# Explosion Tanker Takes Light; 25 Persons Injured

HOUSTON, Tex., Nov. 8 (AP)—The tanker Amoco Virginia, its plates buckled and ripped by fire and explosion yesterday, claimed an eighth victim today when city fireman D. H. Chandler drowned aboard the ship. Twenty-five persons were injured. The fire aboard the 12,000-ton tanker threatened the heart of the nation's largest oil refining and petrochemical center for 18 hours before being brought under control. The vessel's captain R. R. Conlay, his wife and the 40 crew members perished. Chandler, 28, apparently stepped into a hole in a submerged portion of the hull. Investigators scoured the buckled plates in search of clues as to what caused the blast. The fire broke out less than four hours before the American Oil tanker was to sail for Albany, N. Y. ### Japan Checks Growth With Birth-Control

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9 (UPI)—Japan has the praise of an American population expert for performing the "miracle of Japan" by checking its population growth with birth control.

David C. O'Connell, director of the David C. O'Connell Reference Bureau, a population research organization, said that Japan's intensive practice and legal abortion and sterilization would stabilize its population.

The report said Japan's birth rate fell from 34.3 per cent in 1947 to 21.2 in 1957.

Japan also had the lowest average population growth in Asia in 1958-1959 with a rate of 1.2 per cent. It compares with 2.2 per cent for India, 2.5 per cent for Ceylon, 3.6 for Taiwan and 1.8 for the United States.

The "Japan Problem" while the western world has been officially at the "population crisis," the report said, "the Japanese people, aware of the danger of an accompanying intense population pressure, looked straight ahead to their objective of a stabilized population which would be a trend in birth rate per capita, population will continue to increase until about 1970, after which it is expected to level off and by the year 2000, and may even show signs of reduction."

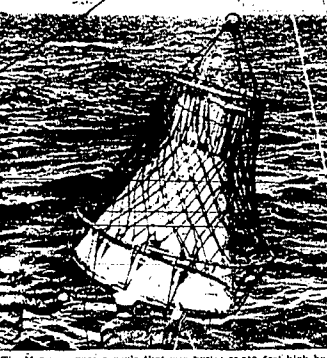

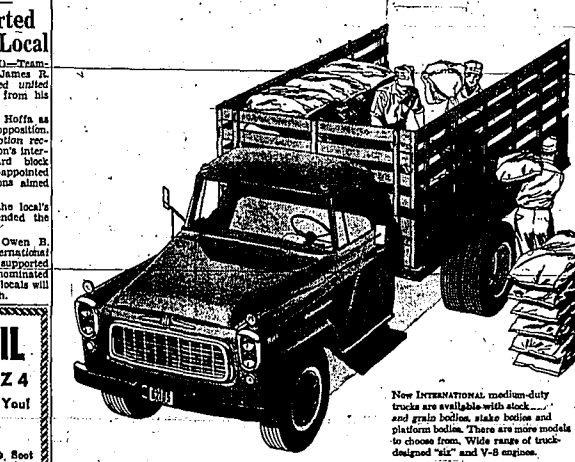

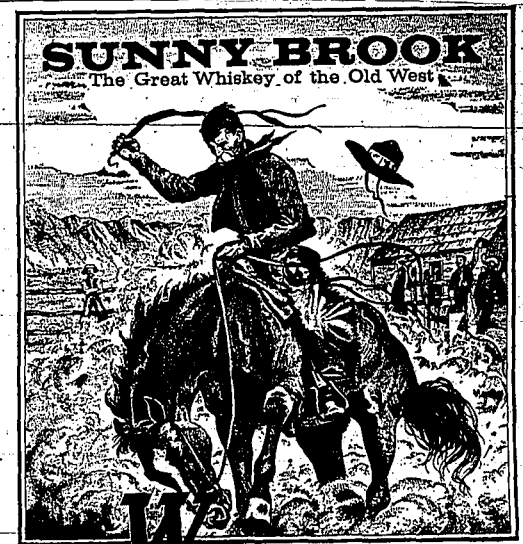

### Court Ducks Ruling About Long Strikes

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9 (AP)—The supreme court has ruled the steel strike for 30 days has left unanswered a basic question: Should a union industry plaintiff in the form of a strike be permitted to endanger the national welfare?

Proposals for touching the law against such a strike are being introduced in Congress to prevent them in the 1950 election year unless the strike resumes at the end of 30 days. If that happens, what does the Act "Protects Public"?

The 1947 Taft-Hartley labor act which says its purpose is to protect the "rights of the public in connection with labor disputes" which "affect commerce" and endanger the "general welfare." But later, in the section authorizing the government to get an injunction against an industry strike, the law says this should be granted only if the strike imperils "national health and safety."

note that it doesn't say anything about a strike that imperils the general welfare, which would include the economic well-being of the country. The economy already has been hit by the steel strike. Since Program Hart.

In asking a federal court for an injunction in the steel strike, the government argued it was needed to "protect national health and safety." To show why it is needed, the government pointed out how steel shortages injure millions and space programs and nuclear submarine building.

As for the word "health"—the government said it means economic well-being. The union argued that national health isn't really in danger since only one per cent of all steel production is needed for defense. As for "health," the union argued that word strictly meant physical health, not economic health.

The court said it wouldn't because in this case it didn't have to give a ruling on the meaning of "national health." The court said it was satisfied "safety" was endangered and therefore the injunction was necessary.

So this case did not settle the question: Has the government a right to an injunction to protect the general welfare or economic well-being of the country from a strike.

### Reds Prepare New Attacks, German Says

BERLIN, Nov. 8 (UPI)—Berlin tough-talking Mayor Willy Brandt says bluntly what allied commanders can only hint: "The next round in communist attempts to isolate West Berlin from the rest of free Germany has already started."

Reds Ready Attacks There is an increasing awareness in the rest of the city of what Brandt means. It is plain the communists are establishing ideological battleheads to an attack. This attack probably will never come if the summit talks succeed. If they fail the pressure may be clamped down here in a way it hasn't been since the blockade 10 years ago.

The communist East Germans, presumably with Soviet backing, are advancing two main propaganda arguments.

"The first is that West Berlin is not and should not be a part of the federal republic and hence should not permit the Bonn government's federal flag to be flown or federal courts to sit.

Brandt put it grimly: "They want three Germanys—East, West and Berlin. We think the two we have already too much."

The second red gambit is the eastern republic and hence its rights in the 74 western stations of the elevated railway in the city, which the East Germans run under a 1945 agreement.
