**Cuban Newspaper Hints America Is Involved in Attacks on Fidel Castro**

HAVANA, Cuba, Oct. 22 (UPI)—The newspaper Revolution, semi-official voice of Premier Fidel Castro's government, implied today that the United States was involved in last night's attack on Havana. In subsequent attacks on the leaflet reader and in a series of ground bombings and wild shooting escapades, at least 20 persons were killed and almost 60 wounded. The nighttime attacks culminated a day of anti-Castro activity in this island republic and brought a call for a mass labor demonstration today in support of Castro's regime in its bid to crush the rebellion.

**U. N. Action Said Indirect Slap at China**

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Oct. 22 (UPI)—The United Nations last night indirectly slapped China for violating the basic rights of Tibetans but the U.S. was not included in the report from nearly one-third of 100 member nations.

The report, which was adopted by a vote of 100 to 35, with 25 abstentions, said the U.S. had not taken any action to determine their own way of life.

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**Constitutionality Of Taft-Hartley's Strike Law Tried**

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 22 (UPI)—Three federal judges, delaying enforcement of a Taft-Hartley injunction against striking steel workers, took under advisement today the union's plan to throw out a writ altogether as unconstitutional. After a hearing which lasted about four hours, the judges said they hoped to arrive at a decision early next week. Meanwhile, the 100-day old strike continues pending the finding on the question of constitutionality.

The 90-day injunction was granted in Pittsburgh yesterday by Judge Herbert F. Sorg, U. S. District court.

Earlier, the judges granted an injunction to a national union council remonstrated its arguments, declaring that the strike has created a national emergency, that indeed the economy is booming, and that the injunction violated the basic rights of labor to strike, rights that are part of the collective bargaining code in a national emergency.

The government, after a brief interval of uncertainty over the exact legal status, is now ready to go forward with the main question of constitutionality of the injunction, provided it could be filed in the U. S. district court in Pittsburgh.

### Atomic City's School Case Is Appealed

BLACKFOOT, Oct. 22 (U)—The Snake River school board decided last night to appeal to the state supreme court an order to reopen the elementary school at Atomic City.

Rep. Lavern Marcum said the vote was unanimous. The board authorized its attorney, William Rogers, Blackfoot, to proceed with whatever action may be necessary to appeal the decision to the state supreme court.

**Reopening Orders**  
State District Judge Paper Tracy ordered the board to reopen the school Monday. The dispute resulted from the refusal of parents to send elementary school pupils to school at Moreland, 23 miles away. They extended the 60-mile daily trip by bus would be hazardous.

His unthinking readiness to wreak destruction on millions of innocent and helpless people for no other purpose than to assure that the adversary suffers no less than we do, Kennan said, "is the most hideous self-centeredness as the part of ourselves as a generation."

Kennan, a frequent critic of administration foreign policy, offered a new proposal for settling the Berlin problem and the dispute with the Soviet Union over Germany's future.

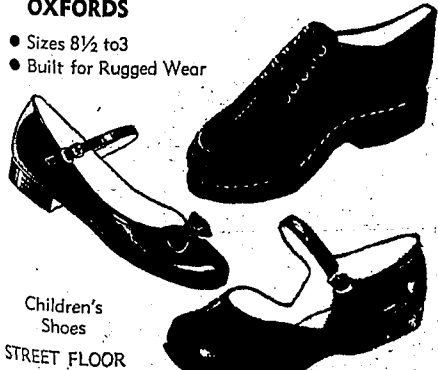

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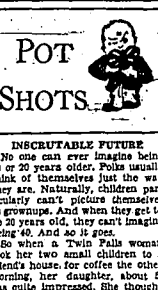

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# TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON — What American presidential possibility would be preferred by Nikita Khrushchev? What candidate might be able to do most effectively to bring about a compromise without any sacrifice of American principles, assuming that Moscow is willing to end the "cold war" and give up the "harmful" arms race?

The obvious answer, of course, is President Eisenhower because he is the only one who has shown that he is willing to do this. But the President is "in" in his desire for world peace and disarmament. But Eisenhower is not in because he cannot run again, although the next administration, whether Republican or Democrat, will be divided to utilize his services in negotiations with the communists. No other American enjoys the same confidence on both sides of the "iron curtain."



**What Is "Unemployment?"**

Congress isn't in session, but a new unit of it is—the senate special committee on unemployment. This group won't make too many headlines but it is likely to be listened to by economists than to thugs and crooks, and economists can be a colorful lot. Yet, the recommendations of this committee may be as important as any that have sat lately.

One of the early witnesses was George Hagedorn, director of research for the National Association of Manufacturers. Mr. Hagedorn urged the committee to get a complete picture of the nature of unemployment in the weeks that will follow.

And he wanted a picture himself. There can be unemployment in a time of acute labor shortage—as in the war years when half a million were jobless and everyone worked long hours and extra days because there wasn't anyone else.

In August, 1959, when there were more than 3 million unemployed, only about one in six of those out of work 15 weeks or more was the head of a family—a main breadwinner. The labor department's unemployment figure includes housewives who only work now and again, women who quit for any reason, students looking for summer jobs. And the figures don't show at all how many people are on short weeks due to lack of enough work in their places of business.

Today's 3 million figure is serious enough for a congressional committee to consider carefully, even though the nation was until a figure of 8 to 14 million from 1933 until the war preparations got under way—and back then there were only three quarters as many Americans in the labor force.

**WASHINGTON (NSA)**—Your payments and casualty losses. The legislators are going to look for husbands and wives to file joint returns. In effect splitting their income to keep their taxes low.

There will be a new sharp look at deductions for entertainment. The lawmakers are also looking into ways to decrease some tax rates. But so far the decrease proposals have less support.

They're looking at proposals which would reduce the maximum tax rate on top-bracket income, but at the same time they're studying proposals that would allow the large income earner loss of a allowance for gifts, medical expenses and other personal expenses now allowed as deductions.

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# First Idaho Electric Lights Used at Smelter in Ketchum

**BOISE, Oct. 22**— Idaho was the first state to benefit from the wonders put at man's disposal by Thomas A. Edison's development of a practical incandescent electric lamp in 1879.

This little-remembered fact of the state's history is recalled by R. R. Helms, power plant operating superintendent for Idaho Power company as the electrical industry and the general public observed the 80th anniversary of Edison's dramatic achievement in 1959.

"It was only a short time later, in 1881 or 1882, that the first electric lights in Idaho were turned on in a smelter at Ketchum," according to Helms, a veteran Idaho power employee.

Power for the lights was generated by what is believed to be the first hydroelectric plant in Idaho—located in the entire Pacific Northwest. It consisted of one of the first hydro plants erected by Edison and powered the smelter's machinery in addition to its electric lighting.

"Helms says he has been with electric lights and it was also there that the state's first hydroelectric plant for service to the public was built in 1885," Helms related.

The lighting system at the Ketchum smelter consisted of 25 carbon filament lamps, while the first public hydro plant at Ketchum served 250 bulbs at a charge of 45¢ per light per month.

Boise got its first electric lights two years after the Halley hydroelectric plant was installed. The utility subsequently replaced the Edison lamps with modern electric lights from a plant with a 500-hp capacity that was built on the Piedburgh canal.

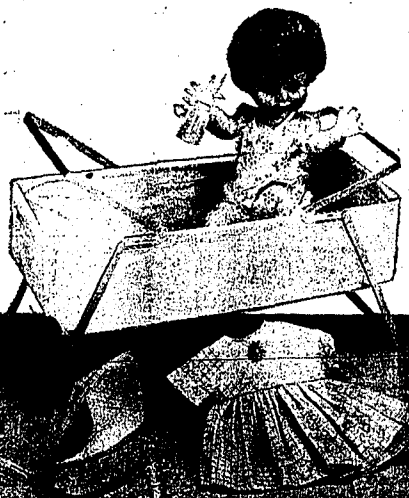

# Filipino War Hero Is Told To Quit U. S.

**SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 22 (U. S. AP)—** A Filipino hero who served with the U. S. Army in World War II and was decorated for his heroism, has been ordered to quit the country after his wife and three American citizens—his daughters.

Francisco said the U. S. Immigration Service has charged Felix Montalban, 36, with being in the United States illegally.

Montalban was discharged from an army ship in San Francisco in 1952 under the McCarran-Walter act forbidding aliens to work on government ships.

His wife, Remedios, 40, whom he married here in 1952, was in San Francisco on a student's permit.

Montalban served with the U. S. transport service in the Philippines and the Korean War, fought as a guerrilla in the Philippines, and was a steward aboard an American transport when it was bombed and sunk off the Philippines by the Japanese in 1945.

His pay \$100,000.

Before the sinking, a report goes, the captain handed him \$100,000 of the ship's money.

"If you're saved," the captain said, "try to get this money into American hands."

Washed ashore on an island, Montalban turned the money over to American forces who met him and went into the jungle to fight as a guerrilla.

"I don't understand," Montalban said, "it was the army transport service which brought me to the United States and then I was ashore. Now I am to be deported for illegally entering the country."

He has worked as a cook for several years for the States Steamship company.

### Butler Says GOP Does "Flipflops"

OBERLIN, O., Oct. 22 (UPI)—Democratic National Chairman Paul M. Butler today accused Republicans of "amazing flipflops" in the foreign policy field.

He also charged that the Eisenhower administration has shown "no initiative" in dealing with world problems.

"In spite of the grave race for national survival... the Republican party will continue to call for less, rather than greater, national effort," Butler said.

In a speech at Oberlin college, the Democratic chairman said the administration has "been largely in a retreat... or advancing dynamically backward away from its own absurdities and indefinabilities."

### Change Asked

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22 (UPI)—Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell said today he plans to recommend changes in the Fair-Hartley law's national emergency provisions relating to strikes.

The main change he wants, Mitchell said, is to "give the federal mediation and conciliation service the right to ask the President to appoint a board of inquiry... a board to clarify the issues" at any time during the mediation process, perhaps even before a strike occurs.

### "Red Magnet"

OAKLAND, Calif., Oct. 22 (UPI)—Soviet Russia's Iron Curtain has been replaced by a "red magnet" according to Norman Cousins, editor of the Saturday Review of Education.

Cousins told an assembly at Mills college yesterday that the present objective of Soviet policy is to attract as many persons as possible to the USSR, especially from Asia and Africa.

### Idaho's Law On Firearms Is Criticized

Grand Juror Wilkins said at the end of the boy's death that he was struck by a bullet fired by Bode while 14, also Bode, four days before.

The special jury also made a ruling in the death of Santiago Camp, whose body was found Oct. 2 to be desert near here. The verdict was that he had been shot to death by an unknown person.

Camp is one of four robbery-victim in southern Idaho whose deaths have not been solved.

### Hunger Strike by Student Is Over

BERKELEY, Calif., Oct. 22 (UPI)—The 18-year-old son of a U.S. Air Force pilot ended his hunger strike against compulsory military training five days ahead of schedule and weakened by hunger.

He lost eight pounds in his 50-hour fast. Fredrick L. Miles, son of the Air Force pilot, said he thought he had accomplished his purpose.

More than 1,000 students at the University of California signed his wish to make reserve officers training compulsory instruction voluntary.

The boy's father disagreed with his son's position, the Berkeley Post said. "I have tried to raise my children to make their own decisions."

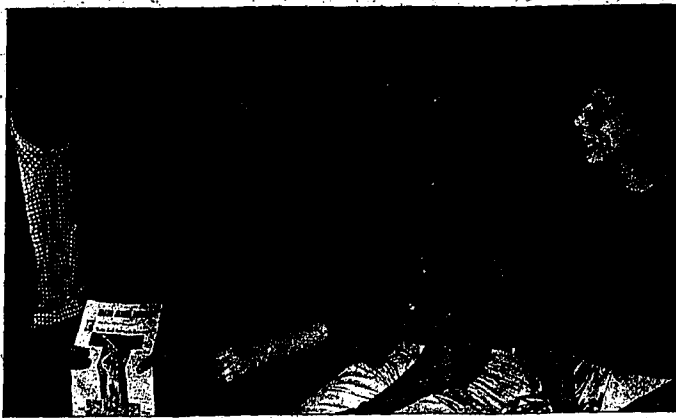

### Hank Disputes Idea English and U. S. Language Is Same

By HENRY McLEMORE

LONDON—One of the most oft-repeated mistakes I know of is that one about how England and America share a common tongue, and how it forms an unbreakable bond between the two countries.

In my small way I have done my best to correct this mistake. When a reader who is planning a trip to Europe writes to ask me if he can expect much trouble because of the language barrier, I always answer: "Only in England. You'll run into trouble there, and will be wise to carry along an English-American self-pronouncing dictionary."

Although I speak little or no German, French, Italian, Swiss, Flemish, or any of the other European languages, I have very little difficulty getting along until I get to England.

Then, no matter whether I'm buying cigarettes in a tobacconist or asking for a single room with bath, no one seems to understand me, and I have a devil of a time understanding them.

I have long given up going to the theater in London. As cheap as the best seats in the best plays are, it is a waste of money to sit through three acts and not know whether you are at a comedy, a tragedy or a mystery. The same is true with the movies, especially those that are made for home consumption.

The movies sent to America are different. The action is more clearly and slowly. But in the ones made by the English for the English, the only recognizable sound is the bang of that drumstick on the

The language barrier got me the minute I stepped off the plane in London. Two crisply dressed Scotsmen, with very crisp voices, gave me instructions as to where to go, and which one to follow. I didn't catch a word and so went off with the wrong hankies, and wound up in the transient passengers' lounge, where I was trapped for an hour.

It was a dismal mistake, for the transient passengers' lounge at London airport is the most unattractive room to be found in any city terminal in the world. It looks like a dog kennel with curtains, only not quite so large.

The passenger can't walk away his time drinking tea if he can get the little old lady behind the counter to make it for him. I never did get a cup, for the little old lady spent all of her time taking the money out of the cash register and counting it—over and over again.

The principal decoration is a glass show case with a display of products made in Australia. There

is a little ball of wool, a warty driver, a monkey wrench, a metal weight and other objects of almost beauty—lowly to look at, but for 14 or 15 minutes, but even the most beautiful monkey wrench would after an hour.

If the transient passenger wants to spend any money there is a Scottish shop which sells baggy tweed skirts and kilts. If he wants to read he has the choice of the night I was penned in there, a June, 1938, copy of Motor magazine and a slightly more recent copy of the Edinburgh Journal.

Every time I tried to break out, I would push me back. I wanted to be or not. I finally made one exit, but I had to spend it on a Common language, my foot.

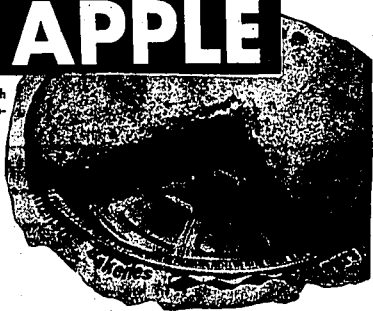

With the Saturday opening the entire state will be open except for three southern counties which do not have huntable populations of upland birds, the Idaho fish and game department notes. The state agency also pointed out Saturday will offer the greatest selection of game to hunters of the variety. General deer and elk seasons and waterfowl hunting plus the upland season opening combine to offer the variety for Idaho shooters.

### Nichols Pays Cyclones Off With Victories

One hundred, sixty-five pounds of Nichols has added up to four wins in football talent for Iowa State and a paying off in the Cyclone's first winning season in decades.  
The investment is Dwight Moore Nichols, a 5-foot, 10-inch, 145-pound halfback from Knoxville, Iowa who has been one of the nation's offensive mainstays the past two seasons. In addition to leading the Big Eight in total offense, Nichols, who spent 41 months in the Navy before enrolling at Iowa, played in the first Coach Clay Simpson's single wing offense that has rolled to a 4-1 record.  
With help from fullback Tom Watkins, he is rewriting the school's offense records. Nichols is fifth nationally in total offense with 67 yards and 1025 in rushing with 27 yards in 10 carries. Watkins is perfect in his running mate's all-around offensive attack, is second in rushing with 157 yards.  
But it is Nichols who is carrying the burden of the offense. He has four in passing in the Big Eight with 377 yards, completing 25 of 43 attempts. He has led the conference in pass completions with 15 and is second in yards with 177.  
Both Nichols and Watkins are tied in scoring with 30 points on five touchdowns.

### Cuban Champ Beats Logart For 25th Win

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Oct. 22 (AP)—Cuban welterweight champion Luis Manuel Rodriguez ran his victory string to 25 Wednesday night by beating a unanimsous 10-round decision over Isaac Logart of New York. There were no knockouts.  
Logart, who had lost his last two fights, started strongly and carried the fight to his arrival the first four rounds. The veteran, also originally from Cuba, fought, looked and wanted to win into close quarters to pound at Rodriguez's body.  
From the fifth round on, however, the pace obviously began to tell on Logart. Rodriguez, sensing the weakening, came on strongly, using a left to the body and head with authority.  
Logart was still trying, but he could not match the incessant attack of the youngster from Havana in the closing rounds. In the final round Rodriguez kept swinging in a right-left, right-left tempo from the opening bell, and though many of the punches were wild he won decisively.

### Burdette Has 'Honors' for Homer Pitches

NEW YORK, Oct. 22 (AP)—Law Burdette of the Milwaukee Braves gave up 38 homers in 1935, the most allowed by any major league pitcher. This was 20 more than he pitched in 1934.  
Jim Bunning of the Detroit Tigers paced the American league in homer balls the past season with 37.  
Burdette's chief tormentors were the Chicago Cubs, figures released by the Associated Press showed today. The Cubs slammed 11, or 28.9 percent of the right-handed veteran. Ernie Banks of the Cubs and Orlando Cepeda of San Francisco hit Burdette for four homers each.  
Burdette worked 299 innings, pitched 21 games and losing 14, in 1935. He pitched 275 innings, allowing only 18 homers with a 20-10 record.

Bunning, also a right-hander, pitched 250 innings the past year and had a 17-13 record. The Cleveland Indians hit him for nine homers and Kansas City for seven. He had the most trouble with Hammy Killebrew of Washington and Minnie Miñoso of Cleveland, giving up three homers to each. Bunning allowed 24 homers in 1935.
