Turkeys To Cost More This Season

 Christmas is going to cost more than last year. And the turkey is no exception. Although prices naturally vary all over the country, turkeys at the moment in the New York metropolitan area range from 45 cents a pound, depending on the size, to 55 cents a pound, depending on the size.

Hams Featured
 Turkeys and hams are universal specialties on the meat counters this season. Ham prices range from 49 cents a pound.

With the emphasis on these two specialties, there are good specialties in beef, pork and lamb.

Steak prices are about 10 cents a pound in some areas. Pork chops dipped six cents a pound and leg of lamb dressed 10 cents a pound.

The week's specialties in the vegetable and fruit departments include typical holiday fare such as green peas, Brussels sprouts, sweet potatoes, white onions, delicious apples and California oranges.

With the alarm over contamination of cranberries having stirred up the traditional red berries are among best buys.

Best buys in vegetables include green beans, asparagus, small cabbages, collards, kale, endive, escarole, small to medium yellow onions, cauliflower, radishes, blue turn squash, sweet potatoes and turnips.

A "good buy" classification includes beets, cauliflower, broccoli, green sprouts, celery, Chinese chives, mushrooms, mushrooms, and celery lettuce.

Best buys in fruits are eastern apples, avocados, limes, grapefruit and tangerines.

Bars are good buys in pears, peaches and western oranges.

Stamps Wanted

States, 14 Nations Seen By President

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (UPI)—President Eisenhower's travels when he leaves for Washington in 19 times more than for business or holiday trips in 14 states and 14 foreign countries.

His trips have lasted from 24 hours in some cases to 20 days for his current tour, which looks like more than 2000 miles to 11 nations in Europe, Africa and Asia.

For holidays, White House records show that the President has spent five Christmas holidays in a farm in the state of Maryland and two at Camp David, White House retreat in the Maryland mountains near Washington.

His longer holidays included a two-week vacation at Gettysburg in August, an eight-day trip to Palm Springs, Calif., in early fall and a one for five and one for 10 days, at the vacation home in Augusta, Ga.

Whenever the President goes, at least part of the White House operation goes with him, even on the shortest holidays. He receives reports by courier and the White House communication system and frequently receives telegrams and ranking government officials who follow him from Washington.

Mitchell Reports How Labor Laws Are Being Put in Use

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (UPI)—The Labor-Management Reporting and Disclosure act has been a statute for only three months. In that time, many administrative tasks and difficulties have presented themselves.

One of the first major tasks was to conceive and prepare the several different types of reporting forms labor organizations and employers would be required to fill out to comply with the act.

Immediately necessary was a form which would provide a description of constitutional structure and operating procedure of labor organizations. This report had to be filed within 90 days after the act was signed.

The department of labor met with union representatives to discuss the technical aspects and currently more than 67,000 writing forms, called LM-1, were sent to 134 international and national unions for distribution to their locals.

Thousands of forms were issued directly to other unions. The department has met also with management representatives to discuss the types of reports employers who undertake certain activities, must file.

Meanwhile regulations governing the forms for trusteeship and labor consultants reports had been developed and issued, since these reports were due within 30 days after passage of the act. These reports became flowing into the department almost immediately.

More than 500 labor organizations filed trusteeship reports under the act, and more than 90 trustees have been lifted since the new law substituted a total of 35 relations-consultants, admittedly the smallest group affected by the new law, substituted a total of 35 reports on their financial and business activities.

As soon as the labor organization information forms were printed, the new bureau of labor-management reports began the big job of processing a financial reporting form. The decision was made to issue two financial forms—one in which a headquarters would file with \$20,000 or more in gross annual receipts, and one for smaller unions whose total intake was under that figure.

This was done to relieve the small unions from undue burden and expense. Both forms will be available early in 1960.

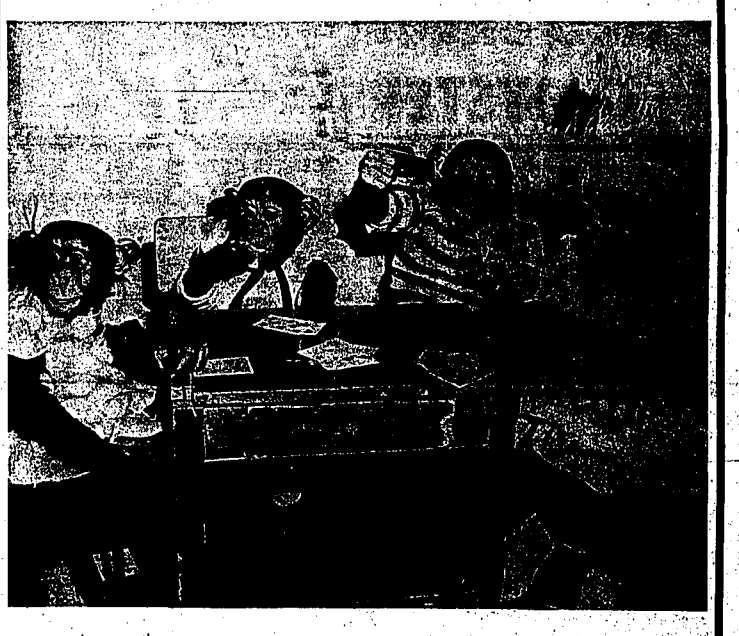

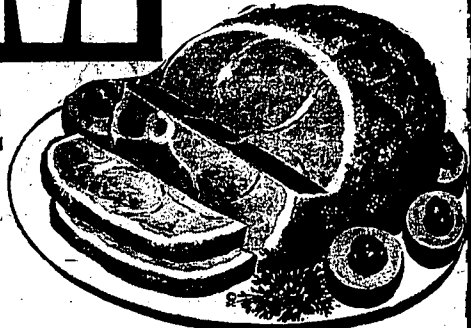

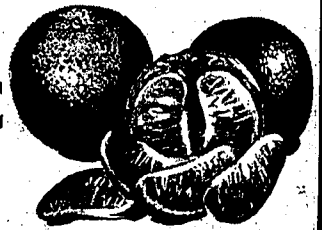

Montana's Air Guard Sends Governor Bill

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (UPI)—The national guard has been trying since last August to secure legislation for Montana, for a round-trip ride to Miami, Fla., on a plane sponsored by the state.

A national guard spokesman said the bureau had sent the bill to the governor's office and the wives of two aides when he used the Montana air national guard to fly from Helena to Miami en route to the National Governor's conference in Puerto Rico.

The bureau said transportation of the four women was "expressly forbidden" by state regulations. Accordingly, the bureau has sent two letters to the Montana adjutant general, Maj. Gen. Hugo Brown, and one to the governor, J. Michael, requesting compensation.

The letters, written by Maj. Gen. Winston O. Wilson, deputy chief of the bureau, were dated Aug. 12 and Oct. 15. The bureau spokesman said Michael has not replied to either letter, adding that "we incline to believe that the bill until the bureau has received a satisfactory answer."

Morocco King Has Big Job Keeping Calm

RABAT, Morocco, Dec. 22 (UPI)—King Mohammed V, Morocco, host to President Eisenhower today, a mild-mannered moderate who has spent much of his reign trying to maintain a delicate balance between the French and the Algerians.

He once was shipped off to a two-year exile when the French were masters of the country. His prestige was so great among his people that France finally called him back to Morocco in 1952.

His Near Absolute Power

Nonetheless, Mohammed is not absolute civil and religious ruler of his nation, slightly larger than California and its 10 million inhabitants.

In practice he never has been able to wield this authority fully. For many years he could only rubber-stamp decisions by the French. Now he must fight his way through the political intrigue by ill-defined political parties.

As the Algerians demand unity, he traces his ancestry to All, son-in-law of the founder of Islam, the Prophet Mohammed.

Family Kicks Thrown

Now 50, Mohammed was elected king of Morocco in 1952 after his father died. The election was between the Wilmas, the learned doctors of Islamic law. The three sons within the Alouia family had done not automatically pass to the eldest son.

Political elections never have been held. Political leaders guided their status by their fight for independence from France, and there is little way of telling how much popular support they have.

This leaves the king the sole task of mediating fierce political intrigues.

18 Palaces Owned

The king—his discarded title of sultan in favor of what he considered more to state times—has 18 rambling baroque palaces at his disposal. But he seldom lives away from the capital, Rabat, with its colorful Negro background, a fleet of 35 American cars, tennis courts, grammar and swimming pool.

Mohammed has two of the four wives allowed by Moslem law and is the father of six children of whom the eldest, Prince Moulay Hassan, is crown prince. He keeps several concubines, but in Moslem eyes this only adds to his status.

U. S. Servicemen Play Santa Claus

NAGOYA, Japan, Dec. 22 (UPI)—U. S. forces played Santa Claus today for more than 5,000 children in this central Japanese city devastated by a typhoon last September.

A caravan of U. S. army and navy trucks loaded with toys and kindergarten, and American servicemen distributed toys and other gifts collected by U. S. forces in a "toys for toots" campaign throughout Japan.

Many Americans also passed out well-filled stockings and toys to beaming children at a leading department store.

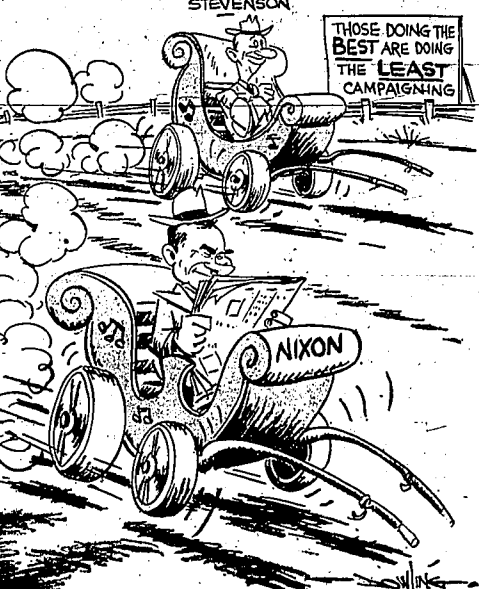

Michigan's Officials End Tax Fight, Wait for New Revenue

LANSING, Mich., Dec. 22 (UPI)—Michigan's tax fight is over and government heads are waiting anxiously for an \$7-million-dollar revenue package to start pouring cash into an ailing state treasury.

The legislature wrapped up the new money program Friday and called it quits on the 158th day of the session, longest in state history.

Urged by Gov. G. Mennen Williams, reluctant-house Democrats have Republicans vote to approve, six-bill package in 40 minutes.

Williams branded the program "financially and miserably" but promised he would not veto it. Republican and Democrat leaders agreed the plan is a stopgap.

Lawmakers will run head-on into tax and money problems again when the 1960 session convenes Jan. 12 to seek a permanent solution.

Biggest and most hotly debated feature of the new program is liquidation of the state's \$6-million-dollar veterans trust fund program worth about \$6 million dollars. The fund, used to aid needy veterans, will be restored piecemeal over the next five years. The fund's annual yield will be appropriated from the general fund.

Organized veterans fought the proposal. But the governor and leaders in both parties considered liquidation necessary to meet the state's pressing obligations. The general fund treasury is currently empty.

Earthquake Hits Tennessee Area

FINLEY, Tenn., Dec. 22 (UPI)—A violent Earth tremor shook this area yesterday causing minor damage but no reported injuries.

Mrs. Egbert Finley, 70, said she "thought the whole house was coming down." Another local resident, Mrs. W. C. Wheeler, said she was doing her laundry "when all of a sudden, the washing machines started dancing around."

U. S. supreme court Justice William O. Douglas reported feeling the quake while seated in a duck-hunting blind near Hall's, Tenn.

Refugee Girl Is Burned to Death

MANHEIM, Pa., Dec. 22 (UPI)—An East German refugee girl who arrived in this central Pennsylvania city yesterday when fire destroyed the home of her fiancée's brother.

Brigitte Heyer, 18, left the Rhineland, in West Germany, this month to join two other refugee groups who arrived in 1957 and 1958. All three groups left East Germany in 1949.

Wilhelm Schmidt, 20, the fiancée, was in the first group. They planned to be married after the Christmas holidays.

New Law by Castro OK's Taking Land

HAWANA, Dec. 22 (UPI)—The Cuban government announced approval today of a new law authorizing the confiscation of property owned by persons convicted of plotting against Premier Fidel Castro's government.

Castro announced in a telecast Sunday night that the new law was in the works.

Earlier, it had been reported that the attorney who defended Azari Young, Miami, against charges of anti-government plotting has been arrested in connection with Young's escape from prison.

Reports from the western provincial capital of Pinar Del Rio said Jorge Bacallao, the attorney, is being held in an army intelligence building. Details of the charges against him have not been made public.

Bacallao also defended ex-Cpl. Luis Lara Crespo, one of two Cubans executed Saturday for anti-government activity. However, there appeared to be no connection between the Lara case and Bacallao's arrest.

Huge Pea Bean Crops Reported

BOISE, Dec. 22 (UPI)—Idaho farmers produced a 60 per cent larger crop of dry peas this year than last and their second-highest dry pea crop on record, the agriculture department said today.

The USDA said the dry pea crop totaled 1,877,000 bags, while last year it was 1,170,000 bags. The bean crop amounted to 9,320,000 bags, 13 per cent larger than average and second in size only to 1952.

Farmers harvested the 1953 dry pea crop from 126,000 acres—the most since 1935—and got a yield of 1,480 pounds per acre. The dry pea crop came from an estimated 144,000 acres, one per cent less than last year. Yield per acre averaged 1,600 pounds.

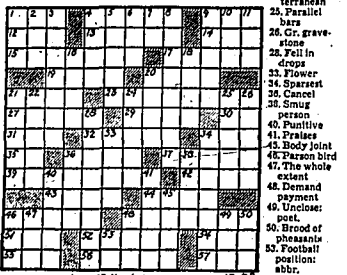

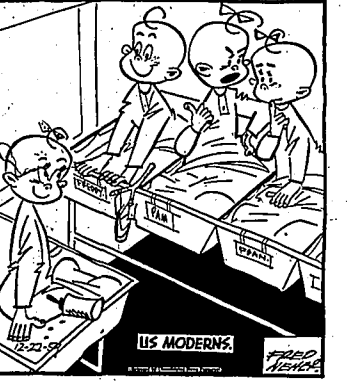

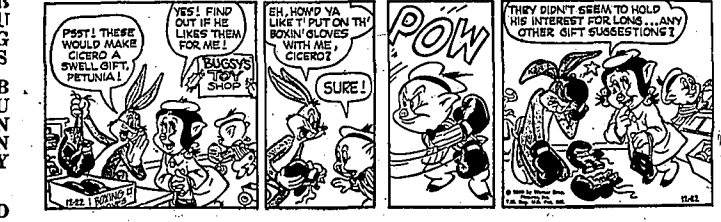

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Rocket Fired To Get Stars' Radio Signal

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—Canadian and American scientists sent a four-stage rocket into space at Wallops Island, Va., today to record radio signals emanating from the stars.

The complicated rocket incorporated a new X246 engine as its fourth stage, and the experiment also was to test how this worked in the vacuum of space.

Rocket "Went Good"

The rocket was set to reach a height of 800 miles. The national aeronautics and space administration could not say immediately the exact height the rocket reached, but it apparently "went good."

The rocket was in flight for about 18 minutes and came down in the Atlantic about 600 miles from the Virginia coastal island.

Radio signals produced by the stars—scientists call it galactic noise—are partly absorbed by the Earth's atmosphere. In order to measure them accurately instruments must be sent above 450 miles.

Radio Carried

The rocket's 48-pound payload carried a three-megacycle radio receiver to collect the star signals. These were telemetered back to Earth.

The launching vehicle was made up of an Honest John missile and two Nike as well as the X246. The whole thing weighed 7,000 pounds at takeoff. NASA called the two-stage compound vehicle a Javelin.

Wife Seeking Funds Target For Bad Ads

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—A housewife who would like to earn a few dollars at home is a favorite target of deceptive employment advertising, a spokesman for the Association of Better Business Bureaus said today.

Edwin M. Lockard, who is also general manager of the Baltimore better business bureau, spoke today from a statement prepared at a federal trade commission conference on deceptive advertising.

He cited promotional matter put out by a Baltimore firm speaking of "numerous affiliations" with business needing envelopes, addressed and stamped to earn "43¢ or more per week for a few hours a night." Women were asked for two dollars "to cover cost of mailing, listing and registration."

Bureau investigation, Lockard said, disclosed that the advertiser was a newly formed company which could not prove it had work to offer. After a postal investigation, the firm went out of business and the postoffice returned to the sender the letters with the fee, Lockard said.

The FTC concludes today a two-day session for representatives of 47 consumer, civic and business organizations, seeking to strengthen defenses against misleading advertising and other deceptive sales practices.

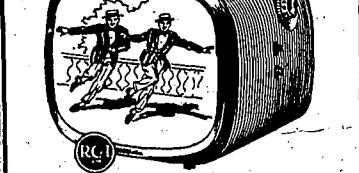
