### 2 Men Executed By Firing Squad

**PINAR DEL RIO, Dec. 10**—Ex-Cpt. Luis Lara Crespo and ex-Cpt. Jose Morillo Reyes were executed by a firing squad this morning at a shooting range at Pinar del Rio army camp here.

Both men were sentenced to death Monday for promoting an uprising against Prime Minister Fidel Castro from hideouts in the mountains of eastern Pinar del Rio province. They were the first to be executed in Cuba since last June.

Lara, 21, had been under an earlier death sentence as a war criminal. He escaped but was recaptured.

Morillo was 34 years old.

### '60 Winter Wheat Crop to Be Bigger

**WASHINGTON, Dec. 10**—The agriculture department says a 1960 winter wheat crop of 926 million bushels is indicated on the basis of winter wheat seedings this fall.

This would be two million bushels larger than the 1955 crop but a sharp 21 per cent under the record 1958 crop.

The 1960 winter wheat crop is expected to be the fifth largest crop of record and 11 per cent above average. Another surplus wheat crop thus is in the offing with the excess to be piled on the already record wheat supplies on hand.

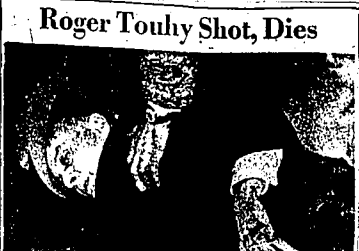

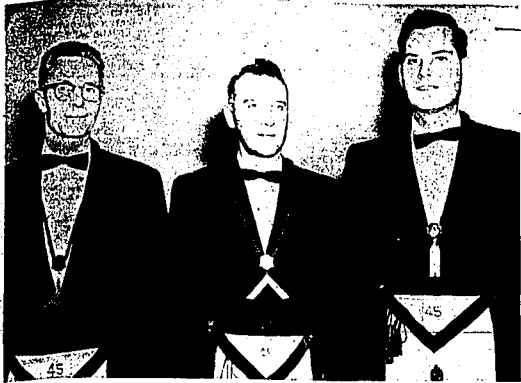

### \$63,900 Grant Given Forest Service In Study of Lightning-Caused Fires

ODEN, Dec. 20—Research on lightning-caused forest fires will be increased through a \$63,900 grant to the forest service by the National Science Foundation, the U. S. department of agriculture announced today.

According to Reed W. Bailey, director of the Intermountain forest and range experiment station at Ogden, Alan W. Materson, director of the foundation, recently approved the grant, effective Jan. 1, 1960. It will expand the research of "project-skyfire," an established forest service project to investigate origin, growth and behavior of fire-starting lightning storms and possibilities for their control.

The meteorological research office of the U. S. weather bureau has been cooperating in the study and will continue participation in the expanded program.

The program has two specific objectives: "First, to obtain basic information on the frequency, type and seasonal characteristics of lightning discharges from thunderstorms and to evaluate this information in relation to theories of thunderstorms and atmospheric electricity; and second, to determine the effects on the frequency and electrical characteristics of lightning discharges when observed as viewed with silver iodide and to evaluate the results in relation to theories of precipitation.

The grant, which is a part of the foundation's responsibility in the weather modification program approved by congress, is one of several made to other agencies and universities.

The research program will be undertaken by the staff of the northern forest fire laboratory, Missoula, Mont., under direction of J. B. Barrows, chief of the division of forest fire research of the Intermountain forest and range experiment station. Forest service research Meteorologist Donald M. Piquay will be project leader.

Assisting Piquay will be a group of forest service fire research specialists who have spent some three years in exploratory investigation which made the expanded lightning research effort possible. Research Meteorologists Robert Laughman and Clyde A. O'Dell will investigate lightning storms effects with the aid of mobile radar, electric field meters and other special field and laboratory equipment. Meteorologist and Scientist H. J. Wells will coordinate experimental lightning storms seeding operations to be carried out by aircraft equipped with silver iodide generators developed by the northern forest fire laboratory.

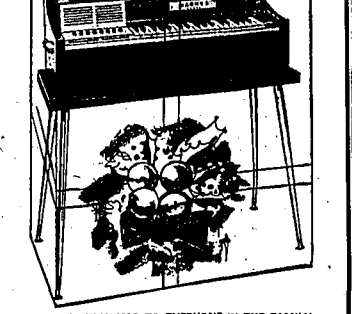

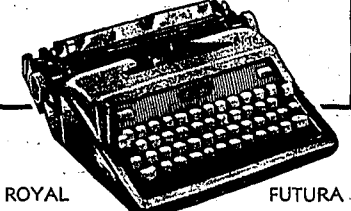

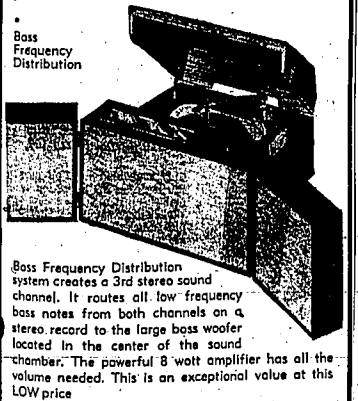

## Union Man in Agreement Of "Dual Pay Basis" Plan

Editor, Times-News:—One of our work rules in the railroad industry is that of "featherbedding" or the "dual basis of pay." This is the form of payment for work performed, and was established by the railroad men who are to be paid for work performed under the contract agreement with the railroad is continuing to those not familiar with railroad jargon for it refers to a days work of 100 miles as being the basic daily rate. Neither does the word "dual" mean that we are paid twice, they are really talking about units of work. It is an incentive system that resembles piecework in other industries.

It establishes a minimum amount of pay that we receive, but it is not intended as the maximum amount of pay that we should receive for a days work or four of duty. The amount we receive for a days work or four of duty is determined by the number of miles run or for a train in one tour of duty the greater our reward. The railroad men in the states that pay in an incentive system they should pay their employees in transportation work at least as much as we are paid. As an illustration let me give an example of a tour of duty actually performed. The distance between Glenn Perry and Huntington, Ore., but not all trains go through Huntington in a desirable season when there is a heavy shipment of new potatoes from southern Idaho and eastern Oregon we have to move a large number of cleaned refrigerator cars into Huntington. On this occasion this crew was called to handle a train of over 120 cleaned refrigerator cars from Glenn Perry and Huntington at Ontario. After emptying the cars the crew turned the units at Ontario, picked up a train of about 100 cars for the eastern market and handled it to Glenn Perry. All of this work was completed in less than 16 hours. This trip was called a "round trip" within the last week several crews had been doubling back to Huntington without full rest. This was what is called "doubling back." One trip was six hours, the other was six hours and five. The east bound trip was of eight hours duration. Total time on duty was about 16 hours. Six hours rest out of a 20 hour trip is not sufficient for a crew to be at peak efficiency. Without an incentive basis of pay I doubt if there are any employees in any industry that have completed their assigned work in the allotted time.

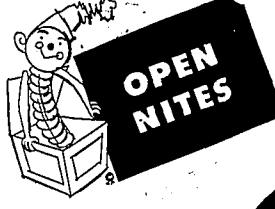

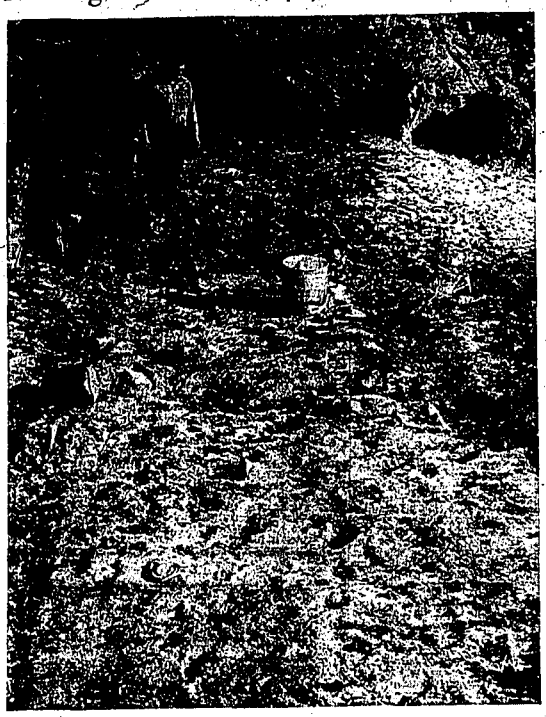

### Ranch Student Builds 'Go Kart' From Scraps to Get Experience in Welding

RUPERT, Dec. 19—All you really need to build a "Go Kart" is two steel fence posts, an old oil stove, a saddle to trade for a motor, and the desire. Anyway this is all Ronny Ashley, a sophomore at Minico high school and a student at the Idaho Ranch for Youth, needed to get a start on a "Go Kart." Ashley started the project last summer and has worked on it during his spare time. He figures he has about \$20 invested in his cart. Ashley says he is interested in any kind of automechanics and started on this project for experience in certain phases of work. He especially wanted to get experience with the arc welder and acetylene torch. During the last few months Ashley has put in quite a few hours studying the mechanics of a "Go Kart" and getting the experience he wanted in welding. "It doesn't take much to make a "Go Kart"—at least the way Ashley goes about it. Two steel fence posts form the frame of the cart. The remainder of the frame is fashioned from three-fourths inch galvanized pipe and steel concrete reinforcing rod. 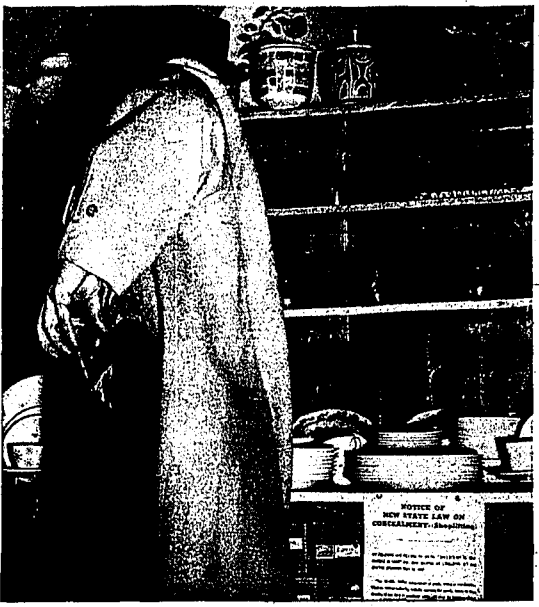

NEW YORK, Dec. 19 (AP)—Life efforts remain a reach, not a conclusion. Shakespeare seized and shook the English language and made of it an arrow to his own meaning. So do, in their own ability, all individuals in all languages.

Grammar is a roadblock only to the false-educated, language itself is the real hurdle.

The only real rule of language is to force it to say exactly what you want it to say, no more, no less. And if you do this you can well afford to break every other rule in doing so.

The true majesty of language, as Shakespeare knew, is not to be a prisoner of a previous grammar and a limp, inherited vocabulary but to assault truth vigorously with both old and new words that create a fresh meaning—both for yourself and the other fellow.

As you stretch your language, you stretch yourself. Anyone can be in his own way his own Shakespeare.

Actually there are millions of languages, or variations of languages.

Every two people who approach each other in the world speak two different languages, and they get along only as their languages meet—or stiffen in silence and retreat into individualism unexpressed.

So it is with nations, as it is with persons.

Language is a marvelous arsenal made up of words, grunts, smiles, gestures, sighs, movements—and pauses. It can be eloquent in each or all of these ways, and other ways.

Sight, for example, how often it is falling tear a human battlefield. What two people in love in all his history locked a separate kind of signal for being together?

People being as various as they are, no dictionary could possibly sum up all the varieties of human languages though learned scholars do make periodic appraisals. Their

## First Federally-Inspected Meat Plant For Valley Is Now Operating at Buhl

BUHL, Dec. 19—The first permanent U. S. department of agriculture meat inspection plant in Magic Valley has been completed by the Carter Packing company, Buhl.

This is the first move in the valley to process stock for interstate and, especially, West coast shipment according to M. W. (Mel) Carter, president of the plant, which has undergone extensive remodeling to comply with USDA regulations. It is just one of many plants in this area which will eventually revise their plants so they can process graded inspected meat and ship interstate.

Carter says the tremendous feeding projects on in the valley will lead packers eventually to process the meat here and ship it to the markets instead of shipping live animals out of the state for processing.

**Has Advantages**  
He points out processing the meat in the home area has many advantages for the farmer, processor and the community. An animal dressed in the home area will shrink less, be dressed less than in a turnkey grade higher than stock shipped to far-away points. This in turn will create local industries which will hire local persons and keep more money in the valley.

He says this also means the farmer, just one step closer to markets with all livestock.

Carter started revising his plant last February and is now in some of the final stages of completion. He adds that in order to keep up with the government regulations the remodeling will always be in progress.

The plant located northwest of Buhl has a staff of 18 employees and the maximum output potential of the plant is 200 head of cattle each week. This is about twice the plant output before remodeling. More than 3,000 square feet of floor space have been added to the building. This includes a women's welfare room and the government inspector's offices two loading docks, a sausage seasoning room, sausage kitchen and a drip cooler.

**Western Move Noted**  
Carter says his plant is just one of many plants expanding facilities across the nation. He notes there have been many changes to place packing houses in agricultural areas.

He adds another reason to place the plants where cattle are raised and fed out.

Carter decided last year to remodel his business so he could comply with USDA standards and start shipping to the West Coast markets when he realized the government with the regulations without going to great expense. Since then there have been many changes in the plant.

**Changes Made**  
Carter notes the changes include all wood work benches and carts replaced by stainless steel and galvanized steel benches and carts. All walls were refinished and constructed so they are now washable and cleaned with steam and larger drains. The rails which hold the dressed meat were raised so the animals are hung further from the floor. The washing system was expanded and improved. It is necessary to have 180-degree water present everywhere for cleaning animals and working areas.

Everything in the plant is washed with hot water and dried with hot air. A special pump was installed, which booms the hot water and steam out under 50 to 500 pounds of pressure. All corrals and ramps within 100 feet of the plant were cemented, curbed and drained so they can be cleaned readily. The corrals are washed down once a week. All delivery trucks are washed out with soap and hot water each morning.

**Employs War Smocks**  
The cooling rooms were outfitted with a washing and draining system. Visitors and employees wear smocks at all times so their clothing can't touch the meat. Additionally is a USDA veterinarian on duty at all times inspecting animals. The veterinarian at the Carter plant is H. W. Russell, who recently moved to Buhl from Boise.

In addition to the locker plant facility expansion, two dressing areas and locker rooms were constructed—men and women employees of the plant.

The result of this extensive remodeling is a clean, bright plant is prepared to process government inspected meat and ship through interstate channels.

**Business Combined**  
Carter hopes to set up a combination type business for the new plant. He will buy cattle from farmers and market the meat to outside markets, mostly in California around Sacramento and Francisco. He also will operate a processing service for independent operators who want to market the processed meat themselves. The latter service will be added later.

Carter believes his operation is



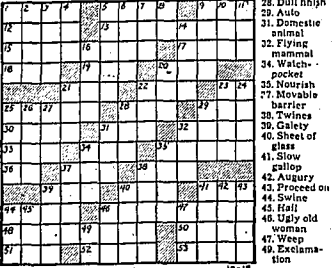
