### Parley Fails To Break up Steel Strike

NEW YORK, Sept. 14 (AP)—Negotiators for the steel strike in industry and the United Brotherhood of Carpenters met for 90 minutes Monday, then recessed apparently as a stalemate as they discussed the strike. As has been the case since the strike of that a million steelworkers began six months ago, the only action came in opposing statements from spokesmen for the companies and the union. R. Conrad Cooper, city negotiator for the industry, reiterated that the 21-1 companies are opposed to any new contract that would be hit-or-miss.

David McLaughlin, president of the union, repeated his charges that the companies' concern about inflation is spurious. Many top steel executives, McDonald said, are also directors of some of the nation's largest banks and insurance companies, and as such are working for higher top rates. McDonald said the highest executives "attempt to blame average wage earners for the evils of inflation." The industry has contended any settlement that increases wages without compensating changes in work practices, or increases, per-man-production would be inflationary. The strike was averaged \$2.11 an hour.

**"BAD APPLES" AMONG YOUTH**

It's a touchy subject, this teen-age violence. But closing our eyes to it won't solve the problem.

Neither will it be wise for us to maintain a smug attitude in respect to the frightening news from New York City where juvenile crime and destructiveness are on the rampage.

While acts of juvenile violence have not reached such proportions in outlying districts over the country, there are indications our own communities are headed for serious trouble with youthful hoodlums unless we are on our guard.

There is no longer any logical point to the argument that the term "teen-agers" implies an unripe indictment of teenagers generally. Everyone knows the great majority of juveniles is well behaved. But it's that growing number of auri and arrogant punks and hoodlums that must be brought under control, if we are going to avoid trouble that could be really serious.

In New York City teen-age gangsters are stopping at nothing—even murder. They have no qualms about beating and killing their fellow citizens. They are not less elderly citizens for whom they have taken some dislike.

Although we have not experienced such extreme brutality out in our part of the country, outbreaks of violence and terrorism are becoming quite commonplace. More significantly, as time goes on, these youngsters inclined to be incorrigible are becoming more vicious and hateful.

It is not a local problem, appearing before the Twin Falls city commission at its last regular meeting, registered complaints involving two instances of arrogant misbehavior by teen-age hoodlums. On one occasion a boy was frightened and held by a crowd of youths seized him by the neck. The other instance involved youths shouting foul language and using obscene gestures after blocking traffic in utter disregard of others after a traffic light had turned green.

The man registering the complaint is no crank on the subject of juvenile delinquency. He is a father of two boys, one of whom is a rotten apple like these that could spoil the whole barrel if we don't do something about them.

Just the other day two teen-agers from the rival gangs of Binwood and Bismarck became involved in a fight in which one stabbed the other 10 to 12 times, leaving the victim in a serious condition. Sheriff's officers said there was no particular reason for the fight. It was a "first one" of those teen-age brawls they're having all over the country.

Over the week-end, the Twin Falls police department had its hands full of juveniles. Some were arrested and others were held for foul language before he was put in solitary confinement at the county jail. Two others, a boy and a girl, were 16-year-old runaways from California. Four more, 15 to 17 years old, were rounded up for stealing hub caps.

These symptoms right here in our own community shouldn't be minimized. Not only should our juvenile authorities and law enforcement and school officials be giving them more serious thought, but parents generally should become more actively alarmed.

**DISCUSSING THE UNITED NATIONS**
