France to Ignore U.N. Appeal for Stopping A-Test

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Nov. 20 (AP)—The U. N. general assembly called on France today to cancel its atomic test explosions scheduled to take place in the Sahara desert. But the French made it clear they will ignore the appeal. The decision was a bitter defeat for France, which has the backing of the United States and Britain, which sought stubbornly to avert such a U. N. request. The vote was 51 to 16 with 26 abstentions. The two-thirds majority was achieved after the 32-nation assembly had watered down the original anti-African resolution by deleting two paragraphs objected to by a number of countries.

The Sahara test issue came up after the assembly had given its unanimous approval to a U. S.-Soviet plan to refer all disarmament proposals to the forthcoming East-West meeting in Geneva.

The plan, worked out by the two big powers, had been sponsored in the assembly's political committee by 12 members of the United Nations. Proposals sent to the 18-nation disarmament committee included Premier Khrushchev's plan for total disarmament as well as Western proposals. The committee met in Geneva on Nov. 19. A key paragraph of the approved U. S.-Soviet proposal expressed hope that "a series of steps would be taken to bring about a general and complete disarmament under effective international control."

The plan, worked out in detail and agreed upon in the shortest possible time, set out the following:

Discoverer VIII Reported Launched in California; Hope to Locate Capsule

VANDENBERG AIR FORCE BASE, Calif., Nov. 20 (UPI)—The United States' eighth polar satellite rose a ball of flame into a clear sky over the Pacific missile range today and rocketed toward the South Pole. Air Force spokesmen said that once again a near-fantastic 700-lb. attempt to get man-made to recover 110-powder space capsule from orbit. Scientists said Discoverer VIII had all the refinements needed to compensate for four straight failures at recovery. Five of the eight Discoverers launched since last February have achieved one or more objectives of the ground here in mid-California were optimistic over chances of the latest satellite package making the breakthrough.

Benson Promotes Campaign to Help Cranberry Market

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20 (UPI)—Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson announced today he has initiated a campaign to restore public confidence in cranberries and to boost sales in the wake of the Thanksgiving cancer controversy. Benson asked the food industry to join his department in an all-out merchandising campaign. He also said he would consider government purchases of surplus cranberries which have been decried by the news.

Benson said he had held a news conference here today to announce the campaign. He told a news conference he had ordered his department to open a promotion campaign to restore public confidence in cranberries and had telegraphed food industry leaders asking their cooperation.

Cranberry sales nosedived when Arthur S. Flemming, secretary of health, said a surplus of cranberries was found to contain a cancer-causing chemical in laboratory tests. Flemming's department approved a program in testing and labeling as a confidence-building device.

Benson said he had been a blow to farmers. But he refused to criticize or defend the manner in which Flemming handled the matter.

Benson acknowledged at one time he had been possible that Flemming could have protected the public without alarming the public. But he said that Flemming's agency "had the facts" about the berries which had been tested.

"They may have been justified in their method of handling the situation," Benson said. "But not prepared to judge."

The agriculture secretary said that he would consider government purchases under his department's surplus buying program. Foods purchased under this program are donated to school lunches and welfare institutions.

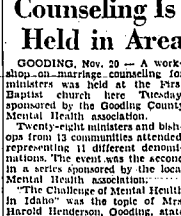

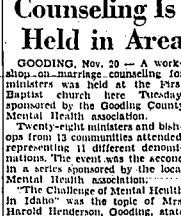

"Ike" Refuses Plan to Take Demo on Trip

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20 (UPI)—President Eisenhower has turned down as impractical the suggestion that he take a 10-day tour of the man on his forthcoming 11-nation goodwill trip.

Eisenhower also rejected from the vacation White House in August, Cal., the proposal that he have some other Democrat as company him. He expressed his views in a letter made public last night by Sen. Thomas A. Dodd, D.-Conn., author of the suggestion.

Truman said in Independence, Mo., "I have no comment on this and I've expressed myself a hundred times before on bi-partisan foreign policy."

Eisenhower and Truman have been cool toward each other since the 1952 election. They have met only at the funerals of two former colleagues where they both attended and exchanged brief greetings.

Truman's secretary of state, Dean Rusk, said he had no objection to Eisenhower's proposal or to Eisenhower's rejection.

But neither the higher prices nor the cranberry crisis has kept housewives from snapping up turkeys at a rate equal to or better than last year.

"After all, our grinning Pittsburg grocer said, 'It's bad enough to be without cranberries without turkey too.'"

United Press International talked to grocers, wholesalers, turkey farmers and food researchers coast to coast and found a generally bright picture—for everyone except the cranberry growers.

Turkey sales are leading for a record in some areas and running strong in others.

Turkey prices are up in most cities, but usually only by a couple of points a pound.

The average mother will spend from \$8 to \$10 to stuff her shopping bag, her refrigerator, her turkey, her oven, her husband and her three children. In that order, on Thanksgiving day. But vegetable prices are down this year and the total cost will be slightly below the average over the past five years.

Small Atomic Powered Unit Is Developed

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20 (AP)—A nuclear reactor the size of a five-gallon can has been developed as a potential long-lasting power source for radio, television transmitters and other instruments in space vehicles.

This was announced Wednesday by Chairman John A. McCone of the atomic energy commission.

He said the 220-pound reactor—designed to be linked with a foot-ball-sized turbo-electric generator—has been successfully ground-tested in recent weeks.

Still in the experimental stage, it is designed to generate 3,000 watts of electrical current for at least a year.

He said the device might well be the forerunner of devices much more powerful, but still weighing only several hundred pounds.

And these, said the AEC, would make possible long-lived weather satellites, world-wide TV communications, deep-space information transmission and eventually interplanetary travel.

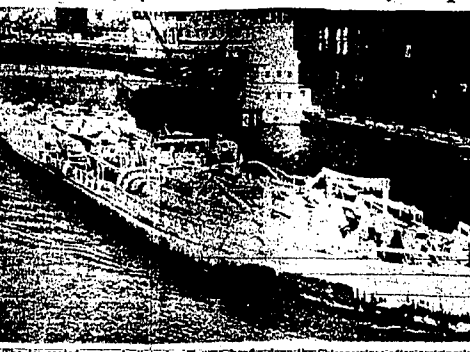

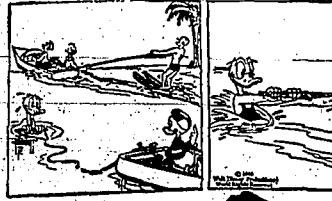
