## Car Plunges Into Snake River; Two Die, Woman Survives

IDAHO FALLS, Nov. 3 (AP)—A young woman, dazed and in shock after driving clear in an auto accident, was found asleep in the abandoned cabin last night. She was the search party that found her said she had wandered aimlessly for almost five miles. The girl, 20-year-old Almira Fisher, was riding in a car in which two men died Sunday night, after it smashed through a guard rail and plunged 300 feet down the steep Snake river canyon bank about 26 miles east of Idaho Falls.

The car burst into flames and the bodies of the two men were seen floating beyond the wreck. The wreck wasn't found until yesterday morning, when another search party located the car. The dead men were identified as Clinton Brown, 41, Holladay, Utah, and his 35-year-old brother Donald K. Brown, Idaho Falls.

State police said Miss Fisher apparently was sitting between the two men when the car plunged down the embankment. She somehow made her way down the road and was found by the search party. Fisher, wearing a denim jacket, was crying through clenched teeth. She said she had a severe headache and was feeling dizzy. The protests followed an announcement by the commission of plans to annex area city blocks to bring the 1960 census count to 25,000 population. The larger population is desirable, the commission said, to get increased revenue from state liquor and gambling taxes, as well as to provide for the city's future industrial expansion.

As an indication of the protest, the commission said it was pointed out that large firms use it as a dividing point in their national advertising campaigns. However, approximately 100 fringe area residents at the meeting indicated they do not want to become part of the city. Several petitions, signed by homeowners, were presented by commissioners that fringe areas had been filed with the city.

Every automaker increased production but the big gain was General Motors corporation, which jumped from 60,000 cars in October, 1958, to 224,162 last month. GM was shut down much of the month last year because of labor troubles.

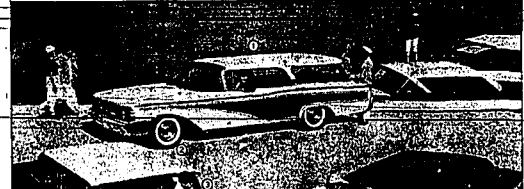

**THE PEOPLE'S CHOICE**

In the past decade or so, American voters appear to have created for themselves a fresh dilemma.

They want men-in-politics who are advocates of the old standard pattern. They want them bright and unsharpened. At the same time they want them tough and practical enough to be able to find their way around in the grubby arena of domestic argument.

The combination of these traits isn't easy to come by. Experience has taught us that some men who appeal because they are "above politics" stay so far above it that they limit their usefulness as leaders and legislators.

There is, ultimately, no escape from the hard bargaining of politics. He who tries to stand aloof will simply discover that someone else moved in to do what he should be doing. And more often than not, the results will be less than what the people wished and expected.

This is especially true of the presidency. One does not have to be a constitutional expert to know that the President of the United States does not enjoy legal authority over the congress. His branch of government and the legislative are independent, as is the judiciary.

Yet over the years the American people have come to look more and more to the President for firm leadership for guidance of a sound legislative program, for a setting of the tone and pace of government.

Obviously, in the absence of any influence of authority over congress, his only shield of authority is his office. He must possess immense political power. Few lawmakers can ignore it if he casts it into the balance.

A president who wastes this influence, who lets it lie dormant, or turns his back upon it, is diminishing the weight of his office. He is a statesman. He must also be a politician.

It may seem ironic to demand of a man chosen as "above politics" that he become a politician. But there is no help for it.

Americans choosing a president in 1960 will not see a very keenest eye to see in those candidates who do not enjoy legal authority with the remarkable blend of freshness, imagination, and tough-mindedness they want.

They have lost patience with the old mold, yet find it hard to fashion a new one to fit the advancing times.

**TOO MANY INDIANS**

Complexity, the mark of this age, often breeds confusion. To cut through it calls for decisiveness and authority. We want more and more, in many walks of life, we are not meeting it with these qualities.

In all too many situations, we meet the confusion of complexity by so dividing authority that there is no decisiveness left.

We get instead, action by groups and decisions by committees. The result is a painful loss of the habit of authority, of the nerve and courage required to hack a clear path through today's tangled growth.

The independent Ray Cromley recently set forth the unhappy consequences of this collective decision making, but damaging indecision in the vital space-missile field.

Rule by committee so narrows the field of one agency's autonomy and individual's responsibility that in time no sense of responsibility is felt at all.

On the other hand, it gives many men and many agencies opportunity to express negative views and opinions, to dissipate effort in tedious and critical decisions. Too often the net effect seems to be to knock things down rather than to build them up.

Occasionally you will hear people argue that rule by committee is the democratic way, and we have no choice but to "muddle through" on this basis.

Democracy is indeed founded on the idea of giving many a chance to be heard. But nothing in its theory or practice requires that we abandon all authority in the name of giving every voice its hearing.

The free debate can and must be had. But in the end the authority that decides, and then authoritative and authoritative.

In too many fields we seem today to have too many agencies, too many committees, too many voices—and no action or decision.

We could not only have a space race, but practically every race there is. It will not learn soon to clear away the clutter of excess committees and agencies and find a way for "insulating democracy" "free of discussion" to the authority that decides, and then authoritative and authoritative.

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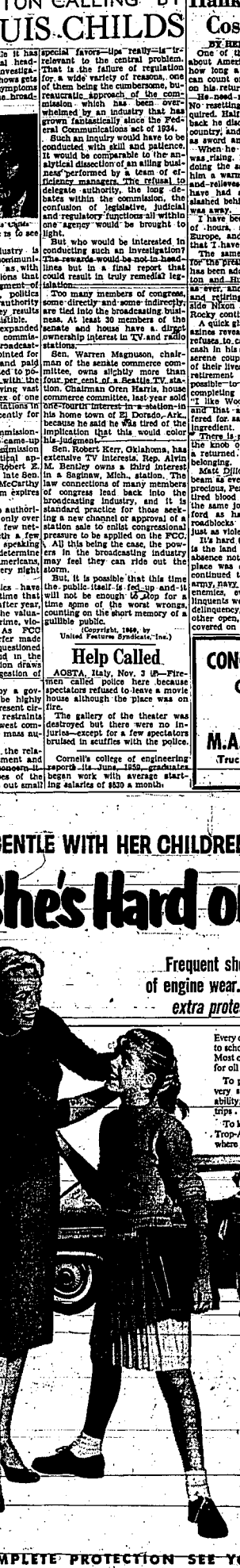

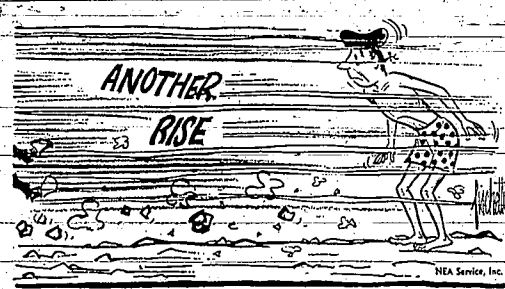
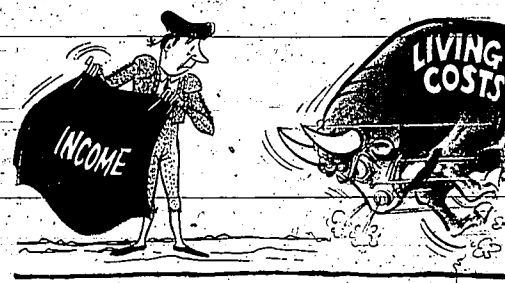

"I hope to be a teacher," he told newsmen. "I think I would be better at that than anything else." To some extent, at least, Van Doren's future may depend on public reaction to his emotional, while winning fame as a scholar on NBC's onetime quiz show "Truth or Consequences."

"I was involved, deeply involved, in a deception," he told the house members overnight session yesterday. "I added it to another point that I would give almost anything I have to reverse the course of my life in the last three years."

Reaction mixed.

The immediate reaction was mixed. "Some of the committee members thought his action in telling the truth at last, and urged that his employers wait for public reaction before making any decision."

The one public interruption during the hearing was hostile. The caustic remark by Rep. Steve D'Amico, R. N. Y., that an intelligent adult should be grateful for telling the truth brought a burst of applause.

Yet as the boisterous, wavy-haired Van Doren left the hearing room, spectators found their way through the mass of reporters to reach his side, shake his hand, wish him well.

### Development Of A-Power Said Slowed

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)—Atomic industrialists said yesterday the one-active push to develop economic electric power from the atom has now slowed.

He said both the government and some sections of industry are "not so sure" of the economic benefits of atomic power.

"What has happened to fade the nuclear fever?" asked Dr. Chauncey Starr, vice president of North American Aviation, Inc., in addressing the annual meeting of the Atomic Industrial Forum.

"Simply answered, our national objectives have slacked."

For one thing, he said, previous international competition with the Russians in the atomic power field "has been dulled by their (Russia's) apparent lack of leadership in this area."

"We will undoubtedly have to wait for a surprise announcement by the Soviets of a significant atomic power accomplishment, before our stimulus is revived," he said.
