Khrushchev Confers With Red Chinese Leaders for Third Day on 'Peace Line'

TOKYO, Oct. 2 (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev conferred in Peking with the leaders of Communist China for the third straight day today in an apparent effort to promote his new "peace line." There were indications that the conferring newspapers gave wide publicity today to his appeal for China's cooperation in seeing international relations. "The Chinese people always support Soviet proposals for easing international tension, disarmament, banning nuclear weapons and the peaceful development of Europe and German questions," said an influential paper.

Denver Snow Stops; Death Total Hits 6

DENVER, Oct. 2 (UPI)—An early season snowstorm hit Colorado today, wrecking traffic and communication lines and causing six deaths. The weather bureau reported today that snow had piled in all portions of the state, although light snow was reported in Cheyenne, Wyo. Weather was clearing in the southern and eastern portions of the state, while in the north was falling in the mountains. Colorado, which had only a few inches of snow on the ground and fog, had the biggest snowfall in the mountains. Roads in the mountains were closed, and slick in the state. The state highway department finished restoring power to heavy damage to the latest fatalities attributed to storm when a 34-year-old man was struck on the highway by a falling tree. Four other men had died of heart attacks and a Navaho Indian, John G. died of exposure at Cornudas. Hunters were believed killed in Wyoming's Albany and Walk River. Snow was falling in the mountains, preparing to leave Canyon after landing their light aircraft highway there.

U.S. Treasury Set to Borrow Four Billions

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (UPI)—The treasury said today it will borrow four billion dollars in new cash bills this month—half at the highest interest in 30 years. On Tuesday, the department will offer two billion dollars in four 10-month notes which will pay 5 percent interest. This is the highest rate on state securities since 1929. On Oct. 14, the treasury will issue six billion dollars of 28-day bills. The investors will bid for these at less than face value. The rate on the discount will reflect the effective yield, or interest rate. The 5 percent rate was the highest since 1951. During a tight money period in that year, rates on notes were as high as 6 percent. The four-year, 10-month notes will be sold at face value and will have a rate of 4 percent. The bills will be fixed Oct. 21, and will mature June 22. Treasury officials said they probably could borrow more of the new cash bills at 5 percent interest and at less than 5 percent interest if it were not for the ceiling on the amount of all borrowings for over five years.

Paper Writes Berlin-Crisis Basis Agreed

BERLIN, Oct. 2 (AP)—President Eisenhower and Soviet Premier Khrushchev have agreed on a basis for a settlement on Berlin, the Berlin newspaper reported today from what is believed to be a reliable source.

The newspaper said that there are three main points on which the two leaders agreed: 1. A corridor would be established across the 115 miles of Berlin, East German territory separating West Berlin from the remainder of West Germany. 2. Western troops would remain in Berlin, not as occupants, but to guarantee and supervise "the safe arrangements." 3. The United States would not object to a separate peace treaty between the Soviet Union and Communist East Germany.

Such an agreement would probably be opposed by some giving it the status of a communist-German state, would also be opposed by making the country even more remote.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 2 (UPI)—A new drug that produces no side effects has been developed by the University of California, San Francisco, which is already on sale in Great Britain.

That is the problem of baseball's famous Negro pitcher.

The greatest barnstorming hurler the game ever knew has fallen in love with the movie industry.

He is 40, married and a post-civil war 1st class cavalry sergeant.

"It was all new to me," confessed Oie Satch, "I had never seen a picture but I had heard that it was a good thing to do."

The hardest part was learning to act. In one part, after burying three of my buddies, I had to cry. It wasn't easy. It's been many years since anyone ever saw me cry.

"But pitcher-makin' is fascinating, particularly when you see how they make the wind blow and the rain fall, and then put the whole thing together. I'd like to do more of it if they want me."

But Paige also still loves baseball, and clings to a thread of hope that the big leagues will summon him again.

Satch, one of 14 children, quit school in the eighth grade to play ball. He had a tremendous career, but it wasn't until 1938, on the twilight of his prime, that he had a few more seasons in the big time with the Cleveland Indians and the St. Louis Browns.

But they tell me it wouldn't look right for a young pitcher to be pulled out of a game and replaced by a man old enough to be his daddy. It would shame their spirit."

Satch is noted for his colorful phrases, such as his advice, "Never-or-look-bellama-joo. Something may be wrong on you."

Asked his secret of durability, Satch said, "Get your rest, eat light, keep busy, and don't agitate yourself. If you want to stay healthy, I could tell you I did it by eating radishes, but it's the Man upstairs who keeps me moving around."

Over the years, Satch has never give up and sit down and give. Find another way. And don't pray when it rains if you don't pray when the sun shines."

DAWN'S LATE LIGHT

For some years now, various European Socialist parties, including the British Laborites, have tried to suggest that flexibility in East-West negotiations may open a pipeline to peace blocked to those who chart a more rigid course.

One of the important stories of the year was the discovery of the West German-Bolsheviks, upon visiting Soviet Premier Khrushchev in East Berlin, that he is totally unimpressed by its attitude of flexibility.

They learned, to their complete disillusionment, that he makes no effort to reach concession for concession. His answer to the soft approach is the hard demand. Concessions from his adversaries he marks down as signs of weakness, and presses more vigorously for his own aims.

The German experience has now been underscored by the recent visit of British Labor leader Hugh Gaitskell and American Senator to Khrushchev in Moscow. They came away in a state of shock at his response to their "reasonable" approach.

German reunification is a favorite topic of the Laborites and other Socialist groups. They found Khrushchev dead set against it on any terms, and totally committed to preserving two German states—at least one of them communist.

Disengagement, meaning some kind of pulling apart of East and West military forces on the continent, is another bright hope of those who think there is magic in flexibility.

Gaitskell and Bevan learned that, to Khrushchev, disengagement means the removal of U.S. forces not just from Germany but from Europe as a whole. That would put an ocean between East and West. Russian military forces would be poised just behind the Polish-Russian border, within easy march of western objectives.

The net effect of such a change, of course, would be to cut the heart of NATO. This has always been a prime Soviet aim.

Certainly there can be no glowing over the Laborites' disillusionment. We can only be grateful that in times past, more and more earnest westerners have been saying persuasively that the rigid rigidity of East-West relations is maintained in Moscow.

ARE FARM BOYS WEAKENING?

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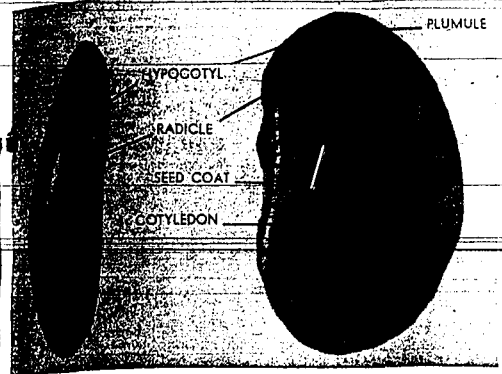

No Weather Damage Looms To Germinating of Beans

"It is hardly likely that the germinating qualities of beans sown in the field have been injured," says G. (Gabe) Nuttle, manager of the National and germination laboratory of the Associated Seed Growers, Inc., Piler.

Nuttle expressed this opinion Thursday afternoon while hoping favorable weather holds for harvesting beans.

He qualified his opinion to exclude beans that have pre-germinated or rotted in the field. He stated that beans sown in the field and germinated in the laboratory when they are wet and they dried down.

Nuttle explains that because of excessive rainfall the seed coat on the beans may tend to be loose and that insects made by improper marketing facilities may cause damage.

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Beet Harvest For Area Will Start Monday

OGDEN, Oct. 2 (AP)—Amalgamated Sugar company will open its factories in Idaho, Oregon and Utah next week, says J. A. Banning, president of the company. The beet harvest will begin Monday in Idaho, Oregon and Washington and Thursday in Utah.

The company has two target plants in the Boise Valley: Nampa, Ida., and Nyssa, Ore., will open Tuesday to be followed the next day by Rupert and Twin Falls. The Lewiston, Utah, factory is scheduled to begin operations Oct. 10.

Amalgamated's 1958 beet crop is expected to deliver about 2,600,000 tons of beets during the harvest. The company expects yields to be 10 to 15 percent in excess of last year's, according to Banning, and total sugar production is estimated at 2,600,000 bags (100-pound units) of sugar.

Practically all use of hand labor in the beet fields has been eliminated and harvesting the crop has become virtually a 100 percent mechanized operation with machines which dig, top and load the beets on trucks.

Amalgamated's regular employee personnel of 750 persons will be augmented by approximately 1,200
