Iowa Leader Claims Autos Poorly Made

DES MOINES, Ia., Dec. 23 (UPI)—Iowa's Governor Warren E. Hearnes today said that Iowa's increasing toll was due, in part, to the fact that American built autos were poorly constructed.

"The auto makers are not interested in power windows, they are interested in safety," he said.

"The prime responsibility for auto accidents rests with the driver, the failure of the driver to take proper care of his car is a cause of the increased toll on Iowa highways," Love-

said. "Democratic Iowa governor will expect to bring up the subject at the February meeting of the executive committee on the National Governors' conference."

"Car manufacturers are now depending on the shipping of the cars to hold their market rather than depending on quality," he said.

"Body construction hit there is nothing to indicate mechanical failure has caused accidents," the governor said.

"Mechanically, the cars are generally of sound construction," he said.

"With the construction of the body itself that isn't strong enough," he said.

The governor said car manufacturers must accept the responsibility of constructing as safe a vehicle as it is possible to build.

Man Charged In Desertion Placed in Jail

FORT WORTH, Tex., Dec. 23 (UPI)—Jack Mackey, 28, charged with deserting his Korean wife and two young daughters, will probably be in jail this Christmas and maybe even next Christmas.

His wife, Marie, 25, and the girls, Betty, 2½, and Judy, 4½, were found in their Fort Worth apartment Sunday nearly starved.

There was no food in the house, no money, and Mrs. Mackey said she hadn't seen her husband in four days.

Family Helped Fort Worth police and private citizens showered the mother and daughters with food.

They arrested Mackey late Sunday at a laundromat.

Mackey, in a full cell interview with Assistant District Attorney Melio Millett, said he wanted a jury trial and was going to plead innocent to the charges against him.

Throughout the conversation, Millett said, Mackey failed to ask about his wife and children.

Case Closed Mackey's attorney said he would give him (Mackey) as speedy a trial as possible, said county Criminal Judge J. C. Du-

vall. "But we've got 1,000 cases on the docket ahead of his."

"I doubt if we can get to him before next December," Millett said.

Mackey's bond was raised from \$100 to \$5,000, Millett said, "and he looks like he's going to stay in jail until his trial comes up."

"Professional bondsmen are a real stinker away from this case like it was a rattlesnake," he said.

"They want no part of the man."

Charge Denied Mackey has repeatedly denied he deserted his wife and children. He said he had gone to Dallas to care for his brother's children.

Mrs. Mackey is still in a hospital, being fed intravenously. She has eaten twice, but very little each time. The children are playing with a neighbor couple, Mr. and Mrs. O. L. Somera.

Pony Express To Ride Again Next Summer

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 23 (UPI)—Next summer the pony express rides again.

Relays of horses and riders will pound over the 2,000-mile route across the plains, desert and mountains from the Missouri river to the Pacific in re-enactment of America's most remarkable mail route.

This time horsemen will try to slice the day off the 10-day East-West schedule of 100 years ago, according to President Wadell F. Smith of the National Pony Express Centennial association.

On July 19 the postoffice department will issue a four-cent commemorative stamp envelope at St. Joseph, Mo., and Sacramento, Calif. Riders will be posted to carry specially prepared mail again, both east and west, over the old route of the pony express.

"We will take at least 500 horses and 600 riders each way," Smith said. "But the men will be ready and the mail will go through again as it did in Civil War days."

The ponies of 1860, according to Smith, will gallop across one mile of Missouri, 130 miles of Kansas, 450 miles of Nebraska, 40 miles of Colorado, 500 miles of Wyoming, 270 miles of Utah, 410 miles of Nevada and 108 miles of California—eight states in all.

The mail will start west from St. Joseph, Mo., and east from Sacramento, Calif., the original terminal points of the pony express.

PARIS, Dec. 23 (UP)—In the wake of the western summit and NATO talks in Paris, the major western allies are still far from unified on four major issues they must negotiate with the Soviet Union.

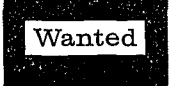
Disunity continues over the military policy of the Atlantic alliance itself.

The western big four set a pattern for negotiation with the Soviets that might go on for years, but their decision is clearly only the beginning of a beginning.

President Eisenhower, French President Charles de Gaulle, British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan and West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer either failed—or did not even try—to resolve their own differences on basic issues they intend to discuss with Nikita Khrushchev.

Instead they ordered their experts to go to work on building a common front, for the proposed April 27 encounter with the Soviet premier. Leading diplomats confidently explain the experts have four months to resolve the conflicts. But it took them 13 months of dickering to get together on the matter of holding the East-West summit meetings.

The West may have a gang fight and wind up with everybody taking his rocks home. Any one of a baker's dozen of festering hotspots may unexpectedly erupt into a conflict of dangerous proportions. But let us be merry this Christmas day. Not because tomorrow we die. But in remembrance of the birth of the Savior and the hope of being alive today and intending to keep on being alive tomorrow, tomorrow and tomorrow and tomorrow.

VIEW OF OTHERS

Idaho's processing plants account for about a third of the nation's potato production. This statement in a recent survey of the potato industry by the Wall Street Journal gives Idahoans some idea of the stature of the comparatively new processing development. Ten years ago only about 13 per cent of the state's crop went to the processing plants. This percentage is expected to be 40 per cent this year. And the difference in the variety of uses and the quality from 10 to 15 years ago is as different as the percentage.

The processors have not only supplied a growing new outlet for potatoes but have developed a new work force in the state as well. The industry also whittles down an old problem—a distasteful market. The less bulky processed potatoes reduce the Idaho freight cost 24 per cent.

But some growers are not happy with the price at times, processing has decidedly provided a versatility of outlet that is bound to aid the grower. He can sell his entire crop more conveniently, too. Where the adjustment will be made as the processing industry fits into the pattern, will be the whole crop price. Some farmers who contracted with processors last summer for \$1 or \$1.25 per hundred may have some misgivings as the price rises now, but they also can remember that their selling price was considerably better at that time than that of the previous year.

The potato man, processor or grower, are all gambler, say. But the fact that the fact has obtained such an early foothold and such a sizable one on the nation's processed market, assure well for the future of the industry. Idaho farmers are going to have more choice than they had before. What is needed to perpetuate the situation is maintenance in both the field and processing goods... and development of a single labeling and packing policy. Idaho again this year will be the nation's 1st potato producer, not only for processed but for potato production generally. THE GORDIAN KNOT
We can all be pretty sure that, now or later, nothing will come of the renewed clamor among farm groups and some politicians for the resignation of Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson. Benson himself obviously has no disposition toward resigning, and never has had. President Eisenhower will evidently not ask him to quit, for he values him highly and is not the kind of guy who gives way under this sort of pressure. Benson, of course, has long served as a scapegoat for the farmer's difficulties. A good many people who rip him up the back may not actually be too clear as to what "Benson's policies" are, and how they affect farm problems. Whatever may have been the effect of his policies and programs on farm income and prices (once more in decline), the detached onlooker must suggest that over the long pull it wouldn't make much difference whether he resigned or not. The original major postwar decline in farm income began during the Truman administration and continued into the Eisenhower regime. It began in a period of high support prices and has occurred also in a time of lower, more flexible supports. The basic cause—the building of immense crop surpluses—has been with us constantly since the free price era. European recovery demand tapered off. In more than a decade of trying, surpluses have not been licked. If anyone imagines that a different secretary of agriculture, Republican or Democrat, is going to wave a wand and waf these surpluses away, let him consider what the untrained farm experts and statisticians have to say about the matter. They flatly predict we won't have the surplus problem beaten even by 1975, despite the fact we'll have perhaps as many as 70 million more Americans to feed. They figure that even with our present technical knowledge, the surplus problem will be up another 25 per cent from the late 1950s. They also think farmers then will be some 10 per cent more efficient at converting feed into live stock weight. These are the kind of long-range farm facts they represent a tide of huge proportions. They indicate surpluses for at least another decade and a half. It will take far more than a change of faces to meet this enduring problem.

Soviets Reduce Cases of Polio

GENEVA, Dec. 23 (UPI)—The Soviet Union has drastically reduced the number of polio cases with the mass use of an American-developed oral live virus vaccine not yet on the mass market in the United States.

The World Health organization (WHO), revealed the oral vaccine's success yesterday in a report prepared by Yale university Dr. Dorothy M. Horstmann, who visited the Soviet Union last summer to check on its safety and efficiency.

Dr. Horstmann, associate professor of preventive medicine and pediatrics, said the oral vaccine—developed by Dr. Albert Sabin, Cincinnati—brought "marked reduction" where used despite a "pattern of rising incidence over the past few years" in the Soviet Union.

But, she warned, "at least another year is needed before a valid judgment can be made about the effectiveness of the "oral" vaccine."

Mike Refuses to Release of Aid Reports

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (UPI)—President Eisenhower has refused to release reports of a congressional administration review of aid to foreign aid. He said such reports would not be in the national interest.

Eisenhower barred release of reports on program in Iran and Pakistan to Comptroller General Joseph Campbell, who sought them from the International Cooperation Administration (ICA). Campbell's administration office was set up by congress to check on government spending.

Senate Comptroller General Joseph Campbell complained to congress that the defense department had asked up two reports which he said would help determine whether U. S. arms aid to Europe was being managed efficiently.

Union to Give Workers and Bosses Raise

NEW YORK, Dec. 23 (UPI)—The Hatters union signs a contract this week with its other hat-grading and wage increases to the owners of the Merriman Hat company, Inc., Amherst, Mass.

With the other hat-graders, the union is passing out wage increases to the management of the plant.

The United Hatters, Cap and Millinery Workers International union bought the company last February when the former owners shut down operations and prepared to go out of business. It hired back the old management and the 325 union workers. And last week the board of directors approved a new labor contract with the majority stockholders.

It announced a profit of \$183,000 before taxes for the first nine months of union ownership, as compared with a loss of more than \$70,000 in the same period of the previous year.

No Challenge Made

Rose, a member of the board on which the union has a majority vote, said the new labor contract calls for a three per cent pay-off fund, increases in wages and health and welfare benefits for an overall increase of 7 1/2 per cent in labor costs. No one presented a varying estimate.

While negotiations proceeded on the workers' demands, the union was considering increases for management," Rose announced, wearing two hats in one sentence. "These, too, have been approved by the board."

The total resulting increase in costs will be between \$50,000 and \$80,000 annually.

Georgia Must Soon Decide School Issue

ATLANTA, Dec. 23 (UPI)—Georgia is nearing its moment of decision on the matter of public school integration.

The question is will the state government stick to its "never-never" policy or will it permit integration to have its way?

The situation which has developed here in recent weeks is as follows:—U. S. district Judge Hooper has ordered Atlanta, with 116,000 school children, 41 per cent of whom are Negroes, to stop segregation policies for its public schools.

Plan Submitted

The Atlanta school board has submitted to Hooper a pupil placement plan that would assign students according to a number of factors but without regard to race or color.

Legislation is being prepared for introduction in January that would leave the final decision on school desegregation to the parents of the children involved.

Some members of the legislature despite their public statements supporting strict school segregation, feel that Georgia must sooner or later face the prospect of some integration. They feel that the question is, when?

No Bargains Promised

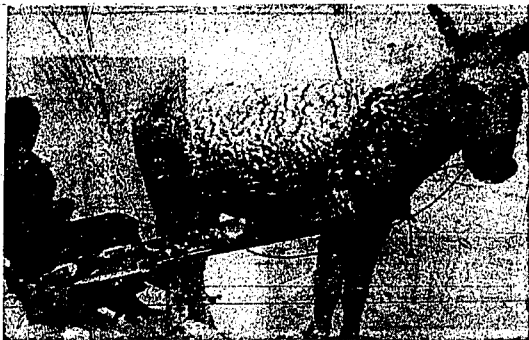
Gov. Ernest Vandiver pledged during his election campaign that there would be no school integration in Georgia while he was chief executive. Many Georgia legislators hold firmly to the same position.

The strategy of the state government is to compel all integration efforts and, if integration has to come, to put it off as long as possible.

An interesting network of laws is on the books to aid this policy. As Georgia laws now stand, any school that integrates may be closed. Immediately, a growing number of leaders feel, however, that the time has come to face the issue head on.

PARIS, Dec. 23 (UPI)—Hawaii has achieved statehood, acquired a new flag and gained a star on the American flag—but the French postoffice won't believe it.

Two Americans from Honolulu are campaigning to get the postoffice to recognize Hawaii as a state. One is conducting his fight by letter and the other is right on the firing line, at the postoffice clerk's window.

Bob Kraus, a columnist for the Honolulu Advertiser, took his complaint about postal non-recognition to Paris on leave from her post at Kaneohe school.

She writes "U.S.A." at the bottom of the address on the letters she sends to Hawaii. The French postoffice clerks dutifully scratch off and charge her double the 25-cent rate.

Mrs. Kraus first discovered this postal discrimination six years ago, when Hawaii was only a territory, but she did not press her claims then. But with statehood, it was different.

Kraus' argument was well-calculated to appeal to the French on either practical or ideological grounds. But first, it must work its way through the French bureaucratic maze.

A spokesman at de Gaulle's palace said that Kraus' letter is because it is in the category of "letters to the chief of state which do not require his special attention. It has been forwarded to the government department dealing with it."

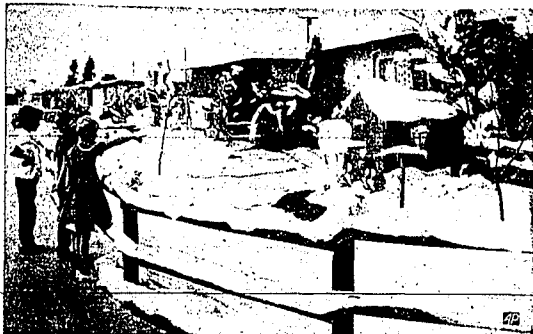

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Dec. 23 (AP)—Food Machinery and Chemical Corporation, New York, has announced plans to build at Kemmerer a \$2 to \$3 million dollar plant capable of producing high grade coals from nearby sub-bituminous coal deposits.

Construction is expected to start next month with the plant ready for "shakedown" in August or early September, according to Henry Muessem, manager of Carbon Products, a subsidiary of the New York firm.

Gov. Joe Hickey and the company issued a joint release saying the plant is based on a new process "that promises to revolutionize the coke industry, not only in this country, but throughout the world, as well."

Food Machinery was announced successful bidder at a bureau of land management auction in Cheyenne for 525 acres of land five miles southwest of Kemmerer.

Food Machinery and Chemical corporation developed the new coke process primarily to furnish steel furnaces. A pilot plant has been successfully operated in the East for about two years, Muessem said.

The decline partly reflects the Christmas holiday, the institute said.

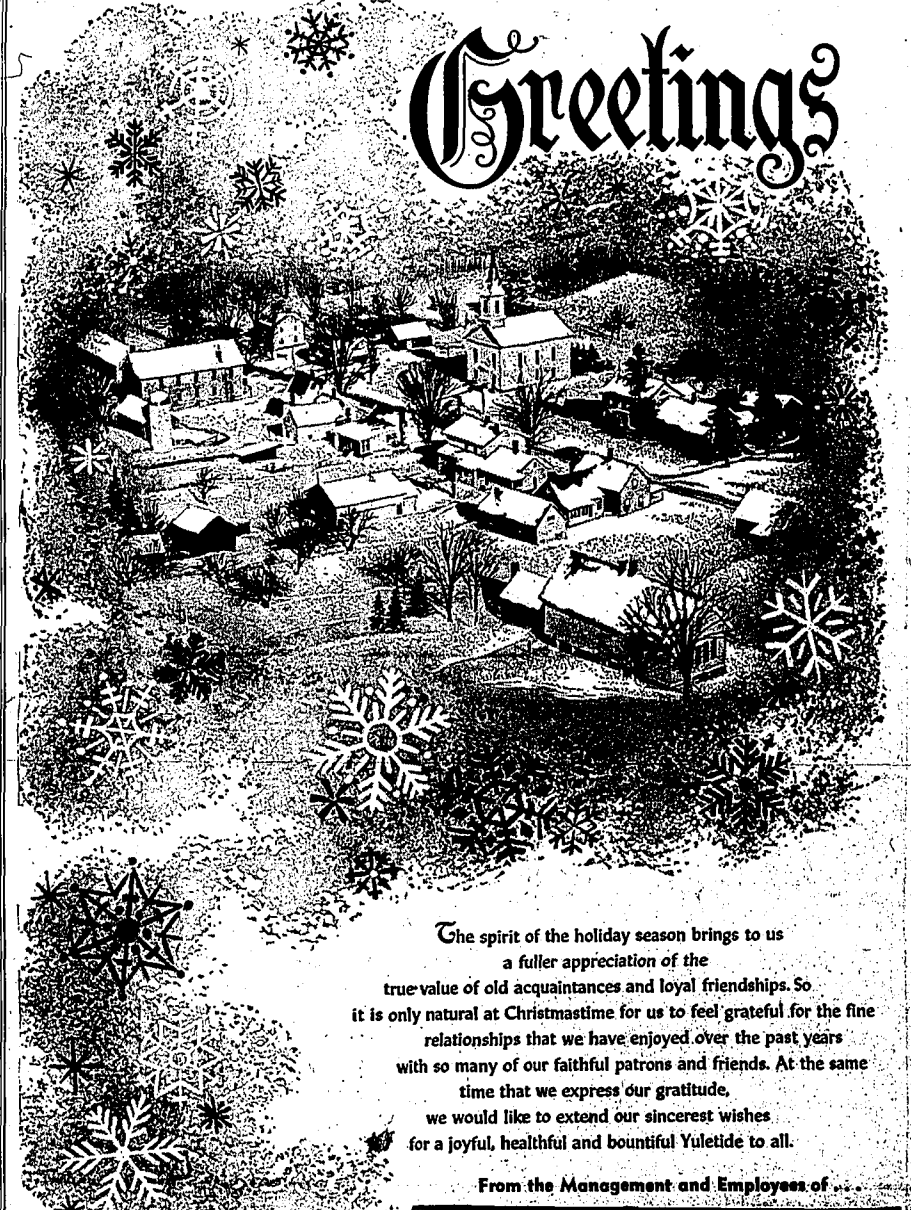

Minister Condemns Russian For Using Christians' Words

NEW YORK, Dec. 23 (AP) — The president of the National Council of Churches said this week "it is a sin and a disgrace to use all" that Russian Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev has been permitted to "grab the ball and run" with such great Christian words as peace and goodwill.

While he does so, the Rev. Edwin T. Dahlberg said, Christian men are "scrubbing among the stars" in search of God, but tracking down possible locations for launchers, platforms, missile pads, and strategy for the military and economic conquest of the communist powers.

"Possibly God has waited long enough," Dahlberg said in his Christmas message to the council, 33 Protestant and eastern Orthodox denominations.

"It may be saying to us, 'I have been counting on you who bear my name. But if you fail me, I shall have to give my word to other nations, other ideologies, and other religions.' It would be the first time in history that God has rejected His people, and turned to the shepherds, managers and stable hands of the renewal of hope and righteousness among men."

Dahlberg's message was made public after his departure on a month-long Christmas mission to U.S. servicemen overseas. He will preach a Christmas day sermon on Okinawa and return to the United States after a visit to church-supported refugee centers in Asia and the Middle East.

Faith in God is still the supreme yearning of millions of His

children," the passage said. "So likewise is the message for peace among the nations. But we must put these prayers to work. It is not enough to pray. We should permit a materialistic, God-denying communist like Nikita Khrushchev to grab the ball and run away with it—going down the field of history with such great words as universal disarmament, world friendship, reconciliation and good will. These are our words, Christian words."

"Ike" Suggested For Peace Prize

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP) — President Eisenhower has been proposed by Sen. Kenneth B. Keating, R. N.Y., as a candidate for the Nobel peace prize.

Keating said in a statement, the prize, which is awarded annually, should go to Eisenhower as "the world's pre-eminent man of peace."

"His historic journey, now completed, has changed peace from a word to a living, shining hope," Keating said.

JERUSALEM, Dec. 23 (AP)—Simon Peres, former director general of the Israel foreign ministry, has been named deputy defense minister. The post of defense minister is held by Premier David Ben-Gurion.

Sheriff Says Long Missing Woman Lives

PONCA CITY, Okla., Dec. 23 (AP) — Sheriff Forrest Walker says he is convinced Mrs. Lyde Marland is alive. He said his investigation into the case of the missing widow of a former Oklahoma governor is closed.

Walker said he has determined to his own satisfaction that Mrs. Marland is alive and living in a large city in one of Oklahoma's bordering states.

"Apparently she wants her whereabouts to remain secret so we are not going to divulge where she is living now," the sheriff said.

The widow of former Gov. E. W. Marland disappeared from Ponca City in February 1933. She was known to have been in Missouri in June 1933 but has not been heard from by people in her home town in years.

She was the "big" ward of the oil-rich Marland. Later they were married after the death of his first wife in 1925.

Mrs. Marland, who now would be about 59, lived in a guest cottage on the 2 1/2-million-dollar estate of her late husband before her disappearance.

Marland, who died in 1941, left his wife about \$40,000 and a small part of the 2,000-acre estate northeast of here.

A letter to Walker from a Long Beach, Calif., man, A. M. Peck, said Mrs. Marland was "alive and

in fairly good health" as of late summer, 1950.

Peck told the sheriff Mrs. Marland was his neighbor in 1929 and added that he also had a letter written by her dated Jan. 30, 1930.

Safe Driving League Opens Winter Action

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (UPI)—The winter driving league will start its first official day of winter driving on a nationwide campaign to reduce the number of auto accidents.

The league is the first of its kind in the drive as the public health service and the national association of police officers.

As part of the effort, the three groups issued a list of tips for drivers in the snow belt states.

At the suggestions:

Winterize. Know that driving in winter is less favorable at this time of year. Winterize your car, use winter driving techniques and wear your seat belt.

Check your tires. preferably use winter tires, or if you have all-weather tires, check for more severe conditions. Tires worn three or more months are less effective. Pump up your tires, or even with the extra help of reinforced tire treads, slower than normal speeds are a must on snow and ice.

Check windshield and windows. Be sure that your wiper blades, your heater and your defogger are working properly. Clean the snow and ice from your windshield and windows. Use a defogger, if you have one. Ventilate, to keep the fogging out of your windows from fogging.

Get Feel of Road. Get the "feel" of the road. In order to avoid unintentional sliding or spinning of your wheels, occasionally try your brakes or gently press your accelerator while driving slowly and as traffic and weather conditions permit. Then shift your speed to road and winter conditions.

Follow at a safe distance. Stay well back of the vehicle ahead so that you will have plenty of room to stop. It takes from 100 to 120 times more distance to stop on snow and ice as it does on pavement. You may find it hard to explain why you couldn't stop when the other fellow did.

Pump your brakes to maintain steering control when braking. Use the "pump" method of braking. A fast application and release of the brakes one, two or more times per second. This gives short intervals of maximum braking power by short intervals of effective steering while wheels are rolling.

Holiday Traffic Menace Will Be Increased by "Pep Pills"

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (UPI)—A hopped-up highway menace threatens to make this year's Christmas-New Year's traffic rush more dangerous than usual, because of a nationwide boom in the bootlegging of pep pills to drivers.

Officials of the U.S. road and drug administration say a growing blackmarket in these drugs has made it easier to buy. Thus, chances of colliding with doped-up drivers have become greater.

Doctors call the pills amphetamines. To the layman, they're usually known as "bennies," "goof balls" and "co-pilots." They're extremely valuable in the treatment of obesity and mental depression. They can be sold legally only by prescription.

Unscrupulous peddlers, however, are capitalizing on the drugs' stimulating powers by selling them to drivers who use them to stay awake. Their biggest customers are long-haul truck drivers.

What motorists don't realize, FDA experts say, is that the pills give them a false feeling of alertness. Staying awake when you're fatigued can cause poor judgment and loss of coordination.

The pills' biggest hazard is their power to trigger hallucinations. A driver under their influence may see a mirage of an oncoming vehicle and swerve off the road or into another car. The pills also may cause motorists to black-out.

FDA agents believe the upsurge in the pep pill blackmarket is due to their crack-down on illegal sales of barbiturates. These high-powered sleeping pills formerly were

You Soon May Be Questioned On How You Like Your Auto

DETROIT, Dec. 23 (UPI)—One day you may be asked a lot of searching questions about what you like and don't like about your car or the dealer and salesman from whom you bought it.

"Are you pleased that you got the make and model you did and got it equipped as you did?" "If you had the opportunity right now to buy a new car all over again, what would you change, if anything?" "Who do you think got the better of the deal, you or the dealer?"

These and thousands of other questions are put to car buyers and car shoppers by phone, mail and in person as part of the auto industry's market-research programs, pioneered by General Motors and championed now by Ford.

Robert J. Egbert, a tall, youthful appearing man with black, wavy hair barely decked with gray, has been manager of marketing research for Ford Motor company since 1957. Previously he headed a similar department for the Ford division.

In an interview Egbert described market research as "more like weather forecasting. In both our fields the forecasters are confronted by an almost infinite number of variables."

Egbert says that by "proper market research" it is now possible to get a very good idea of the breadth and depth of a potential

market, to learn where customers for a specific product are likely to be found, and to determine how they can best be sold about it.

The auto industry, because of the two to three years it takes to move a new model from the drawing boards to the public, often appears notoriously slow in reacting to public opinion.

"and time has to be a handicap," Egbert agrees. "Nevertheless, market research can be a valuable aid to management in making decisions. It won't substitute for judgment or experience, but it can supplement those factors."

U. S. "Nuts" General States Word Altered His Whole Life

BY HAL BOYLE
 NEW YORK, Dec. 23 (AP)—Fifteen years ago today a U. S. brigadier general became the first soldier in history to win military immortality with a four-letter word.

The word was "nuts" and the man was General George Patton. He later came to hate the word in a way that is still remembered today.



1944, with a bombardment by 1,900 German artillery pieces.

The Nazis, attacking with 250,000 troops and 1,000 tanks through the "rest camp" area in the Ardennes, achieved a complete tactical surprise.

The acting commander, Anthony (Old Crock) McAuliffe, and the 101st airborne division were rushed by truck to Bastogne. There, strongly supported by elements of the U. S. ninth and 10th armored divisions, McAuliffe held the vital Belgian road center against the German breakthrough efforts.

square-mile area they held that blocked the gigantic German advance.

By Dec. 21, McAuliffe and his 10,000 men were surrounded by seven Nazi divisions and outnumbered four to one.

Through the morning gloom four German soldiers carrying a white flag trudged up to an outpost three miles south of Bastogne.

They carried a message which said in part: "The fortune of war is changing. There is only one possibility to save the enclosed USA troops from total annihilation. That is the honorable surrender of the enclosed town."

"If this proposal should be rejected, one German artillery corps and six heavy battalions are ready to annihilate the USA troops in and near Bastogne."

The four Germans, blindfolded by their own truce flag, were handed

McAuliffe's quickly scribbled reply: "To the German command or nuts! The American command."

When one of the Germans who spoke English complained he didn't understand the message, he was told it meant "go to hell." He said he understood this, and the four were blindfolded again and led away.

The battle raged on for more than four days and four nights until an armored column from Gen. George Patton's Third Army broke through and lifted the siege.

"Old Crock," a square-jawed, five-foot-five-inch soldier who weighed only 135 pounds, performed heroically before and after the Bastogne siege. After the war he rose steadily in the service until he retired in 1956 as a full general commanding the U. S. army in Europe. He is now a vice president of the American Cyanamid company.

Although over the years he had to tell the Bastogne story so often he shuddered when anyone at a cocktail party passed the outie, he now is recopied to the word "nuts!"

A modest man, he feels it was his spur-of-the-moment choice of this odd one-word classic answer that helped send him later up the army ladder.

At the time of the Bastogne siege he wore a brigadier's star, but his permanent rank was that of colonel.

Although over the years he had to tell the Bastogne story so often he shuddered when anyone at a cocktail party passed the outie, he now is recopied to the word "nuts!"

Then, paying tribute to the troops under him who halted the baffled German tide in the snow at Bastogne 15 years ago, he said, "All you can do as a commander is to put the men out there and hope they'll do their stuff. They are the ones."

This bit of a story was delivered as a dinner reply to a German surrender in a next army.

Today it is still the best remembered symbol of the greatest engagement in World War II—the Battle of the Bulge in Belgium.

The battle personally lasted longer and ended in a just-ditch gambit, began at 5 a.m. Dec. 16.

Survey Finds Reductions in Milk Residues

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23, (UP)—The Food and Drug Administration today announced a survey showing a definite reduction in the amount of residues in milk.

A survey of antibiotic and pesticide residues in fluid milk by the FDA showed that 67 per cent of 1,000 samples tested contained no residues.

A total of 936 raw milk samples collected in 1958 showed 33 per cent antibiotic residues and 11 per cent pesticide residues. An estimated 0.1 part per million is classed by the public health service as a substantial amount.

There was no indication that the affected milk samples constituted any major health hazard. A representative of the food and drug administration said the amount of residues found in various samples was less than that legally permitted on some harvest crops.

The 1958 survey was based on a sampling of pasteurized milk collected at dairies in retail cartons or bottles. It was not possible through this method to relate the residue samples which bore pesticide residues with specific milk producers.

Results of the 1955 survey were made known to the milk industry and to the department of agriculture in an educational campaign was undertaken to promote the safe use of pesticides on dairy farms.

In subsequent 1956 survey was conducted from August through November. It included the collection of fluid milk samples from farm tank trucks; the collection of milk samples from individual producers from the pickup trucks found to contain "substantial" pesticide residues and a visit to the farm producer whose milk contained "substantial" residues. The samples obtained were analyzed for residues of DDT, Dieldrin, chlordane, methoxychlor, toxaphene and heptachlor. The Food and Drug Administration report said DDT was found to be the most "notorious offender," as in the previous survey.

Hoover Story Tells How Kind Act Can Spread Yule Spirit

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (UP)—Christmas stories traditionally include tinsel, trees, plum pudding, holly and mistletoe. This story has none of those things, but it does have giving and gratitude—and an ending that makes it, I think, most satisfying story of that wonderful season when every member of every family longs to be at home.

This story began about 10 days before Christmas eight years ago. At Chambersburg, Pa., an FBI agent, on leave from his New York office, was asked to provide transportation to the next large city on his route for a youth who had been ill and who was hopeful of securing a job on his arrival in a distant city.

The agent willingly agreed to take the boy as far as Winchester, Va. Noting that his passenger appeared to be extremely young to be seeking a full-time job, the agent, genuinely interested, began drawing him out. Bit by bit the story unfolded.

The youth had left his New Jersey home, but his reasons for leaving proved to be very different from those of the usual runaway. A junior in high school, this boy had just come out of the hospital where he had been confined for a three-week period with a glandular ailment.

His mother, a registered nurse by profession, was widowed, the father having died before the youth was born. The mother bore the burden of rearing the lad and his sister, and caring for her own aged mother as well.

The sister had completed high school and secured a job. The youth felt that he also should seek a job and thereby ease his mother's heavy burden. So he had left his home.

Once he had learned the boy's story, the special agent sought to convince the youth that his action would in no sense ease the mother's problems, but would add to them, and that it would be much better for all concerned if he were to return to his home. The agent, meanwhile, had learned the boy had only 20 cents, and that he had spent the previous night in a Salvation Army barracks.

Using all his powers of persuasion, the young special agent at last succeeded in convincing the youth he should go home. As soon as they arrived in Winchester, the agent purchased a bus ticket to the point nearest the boy's New Jersey home, gave the youngster \$5, wished him well and bade him good-by.

That is almost the end of the story. The FBI agent drove to his home. He sent the boy a Christmas card and wrote a note to the mother indicating he was happy to have been able to help her son. He stated that the boy's attitude appeared to be commendable, and he expressed his hope that the youth had arrived home safely.

On his return to New York, the agent received a Christmas card. In it, the youth who had run away expressed his appreciation for what had been done for him. He would, the boy wrote, never forget the agent's aid and ever regret returning home. The card was followed by a

letter for all concerned if he were to return to his home. The agent, meanwhile, had learned the boy had only 20 cents, and that he had spent the previous night in a Salvation Army barracks.

1960 May Be Tagged Year Of Big Switch

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (UPI)—This year 1960 should be known as the time of the big switch—when foreign affairs became a little more human and a little less snarled in what is called diplomacy.

Western leaders—brushing aside the ancient tradition of letting foreign ministers dicker and deal and diddle on details—have proposed not one but a series of summit conferences with the Soviet Union.

They'll Be Brief
Even if they don't accomplish much, or anything, at least they will be brief and direct and save the world from the long-drawn-out hair-splitting, minuté-dancing of the ministers.

Many forces—both men and events—have brought the West to this startling development in world affairs.

The wartime meetings of President Roosevelt and British Prime Minister Winston Churchill—occasionally with Joseph Stalin—broke for a while the old reliance on foreign ministers to find the answers.

World War Stops Change
The tradition took over again after 1945 when the cold war set in and the allies' interests in the West: Pressure on Greece and Turkey, Communist seizure of Czechoslovakia, the Berlin blockade, Korea.

The years between 1945 and Stalin's death on March 5, 1953, were hardly a time for talking peace. He seemed to want no peace. The foreign ministers never solved a major East-West problem.

Ministers began to seem out of place in a few hours and there was less and less reason for them to stay at home. It took them a long time to realize it.

Correspondence Unit Prospects Given Warning

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—The federal trade commission has offered a free lesson to students thinking of signing up in correspondence schools. FTU's lesson: First, ask a lot of questions.

Charles E. Moore, of the commission's legal staff, said, "Even some of the better correspondence schools have grossly misrepresented their courses."

Speaking at an FTC-sponsored conference on deceptive selling practices, Moore suggested, "Do not hesitate to press the salesman for all the facts, and if he is evasive, it is a good sign that a trick is involved."

Stanley Rittenberg, AFL-CIO director of research, said several unions in Alaska have reported instances of workers being allowed there by rosy descriptions of employment opportunities, only to be disillusioned by slim pay chances and inadequate facilities for extra population.

UAR Will Get Loan; Canal Job Planned

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (UPI)—The World Bank yesterday approved a \$65,500,000 loan to the United Arab Republic for improvements on the Suez canal.

The action was taken despite objections from 46 congressmen. They urged that the loan be held up until the UAR agreed to let Israel use the vital shipping link.

Nine private institutional investors joined the World Bank in putting up funds.

Under the program, scheduled to be completed in 1961, the canal will be widened and deepened to accommodate ships with a draft of 37 feet (about 46,000 deadweight tons), compared to the present maximum of 33 feet (about 33,000 tons).

Bank officials pointed out that the canal is one of the world's most important waterways. They said at least one-third of all the world's ocean-going vessels made one or more trips through it in 1959.

The need to improve the canal stems not only from growing traffic, but also to a large extent from the increase in the size of tankers seeking transit.

Farmers Plan to Reduce Hog Crop

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (UPI)—Farmers plan a sharp reduction of 11 per cent in the 1960 crop of pigs, influenced apparently by a big drop in prices this year.

The agriculture department reported today a survey shows that a crop of 55,000,000 head is in prospect compared with 59,697,000 projected last spring.

The reduction will be reflected in marketings for slaughter—and in prices—during the late summer, fall and early winter of 1960.

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Federal Office Blasts 'Secrecy'

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (UPI)—The general accounting office (GAO) complained to congress today the Pentagon and pulled up two secret reports which would help determine whether U.S. military aid to Europe is being managed efficiently.

The defense department contended that the GAO, which is the congressional watchdog over government spending, had no right to the information and, in fact, had a lot of nerve to ask for it.

With a bitter attack on the department, Comptroller General Joseph Campbell turned the issue over to congress in a report to Chairman William L. Dawson, D., Ill., of the house government operations committee.

Toy Sales up

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (UPI)—The commerce department has come up with some happy Christmas statistics for the nation's youngsters.

The department announced yesterday that the sale of toys and games this year is up at least eight per cent over 1959. Furthermore, the survey predicted "the sales prospects for 1960 appear excellent."

 If when passing out the plates for a third helping of candied sweet potatoes at Christmas dinner, the slip and one's lap is filled with turkey, dressing, gravy, creamed peas, cranberry sauce, boiled-onions and pickled peaches, what is one supposed to say and do?
 Mrs. Post doesn't have the answers, and neither does Miss Vanderbilt. In fact, neither of these authorities on etiquette has ever seen fit to include a chapter on the polite procedure for yuletide heat and mishaps. They tell you how to behave at



weddings, funerals, coming-out parties and birthday anniversary dinners, what gloves to wear when eating celery, the proper length skirt for tray-carrying and the proper way to sign an anonymous letter, but nothing about Christmas.
 I intend to fill that void. By the time next Christmas rolls around I will have completed my Christmas etiquette book, and if it isn't a best-seller, then my name isn't Frank L. Cutting. I have done half a dozen chapters already, and with your permission I'll print a few of the questions and answers just to help tide you over this season.
 Q. How do you thank a person for giving you a handkerchief with an initial that isn't your own?
 A. It depends on what the in-

correct initial is. If it is an "A" it is polite to say that you are indeed grateful for the gift, because from now on whenever you are asked to name the president of the United States, the handkerchief will help you remember Chester A. Arthur. If it is an "L," substitute Lincoln for Arthur, and so on.
 Q. Is there a correct way to tell a friend, who always knits you socks for Christmas, that your foot size is 10, not 23?
 A. No. People who knit socks for gifts never knit them within a mile of the right size. This is a weakness with sock knitters. Never, never, when you get an oversized pair, write and thank the sender for the tea caddy, or the handsome laundry box.
 Q. Is it ever proper to ask for fourth helping at Christmas dinner?
 A. Certainly. The gracious guest

will, as soon as she sits down at a few slices of bread, and a small "table" quite "estimate" the amount of food available and work out his share. If his figures show there is enough for five helpings, then he has a perfect right to ask for fifth.  A. Yes. Everybody deserves some cold turkey for a late bite on Christmas night. The gracious host will usually place a drumstick or



Religious Theme Said Making Comeback in Greeting Cards

Chances are that one out of every four cards you get this Christmas will have a religious theme. A dozen years ago the ratio would have been one in 20.

It's an indication that Christmas is the reason for it all; it's making a comeback in Christmas.

The drive to convert Christmas cards from secularism was begun in 1947 by the National Council of Churches.

The council suggested that card publishers help restore the religious significance of Christmas by putting out a greater variety of cards with religious themes.

If they would, the NCC promised it would urge the 28 million members of its member churches to send cards that "more fully express the holy spirit of Christmas."

The Greeting Card association estimates that more than two and a half billion Christmas cards will be put in the mail this year. Of that number, some 650 million will be religious in theme, ranging from traditional—the most popular symbol — to shepherds, wise men and cherubs.

The NCC is not the only organization hard at work trying to reduce the gaudy commercialism that has threatened to engulf what is a recently a religious holiday. A number of groups, mostly informal, are quietly plugging away at the theme.

A novel plan is being tried by the women of the Church of the Assumption Lutheran in Danville, Va.

They are seeking to replace the blazing Christmas tree ornaments with "Christians," or monograms of Christ.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (U)—Watch out for the salesman who asks you've won a contest or that your house has been selected for a demonstration, a federal trade commission official advises.

Watch out even for the encyclopedia salesman who flashes a letter from Johnny's teacher indicating his education would be advanced by the books.

"A little payola may be involved," said Daniel J. Murphy, assistant director of FTC's bureau of litigation.

He spoke at a meeting of 47 civic, consumer and welfare group representatives, opening a government drive against false advertising and fraudulent selling practices.

Murphy suggests some other alerting signs for the housewife who answers the telephone or doorbell.

The salesman who calls himself some fancy name, other than a salesman, and tells you that you have been selected to purchase new and revolutionary cooking utensils.

"The salesman with one foot in your door claiming to be a representative of the city government whose only desire is to make a fire prevention talk but whose real purpose is to sell fire alarm systems.

"Representatives of furnace manufacturers whose sales crews masquerade as inspectors and under the guise of a safety campaign deliberately sabotage a householder's furnace.

Soviets Slow On Releasing Lithuanians

MOSCOW, Dec. 23 (UP)—Mrs. Barbara Armonas is expected to join her daughter in Cleveland soon, but delays seem to be holding up other Lithuanians Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev said could go to the United States.

Doris Armonas asked the Soviet premier to permit her mother, Mrs. Armonas, to come to the United States. When he was in Pittsburgh on his U. S. visit Khrushchev promised this would be done.

Permits Processed

U. S. Consul Richard Snyder said travel permits for Thomas Leonas, 17, and Regina Leonas, 20, are being processed, but the embassy has heard nothing from Soviet officials about them for some time.

He said there is little chance they will make their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paulina Leonas, in Chicago, by New Year's day.

The department has been asked Khrushchev at his hotel in Des Moines for help in getting their children now in Lithuania, to the United States. The family was separated in World War II.

No Other Adults Taken

The embassy also has not received word about Mrs. Anna Prunkis, 41, mother of the Leonas, or Joseph Prunkis, Chicago, a Roman Catholic priest who fled Lithuania in 1940. He took Khrushchev and his wife in Washington to let his mother join him. At the time, he quoted Khrushchev as saying he would.

Meanwhile, Leo Harvey Swald, 21-year-old co-median of Fox Worth, Tex., who announced last October he came here to take Soviet citizenship, has turned his passport over to the embassy. It has been shipped to Washington. The embassy has received no word from him and does not know where he is doing or where he is.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (UP)—The commerce department issued a year-end report card for the economy today and gave it an "A" in nearly every subject.

The department said business continued strong in the late fall, with recovery from steel shortages, progressing rapidly. Both employment and production in steel-consuming industries bounced back after the steel strikers returned to the mills Nov. 7 under court order.

The department said brisk holiday buying meant 1959 retail sales to a new record. Except for a slight drop in real-estate construction, the tone in most business lines is "one of firmness or advance," it said.

The department gave this favorable assessment of recent developments in the current issue of its survey of current business.

South Utah Man Killed in Mishap

TOOLE, Utah, Dec. 23 (UP)—A southern Utah man was killed today when the car driven by his wife skidded and overturned on icy U. S. highway 40 east of here.

Toole county officers identified the victim as Blaine Robinson, Hinkley. His wife told investigators Deputy Jim Furks and Bill Pitt that she started to pass another car when her vehicle skidded.

Mrs. Robinson was not seriously injured.

The fatality raised Utah's 1959 traffic toll to 197, compared to 188 on this date last year and 193 for all of 1958.



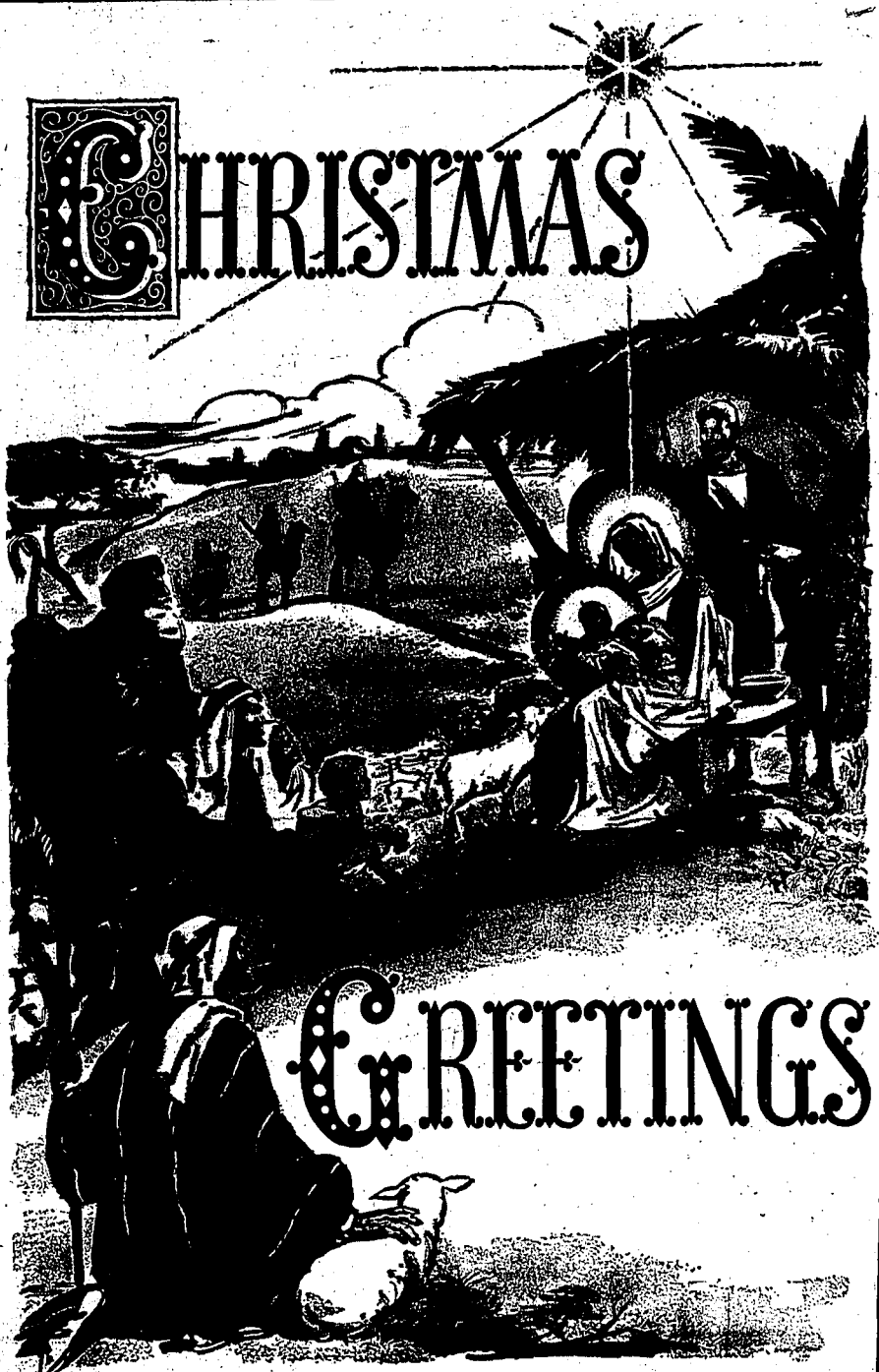

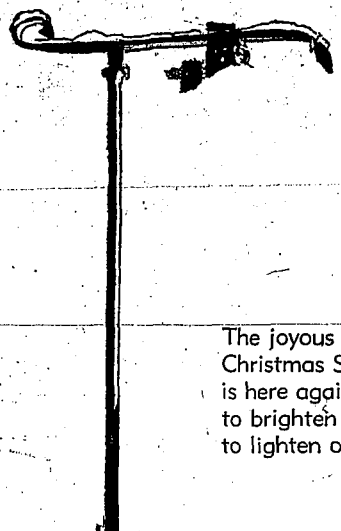
