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### East Local of Teamsters Is Under Watch

BOISE, Dec. 31 — Shotguns, dynamite, rock throwing, firebombs and old-fashioned assault are the tactics of the Teamsters union strikers at the local terminal of Botoms-Flake Trucking company and at terminals in Charlotte and Boise, Va.

Nobody has been killed or critically injured but authorities are apprehensive. "We're watching and hoping we won't get out of this one," one officer said. "Because we just don't have enough manpower to handle anything big."

The state highway patrol and state bureau of investigation (SBI), along with city police and the Outback county sheriff's office, are making law enforcement agencies involved.

E. Congdon, president of the firm which hauls throughout the Carolinas and Virginia, says Botoms-Flake is operating normally. He said strikers have been replaced and because of a recent slump there would be no room for them to return even if they so wished, he said.

"We have been unable to get together with the union on wages," Congdon explained, "and no more (negotiation) meetings are planned as far as any of us know."

He said there has been one such meeting since the strike began Nov. 27, at a local office of the Teamsters union.

A majority of Botoms-Flake employees voted in the union last summer at an election conducted by the regional office of the national labor relations board, and some drivers and warehousemen walked out after four weeks of negotiations failed last month.

Neither side has given any indication they will press for an early settlement. About 200 in the midst of an internal upheaval and its officers have their work cut out under the local to cooperate with an agency to be selected by court-appointed monitors to supervise the elections.

### Temperature To Be Below Normal Here

WASHINGTON, Dec. 31 (AP) — Temperatures probably will be higher than usual in the East and below normal in most of the rest of the nation the next 30 days.

The weather bureau reported that the 30-day outlook for January "calls for temperatures to average below seasonal normals over the western two-thirds of the nation with greatest departures over the mountain states and Great Plains."

"Above normal temperatures are indicated from the Appalachians to the East coast, in unspecified areas near normal averages are predicted."

"Precipitation is expected to exceed normal over most of the country except for subnormal amounts over the Northwest and also the extreme Southeast."

"The anticipated temperature and precipitation patterns suggest a succession of vigorous winter storms attended by considerable rain, snow and sleet, especially over central and northern regions."

BOISE, Dec. 31 — A remote but historic Idaho gold mine which had produced 7 1/2 million dollars was auctioned off yesterday for \$250,000.

The gold Hill mine at Quicksilver, deep in the Boise national forest, north of here, went to W. S. Roodman, Jr., Boise.

At one time the gold in the quarter ran to \$20 or \$30 a ton, said the seller, A. H. Roodman, Jr., Boise, president of Talacite Mines, Inc.

He said he bought it in 1927. Two years later the price of gold was frozen at about \$25 an ounce, heralding the decline of Idaho gold mining.

The mining buildings and the town of Quicksilver burned down Aug. 20, 1931. The mine was rebuilt, but equipment later was dismantled and none was involved in the sale.

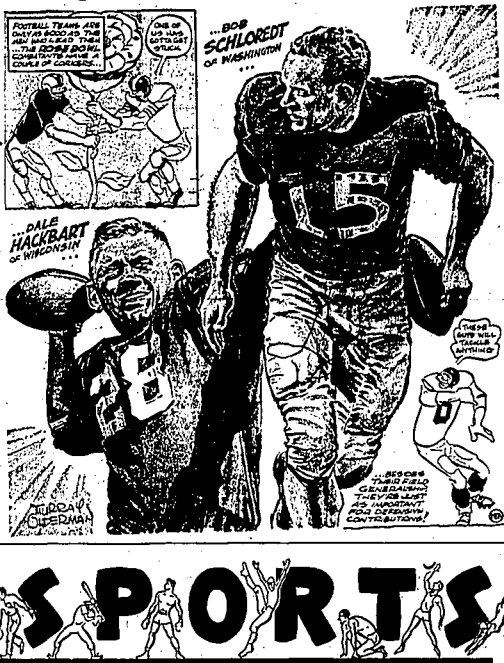

Pocatello—It is expected that the former naval ordnance plant will be put to industrial use in 1960. Phosphate industry in this corner of the state will expand.

Caldwell-Nampa, Weiser-Boise—Agricultural and industrial growth to advance jointly. Local groups active in bringing in suitable industries. Potatoes, onions and seed corn continue to play important roles.

Mountain Home — The federal government has earmarked 40 million dollars to spend on intercontinentally ballistic missile program. An irrigation project to reclaim additional land hoped for in next decade.

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### Humphrey Is Active; States He Is Liberal

Hubert Horatio Humphrey, who yesterday declared his candidacy for the 1960 Democratic presidential nomination, has described himself as "a walking, talking liberal" who can carry his party to victory.

His process for activity—physical and vocal—is conceded by friends and foe.

The bouncy, indefatigable, 45-year-old Minnesota senator acknowledges his propensity for talking on any number of subjects to anyone who will listen—and at any length. Last year, he spent eight hours talking with Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev at the Kremlin and admitted he probably had bustered a bit.

His Forceful Figure  
Humphrey, who once clerked at the soda fountain of his father's drug store in Huron, S. D., has been a forceful figure at every Democratic convention since 1948. That year, as a brash young mayor of Minneapolis, he was one of the "young Turks" who led a successful fight for a strong civil rights plank in the party platform.

The same year, he won election to the senate over Republican incumbent Joseph Ball.

Starts on Wrong Foot  
Humphrey promptly got off on the wrong senatorial foot by assailing the need for a small committee headed by Sen. Harry F. Byrd, the highly-respected Virginia Democrat. Humphrey, who is himself talking to an almost empty chamber before he was through.

Since that blunder, he has taken his tactics and won acceptance into the senate's inner circle.

Humphrey, a blunt-spoken critic of Eisenhower administration, has spoken up sharply on foreign policy, farm problems, defense and civil rights.

He won the accolade of Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt. The former first lady said she has within him "the mark of greatness" needed by an occupant of the White House.

His San Diego Talk  
Humphrey, who still is a registered pharmacist, is a six-footer who scales around 170 pounds. His habit is receding rapidly. He is recognized as one of the best debaters and conversationalists in Washington.

The Democratic hopeful is a lively campaigner who can mix a high-level approach with homespun touch. For example, the Minnesota couple strolling in Washington drove by Humphrey's home in Chery Chase, Md. The senator, wearing his lawn apron, the license plate, whistled them to a stop, introduced them to his wife and four children, and invited they stay for Sunday dinner.

The Pope's message also came the few days after a bitter debate in France regarding state aid to Catholic parochial schools.

Pope John said Pius XII's encyclical on Christian education "has had none of its truth."

"As yesterday, the church deeply affirms that its rights and those of the family in this field come before those of the state."

Today, as yesterday, it affirms its own right to have schools in which will be impressed upon the mind by teachers of firm convictions a Christian conception of life in which all the teaching is given in the light of the faith.
