Steel Leaders Again Reject Peace Offers

NEW YORK, Sept. 10 (AP)—Steel executives have again rejected face-to-face negotiations with Steelworkers Union President David J. McDonald.

Negotiations in the 58-day-old strike resumed today between union subcommittees and similar groups from each of the steel firms.

Donald Wednesday renewed his proposal for face-to-face bargaining.

The executive-chief officers of the 12 negotiating companies replied in a statement:

"The negotiations to date have not suffered from any lack of authority," they said. "We are not going to use you, therefore, to lay aside efforts to seek another forum and to come to grips with the union with the established bargaining team which, as you know, has the necessary authority."

The walkout has idled 500,000 steelworkers and thousands of additional workers in allied industries.

Steel's Strike Fails to Hurt Car Business

DETROIT, Sept. 10 (UPI)—The auto industry still unconcerned and unaffected by the steel strike, went forward today with plans for a consistent build-up of 1960 auto production.

All the auto companies foresaw the steel strike long ago and placed advance orders for large amounts of steel to carry them through a long shutdown. Steel stocks were piled high at the plants and some companies hired outside warehouses to store steel supplies. At the same time, they jugged their suppliers to lay in large stores of steel to assure steady delivery of component parts.

As a result, the auto industry in general believes it will not feel the pinch of the steel strike unless it runs beyond October. American Motors several weeks ago said it would continue production of new cars through December.

Ford produces about 50 per cent of its steel in its own plant which is not affected by the strike. Ford's steel workers are members of the United Auto workers.

Demonstrating the confidence of the industry at large that it can outlast the steel strike, the auto companies have assigned 75 per cent of their plants to regular shift operations in the next few weeks for production of 1960 models.

WASHINGTON—President Eisenhower's proposal for a new international fund to finance underdeveloped areas has been met with a resounding reception in Capitol Hill. The view of the virtually hidden billions which in the United States has spent this year on the arms race is being re-examined.

Eisenhower advanced this novel idea in his televised performance on Tuesday night. He said that the United States is the only nation in the world which has the resources to help the underdeveloped areas of the world. He said that the United States should lead the way in this effort.

The President said that he has already agreed with Nikita Khrushchev over the matter of a new international fund to finance underdeveloped areas. He said that the United States and the Soviet Union have agreed to contribute to this fund.

HARD JOB WELL DONE

This congress may prove in time to be remembered for the fact that it approved major labor reform legislation.

Credit must of course be spread widely among all who had a hand in shaping and supporting the final measure. But it goes to the credit of the practical conferees who stuck at the task of getting out a bill in the face of formidable obstacles.

Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts, chairman of the conferees, worked with skill, firmness and superior skill to bring his colleagues toward a compromise of the important differences between house and senate versions of labor reform.

He was not exactly a disinterested party, since the senate-endorsed bill was his own. But he, like virtually all the conferees, understood from the start that what counted was not any particular individual hand, but getting reasonably sound labor reform legislation now, in 1959.

With that attitude governing, the joint group refused to yield before its difficulties.

Actually, the house-approved Landrum-Jeffrin bill was in most of its major features patterned closely after the Kennedy bill.

These have to do with full disclosure of union finances, with harsh penalties for corrupt practices, the barring of dishonest unions from office, requirements for democratic union elections, and assassination of union members' civil rights will be safeguarded.

The chief disparities in the two bills concern the house's strict prohibition of jurisdictional picketing and so-called secondary boycotts.

Kennedy and other backers of the milder senate measure feared these provisions would in some degree hamstring legitimate union organizing activities. They succeeded in winning certain exemptions and modifications aimed at protecting honest union efforts.

That reality was the crux of the whole matter. Once it was achieved, the conferees had done their work.

The country has the labor reform it has patiently demanded, thanks to that work. Organized labor faces a law 100 years old. It is time to say good-bye to that law. Corruption. But these same men called the 847 Taft-Hartley act a slave labor law, and unions still flourish a dozen years since.

A more sober judgment probably would have said that the new law is a step in the right direction. It is likely to benefit labor itself as much or more than it does the nation.

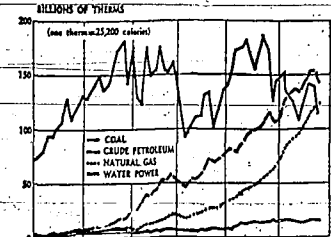

River Waters Spill over in Canyon Area

QUAKE LAKE, Mont., Sept. 10 (UPI)—Raging waters on Tuesday night flowed into the nearby mile-long, rock-lined spillway, supposedly to control water flow, which downstream communities once feared could be disastrous.

The Aug. 17-18 earthquakes sent tons of rock and dirt cascading into Madison canyon. Twenty-eight persons, camping in this southwestern-Montana-vacationland, are believed to have been buried under the slide.

The slide choked off the Madison river, posing a threat to downstream communities. Army engineers, raising the clock built a long, low spillway intended to carry the water safely down the world-famous trout streambed.

The first trickle of water entered the spillway at 8:15 p.m. The water flowed between the lining of boulders; its buildup to a continuous stream, slowed by absorption into water, the rock.

At 11 p.m. personnel at the West Yellowstone headquarters of the army engineers reported the overflow had inched to within 125 feet of reaching the crest-of-the-spillway. It is about 220 feet wide.

Electronic-Marvel Who Will Take Chances Makes Debut

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 10 (UPI)—A mechanical and electronic marvel designed to take man's place in dangerous areas, made its debut today.

Scientists took the wraps off Mobot at the Hughes Aircraft company nuclear electronics laboratory, where it was developed for the atomic energy commission's Sandia Laboratories at Albuquerque, N. M.

Looking somewhat like a small tractor, Mobot can maneuver deftly, perform intricate tasks with its metal fingers and see through television-camera eyes.

The fantastic machine will do its work in "hot" areas of the atomic laboratories where man-made radiation is too intense for humans.

Mobot was described as the first operable machine to be both com-

pletely mobile and remote-controlled.

Dr. Allen E. Purkert, vice president of Hughes, said Mobot will be used by Sandia to test the effects of radiation upon materials. The machine will be used to clean up the debris from the atomic bomb that fell on Nagasaki in 1945.

Mobot's pilot sits safely in another area behind thick concrete and directs the robot's movements with push-button controls which form electronic eyes. He views the "hot" room through Mobot's television camera.
