Same Number of Dollars That Bought Home in '39 Now Will Buy Only "Closely"



In some notorious cases of inflation in past history the savings of a lifetime have become too little to buy a loaf of bread. The creeping cost increase that is turning the U. S. dollar into a pale shadow of its 1939 counterpart isn't that violent, but its effect on Americans is handsly demonstrated by the photos, above. Over 20 years the size of a home that could be bought with the same number of dollars has shrunk from a castle to a closely. In 1939, \$5,000 would have purchased a comfortable six-room house plus garage. For a similar amount in 1949, home buyers would have found garage gone, house harked in half. This year, 1953, all it would get for \$5,000 would be a double-decker, king-size closet. This is inflation's deadly toll on the dollar, a growing threat to U.S. standard of living.

WILL WE HIT 25,000?

The Twin Falls city commissioners are mindful of the importance of this city getting full recognition of its total population when the new census is taken in 1950. It is encouraging to note that the commissioners and City Manager Joe Latimore are making plans to annex as many new areas as possible in the hope of bringing Twin Falls population to 25,000.

Reference is made referred to the planning and zoning commission for further study before the final action is taken.

Inasmuch as the census is taken only once every 10 years, now is the time to be making advance preparations.

In times past, Twin Falls has waited until too late to establish proper recognition for its actual population. As a consequence, such cities as Idaho Falls, Pocatello, Caldwell and Lewiston have appeared to show much faster growth by comparison.

For a city to gain full advantage of its total population is more important than some people realize. As City Manager Latimore points out, Twin Falls needs to receive more revenue from liquor and high-way funds if it has a population of 25,000.

In many respects, a city profits from passing the 25,000 population milestone. It becomes recognized as a metropolitan center. It becomes more attractive to potential industries and enjoys a far greater share of advertising and distributing budgets. Moreover, it becomes a headquarters for various non-profit organizations which are a benefit to any community.

City Manager Latimore has estimated that the city's present population could be increased approximately 1,500 if new areas logically part of Twin Falls were brought within the corporate limits.

With that many extra persons, Twin Falls quite likely would reach 25,000 population, because there is good reason to believe the present figure stands in the neighborhood of 23,500. There's no way of knowing definitely, but public utility installations and Times-News circulation figures would indicate that the city is right on the mark.

Whatever we do locally in approaching the 1950 census, all plans for annexation of new areas contiguous to Twin Falls should be carried out on a cooperative basis, as far as possible.

Unless a determined attempt is made to invite voluntary participation by those living on the outskirts, pointing out the benefits to be derived by everyone, strong opposition might develop. Any such opposition would tend to defeat our purpose. Through the loss of any one area, we might miss our objective.

Here is a real opportunity for community service which will bring glory to Twin Falls during the next 10 years. Let's hope we come through with flying colors and that Twin Falls is successful in entering upon a new era.

Now is the time to get the stage set for the census takers. They'll be starting work sooner than we realize.

WASHINGTON—Ennill the British elections are over and President Eisenhower returns from his first tour there can be no serious consideration of when summit meeting should be held.

Herter and state department officials are aware, too, of the possibility of a Soviet satellite in the form of a national government. This is the kind of kind which should be avoided at all costs for the pleasure of the United States.

This curious touching scene is the boy who grew up in a small Kansas town, now each the head of one of the world's two great power centers, now in the continuing power struggle men less than nothing. But those who witnessed it could not help but hope that the spirit of the United States would be maintained.

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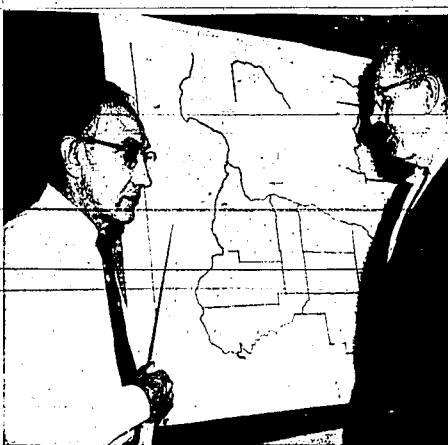

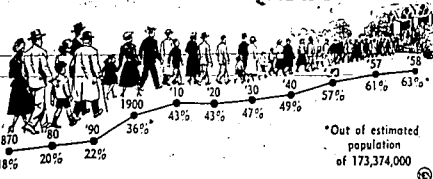

Three of the four major religious groups showed increases: Jewish figures remained unchanged. Sunday and Sabbath school enrollment and members' contributions also rose. Heavy spent for construction of religious buildings was \$62 million dollars, which was down five million from 1957.

Burley Class Described at Kiwanis Meet

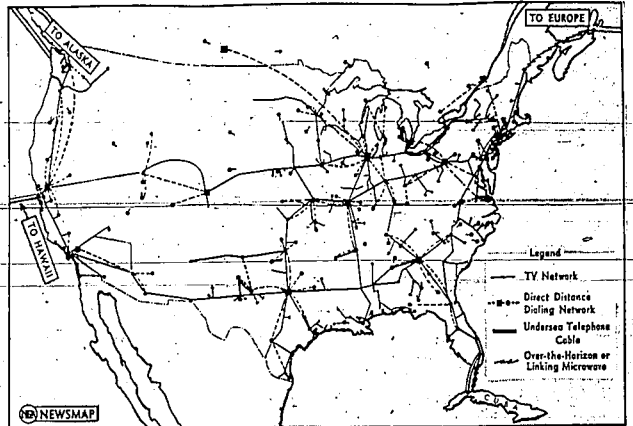

Florida Try At Mixing of Races Fails

MIAMI, Fla., Oct. 8 (AP)—Florida's first experiment in public school integration appeared today to be doomed when the state board of education assigned 378 more Negro pupils to "Oriental" white elementary schools.

The results of the 14 white pupils in the school indicated they now will take the same course as the Negroes.

The school board admitted last week to the integration of the state at the start of the fall term, along with 14 whites. The district in which the previously all-white school was situated has in recent years become virtually all Negro.

It had been expected that the school board eventually would open the school up to the Negro children of the neighborhood. The move that would make it an all-Negro school.

Most of the 14 white children in the Orchard Hills district are attending all-white schools elsewhere.

Staff to Be Replaced

The 378 Negroes will enter the schools in the fall. The present all-white staff will be replaced with a Negro principal and teachers.

In another move, the board rejected applications of 11 Negroes seeking to attend other all-white schools. They had applied for admission to Coral Gables high, and one each to Edison and Jackson high, Miami Beach junior high, and Palmdale elementary.

Nasser Ready To Talk Over Israeli Issues

CAIRO, Oct. 8 (AP)—President Gamal Abdel Nasser says he is ready to accept a United Nations commission that would implement all U. N. resolutions relating to Israel and the Arabs, including the 1951 security council resolution calling for freedom of shipping in the Red Sea.

Nasser emphasizes, however, that resolutions applying to Israel must be carried out along with those affecting the United Arab Republic.

Plan Explained

Those include the plan to give Palestine Arab refugees the right to return to their former homes in Israel or accept compensation, the 1957 plan for partition of Palestine and the internationalization of Jerusalem, which Israel has consistently rejected. He wants these implemented as well as the resolution ordering Egypt to allow Israeli shipping through the canal.

"If Israel accepts all U. N. resolutions, we will accept the security council resolution of 1951," Nasser said in a joint interview Tuesday with the Associated Press and the Christian Science Monitor.

Nasser Queried

Nasser said he has a concrete proposal for carrying out the resolutions.

"I can say we are ready to accept a United Nations board of conciliation to see these resolutions into effect for both Israel and us," he replied. "But it would be unfair if we are to implement the resolutions on our side while Israel does not implement those on her side."

UAW Convention May Be Political

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 8 (AP)—The United Auto Workers union, still suffering the effects of the 1958 recession, opens what may prove to be its most important annual convention here tomorrow.

UAW officials gathering here for the convention indicated they would use the convention to launch a giant campaign for legislative action to prevent a recurrence of the 1958 recession which left the UAW with about 200,000 fewer members than it had in its heyday in 1953-54.

The only internal issue, expected to draw any controversy at the convention was a request by the UAW international board for a bill to force a request stemming largely from the effects of the recession on the union.

Although not specifically on the agenda for the convention, the current nationwide steel strike also was expected to be among the major topics of discussion.

Utah Area May Be Disaster Site

SALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 8 (AP)—Gov. George D. Clyde asked President Eisenhower yesterday to name the only southern Utah counties drought disaster areas. And the governor said the request may be enlarged later to include six other counties.

The request came amid predictions of a possible water shortage next summer even in areas not plagued by drought this year.

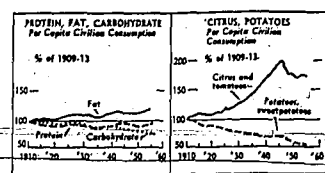
Clyde said conditions were much worse now in the counties than in 1946 when they were declared drought disaster areas.

These experts predict that in three and a half years, the U. S. may catch up with where the Soviet space men are today.

At exactly 9 p.m. (EST) today, the 13½-pound instrument package, reaches its apogee—the most distant point from the sun—on its first lap of an eternal orbit around the sun.

It will be 107,831,000 miles from the dominant star of our solar system and racing through the heavens at 59,848 miles an hour.

When it reaches its farthest point from the sun, Pioneer IV will be 15-million miles from the Earth.

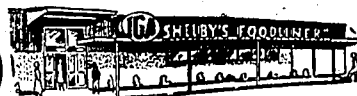

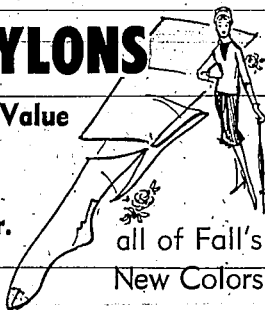

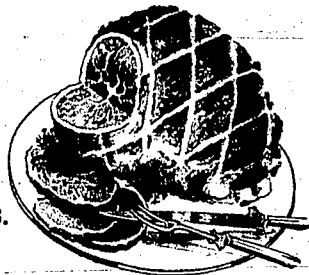

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8 (UPI)—Sen. Clifford P. Case, R. N. J., charged today that the interstate commerce commission (ICC) had favored the railroads in 95 per cent of its route abandonment decisions under the 1938 Transportation act.

He challenged Commission Chairman Kenneth H. Tamm's denial that the agency had allowed "wholesale" discontinuance of railroad passenger service.

The 1938 Transportation act gave the ICC broader discretion in allowing railroads to abandon unprofitable lines.

House Chairman Tamm has used to show that "wholesale" discontinuances have not taken place and to disprove any support his statements," Case said in a statement.

Benson Trips Place Him in Dulles' Steps

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8 (UPI)—Agriculture Secretary Ezra Benson is stepping into the shoes of the late Secretary of State John Foster Dulles as the Eisenhower administration's traveling secretary returns tomorrow from a 100-day tour of Europe with his wife and two of his daughters.

At the end of his current trip, Benson will have rolled 145,029 government travel miles in the United States and overseas.

The military is thought to take him to the moon and back with 10,000 miles left over. Benson could easily track that amount before the end of his trip.

The agriculture secretary is hoped to go to India in December to open the American exhibit at the World Fair of Agriculture. There were indications that he would like to include several other countries as well.

Benson's latest trip took him to Denmark, Yugoslavia, Russia, West Germany, Finland, Sweden and Norway, and announced purpose was to look for opportunities to promote trade in farm products.

Assassination Try Hints of New Trouble

The attempt to assassinate Premier Abdel Karim Kassem indicates a new and very confused crisis boiling up in the Middle East.

The time, world communism and the Arab East—can hardly be pleasant for the United States and the West. All such crises are dangerous. The new one could be all the more so if it develops into a test of strength between Gamal Abdel Nasser, United Arab Republic, and those who challenge his claim to Arab leadership.

No matter what the source of the attempt on Premier Abdel Karim Kassem's life in Baghdad, the incident will bring on a period of rigid martial law in which the leader of the 15-month-old Iraqi revolution will try to keep his enemies at bay.

This comes at an opportune moment for the communists. Nasser is involved in a violent war or word with Baghdad. He also is embroiled in a nasty quarrel with communist China, which more and more has been attempting to throw its weight around in the Middle East.

This quarrel came about as the result of an attempt by the Arab communists—and the Chinese communists—to ally themselves with the fledgling Iraqi republic against Nasser. This drew indignation from Cairo. It happened less than a week ago.

Lamb Purchased

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8 (UPI)—The agriculture department has announced the purchase of 100,000 pounds of frozen ground lamb for donation to school lunchrooms. The cost was \$95,000.

Officials said the lamb purchased program will continue next week. So far, 180 thousand pounds have been bought at a total price of \$113,000.

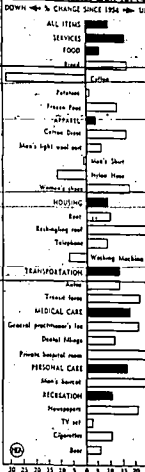

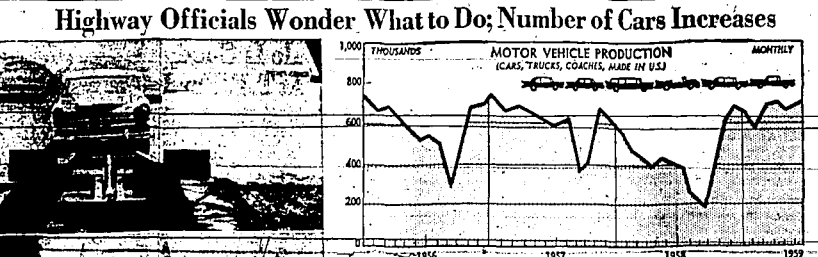

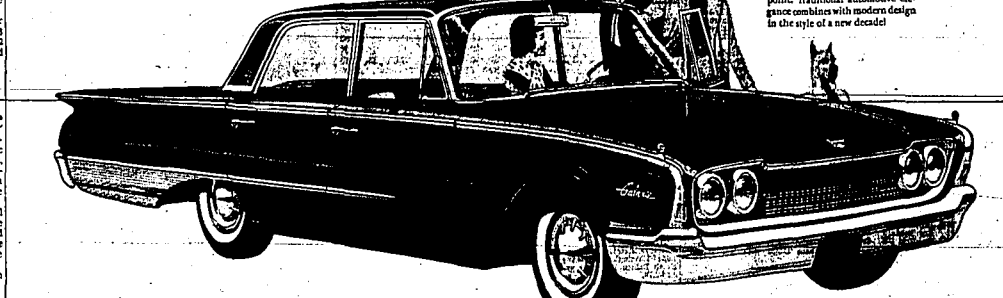


Chart, above, traces recent vehicle production. One estimate places production during next 18 years at an eight-million annual average, for autos, alone. Data came from Business Statistics.

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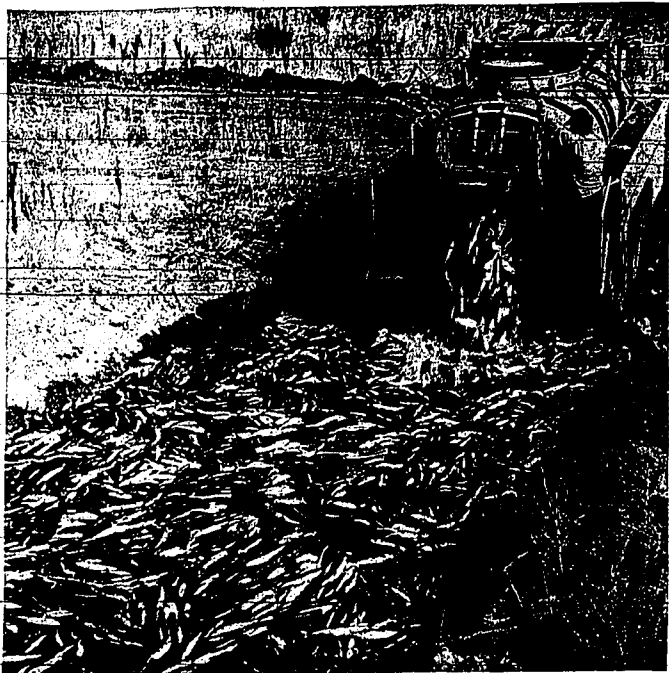

Power Firm Disposes of Trash Fish From Oxbow

Idaho Power is permitted by the federal and state fish agencies to bury loads consisting solely of trash fish, but is required to haul all

trappings containing salmon and steelhead 15 miles upstream for release in the Brownlee dam reservoir. When disposal pits such as this one are full of trash fish, they are covered with dirt by bulldozers. Wendell K. Smith, Idaho Power fish biologist, says efficient handling of salmon and steelhead is complicated by the hordes of trash fish that enter the complex Oxbow trap along with the game migrants. About 90 per cent of the trash fish are suckers, while other species include squawfish, carp and chiselmouth. (Staff engraving)
