Symington Is Mentioned as 'Compromise'

 WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 (UPI)—Sen. Stuart Symington, Missouri, is mentioned as one possible compromise candidate in most congressional Democratic national convention polls on an early ballot in the presidential candidate nomination process.

Sen. Symington is another who figures in compromise speculation. That is to say, if the contest is close, Hubert H. Humphrey or Sen. John F. Kennedy is able to win very quickly, the convention is likely to turn to Symington or to Stevenson.

Johnson Not Talked
 Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, Texas, was not much figure in talk of a compromise nomination. This is because, because of them all, Johnson's record seems most nearly to fit the pattern of compromise—a simple definition of compromise is "a settlement reached by mutual concessions."

As illuminated by that definition, neither Stevenson nor Symington seems to fit. Kennedy and Humphrey are properly compromise choices if both Humphrey and Kennedy are able to win. But neither Stevenson and Symington would appear to be alternate choices.

Others they surely would appear to be on the basis of Symington's recent voting record and Stevenson's nomination. This is so far as the left wing of the Democratic party is concerned.

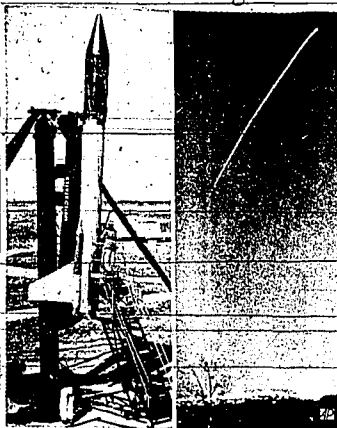
ADA Officials Named
 Americans for Democratic Action (ADA) speaks of making an effective element of the Democratic left wing. Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt is the national chairman. National chairman is Robert Nathan, one-time CIA director. Humphrey is executive chairman. Executive committee members include Leon H. Keyserling, chief economist of the national administration; former Sen. Herbert H. Lehman, New York; and Walter P. Reuther, No. 1 man in the AFL-CIO.

ADA annually rates members of congress on their voting records. It selects key issues which ADA feels clearly made an issue between liberal and conservative viewpoints. The most recently rated were voting records in the first session of the 86th congress which met in 1959.

3 Men 'Perfect'
 On its such liberal-conservative senate showings last year, Humphrey and Symington were tied, each with a perfect score of seven, having once failed to support the ADA point of view. Kennedy voted the ADA way on 12 issues, but was absent on one occasion. ADA rated Johnson with seven ADA and five against.

On the record, so far as ADA is concerned with senate votes, all three would seem to be nearly equally as eligible for the Democratic presidential nomination. There would be little need or room for mutual concessions. To nominate Johnson, all concerned would have to concede.

Demo Group Asks U.S. Aid For Schools

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 (UPI)—The Democratic advisory council has called for a federal aid to education program that would cost one billion dollars a year at the start and grow to three or four billion annually.

The council said many states and communities have expanded and improved schools in the past 10 years but more classrooms are needed and the federal government should help.

The multi-billion-dollar outlay, it said, would be small compared with federal spending for defense, highways and many other purposes.

The group, composed of former President Harry S. Truman, Adlai E. Stevenson and other party leaders, most of them from outside congress, is an arm of the Democratic national committee.

The recommended program on "education and freedom's future" was contained in a report, one of a series of pamphlets the council is publishing on foreign and domestic programs.

Rural Living Non-Smokers Avoid Cancer

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 19 (UPI)—Non-smokers who live in the country have the best chance of avoiding dying of lung cancer, according to Dr. Richard A. Prindle, chief of the air pollution medical program for the U.S. public health service.

Dr. Prindle told the University of California conference on "the air we breathe" that among urban smokers the lung cancer death rate is 70 per 100,000 people, compared with a rate of one per 100,000 people for rural non-smokers.

Study Results Reported
 The doctor said he took all white males 50 to 69 years of age from the 1950 census and grouped them into four categories: urban smokers, urban non-smokers, rural smokers and rural non-smokers.

The results:
 —Among 5,170,000 urban smokers, 4,400 died from lung cancer, a rate of 70 per 100,000.
 —Among 2,150,000 urban non-smokers, 308 deaths, a rate of 11.2 per 100,000.
 —Among the 5,370,000 rural smokers, 1,077 deaths, a rate of 6.2 per 100,000.
 —Among the 1,645,000 rural non-smokers, 10 deaths, a rate of one per 100,000.

"Smog" Defined
 Another air pollution expert, Dr. Patrick J. Lawther, London, said the word "smog" was invented in London years ago and had been misused in the United States.

He said neither fog nor smoke is the primary cause of California smog. Lawther blamed automobile exhaust fumes as the major cause.

Submerged Isle Found by Unit

NEW YORK, Jan. 19 (UPI)—A submerged island, 35 miles across and the base and five miles at the top, has been discovered by a team of Columbia university geologists, Columbia.

The geologists theorize it was once a real island. Now it is located 210 feet beneath the surface of the south Atlantic, about 150 miles west of the Cape of Good Hope.

Robert D. Gerard, representing Columbia's Lamont geological observatory, was chief scientist aboard the university's research ship Venus when the island was found.

He said it was apparently an extinct volcano, submerged when the surface of the Atlantic rose at the end of the last ice age—8,000 to 10,000 years ago.

Group Wary About Russia Ending MVD

By J. M. ROBERTS

Announcement of the abolition of the MVD, a group of Harvard foreign relations commentators, said today that it is a sign of the hope that improved standards of living tend to erode Soviet totalitarianism.

The MVD or ministry of interior controlled the secret police. It has gradually been dismantled by Soviet Premier Khrushchev. Its abolition tends to encourage trust among the Soviet people and so perhaps may actually strengthen the hands of the totalitarians.

Earlier news of the MVD's abolition was a gesture toward western opinion similar to the one made when Khrushchev abolished the old commissars during World War II. That gesture meant only a temporary end to the subordinate activities of international communism.

The Harvard center for international affairs in a report to the committee warned against basing American policy on such outward developments and suggests it should pay more attention, instead to political positions not based on reaction to the conflict with the Soviet Union.

Aid Death Wits

A part of the report deals with the newly-investigated allied effort to aid underdeveloped countries and raises an old question with regard to the American attitude toward neutrals. It suggests that instead of trying to win these countries over to active cooperation with the West, the assistance of their independence should be the chief objective.

While the United States encourages a new cooperative aid program by the western powers, it is also contributing to a stepped-up United Nations program.

One Program Keyed

The question being asked, by some students is whether the western powers might make greater progress by concentrating their efforts in one program, through the U. N. It is argued that this would eliminate African-Asian fears of selfish intent and represent real concentration on their independence rather than their political allegiance.

Thus, they argue, the lines might be more clearly drawn between the western economic program and the Soviet program which the West advocates to be designed to subvert allied countries.

New Budget Asks 5 1/2 Billion For Agriculture Department

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 (UPI)—President Eisenhower's new budget asks \$5,500,000,000 for the agriculture department in fiscal 1961 and "urgently needed" legislation on farm price support.

The proposed budget compares with \$5,118,000,000 spent by the department in fiscal 1960 and \$5,250,000,000 in fiscal 1959.

"Particularly urgent now is legislation to place wheat price supports on a more realistic basis," Eisenhower says. "The longer unrealistic price supports are maintained, the more difficult it will be to make the adjustments in production needed to permit relaxation of government controls over farm operations."

The big item in the proposed budget was \$2,600,000,000 for stabilization of farm prices and farm income. The department spent \$2,492,000,000 for the same purpose in 1959 and \$2,275,000,000 for the commodity credit corporation to farm price support. This was up from the \$1,923,000,000 from 1958.

Eisenhower says that the budget estimate for 1961 reflects the results of the effort of the recent harvest and 1959 crop and "assumes that yields on price-supported crops for the 1960 crop year will be in line with recent averages." He adds that exports of farm commodities in 1960 sum up to about \$1.6 billion less than the "high level" expected in 1960.

The President has outlined a six-point legislative program for agriculture. It was, virtually the same program he proposed last year in a special message. He recalls that "very little of this program" was enacted and recommended that congress "give this important matter early consideration."

The proposal included:

- Further revise agricultural price support programs and "revise with revisions the conservation reserve program.
- Strengthen the "food for peace" program.
- Revise interest rates for rural electric and telephone loans.
- Simplify and consolidate loan

Military Trial Is Ruled Out For Civilians

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 (AP)—The supreme court yesterday ruled out military trials during peacetime for civilians who accompany the armed forces overseas.

Divided rulings in four separate cases applied to civilian dependents and civilian employees of the armed forces.

In 1957, the court held that civilian dependents could not be court-martialed for capital crimes, such as murder.

Yesterday's decision extended that principle to lesser offenses and regardless of whether the accused are dependents of military personnel or civilian employees.

One result of the rulings could be that more civilians will be tried in the courts of the countries in which the United States has military forces.

The justice and defense departments declined to discuss the situation.

Military authorities have sought jurisdiction for courts-martial wherever possible instead of sending civilians over to foreign courts.

Justice Tom C. Clark, who wrote the majority decision, spoke of the possibility of new legislation under which U. S. civilians could be brought home and tried in civil courts.

'59 Personal Income Jumps For Idahoans

BOISE, Jan. 19 (AP)—Personal income in Idaho for 1958 is estimated at \$1,800,000,000, an increase of 4.1 per cent over the total in 1957.

The First Security Bank's newsletter, listing the figures, estimated total personal income—the year would reach \$1,240,000,000.

"Increases are expected in employment and most economic segments along with increased wages and retail sales," said the newsletter, released here by Ralph J. Comstock, Boise, president of the First Security Bank of Idaho.

Farm income in Idaho in 1959 was put at slightly less than 400 million dollars, down a bit from 1958.

"Cash farm income in the state," the newsletter said "decreased less than nationally because of the difference in agriculture patterns."

"The higher prices received for potatoes, the larger marketings of livestock and fairly stable grain prices offset decreases in income from other agricultural segments."

The publication said lumber production set a new record of 610,000,000 board feet, 18 per cent more than in 1958. But because of an anticipated decline in housing construction the newsletter said 1959 lumber production probably will be down.

Mineral production was reported as 67 million dollars, up 10 per cent from the 1958 total.

Blaze Levels Big Building In Pendleton

PENDLETON, Ore., Jan. 18 (UPI)—Fire ripped through a three-story corner business building here early today causing more than \$70,000 worth of damage.

The blaze which broke out a few minutes before midnight raced through an insurance firm, a real estate office, a large music store, an accountant's office, an oil and fuel dealership, a real estate office and an empty store on the second floor of the building. A construction firm office, a doctor's office, a credit bureau reporting office and some law offices were destroyed on the second floor.

Thirteen persons who lived in apartments on the third floor of the building fled in their night clothes. There were no injuries.

The building, which extends about a block on each of the two streets it faces, was completely gutted by the fire and only the shell was standing when firemen brought the blaze under control at about 11 a.m. (PT).

Hundreds of persons braved the degree weather to watch fighting battle the blaze which sent flames and sparks high into the air. The fire was visible for miles around the eastern Oregon town.

One of the streets faced by the building was highway 30, a main arterial, and traffic had to be rerouted during the blaze.
