Steel Union Is Asking Living Cost Pay Hike

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 24 (AP)—The United Steelworkers union went into court today with a claim its members in the basic steel industry are entitled to a four-cent hourly cost-of-living pay increase. Union attorneys filed a petition in U. S. district court asking the union pay increment become effective Jan. 1. At the same time they requested that benefits under any new contract finally negotiated be made retroactive to Nov. 7. That when 500,000 steelworkers ended a 116-day strike and returned to work.

White Blanket Covers Northern U.S., Foot of Snow Falls in Midwest

A blanket of white covered wide areas in the northern half of the country today in the wake of pre-Christmas snowstorms that hammered the East and Midwest. The heaviest snowfalls of the season hit the Midwest yesterday, dumping up to a foot and more of snow on the northern plains to the Great Lakes. The storm, of the same pattern that whipped the Northwest Monday and Tuesday, disrupted transportation, discouraged holiday motor travel and inconvenienced millions. The blowing, drifting snow added to the woes of last-minute Christmas shoppers. The storm took a heavy toll. Most of the 42 deaths reported were in traffic accidents on snow-covered highways or from heart attacks due to over-exposure while shoveling snow.

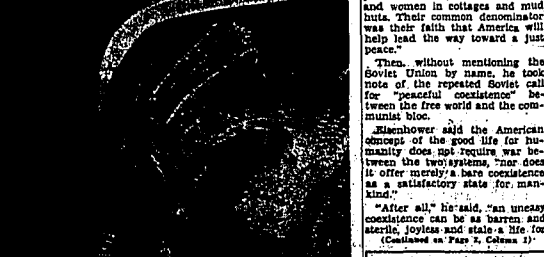

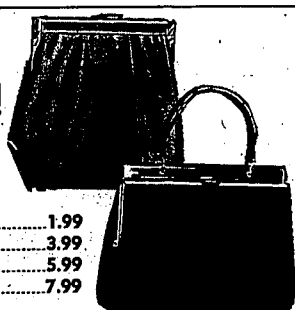

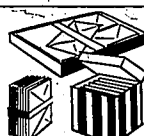

Furs Weren't Sent by Santa

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 24 (UPI)—Santa Claus flew over southern California yesterday and dumped \$14,000 worth of furs off his sleigh.

That's what delighted housewives wanted to believe Saturday when six sacks of large coat length pelts of Persian lamb, Russian sable, mink and dyed muskrat fell in suburban San Marino, San Gabriel and Alhambra.

But the federal aviation agency said "Santa" was a pilot by the name of Eduardo Jimenez and his "sleigh" was a converted World War II B-25.

Investigators said the furs—all of which were believed turned in by residents—apparently fell from the Douglas-bound plane as it took off from International airport. It was transporting a cargo of furs, cosmetics and perfume.

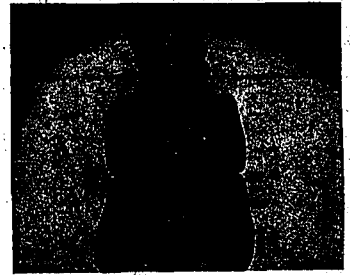

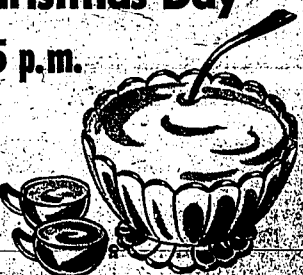

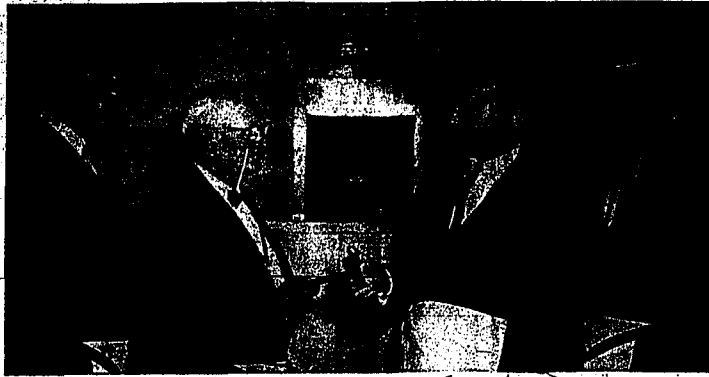

Gooding Sheepherder Set to Defend Weight Lifting Title

GOODING, Dec. 24—Jose Maruri, Basque sheepherder employed by Cusheo Astorquia here, has been practicing for the past 15 days to defend his title as champion weight lifter at the annual North American Basque weight lifting contest to be held at Boise Sunday.

Maruri spends about one-half hour daily lifting a 280 pound cement block to keep in shape for the contest. Just as other champions before entering competition he observes good health rules of no smoking, drinking, heavy eating or late hours in his preparation for the contest.

During his training sessions in the potato cellar on the Astorquia ranch he has recently hoisted the large block to shoulder level 20 times in five minutes.

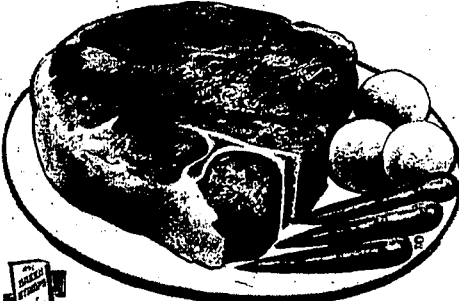

Pensions for U.S. Conflict Aren't Ended

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24 (UPI)—The Veterans Administration (VA) has passed another name off its Civil War pension rolls—but that bloody conflict still costs the government more than \$282,000 a month.

The death of Walter (Old Rebel) Williams, Houston, Tex., who outlived all his fellow veterans of the war between the states, meant closure of his Civil War pension.

Daughter Gets Pension
More than 4,000 dependents of Civil War veterans—one of them Williams' daughter—will continue to draw federal pensions for the rest of their lives.

The continuing cost of these pensions to the government was \$248,660,000 through the end of 1958. And the VA says its probably will be several years before the last dependent drops from the rolls.

Most of the money has gone to veterans of the Union army. Congress did not make Confederate survivors eligible until May, 1958. Less than a thousand widows and children of Confederate veterans are still alive.

Widows Get \$45
The usual pension for the widows is \$45 a month and the payment for children is \$145. VA till his death, Williams received the veterans' maximum of \$135.45 a month.

Until the two world wars came along, the Civil War was the most costly in history from the standpoint of federal payments to veterans. Payments to World War II veterans already have gone over the \$1 billion dollar mark, and the World War I outlay has been more than \$2 billion.
