New Surgical Skill to Help Artery Illness

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 1.—A new surgical technique in the treatment of arterial disease is being used here for the first time. The procedure, known as aortography, involves the use of a catheter to inject a dye into the aorta, the main artery of the body. This allows the physician to see the branching of the arteries and to detect any narrowing or blockage. The procedure is usually performed on the lower leg, where the arteries are more accessible. It is a valuable tool for diagnosing and planning treatment for various types of arterial disease, including atherosclerosis and aneurysms.



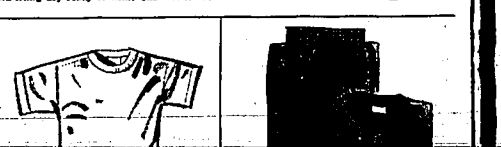

DE GAULLE AND ALGERIA

There are those who think President Charles de Gaulle of France is unrealistic in his dreams of a return to glory for his country. But he has demonstrated many times that he is not unrealistic in his approach to the knotty problems France faces.

He has understood all along that the test of his regime under the new French constitution must finally be whether he can find some workable solution in troubled Algeria.

De Gaulle has made many efforts at this, with perhaps some net gain. Only a man of his great prestige in France could attempt some of the bold moves he has undertaken. But the problem remains unsolved, and bloodshed in Algeria continues on a disheartening scale.

Now he has thrust his life on the dilemma again. He has given Algeria a three-way—outlet to total independence, from France, integration with it, or the kind of "community" autonomy enjoyed by members of the British Commonwealth.

This is the first time any French leader has dared to offer outright independence. De Gaulle knows Algeria will not take this course, but he has come to realize that it must be offered if there is ever to be a lasting solution.

The old general is not, however, a soft brawler. He demands a strict condition before he will allow the Algerians to make this historic choice.


He wants peace restored to the territory. And he defines it sharply—meaning no more than 200 deaths by murder and ambush must occur in a given year before he will conclude that Algeria is pacified. Some think that total that makes a good average monthly total.

France's friends in America and elsewhere must all get together to support a battle on his side. He never rests in negative posture. If one thing doesn't work, he tries another. He is a man who believes problems can be solved, and he spends his days looking for answers.

If he should finally find the answer to Algeria, not only France but other free lands would be the beneficiaries. For France has wasted much strength in material and manpower in the far, futile effort to suppress the Algerian rebellion. We must know what strength the French could otherwise muster in the great and continuing resistance to Soviet Communism.

NIXON'S GOOD WORK IN FOREIGN FIELD

Excluding President Eisenhower's term, there has been no American spokesman who has met with Khrushchev—Stevenson, Harriman, Humphrey, Ike Johnson—their names as a forgetful job for the western world. The man who had to work his way through college, living on a shoestring.

It was not too curious a reception which, with a few exceptions, the American community—businessmen, politicians, state and city officials, Hollywood crowd—made clear that he has done better as a visitor from Moscow suggests that the Nixon approach and answers struck a popular chord. The latest polls warrant a conclusion.

TOUGH FIGHTER AGAINST RED AIMS—Helping Nixon, too, is the general opinion that, as a president, he would be a more valiant anti-Soviet Russian than that of the Democrats, or any other party.

Assuming that a real accord does not result from the Camp David talks or a possible summit meeting, a man who has fought communist personalities and principles for so many years may be a popular figure in the West. In fact, here as in the Macmillan-Dawkins campaign in England, the election outcome rests on the question of which statesman can better equate to deal with Russia in future terms.

KHRUSHCHEV'S HATRED OF VICE PRESIDENT
—There is another factor which accounts for Khrushchev's obvious hatred of Nixon. Our Russian guest has made it clear that he has close ties on the American newspaper. He even reads, as he told the labor group at San Francisco, and although through the agency of George L. Meany, AFL-CIO president.

As a careful subscriber to the American press, Khrushchev knows that Nixon won his first election to the house by branding his opponent as "top communist."

Nor can Mr. K. forget that it was Nixon's persistence which put down Alger Hiss at a Russian copacopter and sent the state department, figure 14, to prison. Nixon was also a Joe McCarthy partisan in the early days of the late William Jenner's investigation.

ANTAGONISM POLITICAL FACTOR—The Nixon-Khrushchev antagonism has a great political potential insofar as the 1960 nomination is concerned. In every country there are men who are big game, big game and almost every on the military and aerial bars that enforces the Russo-Chinese empire. It was one of the main topics in his Camp David talks with President Eisenhower.

The vice president has been the most effective fighter on Capitol Hill for the administration's anti-Communist program. He has called for the troops in which they are located. Again, as a close reader of the press, Mr. K. is aware of this.

A tragic, preventable lake can be so awfully deadly to the unsary.

The rules of boat and water safety are simple. Don't swim. Don't drink. Don't get drunk. Load the life jackets. And be careful in the use of outboard motors.—Salt Lake Tribune.





Two Changes Are Reported For Soil Bank

The Twin Falls county agricultural conservation and conservation office announced two important changes in the soil bank program of this county.

Basic annual rates will be established by the same method used in 1958 contracts; and farmers will have until Oct. 9 (rather than Oct. 30) to take the first step in signing for the 1960 program.

These changes have been announced in a letter from the following director of the new law passed shortly before the recent adjournment of congress and signed Sept. 21 by the President. The new law will enable farmers to study the new rate arrangements and determine the advisability of coming into the program.

Carl Boyd, chairman of the Twin Falls County ASO committee, says the new law requires the legal requirement that the annual payment rate must depend on actual crop production during the period 1958 on the land placed in the bank. Many farmers reared such rates as unfair because of the effect of drought and other natural disasters on crop yields during one or more of those years.

Under the new law, basic annual rates for 1960 will be determined on the basis of the producing and value of the land for agricultural purposes for the years 1958 and 1959. The basic rate may not exceed 20 per cent of the value of the land offered and may not be higher than the basic annual rate that would have been established for the same farm in the past.

In every case where a farmer has already been informed of this rate and where the change will result in a different rate, the farmer will be notified and will have an opportunity to submit an application for a contract on the basis of his new rate.

Another recent program change that may affect some farmers in the county permits a contract with a land owner where a tenant leaves a farm voluntarily and the owner has it necessary to take over the property. The farmer may offer and apply for a contract at any figure below that basic rate, if the funds are insufficient to permit acceptance of all applications, priority in accepting offers will be based on the date at which the farmer offers his land.

Farmers who have not previously requested a rate determination but now believe that the program will be of interest to them should visit the county office as soon as possible to obtain full information, Boyd said.

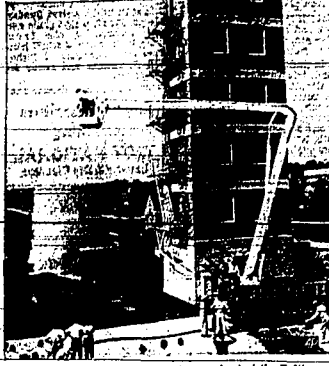

Effect of Weather Changes On Man Worries Scientists

WASHINGTON (UPI) — No one is talking about the weather when he is first changing the climate. The thought has scientists worried that man is discussing the problem informally in and out of meetings of the National Academy of Sciences. They note that man is delicately adjusted to the weather. That men—husbands and fathers—get more emotional at certain periods of the month and in different seasons of the year.

This report from Europe indicates periods of warm and dry southerly winds are always followed by increases in death rates, in automobile accidents, in mental disorders. What happens to a man, questions René J. Dubos, Rockefeller Institute, New York, who makes "sudden and repeated shifts from the hot, humid atmosphere of the tropics to the cool and dry environment indoors? Comfort of the moment may have to be paid in the future in some form of respiratory and circulatory disorders." "When you get the scientists worried, air conditioning may interfere with some of man's seasonal cycles."

What that might eventually do to his emotions makes one scientist click his tongue. Of course, for all the talk, he could change man for the better. There were several things besides weather that worried the scientists looking into man's fragility. There was new research information on animals which suggested that men might possibly be more easily killed by atomic radiation than women.

There were reports that large atomic or hydrogen bombs exploded at the right heights hundreds of miles in the atmosphere would kill by radiation men living in satellites long distances away. The scientists looked to animals to determine more new ideas on what climate changes might do to man in the future.

They noted that animals living in colder climates are usually larger than those living in warmer climates. They quoted reports that the higher the temperature, the faster ants move. They referred to findings that some new strains of worms develop when living under slight differences in temperature.

U. S., Allies Discuss Red Trading Ban

LONDON, Oct. 1 (UPI) — The United States is consulting its Atlantic Pact allies about a possible reduction in restrictions on strategic trade with the communist world, it was reported today. Administrative sources said preliminary talks are underway as a preliminary to a meeting in Paris later this month at which pact members will review current restrictions on "war-potential" aids to the reds.

The United States, under pressure from European nations eager to "cut themselves in" on billion-dollar deals offered by the Kremlin, has been working to ease the ban on G-3 items from the prohibited list. It appeared today that the Paris meeting would agree to free several of the 118 items remaining on the restricted list—such as the ban on G-3 items from the prohibited list.

The communists say that some of the items the West refuses to sell to the reds are in fact so plentiful behind the Iron Curtain that they are being "exported" by Russia and its satellites. The United States has opposed major changes in the security program, especially as it affects red China. It is not yet certain whether the recent Eisenhower-Khrushchev talks will ease the U. S. stand.
