The 200-ton jet, valued at five million dollars, smashed into piles of scattered burning wreckage when Baum set it down on the sand bar on the Bullwinkle river after three of its four engines were torn away in what Boeing officials called a "violent maneuver due to misapplication of controls." Only the tail section, in which those who survived were riding, remained intact after the plane crashed.

The rest of the plane became a funeral pyre for Baum and three others, two of them personnel of Boeing's test pilots for the airplane had been manufactured.

Those who died with Baum were identified as George C. Hagen, 28, Boeing flight instructor, Renton, Wash., and Capt. John A. (Jack) Dure, 46, and Capt. Frank Blalock, 44, both Braniff.

The survivors were listed as William Atlopp, Seattle, a Boeing pilot; William Huxford, federal aviation agency, and Al Krausz and Fred Symank, Braniff.

### 2-Stage Plan For Building Dam Opposed

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—The army is opposed to use of the installment plan for construction of Lilly dam, subject to a dispute between the United States and Canada.

The army's position was disclosed today with release of a long letter to the house public works committee.

Despite this opposition, Rep. Lee Metcalf, D. Mont., said he would try to line up support in 1960 for the Lilly dam bill he introduced this year. His bill would authorize construction of the dam in two stages.

A dispute over how the two countries should divide benefits from Lilly dam has for years prevented the United States from building the Kootenai river project in northwestern Montana.

Because the dam would back water into Canada, where the Kootenai flows, the United States is opposed by its neighbor to the approval of the project before the project is approved.

An application for such approval is before the International Joint Commission which handles water problems arising between the two countries.

Metcalf's bill would permit the United States to build the dam in two stages: First, to a height which would back water up to but not over the international border; second, to a height necessary to cover the U. S.-Canada reservoir required for generation of electric power and storage of flood control water.

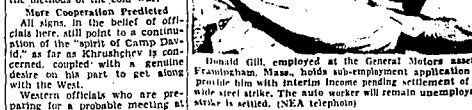

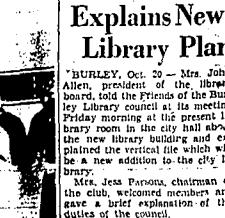

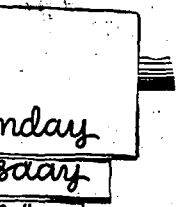

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### Female Now Weighs Less; Men Heavier

**NEW YORK, Oct. 20 (UP)—**American women tend to weigh less and American men tend to weigh more, according to a study by the American Medical Association. The study, based on data from 1940 to 1955, shows that American men are taller, but American women are about half an inch taller.

Men start to gain weight in their 20s, and level off after age 30. Women hold the diet line until after age 35.

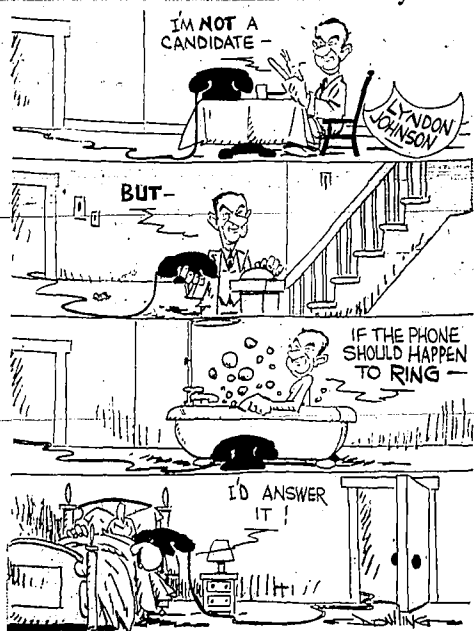

### Arms-Making on Increase in Germany, U.S. Dollars, Know-How Listed as Cause

**BONN, Oct. 20 (UP)—**Arms-making in Germany is increasing, particularly in West Germany, because of the six-nation common market and technical know-how—almost by accident—now giving it a big boost.

Just how far it will go remains to be seen.

U. S. government officials say they are watching the development with interest and some concern.

The defense ministry says it has no desire to see a major arms industry grow up again in Germany but adds it can't do anything to prevent Americans from spending their money where and how they wish.

Proponents of the European market, particularly in Germany, before the six-nation common market creates a formidable tariff wall against American goods.

American investors estimate their money can go further where production costs, particularly labor, are cheaper than at home.

American firms feel that West Germany is going to grow more and more important as an arms producer and that profit is to be had in the field.

"But the latter point is essentially a by-product of the first two," says Richter.

American officials point out that the major area of U. S. investment in the field of defense production has been aircraft.

U. S. money is going chiefly into the building of wholly owned subsidiary plants rather than in purchase of shares in German industry.

### Overseas Aid By U. S. Will Be Less Now

**WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (UPI)—**A new U. S. policy on foreign loans was expected today to shift a bigger share of the overseas aid burden to other industrialized nations.

The policy change, announced last night by the Development Loan Fund (DLF), also is intended to help check the flow of gold and dollars out of the United States—now running about \$1,000,000,000.

Buying in U. S. Emphasized

From now on, the DLF will place "greater emphasis" on loans which will be spent in this country. Officials said this would block underdeveloped nations from getting loans and then using them to buy consumer goods from other countries such as Germany and Japan.

DLF Director Vance Brand said the policy was reached after a careful review. He noted there has been "growth in the steady state" since 1953, he reports the U. S. has a surplus of goods and services in the free world and that they have shown "increasing ability to assist the less developed countries."

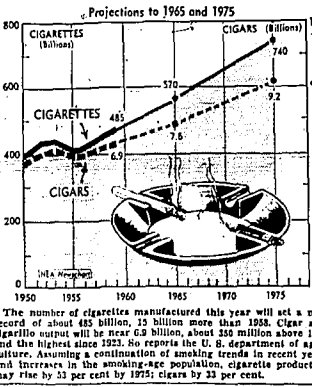
Others to Help

"There is now a fair presumption that other industrialized countries which export capital goods to the less developed countries are in a financial position to provide long-term loans on reasonable terms to assist such countries in their development programs," Brand said.

"It has therefore been decided to particularly in financing the foreign exchange costs of development projects and programs the DLF will place primary emphasis on the financing of goods and services on U. S. origin."

The DLF will not shut off completely the financing of development projects requiring goods and services supplied by other nations, in cases where it would be more logical to use foreign equipment, the fund will insist on a "buy American" policy.

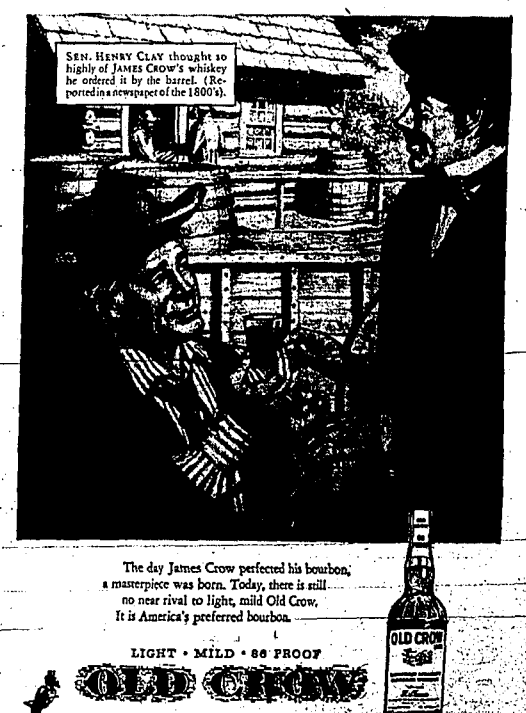
