Ike's Soviet Union Trip to Start June 10

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—President Dwight D. Eisenhower will travel to Moscow to promote peace and freedom will take him behind the Iron Curtain into the Soviet Union for 10 days starting June 10.

Dates for the President's trip, planned and announced yesterday by the White House and the Soviet government, will be: U. S. anniversary of the Russian Revolution, Oct. 30, shortly before Eisenhower flies back to Washington after a week-end of quiet hunting.

Will Be Return Visit

The President will be returning to the Soviet Union to return the visit which Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev made to the United States last September.

The President will go first to Moscow. He also will visit Leningrad and other cities in the Soviet Union but there has been no final decision as to which ones.

Guests to Be Used

There are no immediate announcements as to whether the President will be accompanied by Mrs. Eisenhower and their four grandchildren. Khrushchev invited the youngsters when he met them at the President's Georgetown, Pa., farm.

Diplomatic Sources

Eisenhower will stay in a guest house in the Kremlin rather than in the Kremlin palace.

Eisenhower's trip will be part of his campaign of worldwide travel in behalf of what he terms "peace and friendship-in freedom."

Budge Asks for "Substantial" Tariff on Foreign Lead, Zinc

WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 15 (AP)—The only way to eliminate this problem.

Wives of the estimated 6,500 men held by Utah's copper strike threw in the towel yesterday, saying they'd hold no more mass meetings to get their breadwinners back on the job.

Strike Protested

The women—some of them held—met in a meeting Friday night to protest the fact that a minority of the workers, still on strike, was preventing the rest from returning to their jobs at Kennecott Copper Corporation, Utah mine and smelter—refinery—complex.

They met with Kennecott officials.

The wives' chairman, Mrs. Kenneth Hardman, said last night the women leaders have had a change of heart—now making a closer look at the situation.

They're Enlightened

"We have been enlightened on the subject," she said, "and I honestly believe that we as housewives should be our men setting this strike over the bargaining table.

"There will be no more meetings of the wives."

The Kennecott strike began Aug. 10 and all but three small union locals—representing some 850 of the firm's Utah force—have settled with the copper giant. Those who have settled have continued to honor these unions' picket lines.

Wisdom Behind Ike's Budgets Can't Be Decided Until Later

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—It's a question that will be decided in many months in preparation for the budget. It was in the army all his life and may have had an oversimplified idea of government costs.

There was a drop in spending after the Korean war, briefly. Still, in the past five years the budget he offered congress has been going up, although accompanied by a warning from him to keep spending down.

In other words, his budgets may have been acting practice records but each time he considered his figures a minimum necessity.

There are a couple of reasons:

1. More than a week ago he revealed the spending budget—his estimate of the cost of running the government another year—was \$70,000,000,000. It was a record for peacetime. But it was far less than some of his critics think necessary.

Frankly, his estimate and their complaint are both matters of opinion. It will be years before his ideas on spending can be proved right or wrong—and then only by the results they show up.

Eisenhower took over the presidency as a new age was dawning—an age of missiles, space travel, competition with a rising Soviet economy, and a military competition with rockets untraced of a few years ago.

It's because we are all in the infant years of this new age that no one can say for sure either that Eisenhower kept his balance or that he underestimated the national problem and the American needs in terms of spending.

In his 1952 presidential campaign Eisenhower criticized his Democrats for spending too much. He promised to "cut the fat out of

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Personal and political fruds have broken among the Democrats in several states which have more than 200 delegates at the 761 necessary to nominate a presidential candidate in the all-important electoral college.

They are squaring these threatening intra-party divisions over control such routes. Influential and powerful Democratic leaders are Ben. John F. Kennedy, Eleanor Roosevelt, Harry E. Truman and Adlai E. Stevenson. How the Democrats resolve these differences, if possible, may determine whether they have a realistic chance of electing President Nixon.

In contrast to the lack of power politicians, Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's early withdrawal has given the GOP a convention unity which has not enjoyed since Herbert Hoover was renominated automatically in 1927.

DEBATE TARGET OF NEW DEALERS—The banner political state, New York, has become a battleground for the GOP's convention unity. The state's delegates determined effort to dislodge Carmine G. De Sapio as boss of Tammany hall.

Heads by Hugh Roosevelt, former Governor Herbert H. Lehman's son, and a group of would-be-gain-control of the state have an all-out convention campaign. They already have won a majority of the state's delegates.

Mrs. Roosevelt opposes Senator Kennedy because she feels that he did not condemn McCarthyism, and she is a family man "spending oceans of money" to obtain the nomination. Although she has praised Eisenhower, she is believed to be Stevenson, as he is of the eastern "regional" crowd.

N. Y. CITY ADMINISTRATION PLAGUED WITH SCANDALS—Chief troublemaker, New York City Mayor John Lindsay, is being attacked by a group of 45 electoral ballots. The Wagner New York City Council, slum clearance and school scandals, G. Powell threatens to lead 30,000 Negro and Puerto Rican voters to the polls.

Should he decide to back the governor pro-Kennedy strategy, he might leave a Republican victory in this crucial state next fall.
