### Workers for 3 State Area Earn Billions

BALT LAKE CITY, Oct. 19 (AP)—Collectively, Intermountain wage earners are billionaires.

A report released by First Security bank says personal income in the area this year should reach \$2,000,000,000.

The figure includes \$1,600,000,000 in Idaho and \$400,000,000 in Utah and \$1,100,000,000 in Nevada and \$1 million in the southwestern Wyoming area served by the bank system.

Vice Pres. Erroy Nelson said in the report that wage loss from the strikes in copper and steel, which has been running about two million dollars weekly, is 18 million dollars in the third quarter of the year.

"Despite the strikes in copper and steel, Utah's personal income continues above last year's levels because of the increased malleable program in the area from Salt Lake north to Box Elder county," the report said.

"Farm income for the first nine months of 1959 was slightly lower in Idaho than a year ago. The same applied to metal mining. However, on a statewide basis there have been more than offset by increased employment and wages in industries such as lumber and phosphate.

"Increased marketing, especially for cattle at fairly stable prices, and the improved outlook for wool and prices are expected to balance somewhat the decreases shown in cash farm income in the early part of the year."



### Hank Suggests British Drive On American Side of Roads

By Henry McElwre LONDON—A mighty good way for England to settle its lend-lease debt to us would be to abolish driving on the left-hand side of the road.

Hundreds of thousands of Americans visit England every year, and every year hundreds of thousands of Americans spend half their time there in their hearts in their mouths.

There is no such thing as an American visitor to England and almost always the wrong way to travel is the "wrong way" traffic. It takes weeks to keep from looking the wrong way when crossing a street, and to get accustomed to bowing along in a taxi on the left side of the road.

A tourist simply can't enjoy the sights of England while holding his breath. He expects to be rammed by an oncoming vehicle any second. Many Americans never grow used to traveling on the wrong side of the street so they do all their traveling with their eyes closed or crouched in the bottom of the car.

Sightseeing with the eyes closed, or now and then taking a peek over the top of a car door, can hardly be called sightseeing at all. Highly nervous Americans stick close to their hotels. I was talking with a gentleman from Indiana today, and he had seen nothing of London except what he could see in a hurr around the block as he "tried crossing the street once."

He told me, "but I looked the wrong way and a bus took the shine out of my shoes. I'd love to see the crown jewels and the zoo and the change of the guard, but I have to get my family back home, to which I am devoted, and I feel it my duty to return to them alive, even if there is nothing of London but the tourists from my hotel window."

The bravest of all American tourists are those who rent a car and drive it about England. I tried this one, years ago, and finished the run from London to Scotland with a triple heart murmur, a permanent flutter in the left eye, and a pair of hands that still shake.

It is impossible for an American, schooled in right-hand driving, to take a curve on the inside without having his heart skip to or 12 beats while rounding it. He just knows there is going to be a collision, if not with an English-

Paul Rand Dixon, chief counsel for the committee, made those disclosures today. Dixon said, "our investigators located D'Amato in New York City, and asked if he would confer with them. He agreed readily. And he cooperated with them in answering their questions. We regard him as an important witness."
