## 'The' Tunisian Leader Discuss War in Algeria

WITH EISENHOWER AT SEA, Dec. 17 (AP)—President Eisenhower received thousands of Tunisians today and discussed with President Charles de Gaulle the war in Algeria. He then resumed his voyage to Toulon, France, aboard the U. S. cruiser Des Moines. White House secretary James C. Hagerty said the two presidents in their Tunis meeting endorsed French President Charles de Gaulle's proposals for ending the Algerian conflict by an offer of self-determination. Hagerty stressed that the two presidents did not seek to settle the conflict, leaving that to the Algerians and French themselves.

## Roger Touhy Is Ambushed By 'Assassin'

CHICAGO, Dec. 17 (AP)—Roger Touhy, paroled prohibition era gangster, was ambushed and killed on a Wood Street last night by a shotgun assassin. Touhy's companion, retired police Sgt. Walter Miller, who was a principal defense witness at Touhy's trial, was critically wounded. The pair was gunned down behind by the assassin while they were entering Miller's home. They had spent part of the night discussing a newly published book about Touhy's life and were returning home when they were shot.

The assailant or assailants were seen from the sidewalk to the Miller home. Miller, who is outlying to carry out a search and seizure of five shots before he fell. Touhy has been lying at the home of his sister Ethel Alford since he was paroled from Stateville penitentiary last Nov. 24. The police surrounded the neighborhood in an effort to trap the assassin.

## Business Census Shows 10 Per Cent Gain Here

Receipts of selected service trade establishments in Twin Falls for 1959 totaled \$18,000, an increase from 1958 of \$1,000 or 10.2 per cent, according to the Portland field office of the U. S. department of commerce. Statewide, receipts totaled \$1.3 billion dollars, an increase of 10.1 million dollars or 2.1 per cent since the 1958 business census. The 15-nation council closed a three-day meeting by ordering the defense ministers to meet in Paris in March and permanent NATO representatives to meet here again in March to attempt to break the deadlock on how to organize the air defense of western Europe against any possible Soviet attack.

Two boys, age 9 and 8, and a girl, age 7, recently came under the jurisdiction of Judge J. Dean Mosher as neglected minors for the second time within a 12-month period.

Finding it impractical to arrange for a permanent home for the children in a short time and concerned about the children's welfare during the joyous season, the judge issued an appeal for a temporary home for the youngsters and a permanent disposition can be made of the case.

### Convict Gets Caught; Only 2 Still Free

BOISE, N. C., Dec. 17 (AP)—An armed fugitive from North Carolina's Ivy Bluff prison was captured here yesterday after he tried to escape over an FBI agent and a deputy sheriff with a stolen station wagon.

Woodrow Stewart, 36, had a loaded .38-caliber revolver when he was dragged, struggling and dazed, from the auto.

His capture leaves at large two of the 20 tough convicts who were paroled six guards and fled from Ivy Bluff prison for fear of re-arrest.

They carried away eight pistols, eight rifles and a submachine gun. Stewart was spotted in the station wagon, stolen Monday near Pilot, Va., parked on Hillside road leading into the rugged Appalachian mountains west of here.

The fugitive was listening to the radio when the FBI agent and deputy sheriff Emmett Oliver stopped Stewart. Stewart ignored three calls to surrender, then threw the station wagon in reverse and attempted to back over the two officers. The FBI agent fired a warning shot into the rear window, and he and Oliver quickly ratched the doors open and pulled Stewart out.

### Politics Code For Idahoans Not Welcome

BOISE, Dec. 17 (UPI)—A proposed code of ethics to govern political campaigning in Idaho has drawn a lukewarm reception from party chairman today.

Secretary of State Arnold Williams has suggested such a code to help stamp out "maneuvering, backstabbing, and the danger of 'character assassination' discouraged political officers."

Ray Robbins, Idaho Falls, state Republican chairman, said he could see no need for such a code—not by the GOP. The Republican party doesn't indulge in that type of campaigning.

But John Walters, Boise, state Democratic chairman, said he felt such a code would tend to "do away with any derogatory remarks that are unfounded."

He said there are similar agreements between the parties at a national level and that he felt Idaho campaigning has been relatively free of backbiting tactics in recent years.

Nevertheless, Williams said he felt the code would help to curb rumor-mongering and unsupported accusations made in the heat of argument.

### Union Turned Down on Bid To Buy Paper

PORTLAND, Dec. 17 (AP)—"The Journal is not for sale," William W. Knight, the publisher of that Portland newspaper, when told yesterday of a union suggestion that labor buy it.

The proposal was made by the Carpenters' union and it immediately received the support of James T. Merr, executive secretary of the Oregon AFL-CIO.

Local 226 of the Carpenters' union gained the endorsement of its district council for its proposal. The resolution voiced the fear that the Journal would be purchased by The Oregonian in the course of the Portland newspaper strike.

The Stereotypers' union struck the two newspapers Nov. 10. Members of other unions at the plants covered the picket lines and the dispute has killed 900. The two newspapers have published a combined edition throughout the dispute with non-union and supervisory personnel. It has been published in The Oregonian plant.

Journal officials recently said the Journal will resume separate publication in about two months after obtaining some new typesetting equipment and a crew to operate it.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—An old-fashioned torchlight celebration with new-fangled torches will greet President Eisenhower on his return from his tour of Europe and Asia.

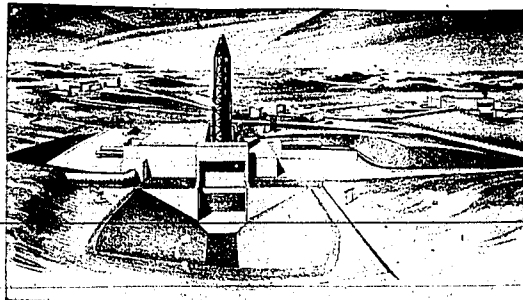
The District of Columbia commissioners in charge of the arrangements, said they will be preparing a torch of 10,000 torches for the President on his return Tuesday night.

Since it may be near midnight when the city—Commissioner Robert E. McLaughlin said the idea of having a hand join the torch has been ruled out.

"Having in mind that the President carried the torch of freedom on his tour, we are going to hand out 10,000 torches," McLaughlin told a reporter.

He said they will be modern calcium flares, and as Eisenhower approaches Lafayette square, where the crowd will assemble, the torches will be lighted simultaneously by those holding them. Lafayette square is across the street from the White House.

### Permanent ICBM Bases Ruled Out



This official air force drawing depicts an Atlas ICBM being prepared for launching from a "hardened" or permanent base. Such missile sites, planned to be scattered about the nation, may never be built. Immovable, and requiring many facilities to get liquid-fueled rockets like the Atlas ready for firing, they are too vulnerable to enemy attack, the Pentagon has decided. Instead, emphasis will be on developing a new set of easily transportable solid-fueled missiles, such as Minuteman, which can be mounted and fired from trains or ships, or Polaris, designed to be launched from a submarine and other places.

### 87 Miles of Interstate Roads In Idaho Costing \$19,352,000

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 — Construction is under way or advertised on 87 miles of the national system of interstate and defense highways in Idaho, at an estimated cost of \$19,352,000, Cong. Harmer H. Judge announced today.

Federal funds for the complete projects totaled \$10,751,000, and \$17,900,000 for projects under way. In addition, Representative Judge said that under the primary, secondary and urban road program, 654 miles have been completed in Idaho since July 1, 1956, at a total cost of \$23,271,000. Construction under way or advertised totals 128 miles at an estimated cost of \$12,598,000.

### Another New Record Set; Awards Told

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—The air force yesterday claimed a world speed record—1,529 miles per hour—when the pilot who flew the F106 jet fighter more than twice the speed of sound took a record-breaking flight through the 10-kilometer course—a little over 11 miles—turned and flew back.

Maj. Joseph W. Rogers, Wright-Patterson, Ohio, set the record for a speed record, made it in a Delta Dart aircraft, instrumented and loaded for its job as an all-weather fighter. He took it up from Edwards air force base, California.

Made at 40,000 feet, Rogers touched off the afterburner, flew level through the 10-kilometer course—a little over 11 miles—turned and flew back.

If the plane went up or down more than 30 meters—a bit over 150 feet—at any time during the 23-mile-long measuring run, any record claim would be tossed out.

The Soviet Union claimed in October a world record for a fighter plane that flew 1,483 miles an hour. The fastest jet ever flown was a flight with 1,404 miles an hour, in May 10, 1958.

Air Force National Twelve hours of studying the radar and photographic record of Rogers' flight satisfied the fact that the photographic requirements had been met.

Then Rogers flew to his post in Colorado Springs, Colo. He and his wife and came to Washington, D.C. Gen. Thomas D. White, air force chief of staff, presented the record-breaking Flying Cross on Rogers and four other pilots who participated in the record-setting flights during the past week.

Others decorated with Rogers decorated along with Rogers. Capt. Joe B. Jordan, Huntsville, Tex., who set a new altitude record of 80,000 feet Monday.

### Ike's Travels Give Closeup Of Problems

President Eisenhower's 11-nation tour is giving him a close-up view of the little quarrels that stand in the way of the big peace.

They are the quarrels among neighboring nations, small in comparison to the global struggle between democratic and communist ideologies, but looming so large in the eyes of the participants they may be blind to all else.

**West Problems Local**

In some cases communism has helped to keep the ferment local, but mostly they are strictly local. As the President traveled along the perimeter of the Arab world from Turkey to India and then doubled back for his western summit in Paris, there are some he has encountered:

**Turkey:** Within the last year, Turkey has been at the helm of peace with the United Arab Republic, but normally strained relations with Russia and, despite a settlement of the Cyprus question and the fact that both are NATO members, is only friendly. The two are ancient enemies and seem unlikely to change.

**Pakistan-India:** The two are bitterly at odds over Kashmir, claimed by both sides. India will along an uneasy cease-fire line. Earlier plans to let Kashmir decide by itself in a plebiscite have gone by the boards and no settlement is in sight. The two also have quarred over water rights.

**Pakistan:** Relations with the United States are normal on the surface but irritated by Pakistan's north-west territory and by Afghan support for an independent state in the area which would also split Pakistan territory.

**Iran:** Involved in a border dispute with neighboring Iraq and a dispute over use of inland waters which both use to their oil to the Persian gulf. Iran also is a source of both arms and oil.

**France:** Relations with France are friendly, but French troops in Algeria are a source of concern. French warplanes have bombed Tunisian soil on charges that Tunisia provides a sanctuary for hit-run attacks on French troops in Algeria.

**Morocco:** Also at odds with France over the Algerian issue and with Spain over Spanish-held territory inside Moroccan boundaries.

**U. S. air bases in Morocco,** which cost millions to build, will be abandoned at Morocco's request.

**Spain:** Last of the fascist dictators and outside the western family of nations for most of the years since World War II. Relations with the U. S. good, improving with France and West Germany, chilly in most other places.

**France-Germany:** Relations are friendly, but Germany is Eisenhower's biggest problem.

**France annoyed with United States:** Britain annoyed with France, and West Germany suspicious of Britain.

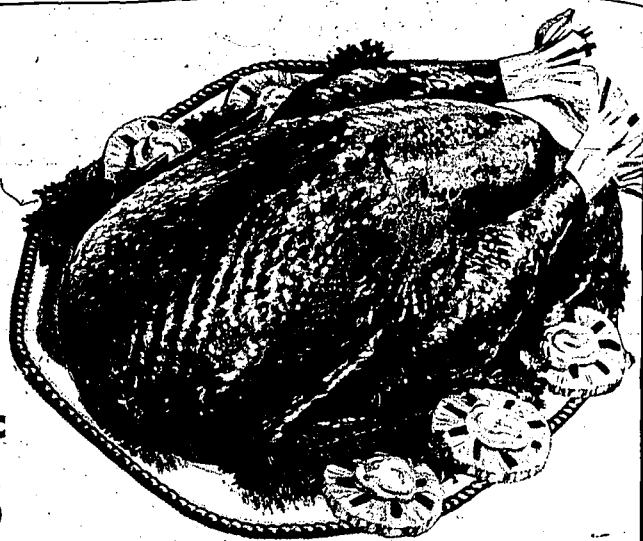

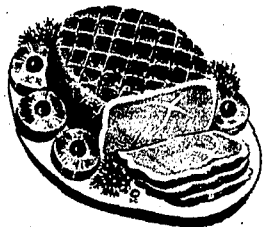

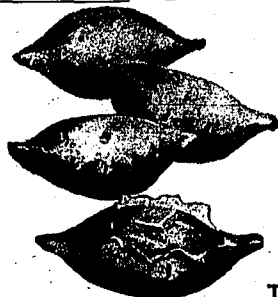

### Problems for Coal Business Are Plentiful

NEW YORK, Dec. 17 (AP)—The American coal industry has more problems today than just how it will get along with a new head of the United Mine Workers.

John L. Lewis stepped down as president after a long reign that saw many changes, many ups and downs in the industry.

Output is well down from the peak days. Other fuels have taken much of the domestic market, notably by the railroads and in the home.

And a foreign market that flourished for a couple of years during Western Europe's industrial boom has been hamstrung by quotas and tariffs aimed at keeping American coal out, although it often is cheaper than the other nations can produce coal for themselves.

American bituminous coal production reached a peak of 621 million tons in 1947. It's down to about 400 million tons.

The changes for the workers themselves are much more striking. In 1923 the United Mine Workers had 250,000 members, making around \$7.50 a day.

Now the union numbers 430,000 with about half doing other work than mining. But their pay in 1950 went to \$24.25 a day.

### U.S. Personal Income Rises

WASHINGTON, Dec. 17 (AP)—The personal income of Americans soared to a record rate of nearly \$85 billion dollars a year in November as the steelworkers began earning paychecks again.

The commerce department announced yesterday that total income rose by 2 1/2 billion dollars annually in the month, despite lingering after-effects of the steel strike in some important steel-making industries.

The report supplied evidence the economy is bouncing back rapidly from the sag caused by the 115-day shutdown of steel mills across the country.

The \$84.5 billion, personal income was a billion dollars above the previous peak annual rate reached in June.

That was the last month not affected by the strike.

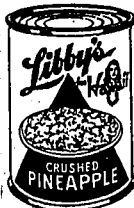

Speakers reviewed the persistence of the Wrights to meet the challenge of flight. Among them were Rear Adm. Peter A. Vickers, commandant of the fifth coast guard district; Tom Davis, president of Piedmont Airlines; and Grady Miller, Jr., history president of the North Carolina Aero Club.

"For the praise of Almighty God and the honor of the Holy Apostolic See, receive the red hat, the special badge of a cardinal's rank. By this you are to understand that you must be yourself fearless, even to the shedding of your blood, in making our holy faith respected, in seeing justice for the Christian people, and in promoting the welfare of the Roman church. In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, Amen."

Cardinal Marella was the first of the new American prizes to kneel before the pope. Cardinal Meyer, at 86, one of the youngest members of the college, followed him a minute later. Both the American cardinals are natives of Milwaukee.

Residents of Twin Falls Are Warned To Guard Against Fires on Holidays

Every year from a few days before Christmas to the week following New Year's, a plague of fires rages up and down the country.

Many of these fires result from the extra hazards which exist only during the holiday season, and from carelessness that would not be tolerated at any other time, says Twin Falls Fire Chief S. Z. Bartlett.

"Little careless acts that seem so unimportant at the time cause these holiday fire tragedies, Bartlett notes.

The tragedies are needless if each person will take a few minutes to read and follow simple fire safety rules.

1. Cut a growing tree or try to buy one that hasn't dried out from prolonged storage.

2. Stand the tree in water or snow outdoors until you're ready to use it indoors.

3. Bring the tree indoors just before Christmas and take it out as soon afterward as possible.

7. Support the tree well. Don't put it near sources of heat or where, standing or fallen, it could block the way out of the house.

8. Do not use candles on the tree. If you must use them, use them in a safe place and never leave them unattended.

9. Use only electric lighting sets that bear the UL (Underwriters Laboratories) label.

10. Each year before using check lighting sets for frayed wires, loose connections, and broken sockets.

11. Be sure the fuse on the electrical circuit you use is not over 15 amperes. Cord sets with fuses must bear the UL label, are available.

12. If any extensive holiday wiring is planned, call a competent electrician; don't try to do it yourself.

13. Don't plug too many cords into one outlet.

14. Never allow Christmas wrappings accumulate in the home; place them in your metal covered trash barrel or use the incinerator as soon as possible.

15. Use non-combustible materials to decorate the home for Christmas wherever possible. When you must use combustible materials, be sure they are "flameproofed," particularly if they are to be anywhere near the tree.

16. Untreated cotton batting, paper and certain cloth costumeing will ignite easily and burn with great intensity unless they are "flameproofed."

17. Santa Claus walkers have caused Christmas tragedies; be sure they're "flameproofed."

18. Don't buy pyroxylin plastic dolls, toys or non-flameproofed cowboy suits, etc. Toys operated by alcohol, benzene or gasoline are especially dangerous; use them safely and set fire to children's clothing, the tree, or to the house itself.

19. Look for the Underwriters Laboratories label when buying electrical toys. This means they have been tested for fire and shock hazards and may be considered safe if properly handled and maintained.

20. Don't set up electric trains or spirit-lit toys under a Christmas tree.

21. Don't allow smoking near the tree and avoid decorations or piles of wrappings; have plenty of safe ashtrays around and use them.

22. Guard against flying sparks from a fire place with a substantial chimney and don't use the fire place to burn up Christmas wrappings and decorations.

### I.F. County's Power Taxes Are \$177,000

A \$177,000 check for Twin Falls county sent into the small town Power company this week as the utility began first payments totaling more than half payment for 27 Idaho counties on the largest property tax bill in its history.

The treasury - fattening checks from Idaho Power - is the state's largest single taxpayer - are the biggest installment on the company's 1959 property taxes totaling nearly \$278,000. Second-half payments were made to the counties in June, 1959.

T. E. Roach, Idaho Power president, says the rate of taxes levied against the utility are higher this year than ever before.

County and 1959 property taxes in Idaho are well over a half-million dollars higher than in 1958 and nearly four times what we paid in 1945," he adds.

The company's 1959 state and local taxes of all types in Idaho total about five million dollars, an increase of approximately \$1,000,000 from last year. In 1958, the company's 1959 federal taxes will be nearly \$500,000 more than in 1958.

The utility president explained that the increase is the result of a steady expansion of the company's generating, transmission and distribution facilities, such as its Brouillette-Hotels-Itaska Snake hydroelectric development project under construction on the Snake river.

"That is by far the company's greatest single expense," Roach reported. "The 10 million dollars that Idaho Power is furnishing into the coffers of the states and the nation in taxes this year add up to more than our operating costs, more than our payrolls and nearly twice as much as the dividends paid to the company's two million shareholders."

Schools will receive nearly two million dollars or about 60 per cent of the company's total 1959 property tax payments to the 27 Idaho counties. The money also will go for such other local government operations as roads.

Idaho Power pays the property taxes on its generating plants, transmission and distribution lines, substations, offices, warehouse buses and other service facilities.

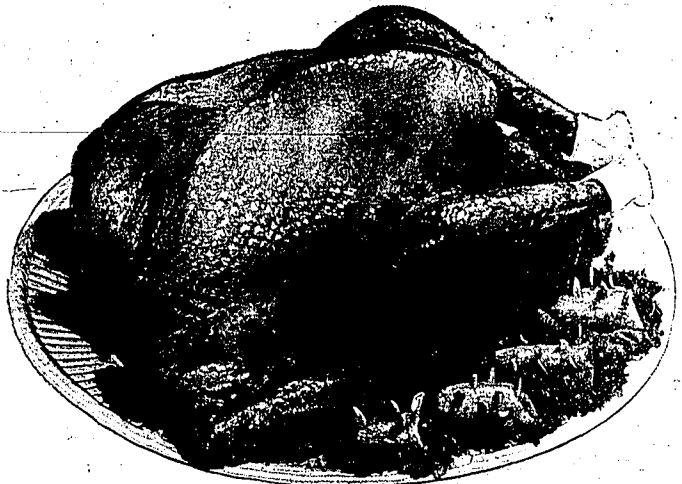

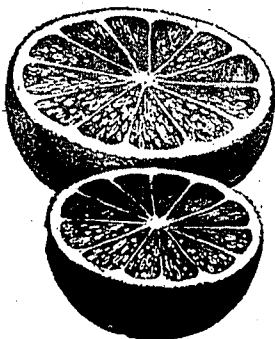

Acting on the theory that housewives know full well how many shopping days remain until Christmas, many supermarkets and neighborhood groceries in their holiday wars in the window this week.

**Chief Cuts Are Specials**  
If she wants to wait to see what kind of bargains she can expect next week, chief roast and other beef cuts used for pot roast are "specials" in quite a few places. In addition, steaks are off from a few cents to as much as 24 cents a pound in some areas.

Butter also is off over a wide area, with reductions ranging from one to six cents a pound. Although prices naturally vary from section to section, brick butter is priced at 9 cents a pound and print at 71 cents a pound by one chain in the New York metropolitan area.

**Fresh Vegetables Bargains**  
Fresh vegetables on the outstanding bargain list are onions, potatoes, rutabagas, sweet potatoes, Brussels sprouts, artichokes, cauliflower, collards, leaf spinach, mushrooms, radishes, acorn and butternut squash, and approved cranberries.

Peas are present an interesting contrast. The fall crop of regular pods is down nine per cent from last year and nine per cent above average. Sweet potatoes, on the other hand, are up four per cent from last year but seven per cent below average.

**Other Buys Listed**  
You can get good buys, too, in broccoli, carrots in plastic film bags (especially smaller sizes), celery, beets, and Chinese cabbage. More expensive are cucumbers, corn, beans, peppers, tomatoes, egg-plant, yellow squash, escarole and fennel lettuce.

Avocados are among best buys in fruit, also a timely item for the holiday. Fruit bowls for decorative purposes can be filled with inexpensive limes, oranges, grapefruit, tangerines and some apples. Peas, navel oranges, lemons and emperors grapes are rated as good buys.

### Rockefeller's Crowd Small In Oklahoma

OKLAHOMA CITY, Dec. 17 (AP)—After a harrowing flight from Milwaukee, New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller warmly embraced a small company of Oklahoma Republicans here last night.

Some of the Oklahomans did not return the affection. Big Problems Predicted Speaking at a rally, Rockefeller said when President Eisenhower lays down his burden the United States will be faced by new problems bigger than any in the past. He hinted he could call the shots to solve them.

The sparse crowd of 200 in municipal auditorium applauded enthusiastically. Not state Republican leaders said after the speech that support for Vice President Richard M. Nixon for the presidential nomination is not wavering. The Oklahoma GOP state committee recently voted 65 to 2 in favor of Nixon.

Before flying to Oklahoma City, Rockefeller pledged that if he decides to run for the presidency he would divert himself of any activities that might involve the national interest.

Heckler said his current tour is helping him decide whether to oppose Nixon for the presidential nomination, and promised a decision within a month.

Just about all the Democrats being mentioned prominently for the presidential nomination next year will address a 6100-a-plate dinner here Jan. 25. So will former President Harry S. Truman, Oscar L. Chapman, Democratic former secretary of the Interior, said yesterday that at least seven presidential hopefuls will be on hand.
