New U.S. Satellite May Tell of Space Radiation And Weather Questions

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., Oct. 13 (UPI)—The United States put into orbit today a new "gyroscop" satellite expected to answer many questions about space and weather. The satellite, named Explorer VII, was put aloft with a powerful Juno II rocket fired here at 11:31 a.m. (EST). In Washington, the national space agency announced that Explorer VII is in orbit. The satellite had completed one complete orbit around the Earth shortly before the announcement, an agency spokesman said. Weighing 914 pounds, the satellite's main goal is to study cosmic radiation, knowledge of which is a key to space travel by man. The 76-foot rocket rose ponderously from its launching pad, it accelerated rapidly and, after about 40 seconds, cleared high in the sky and headed toward the northeast, spouting a brilliant trail of fire. A minute later the satellite had cleared the atmosphere and was in its second space orbit. It was launched at a 37-degree angle from the cape. Smylie Tells Soon Unit Idaho to Get First Use of Water

BOISE, Oct. 13 (UPI)—A visiting select senate committee on water resources today announced that Robert A. Smylie, Idaho plans to use its water resources for itself first. The governor's detailed remarks on the water situation were read by Reclamation Engineer George Carter. The chief executive is in Los Angeles with a group of Idahoans on a state promotional campaign. Sen. Robert Kerr, Oklahoma, presided over the session. Bureau of Reclamation officials and private citizens appeared to testify during the day.

In his statement, Smylie said Idaho is not evenly confronted with the serious water problems that exist in other parts of the United States. There are minor shortages of irrigation water supply in local areas, but they are readily remedied by storage construction.

He said he "wanted four things for Idaho to receive from the federal government."

These, said the governor, are "flood protection" for existing agricultural and domestic water rights, the state's right to make later overriding appropriation of water from the federal reservoirs for beneficial agricultural consumptive use must never be reduced, and adding downstream states "by concentrating on upstream storage."

John Sorenson, Hagerman, representing the Idaho Farm Bureau federation, said Idaho agriculture "could be more profitable from a long-term view than from any other source of income."

Such a shift might change the whole picture of American politics. In fact, statistics of numerous elections throughout the country suggest that the rank and file has been ahead of their bosses in assuming an attitude of "neutrality."

The record of recent decades suggests the chance is not great. Whatever the leaders say in certain moments of heat, most regard the Democratic party as their political home. When the voting test is at hand, they get an uncomfortable feeling of straying if they start to move beyond its borders.

BOISE, Oct. 12—With less than two weeks remaining before high school seniors in 14 states will take a new college admissions test, Dr. John S. Knight, Jr., Boise Junior High School, announces that most Idaho colleges are participating in the test.

The test will be given at Boise Junior college, Boise; Idaho State college, Pocatello; North Idaho college, Coeur d'Alene; Idaho State college, Rexburg; Twin Falls high school, Twin Falls; and the University of Idaho, Moscow.

Philip, who is the state coordinator of the program, said these colleges have joined the American college testing program, which will conduct the first entrance examination throughout the state on Oct. 14. Students in 14 western states will write the test.

The 10,000-word report on "Economic Opportunity and Progress" was the fifth and final document approved by a 40-member committee headed by Charles H. Percy, Chicago businessman. The group was named to outline long-range GOP goals.

BOISE, Oct. 12 — Rep. Hanner Budge, R., Ida., said today he favors Vice President Richard M. Nixon for the GOP presidential nomination in 1960.

Budge told UPI in an interview that "Nixon is the best qualified man in the United States to be president" because of his ability and experience.

Nixon Is Ahead — The meeting among Republicans in Washington, D. C., he said, is "much the same. Nixon is 'running far ahead' among the potential nominees mentioned, according to Budge.

Rep. Charles Halleck, R., Ind., minority leader of the house, also mentioned as a running mate for Nixon, Budge said. Both Nixon and President Eisenhower are "very conversant with Idaho's interests," he said.

The eastern Idaho congressman said Adlai Stevenson is "about" among Washington political circles to have the best chance of winning the Democratic nomination.

Budge said he wants to get back to Washington before the budget bureau proposals are drawn up by the president.

"Idaho has a big stake in these," he said, pointing out the federal government owns about 67 per cent of the land in the Gem state.

Also of importance to Idaho are budget plans for atomic energy and guided missile installations, he said.

Dougiers', Alston, Lopez of White Sox Are Named Top Managers in Major Leops

NEW YORK, Oct. 13 (UPI)—Al Lopez, who led the Chicago White Sox and Los Angeles Dodgers to surprise pennants, and then battled the Philadelphia Phillies first "jet world series," were named the top managers of the American League and National League, respectively, by 22 of the 24 writers who comprised the American League committee while Alston, 47-year-old native of Darrtown, O., was picked for the National League's top spot by 16 of the 23 writers on the board.

Joe Gordon, who led the Cleveland Indians to a second-place finish, received the other two votes in the American League. Bill Hays, whose San Francisco Giants folded in the final week of the campaign after apparently having the pennant "locked up" was selected by 12 of the 23 writers on the board.

Lopez, who never has finished less than second in 12 years of managing major and minor league teams, was honored for steering the White Sox to their first pennant in 40 years. Although rated first, Hays' record was not really expected for the perennial world champions.

But the White Sox, making up for their lack of pitching and strong defense, excellent pitching and resourceful hit-and-run offense, stayed close to the front-running Cleveland Indians through the first half of the season and then glided into the lead in July.

The Sox assumed complete command of the race by winning a dramatic eighth game on Oct. 11 in the eighth inning and finally breaking the Sox's south side hitless flag into two by beating the Indians, 4-3, Sept. 2.

This marked only the second time in 12 years that the Sox failed to bring home the Yankees first—and it was the second time they have been by a league-level team. The ex-Dodgers coach managed the Indians in 1957 and 1958, and won the record number of pennants at five straight.

For his handling of pitchers during an 18-year big league career, Lopez contributed to the Dodgers' success in 1955 when Stengel, who had won the pennant in Brooklyn, started this year's pennant race in the eighth inning of the seventh-inning final of the year.

Few experts gave the Dodgers a chance of winning a half dozen games during the season as the Giants' lead in the pennant race was a two-game lead for the first game.

But the Dodgers roared from behind to tie the Yankees in the final post-season playoff in New York when they stopped the Braves in two straight games and then upset the White Sox, favored at 10-1, in the six-game world series.

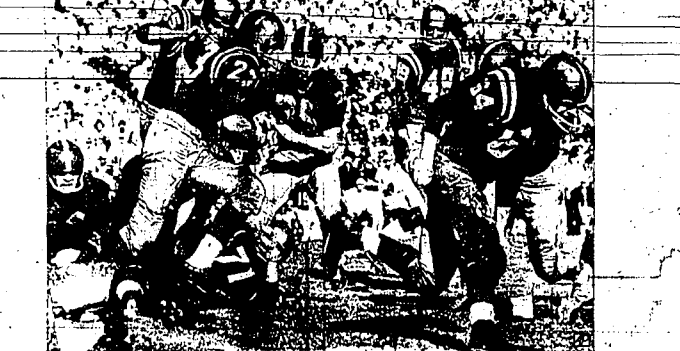
