New Commission Divides T.F. Government in Three Sections at First Meeting

The city commission Monday night approved, by not objecting, a proposal by Chairman Vernon Riddle, to divide the city government into three divisions—public works, administration and public safety—and provide that two commissioners and the chairman work in each section with department heads. Riddle said the matter was discussed at a Monday noon meeting between the commission and Joseph H. Lattin, city manager, and presented to the commission at Monday night's meeting. Riddle said in a prepared statement that in the past the city has been faced with a situation which necessitates that two commissioners be assigned to each section. "It is necessary to consider a long range planning program in the city," he said.

The departments included in public works are streets, water, sewer, sanitation, flood control and engineering. The commissioners are William Hoopes, Jr., and John J. Smith. Public safety includes the fire department, police department, inspection, airport and public health. Administration includes the city manager, James Norflett and Howard Reynolds, assigned.

The administrative committee would be concerned with the police judge, city attorney, clerk and treasurer's office and parks and recreation. Commissioners John Vold and George Bennett would work with these groups. Chairman would work with all three divisions.

The city responsibilities would be divided as a committee working with the city manager and heads of various departments would be of assistance to them and help planning both short and long range. There also are times, he said, when a discussion among the committees is required in order to secure information and figures which would be impossible to obtain by the public and press are present."

Castro Regime Rejects Protest Against Cuba's Seizing U.S. Property

HAVANA, Jan. 12 (AP)—The Castro regime has rejected a protest against its seizure of American property in Cuba and said it would stand by operations of its land reform program against both Cubans and foreigners. Property owners were told to take their complaints to the Cuban courts. U. S. Ambassador Phillip Bonsal delivered a state department note yesterday complaining that lands and buildings of U. S. citizens in Cuba had been seized without court orders and frequently without written authorization.

U.S. Will Not Protest Soviet Rocket Tests

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12 (AP)—The United States because of its missile and nuclear tests in the Atlantic and Pacific—has slight ground to protest Soviet plans to shoot test rockets into the Pacific, two key members of congress said yesterday. U. S. diplomatic officials indicated this government will not protest the Soviet test plan. Those officials, too, noted the United States is using the word "protest" in a scientific sense. "What's using for the goose is sufficient for the gander," said Chairman Overton Brooks, D-La., of the house space committee subcommittee. "If my understanding of the situation is correct, what the Russians propose to do is what we have done. In Francis Case, R. S. D. told the senate, Case is a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee. Brooks and Case spoke out amid new speculation over what may be behind the state's Soviet test plan. There were suggestions the forthcoming Soviet rocket tests in the Pacific may signal a new gambit in the missile competition the Soviet Union has used before.

Acting Foreign Minister Marcelo Ferrer last night said the state department "does not take into consideration the situation here, and it relates a number of supposed deeds which are qualified as 'violations' of the agrarian reform law." BOISE, Jan. 12 (UPI)—The state board of land reclamation today approved a plan to sell 100,000 acres of timber land in Idaho's west. St. Joe district in Idaho's west.

Humphrey Is For Supports And Controls

LOGAN, Utah, Jan. 12 (UP)—Sen. Humphrey said last night that support and production controls are necessary for farm prosperity.

He said Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson cannot be blamed for his policies because Benson is simply setting under orders of the administration.

"Policies Not Changed" "You don't change the policies by changing the hired man," he told about 400 persons at the annual meeting of the surrounding Cache valley of northern Utah and southern Idaho.

Benson was raised on a farm on the Idaho side of Cache valley. The agriculture secretary has said the nation's farmers would fare better under free economic competition rather than government control and subsidies.

Humphrey, a Democrat, presidential candidate, said nowhere in U. S. farm history have we had farm prosperity without price support and production control.

"Cooperative Hired" "One of the best things we could do," he said, "is establish a cooperative farm credit system."

The Minnesota senator who wound up a two-day campaign in Utah, called upon America to launch a mighty crusade to feed the hungry.

"We ought to take it to God-given abundance and put it to work. It is wicked to speak of surplus in a world where millions are starving."

Food Guarantee Asked "We can guarantee 44 million military protection for 40 years," Humphrey said, "we can guarantee them food so they don't starve to death."

The candidate was introduced at the nearby Smithfield Junior high school by Dr. Wendell Anderson, professor of political science at Utah State university, Logan, as a "man to match our mountains," the auditorium was slightly more than half full.

Humphrey said the U. S. has identified itself with things rather than people in the eyes of the world.

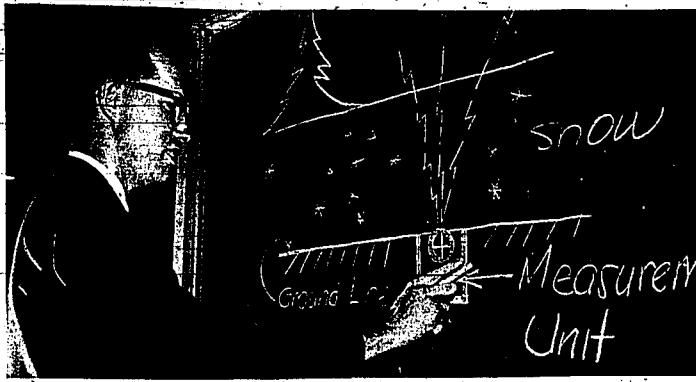
"Only-Be-The-Charged" "For example, he said, "in the middle East we've identified ourselves with kings and oil instead of people and water."

\$28,803 Grant Given Idaho for Study Of Automatic Measurements of Snow

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Jan. 12 (UP)—A \$28,803 grant to study methods for automatic measurement of snow water content has been awarded to the University of Idaho engineering experiment station, it was announced today.

Funds for the three-year study were provided by the U. S. department of agriculture, through their watershed runoff investigations section of the soil and water conservation research division, Beltsville, Md.

The purpose of the study is to investigate possibilities of finding techniques in which snow-water content can be measured at remote mountain locations automatically without humans doing it. Most snow surveys are now made by men on skis and snowshoes trekking into mountain areas for data.

The work will be under the supervision of Professor C. C. Warnick, associate director of the engineering experiment station, and will be carried out at special test sites on nearby Moscow mountains.

The aim for the study assumes measurements must be suitable for transmission by radio signals. Such information is needed to provide a more economical and less hazardous method of making snow surveys for the extensive system of "water supply" forecasts now made for agricultural water needs by the soil conservation service, said Warnick.

The grant has come about as a result of the department of agriculture's interest in projects that have been and are presently being carried out by the University of Idaho in the field of snow science and hydrology.

First phase of the work will be a thorough study of techniques and ideas that might be used and a study of attempts that have been previously made, Warnick said. Later, prototype units of possible measuring devices will be tried in the laboratory and also in the field.

Storing of Feed Grains Hits Peak

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12 (UPI)—A record volume of feed grains—corn, oats, sorghum, grain, and barley—was stored on farms on Jan. 1, the agriculture department said yesterday in its first crop summary of the year.

The feed grain stocks were six per cent above the previous record 8-year-ago and about one-third above average.

Stocks of corn, the heavyweight of the feed grains, totaled almost 3,100,000,000 bushels, 15 per cent more than the previous high, and 39 per cent above average.

Sorghum grain stocks were a little above Jan. 1, a year ago, in spite of the slightly smaller harvest last fall. Oat stocks were about 25 per cent less than a year earlier, and the smallest since 1949. Farm-stored barley was well below a year earlier, but more than a third above the 10-year average.

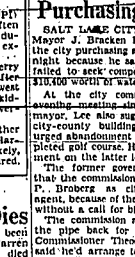
