The prime minister declared his policy of seeking a settlement by mediation is not appeasement and bluntly told parliament he would resign if it wanted another leader.

Thanksgiving Snow Covers U. S. Midwest

By United Press International The fall of a Thanksgiving day storm blew into New England today, but weathermen said it would be much calmer than the storm that dumped 14 inches of snow on Colorado.

Light snow was reported falling early today from the Midwest through the East. The snow amounts averaged only one to two inches.

Yesterday's storm buried Boulder, Colo., under 14 inches of snow, then dropped three inches around the lower Great lakes. Five inches in Iowa, eight inches in North Dakota and 10 inches in the upper Ohio valley.

The snow began to die out as they neared the Atlantic coast, but still had about an inch falling six inches to western New York state.

A blizzing cold wave which dipped temperatures as low as 10 below zero at Grand Forks, N. D., spread today from Canada to the Mexican border from Texas and Arizona and reached Pennsylvania in Kentucky, Tennessee and Louisiana.

The cold air was expected to peak at West Virginia and Alabama today.

On the edge of the snow belt, frost in Ohio fell from Lehigh into Ohio and Pennsylvania. Bowling Green, Ky., reported a 1.75-inch rainfall in six hours.

Western states were mostly sunny for Thanksgiving, but hundreds of motorists were stranded in California when fog shrouded the Los Angeles and Long Beach airports.

INFLATION VS. DEFLATION

Evidently the leaders of this country have no choice, for years and years to come, but to try to steer us between the twin rocks of inflation and deflation.

Beneath, we should never make light of this task. Our economy is full of delicate balances. Pushing it just a little too hard can set an upward spiral of downward plunging prices under control.

Put together an expanding economy, a swelling population with an almost constantly rising demand for goods and services, a massive amount of money in circulation, and you have ingredients that cannot help but make inflation an ever-present threat.

Yet we will be doing ourselves a great disservice if we allow the problem of inflation to dominate all our thinking on the national scene. When a politician announces his candidacy for major office and says the two big issues are inflation and rising costs, he is not only making a mistake but also getting out of focus. That happened recently.

It is something like moving into a new house and announcing: "The problem is to prevent leaks."

The problem, of course, is to use the house to build a roof, full life, to make it serve all the purposes of the family. In the process, you must hope to keep the roof from leaking pipes from bursting, the wires from short-circuiting, and so on. But they are not the goals.

No one who understands the consequences of inflation, but preventing it is a negative business, however positive may be the steps used to control.

A politician worth his salt in 1959 and 1960 should be getting up on his feet and telling people what truly positive goals he has for them and how to get them.

Paintings to Be Displayed For Art Men

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 27 (UPI)—An attorney for the owners of a disputed art find said today he hoped arrangements would be available for public display and scrutiny by experts "some time next week."

Lester Olson told United Press International the owners and their manager, Charles Di Renzo, were working as "fast as possible" to work out all details preparatory to the public showing.

The paintings—valued by Chicago restorer-sculptor Alexander Zlatoff-Kirby at between eight to 10 million dollars but labeled as worthless by Pasadena art dealer Taylor Curtis—have been locked up in a bank vault since announcement of their find Nov. 16. Among the few persons to have seen them are Zlatoff-Kirby and Curtis.

Olson said certain accredited art experts would be invited to pass judgment on whether the paintings are the heavily priced masterpieces from the Italian renaissance the owners believed them to be. He declined to reveal the names of experts being considered.

The attorney said delay in publicly exhibiting the paintings came when the owners and Di Renzo had some "differences." They have all been worked out, he said.
