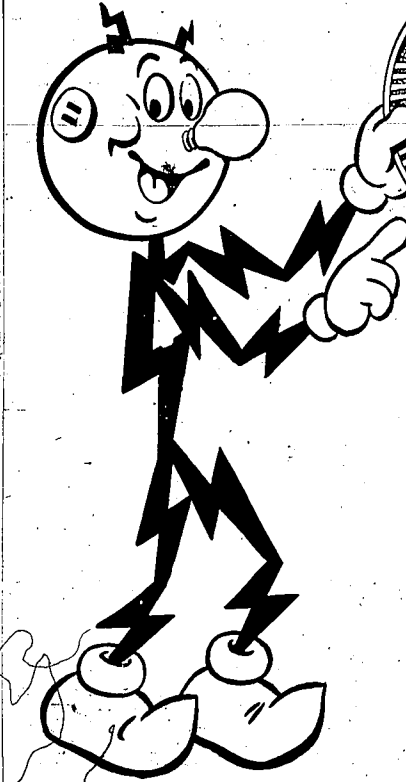

Man's Chance For Survival "Not Special"

CHICAGO, Dec. 30 (AP)—Man is not the "darling of the gods" in evolution and stands no better chance for future survival than his distant cousin, the tapeworm, an expert on fossils says.

George Gaylord Simpson, Harvard University, said the history of life, as recorded in fossiliferous strata, shows no clear overall progression toward a transcendently worthy goal.

He addressed the annual meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

"Organisms diversify into literally millions of species, then the vast majority of those species perish and other millions take their place for an eon until they, too, are replaced. If that is a foredoomed plan, it is an oddly ineffective one," he said.

Simpson, professor of vertebrate paleontology, criticized what he described as "too much pussy-footing" on Charles Darwin's theory that man's closest living relatives are the apes.

"Apologists emphasize that man cannot be a descendent of any living ape—a statement that is obvious to the verge of imbecility—and go on to state or imply that man is not really descended from the ape or monkey at all, but from an earlier common ancestor," he said.

"In fact, that common ancestor would certainly be called an ape or monkey in popular usage by anyone who saw it. Since the terms ape and monkey are defined by popular usage, man's ancestors were apes or monkeys or successively both. It is punilimonious if not dishonest for an informed investigator to say otherwise."

Simpson said man is in the fullest sense a part of nature and not apart from it.

Father Watches Big Wave Carry Son, 13, to Death

SEAL BEACH, Calif., Dec. 30 (AP)—A father who can't swim watched helplessly yesterday as his 13-year-old son was swept to his death by a big wave.

Thomas A. Jenkins, 61, plunged into the water, almost drowned, and then clambered back on the rocks. The tide carried the boy Jimmy, to sea.

"I tried to get a half mule to the nearest telephone and called for life guard boats, a rescue helicopter and six divers rushed to help.

All were too late. "They found no trace of the boy.

Jenkins had taken his son and two other boys fishing on the Seal Beach pier.

"Jimmy tried to get the bait box and our fish," said Jenkins.

"Then the second wave hit. I heard him scream for help as the wave hit him. Then he went into the water and the tide carried him away."

The service will be opened with remarks by C. J. DeLoach, who succeeded Porter as chief justice. Richard D. District Judge Hugh A. Baker, Twin Falls, will deliver the address in memorial of the deceased attorneys.

Naturally enough when an adult sees a child struggling to do something in imitation of what he does, he goes to help him. Before interfering, or offering help, it is best to learn if that is what the child wants or needs. 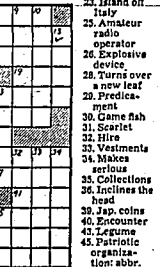

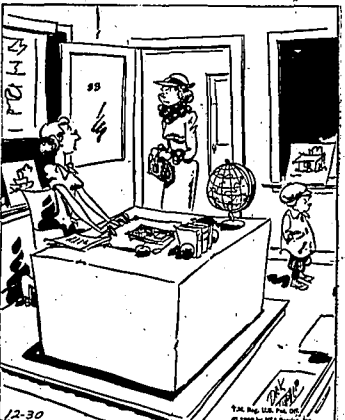

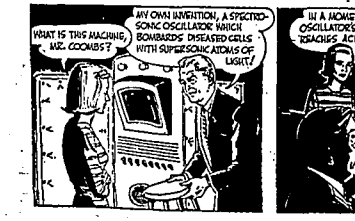

The four-cent Boy Scouts of America 50th anniversary commemorative stamp, designed by artist Norman Rockwell, will be sold in 5-cent postage stamps. The first day of issue will be at Washington, D.C., the birthday anniversary of the movement. The stamp will feature a head and shoulders view of a Boy Scout with his right hand raised in the three-finger Scout sign. An initial order for 100 million of the stamps, to be released in panes of 50, has been authorized.

The likeness of a Scout will be shown in graduations of khaki, blue and white. The Boy Scouts of America will be the focus of the "U.S. Postage" at the right, and the right of the lettering is blue.

The postoffice department said collectors desiring first-day cancellations should send in addressed envelopes, with remittance to cover cost of the stamps, to Postoffice, Washington 25, D.C. A close-fitting enclosure of postcard thickness should be placed in each envelope and sealed. Envelopes submitted should be of ordinary letter size and each must be properly addressed.

An envelope must not be sent if the return of first covers. The outside envelope to the postmaster at Washington, D.C., should be clearly endorsed "First Day Covers of the Boy Scouts of America." Orders for first-day covers must not include requests for uncancelled stamps.

Requests for first-day covers should be mailed in ample time to reach the postoffice in advance of Feb. 8 date of issue.

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A-Blasts and Quakes Can't Be Separated

PASADENA, Calif., Dec. 30 (UP)—Scientists say seismographs can't tell the difference between earthquake and underground nuclear bomb explosions but there is hope that they may be able to tell.

One possibility, they told the American Physical society yesterday, is to separate quakes and bomb shocks by analyzing the frequency of the waves they produce.

Another possibility is to determine the depth of quakes more accurately. Some quakes occur miles down but it would be possible to plant a man-made bomb deeper than a few thousand feet.

A real problem, the scientific group reported, is the recent disclosure that a bomb fire timed the size of the Hiroshima bomb could be muffled sufficiently to prevent detection by exploding it at the bottom of a big hole.

This turned out to be an obstacle at the recently discontinued nuclear conference at Geneva.

The American team presented data indicating a hole 3,000 feet deep and 100 feet in diameter could deflect the blast of a bomb equal to 100,000 tons of TNT. It would cost about 10 million dollars and a year's work, the scientists said.

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Weather Talk

CHICAGO, Dec. 30 (UPI)—Machines that converse about the weather and solve problems in logic were described yesterday by researchers attending the annual meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

MOSCOW, Dec. 30 (UPI)—The communist newspaper Pravda said today U. S. refusal to extend its moratorium on tests of nuclear weapons "can hardly be considered an indication of a love of peace."

An editorial signed by Vladimir Zolotarev also accused the United States of having violated the moratorium in effect for a year by carrying out underground tests.

West blamed "These tests can definitely be regarded as underground blasts" against the Geneva conference which has been bogged down for more than a year by faults of the western powers," Pravda said.

The communist organ criticized the West for ignoring the "total disarmament" proposals of Premier Nikita Khrushchev and recalled that, the supreme soviet (parliament) had appealed to the parliaments of the world to end the armaments race.

"The parliaments of the West continue to ignore this urgent problem," Pravda said.

Story of Talk Carried "The Soviet press today carried a brief story from New York commenting on President Eisenhower's moratorium statement yesterday in Augusta, Ga.

The dispatch in Pravda mentioned Eisenhower's charge that Soviet experts at Geneva had no desire to seek agreement, thus making worse the prospect of discontinuing nuclear tests in 1960. "It did not mention Eisenhower's declaration the United States would modify other powers before resuming nuclear tests."
