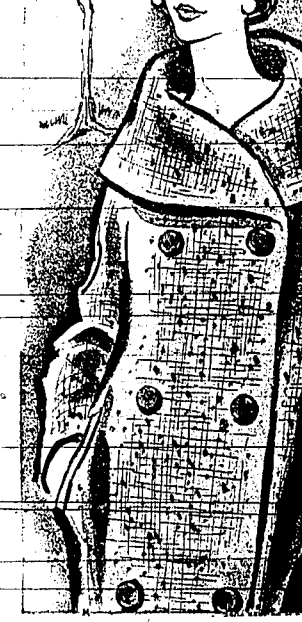

PROFIT, WITHOUT HONOR?

Much lip service is paid to the American free enterprise system by those who in the assembly have this element that makes the system work.

"Profits are too high," is a refrain often heard today, mostly from those who would gladly reduce profits by chipping some of them to their own pockets.

The condemnation of high profits comes from unions which see them as a reason for raising wages, although they never see falling wages or even losses as a reason for reducing wages.

To determine whether profits are too high, it is necessary to ask what becomes of profits. First, of course, the federal government takes more than half of them to keep the country's bills paid and defenses strong. Then many state governments take a share, and sometimes a single company must pay shares of their profit to many states.

About half of what remains is plowed back into the companies. Part goes for research which will improve tomorrow's standard of living. Part goes to pay the cost of expensive materials, sparrow new life-saving drugs, and strengthen defense. Part goes to replace obsolete and worn out plants and machinery, because depreciation is not a cash item. Part goes to the replacement of worn-out equipment.

Part goes to expand plants or set up new ones, which provide products for a growing population and jobs for a growing work force.

What is left—about a quarter of those record profits—is paid out in dividends. Ten million individual Americans depend upon these dividends, which they receive by investing their savings, for part or all of their income. Other stockholders include insurance companies, which use dividends to pay their policy holders; universities, which use them to help pay for the plant and scholarships and many labor union welfare funds.

So profits serve many social purposes. Lack of profits in a free enterprise system is a sign that things are working poorly. A normal ceiling in profits is not a matter of individual firms by competition. Profits that are "too high" may be conceivable, but the fact is that corporate dividends today are a smaller share of the national income than they were 20 years ago.

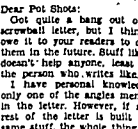

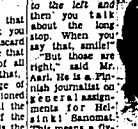

PEACE ON CREDIT

Though seldom mentioned in the news in recent months, the small, 5,334-man U.N. emergency force (UNEF) is still maintaining an uneasy peace along the restive border between Egypt and Israel. It would seem almost as if good news is no news, to reverse the old adage.

This tiny force, composed of men from such unenviable places as the peace-making and peacekeeping power of the United Nations, when that conglomeration of countries is moved to concerted action by a common danger.

But it is not an unqualified success. As Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold recently warned the general assembly, the UNEF will wind up with a deficit of over six billion dollars unless it receives \$95 million per year from its member states.

Mr. Hammarskjold named no plain, nor called none, but what else is this but an ordinary device of an international peace-keeping force? The idea of a United Nations has a long way to go if its own members default on their miserable little assessments, want to eat their cake and have it too.

British Back U.S. and Red Meet Results

LONDON, Sept. 28 (UPI)—British officials fully endorsed the decision of the conference between U.S. President Eisenhower and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

The rest of western Europe considered the Khrushchev trip to be a sign of relief. And Moscow considered the Khrushchev trip to be a sign of a flash of light in the world's darkest.

A British foreign office statement announced that "her majesty's government warmly welcomes the plan of the conference which fully accord with their view."

Belgian Gratified

The statement said Britain was "especially gratified that the United States and the Soviet Union should have agreed to settle outstanding international questions by peaceful means through regular channels."

Britain limited its first official reaction to a brief communique in the absence of detailed information on the confidential discussions between Eisenhower and Khrushchev.

A foreign office spokesman said the government was waiting for a report from Sir Harold Caccia, British ambassador to Washington, which would be carefully studied.

There would also be consultations with the British Isles in Washington and London and with the other western allies in NATO, he said.

These discussions were expected to map action which would follow the policy review of the conference by Eisenhower and Premier Khrushchev.

Belgian officials recalled that the last Geneva communique which followed the unsuccessful London ministerial treatment last summer left the door open for a resumption of the four-power talks in Berlin.

Diplomats willing to comment privately said citizens listening to radio news and coffee houses appeared to feel that the Eisenhower-Khrushchev communique was all that could have been hoped for and more than was expected.

3 Firms Making Space Ship Study

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28 (UPI)—At least three companies are making exploratory studies for the six-firm aimed at future development of interplanetary space ships, Aviation Week magazine said today.

The investigation of possible "interplanetary systems" is a study in a preliminary stage. The project is aimed at possibly establishing a base on the moon.

Shanshin, an anti-cancer officer and member of the Communist Party, said in a report in the journal "Onkologiya" that "Experiments abroad and in our country by me and my colleagues have turned up an ingredient in tobacco smoke that causes cancer. The experiments were made on animals, but there is no doubt it has the same effect on the human organism."

Explorer VI Takes Space Earth Photo

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28 (UPI)—Explorer VI, the middle weight satellite, has provided the first crude picture of the Earth and its cloud cover from out in space, the national aeronautics and space administration announced today.

The picture, taken when the satellite was 17,000 miles out in space, covered the area of Mexico.

Signals received

It was made from signals received by the South Point, Hawaii, tracking station Aug. 16.

"Thus the area photographed was more than 20,000 miles from the satellite," the NASA said in a news conference.

While the Earth was in the camera's field of view, the relative positions of Earth, sun and satellite allowed only a crescent of the sun-Earth to be seen.

A black indentation on the upper right part of the crescent was caused by loss of data.

The signal transmission from which the picture was made was received early Aug. 14, or at 3:45 p.m. Hawaiian time, Aug. 15. At that time the central part of the Pacific was lighted, the North American continent was dark and Asian land masses were over the satellite's horizon. Explorer VI was launched Aug. 7.

Navy Boasts Of New \$400 Zuni Rocket

CHINA LAKE, Calif., Sept. 28 (UPI)—The navy today boasted that its newest rocket, the Zuni, was a "major advance" in missile development.

The Zuni, developed at China Lake, is a solid-fuel missile for both air-to-air and air-to-ground use.

It is nine feet long, weighs 110 pounds and is five inches around. It is not designed to carry a nuclear warhead, but can be fitted with warheads now in development.

Project Engineer Syd Aheffer said the Zuni is more effective than the more expensive Bullpup and 100 per cent more effective against low flying aircraft.

The Bullpup, unlike the Zuni, is fired after it leaves the airplane. The Zuni is fired by the pilot in the same plane when it fires it.

State in East Seeks Cause Of Epidemic

ATLANTA, Ga., Sept. 28 (UPI)—The state health department today collected 100 mice and wild birds in three southern counties in an effort to pinpoint the cause of an epidemic of encephalitis that has claimed 10 lives.

Dr. R. M. Keadle, director of the state health department, said a 4-year-old boy died in Ocon county and another in Wilkes county with victims of encephalitis.

Other hospitalized persons included a woman suffering from the disease which affects the central nervous system and is fatal about 75 per cent of the time.

The source of the virus is wild birds, according to health officials, but it is believed to have been spread by mosquitoes.

Keadle said investigators trying to determine the exact cause of the disease were catching mosquitoes and wild birds in Cape May, N.J., and Atlantic City, N.J., where the disease has been reported because of their proximity to the source of the virus.

The state health department is looking for the source of the virus in the area of the epidemic, but officials said that the disease has been reported in other parts of the state.

U. S. Defense Costs Likely Won't Change

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28 (UPI)—The Pentagon's top finance official today said that the nation's defense costs are likely to remain unchanged, U. S. spending probably will not increase in the neighborhood of \$2 billion annually for the next two to four years.

Walter D. Merrill, assistant secretary of defense, said that the defense budget conceivably could be higher, but he predicted that power might be reduced slightly to offset increased procurement costs.

Merrill, who is credited with the handling of many defense finance matters, said that the Pentagon's budget for fiscal 1960 is \$14.5 billion, a 1.5 per cent increase over the \$14.2 billion for fiscal 1959.

He forecast there would be a "considerable number" of military aircraft throughout the next 10 years. He added that the new money going into missiles is "likely to be as much as that spent on new planes."

Any major outback, Merrill said, would be ordered "in a piecemeal fashion" and would be spread over the next three or four years.

Merrill said he did not think that the situation of the armed services would lead to any substantial change in defense spending.

Graham Talks at Wheaton College

WHEATON, Ill., Sept. 28 (UPI)—Evangelist Billy Graham opened an eight-day crusade yesterday before about 10,000 persons on the campus of Wheaton college.

Graham, who was graduated here in 1935, was invited back for the Independent Christian college's centennial celebration, as his crusade is the first of a series of evangelistic meetings to be held here at the beginning of each semester.

The college's new \$500,000 centennial gymnasium was dedicated before the start of the rally in a ceremony.

About 450 persons in the crowd composed of Wheaton students, faculty members, community residents, and visitors declared themselves for Christ.

"Ike," Khrushchev Appear to Have Reduced Cold War Chill

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28 (UPI)—President Eisenhower and Premier Khrushchev appear to have reduced the chill of the international atmosphere but there is no sign yet that they touched any real thaw in the cold war.

That was the diplomatic comment here today on the secretly-shrouded session between the two leaders at Camp David, Md.

The Russian press and radio was busy hailing Khrushchev's U. S. visit as an unqualified triumph and the Camp David meeting as the most "monumental" event since World War II.

But American officials took a cautious attitude.

"Only time would tell," they pointed out, whether the joint press conference and the talks in the morning and afternoon would result in any real thaw in the cold war.

The question of whether Khrushchev's visit was a "progress" toward a new agreement on "ending the cold war" and the decision to resume long-stalled negotiations to settle Russia's lend-lease debt.

There was also no real advance toward solving the problem of Berlin, which constitutes the heart of the cold war—Berlin, Germany and disarmament.

The word from Camp David that some "progress" was made on the German problem, it was apparent that it must have been very slight.

Khrushchev, at a news conference immediately after returning to Washington from Camp David, reiterated Russia's demand for separate peace treaties with the two Germans. This is an idea which repeatedly and emphatically has been rejected by the United States and its allies.

The mutual renunciation of force was a "positive" international question," it was pointed out, was merely a reaffirmation of the pledge both countries made when they signed the United Nations charter.

There was no definite word on any new plans.

Gifted Boy to Be Student at Home

SAINT LOUIS, Sept. 28 (UPI)—A 14-year-old boy, who amazed his one-room country school teacher with his knowledge of science and mathematics is the basis for an experiment in home learning for the exceptionally talented student.

The boy, who was not identified, showed unusual proficiency in calculus problems when he was 10.

His teacher called the attention of Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo, to the boy when he felt his interest and aptitude in math and the sciences were "too much for her."

The college, in conjunction with the Leach corporation, Los Angeles, will establish a laboratory at his farm home and administer the home-study program—through a four-man steering committee.

College officials said the experiment is to find maximum assistance and encouragement to the specially gifted boy or girl without taking time away from character-building and normalizing home environment.
