Powers had sent word he expected to return here Aug. 28. His father, who is 85 years old, has not been well and had not been told about the quake.

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Red Clamor Spreading in Laos Trouble

TOKYO, Aug. 15 (UPI)—Communist clamor grew today against alleged U.S. military actions in Laos and against the French in the southeast Asian pact, according to a report.

One communist broadcast here said the French contained possible United Nations intervention in the former French colony and said the pact would "lead to the end in defense of our country."

Battles between the communist-led Pathet Lao rebels and government forces have been reported throughout the summer and yesterday the rebels claimed to have captured "vast" amounts of territory.

Communists accused the Laotian government of Vietnam in what was once French Indo-China has accused the communists of trying to take over the free nation and said the communist forces of Ho Chi Minh, leader of North Viet Nam, have sent arms and troops to Laos.

The communists have tried to make the United States the scapegoat for the civil war and said it has joined the attacks. The official Soviet news agency said yesterday Laos had lost its neutrality by bringing in U.S. military personnel.

"This said a serious threat of civil war" existed in Laos and that the responsibility for it "lies with the present government of Laos," said Premier Phoukhanthone.

U. S. interference charged the U. S. military was in control of the Laotian army and that "under their direction military preparations are being carried out at high speed on the territory of Laos, such as the construction of airfields and landing strips."

An earlier broadcast by Peiung radio said U. S. planes were actively involved in the fighting between government and rebel troops.

China's Communist Foreign Minister Chen Yi issued a statement accusing the United States of "exploiting the civil war in Laos to 'poison' the international atmosphere."

He warned that "imperialism" was threatening the security of red China.

Platt went back in. Finally he found Scott Biven huddled unconscious in a corner of the crib, found the window again and, half falling, half leaping, brought the boy out.

The father, who was badly burned getting out of the house, explained by sign language he had thought his wife was bringing the child.

Scott and his father were admitted at Southwest community hospital. The boy, who can see, hear and speak, was treated for smoke inhalation.

Old Faithful Is Roped Off After Quake

YELLOWSTONE PARK, Wyo., Aug. 18 (UPI)—Old Faithful geysers, main attraction of Yellowstone national park, was blocked off as a safety measure today by Wyoming rangers in the wake of series of powerful earthquakes in the park area.

The main body of the park is within Wyoming's borders. But compared to Montana, damage reports in Wyoming except for the park itself were minor. The tremors were felt all the way across the top of Wyoming, as far east as Sheridan and as far south as Jackson.

Sub District Ranger Lee Robinson said the area around Old Faithful was roped off shortly after the first quake.

Robinson said a small chimney tumbled off the famous Old Faithful lode and the area around the lode was put out of order.

Because of this, rangers evacuated the east end and the lobby of the lode. But there were no injuries and damage to the building was slight.

Robinson said all roads in the park were open early today except those in West Yellowstone and the road from Madison Junction to Norris Junction, a distance of about 15 miles.

In Powell and Cody, the quake shook furniture and rattled windows. A Powell police dispatcher said the department received several calls from persons who must have heard the rattling and thought someone was breaking into their houses.

Cuban Little Peoples' Faith In Castro Idea Is Good Sign

HAVANA, Aug. 18.—The development of Fidel Castro's revolution in Cuba has its hopeful side.

The touching, unquestioning faith of the campesinos—the little people of the countryside—in their leader must be seen to be believed.

To them the revolution means only hope, and they—not Havana—represent Cuba. They are people who like the vast majority of Cubans, depend on the land for a living.

Many now live in hovels, eking out an existence for their families. They have been told this is their revolution—a revolution of the farmers. If the promises are not fulfilled, their disillusion will be terrible.

The peasants place great hopes in the future of agrarian reform and cooperative farming. Competent economists say there is no reason why the program shouldn't succeed with careful, intelligent direction.

The National Institute of Agrarian Reform has outlawed the huge federal land holdings and is intent on chopping up the big farms into

smallholders' plots for distribution among the landless tenants, sharecroppers and squatters.

The landholders, however, have given out with anguished protests coupled with dire predictions about the future of Cuba's economy which depends mainly on sugar.

Proponents defend the law pointing out that such measures have worked in other countries—including Japan under the U. S. occupation.

Agrarian reform undoubtedly has a tough uphill path, so far the institute has equivalent of 20 million dollars recovered from mass estates of former President Fulgencio Batista and 13 million from voluntary contributions. Much more is still needed to pay for expropriated lands and finance prospective cooperatives.

The experiment is unquestionably a big job for the new, inexperienced regime. But if the enthusiasm of the peasants means anything its prospects are good.

Land redistribution is only one of the many enormous economic problems facing a nation pillaged

by its former regime. Uncertainty under Fidel Castro's revolutionary government has led to a sharp drop in private and foreign investment. This has led to a near standstill in the construction industry and to consequent unemployment. Roughly half a million Cubans are jobless out of a total work force of 2,400,000.

To take up the slack, the government has embarked on a public works program and deficit spending. This is a political necessity and probably will be difficult to stop when it becomes necessary for Castro to ask his people to tighten their belts in an austerity program later on. He is reported only recently aware of the dangers of inflation in the current situation.

The critical time for Castro is still months ahead—perhaps, in 1960. That's when his promises fall due.

As one habanero put it, "Fidel has shown us roses, but unless he waters the plants they'll die."

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
