WASHINGTON, Oct. 16 (UPI)—Steel company negotiators agreed today to consider a scaled-down wage-benefit package plan proposed by the union as a means of ending its 94-day-old strike. Steelworkers President David J. McDonald presented his new peace offer as direct union-management negotiations resumed for the first time since Oct. 6. R. Conrad Cooper, chief management negotiator, told newsmen after the one hour and 45 minute session that his side would examine the proposal and meet with the union bargaining team again at 4:30 p.m. (EDT) tomorrow.

"We are on both sides strenuously endeavoring to reach an agreement to settle this issue," he said.
