U.N. Preparing Talks for Laos' Appeal for Help

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Sept. 5 (AP)—Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld returned from South America tonight and immediately began a round of talks on Laos' appeal for a U.N. emergency force to help quell a communist aggression. Hammarskjöld prepared a message for the council that will decide whether the U.N. Security council will meet to take up the Laotian appeal. Speculation here was that a council meeting will be held Monday or Tuesday.

There were three other developments in the Security Council in the southeast Little South-east Asian country. 1. The United States came out in favor of U.N. intervention in Laos. 2. U.S. help. A state department spokesman in Washington did not say whether the United States is in favor of sending U.N. troops to Laos.

3. Communist North Viet Nam urged the U.N. to turn down the appeal from Laos. Reports said North Viet Nam had sent Hammarskjöld a memorandum opposing U.S. help. North Viet Nam urged the United States to trouble in Laos.

4. In Laos itself the government announced a national election emergency. The order extended such control throughout the nation. The order was issued although it had been under emergency since following an increase in military operations in Laos.

5. Canadian Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson announced his cabinet will hold an extraordinary session Sunday to discuss Laos' appeal to the U.N.

realizing equality under the law. Keating said "The commission's recommendations for the most part are very moderate."

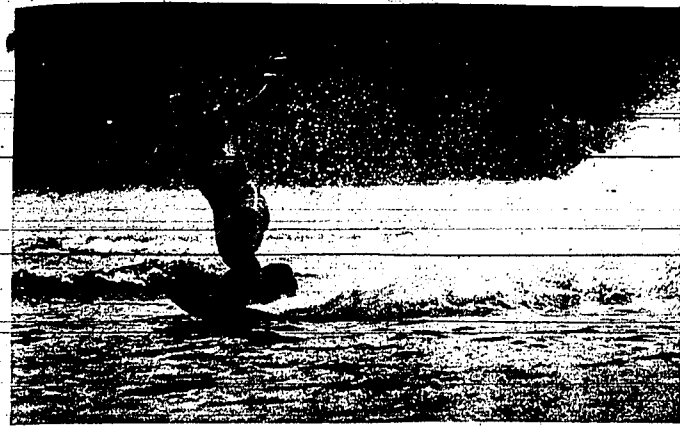

New Service for Joslin Field to Provide Safety Factor for Pilots

By the middle of the week the FAA. In order to use the new equipment with a very high level of safety factor for Joslin field, installed at facilities, an airplane must be equipped with transmitter and receiver, airplanes have such equipment.

A flight of change service is being installed and will be maintained by Harold A. Zorn, chief of always technical field office of the federal aviation agency at Gooding.

The unit will offer a threefold service to pilots in this area. It will put them in direct contact with the Burley FAA always traffic communication station. This will enable them to file flight plans, get weather information and send emergency messages.

Jack Parson, airport manager, says the unit is being installed because of the increased traffic at Joslin field. He explains there has always been a radio dead spot in this general area, especially if planes were at a low altitude, and the pilots couldn't get radio contact with the two FAA stations.

Now the dead spot will be removed, making flying in this area more convenient and possibly safer.

The unit has a receiver and transmitter at Joslin field. Any pilot in this area can radio the receiver and then be put in immediate contact with the Burley station by a telephone, radio line. He also can make contact with the Gooding station through the Burley transmitter.

The unit will be able to file or alter his flight plan, request weather information or request emergency aid.

T.F. Woman Past 70 Takes Float Trip Through Famed Hells Canyon

A Twin Falls woman, who admits to being past 70 years old, has returned from a float trip through Hells canyon on Snake river. She is Mrs. Clarence H. Mitchell.

For four days she and 21 other members of the party floated down the roller-coaster-like Snake river. The trip started at Homestead, Ore., on Aug. 17 and it ended on Aug. 21 near the confluence of the Grande Ronde and Snake rivers, about 25 miles south of Lewiston.

Mrs. Mitchell reports the trip was "damp" but exciting.

"It is a river trip of the type she has taken. She had planned to take the jaunt for many years and finally got around to it this summer. She was accompanied by her cousin, Mrs. Clifford Elgry, Boise. The remainder of the party was from out-of-state.

The trip was supervised and controlled by a professional river warden, Mrs. George White. She says her raft was saved. They are 17 feet long and seven feet wide. The raft is made of wood and is built to add to the stability. Each raft had an outboard motor to aid in the clearing and to keep the raft through the infrequent shallow water. The passengers were divided between the two three-raft units.

"There were seven women in the party. Mrs. Mitchell says in some respects the trip is a man's trip, not a woman's. In the past she enjoyed the trip. Except for frequent drenchings, it was a memorable experience.

"Other persons in the party that have been down the Snake river are Mrs. A. W. Morgan, a Twin Falls high school economics teacher who is now in England.

The party members dressed in flannel shirts and flannel trousers. Big Increase
 On the average Sunday during the summer there were from 100 to 150 persons on Snake river some time during the day. This is quite an increase in 10 years, but even five years ago there was just a handful of skiers.

Sliger says that in 1929 no boats were sold there for water skiing. In fact, they didn't have inquiries for boats—other than conventional fishing boats. Sking boats are "sturdier, faster, and more maneuverable" than the conventional boats. Sliger says that the boat business began to pick up in 1934 and we sold about 20 boats.

Sliger says that in the past few years fiberglass boats were introduced and the motor companies introduced more powerful outboard motors.

60 Boats Sold
 Contrast these sales records with a record of more than 60 boats sold during this summer. Most of them were sold complete with motors. Sliger notes that 80 per cent of all the boats sold now are bought for water skiing. Sliger sold over 100 sets of water skis this summer. Loan companies have financed boats and motors and this has contributed to their popularity. More people can own them. He estimates 70 per cent are financed.

These figures represent a lot of water skiing equipment and reflect that the Twin Falls boat business is booming. Sliger notes that about 80 per cent of the resort business comes from Magic Valley.

Not only has the passion for water skiing opened whole new frontiers for the water sport enthusiasts, but it has developed new industries and has had a great effect on local business.

Expansion Needed
 Sliger estimates that water skiers alone have contributed to 70 per cent of their expansion. Dock space, which Sliger stresses is free and open to the public, has expanded from space for 10 boats to complete facilities for 300 boats. Employees at the resort have increased from 10 in 1929 to 100 today. They have added a new marina, featuring every conceivable kind of water sport equipment and the boats can dock right at the marina door.

"They are currently remodeling and expanding the restaurant and it will be completed by fall. A new service station that will service both the highway and the dock area will be built soon."

Lighting Planned
 Sliger says they are considering lighting the sking area for about one-half mile in front of the docks. Skiers can ski at night during the summer months. Next year, in the future they also plan to expand the trailer park and build a drive-in restaurant, and Sliger adds they have even considered paving the driveway because many skiers drive to the resort and they expect more air traffic.

Sliger says that just a few of the in-state water skiing camps have had on one business, in Magic Valley. And it has had its effect on individuals.

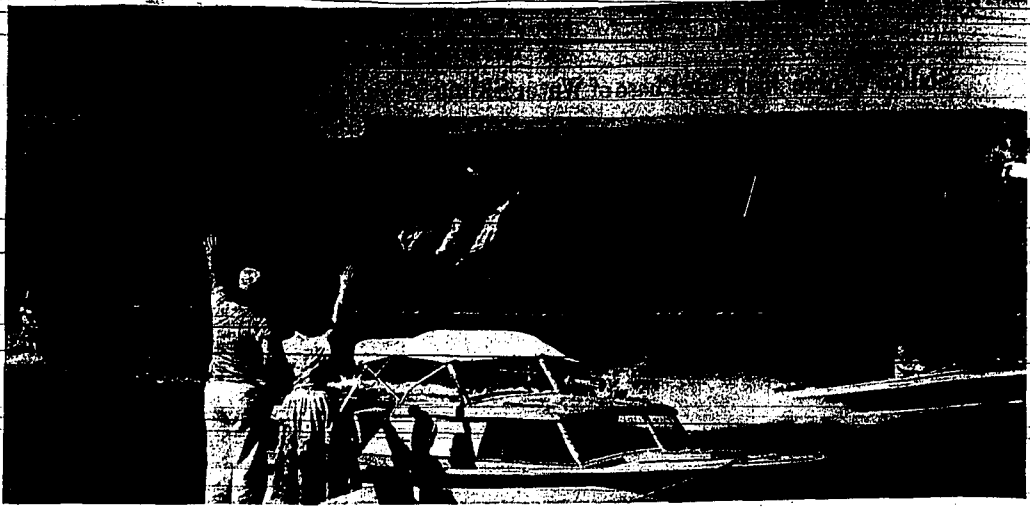

Planes Are Used to Drop Salt Blocks On Steep Mountainsides to Deer, Elk

Thousands of tons of salt blocks have been dropped from planes since 1900, when wildlife biologists first began to use salt to attract elk and deer. Both aerial and ground operations demonstrate that elk and deer do not lick the mineral blocks until they have reached the ground, for salt which has been scattered over a wide area and then they eat the salt around the artificial licks as much as two years after all traces of salt have disappeared.

From the earliest recorded Idaho big game salting of 1900 to 1931, the 25-ton plane in 1914, down to the wind-throwing one and one-fourth ton this year, one thing has been proved conclusively—the deer family like salt.

several stages of browse plants that are generally favorable to elk. These herds increased to a level evidently greater than the area can support, and the population apparently is undergoing a decline.

Merely Substitute
The use of salt to manipulate game migration movements with the basic objective of preventing destructive over-use of winter ranges seems at best merely a substitute for proper management—that is, the regulation of the numbers of big game ruminants using the region.

In other words, if a range is used only to carrying capacity there apparently would be no destructive over-use of winter range. Hence little need for game to be hustled from winter range earlier in the spring than natural. Or, by the same token, there would seem no reason to salt the following big game on summer range later in the fall than usual, just to protect the winter range some more.

Checks Continued
Controlled experiments to date, however, suggest that salt does not reduce overuse of limited winter ranges effectively, although field observations and other scientific checks are being continued by the state fish and game department's current data, extensive big game salting appears unproved as a biologic benefit to elk and deer. Salt bait to move them earlier from winter range with the less hard-bitten of spring, and to hold them on summer range later in the fall.

Accordingly, the department this year is using only four and one-fourth tons of salt for investigative studies in an effort to appraise more accurately some of the results which may be obtained from the use of the mineral as a big game management tool.

Present studies are designed to place the role of big game salting in Idaho on a factual basis. A survey of recent big game salting programs in 10 other states shows that Colorado, a big elk producer, does not supplement natural licks at all. Most state programs are static or declining.

While there is no conclusive evidence on the point, the consensus these days is that it is unlikely big game animals need more salt than is available naturally at deer licks.

The location of the study in the lower Selway area mostly is a burned-over region which supports
