An inquest was to be held at 4 p.m. today in the Jerome courthouse into the death of Mrs. Phyllis Young, 30, Twin Falls, killed in a one-car accident about 10:30 p.m. Thursday two and a half miles north of Perrine Memorial bridge on highway 93.

Mrs. Young's car was struck by a broken neck, Charles E. Eddy, Twin Falls, driver of the car, which was demolished, was taken to Magic Valley Memorial hospital where he was treated and dismissed. He was in a dazed condition when he awoke Thursday night and could only repeat the name "Phyllis," according to State Patrolman Marvin Wright, investigating officer.

Living Cost for July Reaches All-Time High by .3 Per Cent

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21 (UPI)—The government reported today that the cost of living rose fractionally in July to reach an all-time high. The increase amounted to three-tenths of one per cent. Higher prices were reported by the labor department in nearly all areas of the consumer spending. The increase, plus a decline in spendable earnings, reduced consumer buying power by approximately 1.5 per cent. However, the department said the increase actually was less than the usual seasonal jump recorded between June and July. A spokesman predicted the report for August, "probably will show a decline in the cost of living."

Former Resident Is Involved In Big New Investment Firm

Laurence G. Duerig, 56, a former Twin Falls resident, has been named as a general partner in a new investment company capitalized at 6 million dollars to have offices in San Francisco and Palo Alto, Calif.

The partnership of Draper, Gaither and Anderson, was formed for the main purpose of investing funds in Western industrial companies. Duerig will investigate companies which apply for loans from the new corporation. A firm of this type has never been established on the West coast before. When company wanted capital it was required to go East for the money.

Glen T. Duerig, Twin Falls, says his brother was graduated from Twin Falls high school in 1921 after which he attended University of Southern California and the University of Southern California at Los Angeles from where he obtained a degree in business administration.

During the years he attended high school he worked in the office of the local building and loan company. Upon graduation from the university he began working for Schwabacker and company, 18 miles.

After that he worked for Burgess and company, San Francisco, before becoming a partner in Anderson and Hellera's company, Palo Alto, another investment company for which he was a consultant.

The three general partners in the firm which takes their names include William H. Draper, Jr., retiring chairman of the board of Mexican Light and Power company, former partner of Dillon, Reed and company, and former undersecretary of the army—H. Rowan Gaither, Jr., former Ford foundation board chairman and head of the committee which issued the Gaither report in 1957; and Frederick L. Anderson, Palo Alto, financier and retired air force general.

Negotiations for forming the new firm have been pending for nearly a year. The firm let the contract last week for its new building, which will be on Stanford university grounds.

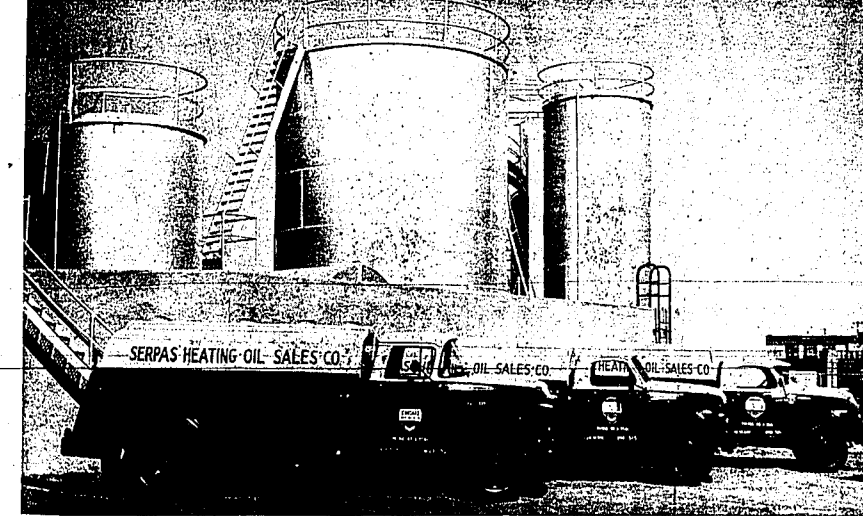

Date Given to File Requests On Soil Bank

GOODING, Aug. 21—James P. Guthrie, chairman of the Gooding county agricultural stabilization and conservation committee, announces that farmers who wish to put "cropland" in the soil bank conservation program must ask the county ASC committee to set a base annual rate per acre for the offered land.

The period for filing such requests is from Aug. 24 through Sept. 10. No such requests will be accepted later than this period.

In setting the basic annual per acre rate for land offered, the county committee will take into consideration the productivity of the land and the rate will be limited to the local fair rental value of the land based on the crops harvested from it during the past five years. When all the eligible cropland on the farm is offered for the conservation reserve, the rate will generally be set 10 percent higher than the rate for only part of the eligible land.

After the basic rate has been determined, the farmer may apply for a contract at any figure below the basic rate established for the land offered. In the request for rate, if necessary, a priority system will be used to determine which offers are accepted.

Contracts under the conservation reserve may run for as long as 10 years. During the time of the contract, the farmer will receive an annual rental payment on the reserved land for the life of the contract, and he also will receive cost-sharing help in establishing an approved conservation practice.

The basic per-acre rate of payment for Idaho, under the 1960 conservation reserve is \$14.50, the same as under the 1959 program. The tentative acreage goal for the state is 66,000 acres, subject to consideration and recommendation by the state ASC committee, states the chairman.
