Army Corps Working on Quake Lake

WEST YELLOWSTONE, Mont., Aug. 25 (AP)—Army engineers attacked a fallen mountain yesterday in an effort to prevent a possible new disaster stemming from the southwest Montana earthquake of one week ago. The key element in the "Quake Lake," a swelling reservoir formed on the side of an 8,000-foot mountain was sheared off and sent crashing through a campground into the Madison river below. The 50-ton mass of rock and earth blocked the river seven miles below the dam.

The question is whether the natural dam will hold back waters which range from 135 to 200 feet deep at the rate of 2,000 to 3,000 acre-feet a day.

William W. Johnson, chief of the Missouri River division's engineering section at Omaha estimated the water will crest at the natural dam in from 20 to 30 days.

He estimated the dam plugging the valley ranges from 135 to 200 feet in depth and is a mile long. Water behind it, already is about 10 feet deep.

The engineers were sent here to assess the situation and determine whether it is possible to stop the potential flood threat. They are working in shifts around the clock.

Two more popular suggestions are to make a permanent dam of the side with gates to permit the water to run off or to cut a channel through the slide.

Johnson estimated the capacity of Quake Lake at 40,000 to 50,000 acre-feet.

He said the dam itself damaged by the quake had lost back more than 300,000 acre-feet. Engineers are watching it closely for further damage.

The nearest town is Elms, Mont. where 600 residents were evacuated a week after the original quake. Some 15 miles downstream from the slide area.

Idaho Power Bureau Ink Agreement as Insurance For State Water Users

BOISE, Aug. 25 (Special)—Idaho Power company yesterday signed two new contracts which expand existing and long-standing coordination arrangements between the utility's system and bureau of reclamation projects. These arrangements are designed to insure to the water users in southern Idaho the maximum financial benefits from those irrigation developments, according to T. E. Roach, Boise, Idaho Power president. The contracts, which go into effect immediately, enlarge the scope of coordination of the company and bureau power generating plants as well as the interchange and sale of power. One of the agreements, which replaces long-standing coordination contracts between the utility and the federal agency, will enable the bureau to increase its firm electric and hydroelectric output by some 140,000,000 kilowatt-hours a year.

Treaty Issue Is Posed for Japan Chief

TOKYO, Aug. 25 (UPI)—Japan's Prime Minister Nobusuke Kishi has returned to his post as chief of the Japanese government after a brief face-to-face with the hard and conflicting realities of Japan's political situation.

In Japan, a clear mandate from the electorate is being sought for action. Because of the parliamentary system, Kishi, who has been in office for more than a year, must face a vote of confidence (close to but not quite two thirds) in both houses of parliament. Yet, it would be difficult for him to win such a vote.

The Japanese premier's biggest problem is a treaty that could give the United States and Japan joint control of the U. S. military bases in Japan. This treaty is the subject of a referendum in Japan.

This treaty—which grants the United States base rights and a certain amount of control—has been a subject of controversy since the U. S. moved its bases to Japan in 1945. It was, admittedly, a "unequal" treaty, and many Japanese feel it is a disgrace.

Photographs Of Sky Are Under Study

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (UPI)—Scientists are studying pictures taken of the sky with a "flying coronagraph" in the hope of finding new information on the effects of dust and other particles in the atmosphere have on weather.

The pictures were taken Aug. 7 during a nine-hour balloon flight from the stratosphere near Rapid City, S. D. For the first time in history a coronagraph—a telescope with an "occulting disc" which blinds out the sun—was carried aloft to photograph the sky.

The flight was part of the stratospheric program of balloon research being conducted by the office of Naval Research (ONR). A stratospheric balloon crew in mid-October will attempt to determine whether water vapor exists in the atmosphere of the planet Venus.

The coronagraph used in the Aug. 7 flight was developed by Dr. Gordon Neakirk of the high altitude observatory of the University of Colorado. It was carried to 28,000 feet in an open basket, balloon manned by Robert Cooper of the observatory and Cmdr. Malcolm D. Ross, described by the navy as "the world's most experienced balloonist."

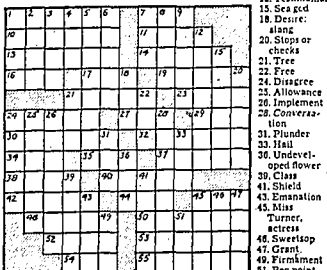

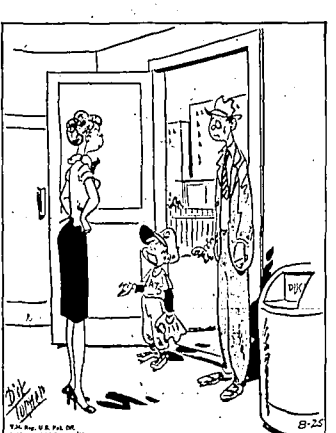

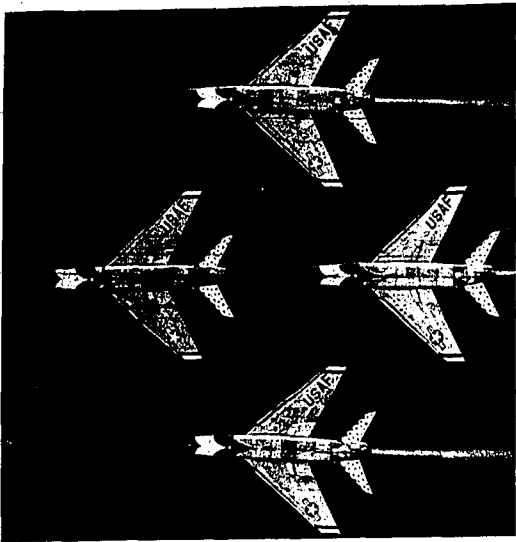

Precision Jet Team Set Here Friday



In close diamond formation, the Thunderbirds, air force precision demonstration team, execute a perfect 360 degree turn. Precision Flying Show Scheduled Here
Friday Is Only Idaho Event of Group

Four F-100 Super Sabres, which will make their only Idaho appearance at a precision flying show over Jostin field at 12:45 p.m. Friday.

The official precision formation aerobics team was organized in 1953 to give the public an opportunity to observe three major capabilities of the air force, the speed and maneuverability of a first-line supersonic jet fighter, close coordination necessary in actual fighter tactics and the ultimate in precision flying.

The precision exhibited by the team is directly related to com-

bat effectiveness. Air force personnel believe the precision demonstrated by the Thunderbirds is an important part of the deterrent effect the air force has upon any potential aggressor. The team performs before civilian and military audiences throughout the United States and selected foreign countries.

Most maneuvers are executed in a close-knit diamond formation adapted from the four-star formation used in combat. It provides maximum offensive and defensive firepower and protection.

All the team's maneuvers are executed at low altitude and within a one-mile radius of the show area, and are the same basic maneuvers taught all new pilots in the air force.

The flying team performs slow rolls, loops, clover-leaf turns and a tight 20-degree turn in vertical banks while maintaining a perfect diamond formation.

The show is climaxed with the famous "bomb burst" in which the diamond formation climbs vertically in front of the audience trailing white smoke. At a signal from the leader, each plane, with a roar from its afterburner, breaks out and check point for the Twin Falls appearance. Arrangements for the Idaho show were made through Don Pieper, Idaho state representative, and the Idaho Chamber of Commerce.

maneuver, dives toward the ground to pull out at minimum altitude. Boasting directly toward each other from the four opposite corners of the demonstration area, the four Super Sabres cross simultaneously in front of the audience with only a few feet separating each airplane. This maneuver is an extremely critical one, demanding the utmost in timing and precision flying.

In May, 1953, the Thunderbirds were presented the air force outstanding unit award by the secretary of the air force for exceptional meritorious service of great national significance. This is the highest peacetime award that can be given to a unit of the air force.

Since the first performance in June, 1952, the Thunderbirds have traveled more than 1,500,000 air miles in North, Central and South America, showing more than 23 million spectators their precision formation flying. In addition, an estimated 200 million have watched them on television, and they have appeared in several moving pictures.

The group will use Mountain Home air force base for refueling and check point for the Twin Falls appearance. Arrangements for the Idaho show were made through Don Pieper, Idaho state representative, and the Idaho Chamber of Commerce.

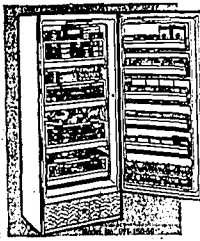

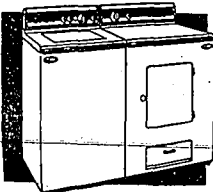
