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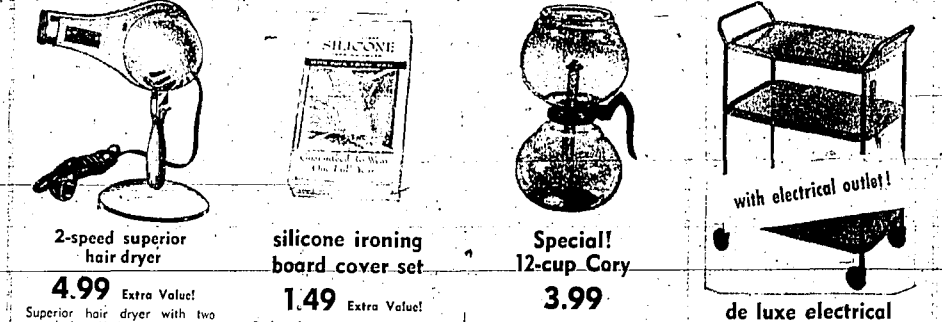

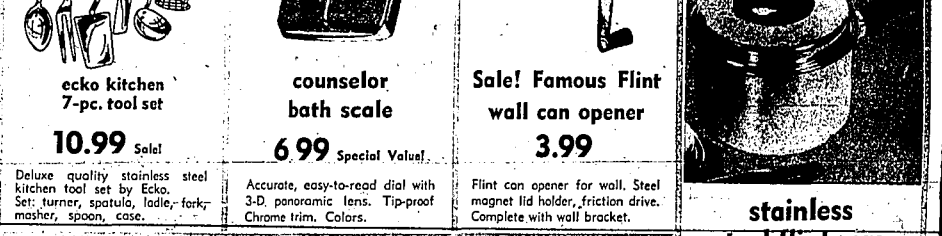

No Ties Seen With Murder Of Two Men

BLACKFOOT, Sept. 16 (AP)—Bligham county Sheriff Archie Hays says there seems to be little evidence at the moment which would connect the slaying of 12-year-old Miles Glen Damron of Inboke with the slaying of two southern Idaho slayings within the past month.

Hays also said Tuesday night a mystery car whose tire tracks were visible on the road which led to the killing, was seen at a residence in Blackfoot. This car was found abandoned. It was owned by a resident of Inboke who was found dead in his car on the reservation last Saturday. The car was abandoned before Damron was killed.

Other two Idaho killings occurred near Bliss, where Dr. John Hunt, Jr., Portland, Ore., was shot in the head, and in south Idaho where Marine Pfc. Wayne A. Siegel, Ft. Ord, Calif., was shot in the head. Siegel was found near Dubois but he was counted in the hills near Montpelier several weeks later.

There has been speculation that the slaying of the two southern Idaho men was connected with the slaying of Siegel. Hays said he could not find any evidence of connection at this time. He said the slaying of Siegel was the first attributed by the Wisconsin health department to the disease, usually transmitted by the bite of a rabid-infected animal or rodent. It creates mad dogs in animals.

A U. S. public health service team has been ordered here to begin a search for infected bats. The work operates a rabies control center at Payson, not far from this southwest Wisconsin village of 42 persons.

The PEIS said there were only six hydrophobia deaths in the United States last year. The disease usually is fatal, once symptoms develop. Skunks are the most frequent carriers of rabies. There have been reports of infected bats.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16 (AP)—Sen. Styles Bridges, R., N.H., said yesterday the United States is ready to put into operation intercontinental-range missiles better than any ever possessed by the Soviet Union.

Bridges is a member of the Senate preparedness subcommittee. His statement issued as Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev arrived here said the United States has now equal to the USSR in the field of military rockets.

"Soon," he said, "I am confident we shall surpass them in the rocketry of purely scientific experimentation."

Bridges said he believes this country made a correct decision to devote the major part of its rocketry efforts to military missiles and to put less emphasis on the aeronautical and space experiments of Sputnik and moonshots.

"Lately" lost in the welter of recent news seems to be the exciting results of recent Atlas "HUM tests," Bridges said. "I cannot say, without any chance of contradiction, that we have in being and ready to set up in operational phase, a fully intercontinental ballistic missile."

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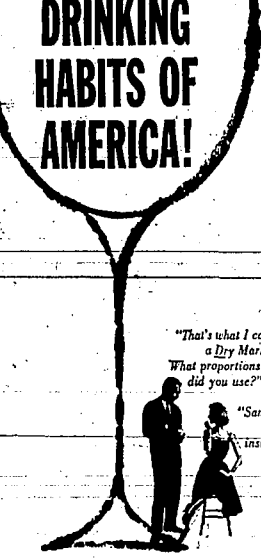

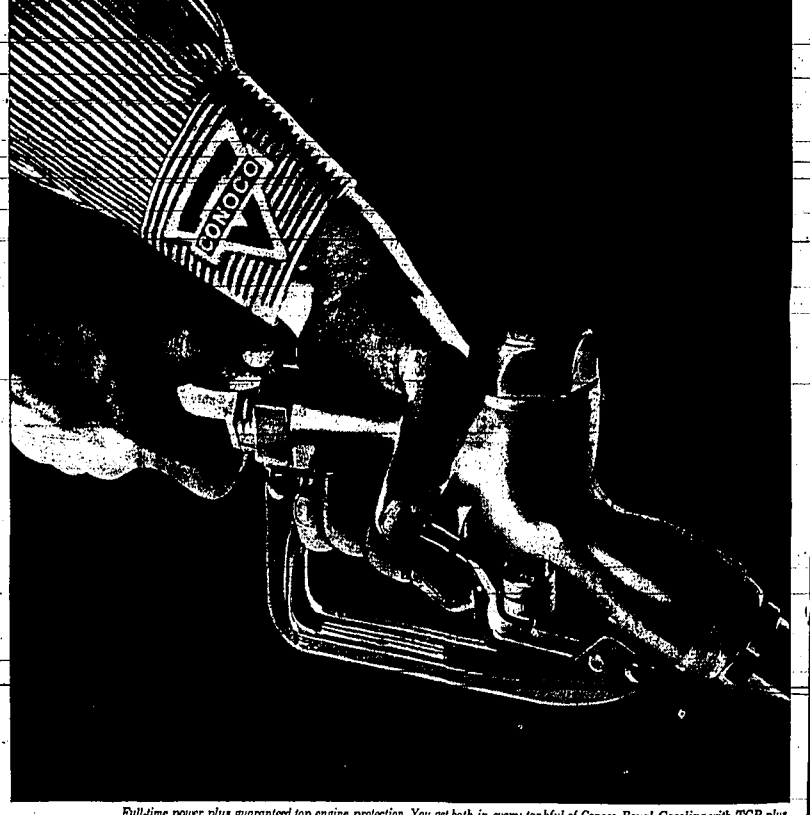

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Area Defeats Third Sewer Bond Ballot

LEWISTON, Sept. 16 (AP)—For the third time in less than three years, voters in suburban Lewiston, Ore., turned down Tuesday a bond issue to finance sewer system.

The vote was 104 ballots shy of the necessary two-thirds majority for approval for the \$200,000 sewer system proposal. The vote was 122 in favor and 672 against.

Walter Schnabel, chairman of the Lewiston Orchard area district board of directors, said no attempt would be made in the immediate future to reorganize a fourth bond issue. He predicted the suburban area of about 10,000 persons would have a sewer system for a week's time. He said pollution may force the area to eventually approve a measure supporting construction of sewer network.

The \$200,000 proposal would have been paid back over a 20-year period.

He warned that sooner or later, Lewiston Orchard residents may have difficulty securing federal aid because of the sewer collection problems. The area now is served by individual septic tanks.

A \$784,000 sewer bond issued in 1958, and a second one was turned down just two months ago in January, 1957, by a 223-102 vote.

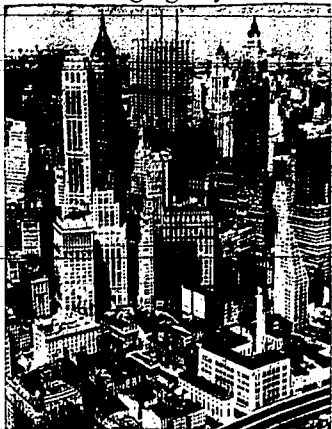

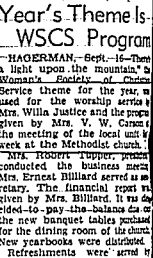

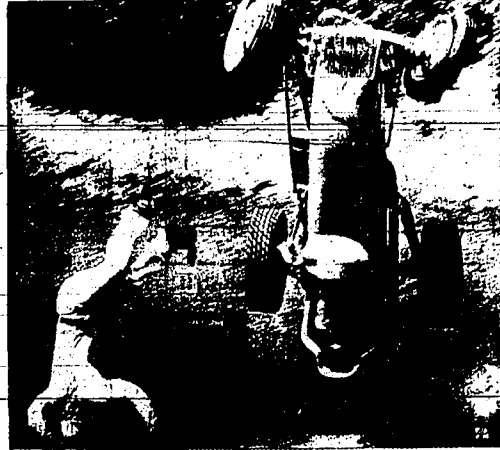

Mrs. Khrushchev Conforms To Customs, Spouse Doesn't

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16 (AP)—Mrs. Nikita Khrushchev conformed to American custom Tuesday night and wore a formal gown to the White House. Her husband came in a business suit.

She spoke English to President and Mrs. Eisenhower, and calmly held a large bouquet of red and white flowers. Her husband, through the fanfare of a full-scale official U. S. welcoming ceremony. She called off any plans, signifying to take an afternoon nap while her energetic husband kept on the go.

With gray hair pulled back in a low bun, with gray eyes, a round and pleasant face, the wife of the Soviet premier is a short and stocky woman with an upturned nose and a smiling smile.

At the airport, she came down the receiving line, a good bit behind her husband, handclapping and smiling, pausing to give an animated greeting to several Russians in the line. She had walked down the 500-foot taxi strip from the gleaming Russian turbo prop plane about 100 feet behind her husband as the official ceremony started. The grandmotherly-looking wife of the Soviet chief was a decided contrast to the chilly dressed American wives of diplomats who came to the airport to greet her in traditional Russian style; she wore a simple, dark dress, with a plain by American standards. She seemed pleasant and fully at ease in the unusual public ceremony.

Only 5 feet, 2 inches tall, three inches less than her husband, Mrs. Khrushchev wore low-heeled slippers decorated with a colorful design. She stood quietly in the sun, her face beginning to flush, holding a large bouquet of red and white flowers. Her husband and president Eisenhower delivered their speeches from a small raised platform.

Khrushchev's daughter, blond Tada, in a beige topcoat, and daughter Julia, both hairless, were given bunches of red flowers by children of Soviet embassy officials.
