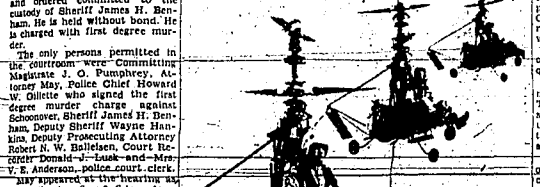

May we suggest before you take a chance with your money... or your health, you get the answers to these questions: What do you know about the reliability of the manufacturer? Does the formula have enough of the essential and more expensive vitamins, or is it loaded with cheap nonessential ingredients? Would your doctor prescribe it?

### Chairman for ASC Outlines Reserve Plan

Carl Boyd, chairman of the Twin Falls county agricultural, stabilization, and conservation committee, answers questions commonly asked by farm and town people about the conservation reserve.

The purpose of the soil conservation reserve is to withdraw cropland from production for the present to help check surpluses that hurt farm prices and income, through contracts voluntarily entered between farmers and the U. S. government, according to Boyd.

The program assures that the farmer takes out the water and soil bank program, as it is sometimes called, originally had two parts, acreage reserve which applied to a few main crops and the conservation reserve which applied to total cropland. The acreage reserve was discontinued and the conservation reserve is now the entire soil bank program.

In this voluntary contract, the farmer agrees to hold specific land out of production and devote it to conservation uses. The government makes an annual per acre payment to the farmer for life of the contract, and pays part of the cost of certain reclamation, fish and game department and other group.
