Rains, Cold Temperatures Hinder Feed

BOISE, Dec. 11—Fall growth of range feed, started by heavy rains, was halted by freezing temperatures during November. Winter grazing conditions, however, are the best since 1951, according to the USDA crop reporting service for Idaho.

Abnormal late fall weather resulted in the sharpest November drop in either last century or this century in 30 years. The outlook for winter grazing is unquestionably above average.

On the other hand, the forage supplies for winter grazing are well below normal in the Blue Mountain plains states of North and South Dakota and Montana plus the three northern states of Utah, Nevada, and California.

In California, the long period of weather has forced a heavy movement of livestock into feedlots. Breeding herds and flocks are either receiving supplemental feed or are being cleaned up prior to wintering.

### Evidence for Cancer Said Insufficient

CHICAGO, Dec. 11 (UP)—The Journal of the American Medical Association said yesterday that there is insufficient evidence to warrant the assumption that cigarette smoking is the principal factor in the increase in lung cancer.

In an editorial, the Journal questions conclusions in a report by Dr. Leroy E. Burney, surgeon general of the U. S. public health service, listing smoking as the main factor leading to such an increase in lung cancer.

Burney's report, summarizing research on lung cancer, was carried two weeks ago in the Journal. The Journal editorial recalled that Burney's report identified the public health service "with those who consider that the evidence to date implicates smoking as the principal factor in the increase in lung cancer."

NEW DELHI, Dec. 11 (UPI)—Barbara Eisenhower, the President's daughter-in-law and official hostess, kept up her schedule yesterday despite a nagging cold.

After accompanying the President to the Gandhi memorial, Mrs. Eisenhower went with Mrs. Zita Bunker, the wife of the U. S. ambassador, to the headquarters of the Indian Red Cross Day Forgetting.

At one point during the 10-minute tour she gave clear evidence of the sort of confusion that can result from a hectic week of globe-trotting.

"What's the date today?" she asked Mrs. Bunker.

"The 11th of December," the ambassador's wife replied with a sympathetic smile. "The year is 1959."

### Red Foley Is Charged With Tax Evasion

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 11 (UP)—An indictment charging income tax evasion was returned Thursday against Clyde J. (Red) Foley, nationally known "country music" singer, by a federal grand jury.

### Herter Says Ike Welcome Passes Hope

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (UPI)—Secretary of State Christian A. Herter says the enthusiastic greeting given President Eisenhower as far as his good will tour have exceeded the administration's greatest expectations.

Herter told his news conference yesterday that the warm welcome in Italy, Turkey, Pakistan, Afghanistan and India indicated the people of those nations have for the United States.

Herter also said Eisenhower's talks with the heads of governments have been extremely satisfactory.

But Herter said U. S. relations with Cuba had deteriorated despite early hopes that the government of Fidel Castro would bring the two countries closer together. He accused Castro of refusing to try to end the roof of protesters separating the nations.

Herter said the United States was discussing with the government of Panama a proposal to permit the anti-American sentiment which led to the overthrow of the government.

Herter said the United States also was considering sympathetic support for a proposal to permit the Panamanian flag to fly over the Canal Zone.

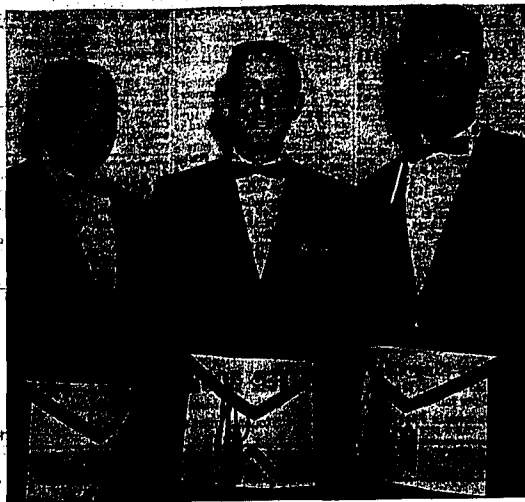

They also have dispatched squads of snappers to eye travelers along the East-West border in a major effort to take all the joy out of Christmas they can.

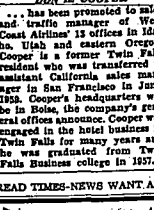
Red officials have refused most applications for family members split by the iron curtain to visit each other on either side of the East-West German border.

## Ex-Champ Canzoneri Dies in New York

NEW YORK, Dec. 11 (AP)—Tony Canzoneri, a great little fighter who came out of New Orleans in the Golden Twenties and won the featherweight, light and junior welterweight championships, was found dead Thursday, apparently of natural causes, in a midtown hotel room. He was 51. The family ex-chor, who had been hospitalized with a bad, dead in his underwear when a bellhop entered the room at the request of Norman Schwartz, a friend of Canzoneri.

Medical authorities said Tony probably had been dead about two days. Schwartz said he had not heard from Tony in two days and asked permission to enter the room. Canzoneri was only 18 when he started boxing professionally in 1925. He won and lost five titles, twice holding the lightweight and junior welterweight crowns. He hung up his gloves in 1939, ending a fabulous career in which he fought the best lighters of an outstanding era and carried more than \$500,000 in purses. He was elected to Boxing's Hall of Fame in 1956.

Last year Georgia was the patsy of the Southeastern conference, loser of six of its 10 games and 10th place finisher in the league of 19. During the past season the Bulldogs negotiated a sudden and surprising reversal. They won nine games of 10, captured the conference championship over such powers as Louisiana State and Mississippi and won a spot in the Orange Bowl against Missouri.

The achievement, in the opinion of sports writers and broadcasters voting in the Associated Press postseason poll, earned the Georgia team the "comeback team of the year" in college football. 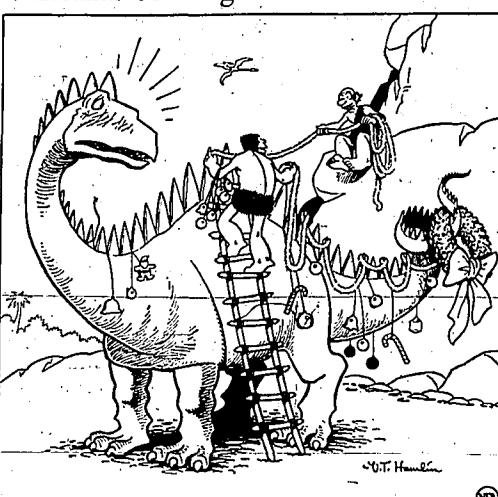

He even smiles goodly like a candidate should. But publicly and privately Johnson will assure you that he's no candidate. Since he's making no effort to win the Democratic presidential nomination, he says, he hasn't a chance. Johnson's own explanation of what he's up to seems true enough. He's the Democratic leader in the senate, responsible for legislating for all the people. He should see what's happening outside of Texas, and he often does when congress isn't in session. But as you watch and listen and wonder, a few impressions fall into place. No man is more skilled at counting the political horse than Lyndon Johnson. He's such a shrewd and careful political leader that he's Republicans in the senate sometimes speak of him in awe and in envy. Johnson is proud that the lights in his office burn late as he and his staff check and recheck on how other senators plan to vote. Up late at night to discover this fact of political life: Since the Civil War, the door of the White House has been locked tight against all Southerners. Johnson knows it, and Johnson presents it.
