President Asks Rally Against U. S. Inflation

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (UPI)—President Eisenhower, rallying the nation to a new battle against inflation, today urged a national rally and labor to keep wages in line. The President did not specify what industry, but a White House source said he had steel and automobiles.

In a message to Congress, Eisenhower announced the anti-inflation battle cry in a generally optimistic and realistic economic report to Congress.

Eisenhower forecast a decade of unprecedented prosperity. But he cautioned that it could be achieved only through the combined efforts of businessmen, labor, consumers and government.

In a direct appeal for some price cuts, he told industry that price reductions would be especially rapid productivity gains, but a normal and frequent feature of our economy.

And he told labor that wage increases should remain within the limits of increased productivity.

A White House source, discussing the President's message, said Eisenhower specifically had urged businessmen to take the lead in price-cutting.

The source said the administration believes there is a good chance for all-around prosperity in coming months to offset the extra cost of the new inflation. He said that the Steelworkers' union, "This in the administration view, would make a serious contribution to the fight against inflation."

He said the steel cost price rise administration does not expect to be a major factor in causing inflation.

Definition of Issues Proposed Sawtooth Park Urged by Forest Official

Issues involved in turning a segment of Sawtooth national forest into a national park will be clearly defined for the public to avoid any "misrepresentation" of facts, J. L. Sevy, supervisor of the forest, said Wednesday in a hearing on the proposed national park north of Galena, Idaho. Sevy, Church, are not clearly outlined at present and the hearings to be held should be used by the public to become completely informed. Sevy's remarks came after mining interests in the Sawtooth forest area publicly voiced opposition to the Church plan as detrimental to the economy of state and the mineral resources of the area.

Sevy stated one of the primary questions of turning the area into a national park is whether or not the area should be used for multiple development and use of a single use—recreation.

He said Wednesday that additional opposition to the proposal can be expected from lumber, coal, and other interests who would want to use the area for their own purposes. He said that the land which is being considered for the park is owned by the Sawtooth National Forest and the mining interests who would want to use the area for their own purposes.

Inflation, Speculation Main Threat to U. S. Good Times

By SAM BAWSON
NEW YORK, Jan. 20—Inflation and speculation are the chief threats to today's good times. If they are lifted or held to a minimum, prosperity could go on for many months to come.

In his annual message to congress, President Eisenhower has devoted six-fourths of these two points.

"He urges congress to do its part by taking measures to control inflation by use monetary measures and abstain from spending spree that could encourage both inflation and speculation."

In his recent news conference he again urged the public—especially business management and labor—to do its part by avoiding the twin threats and recognizing price rises don't wage increases.

That starts the inflationary spiral whirling again.

He stresses that this must be done by an informed public itself and not by any congressional attempt to control prices and wages.

That has been the aim of the department of commerce report that personal income in 1959 rose by 21 billion dollars over the previous year to a record \$30 billion dollars, despite the 11-day steel strike.

And President Eisenhower's proposed fiscal budget assumes a similar rise this year.

But inflation by raising prices could make this new record income by no more goods and services than last year, leaving the public on the old treadmill while trying to make ends meet.

Speculation, by getting out ahead, could hasten another recession. And knock holes in total personal income and in the very economic growth which President Eisenhower envisaged in his congressional messages.

"Whether either congress or the public will heed his advice remains to be seen."

Many in congress seem to be little harm in inflation if it only creeps in in recent years and to regard it as a usual price to pay for increased economic growth.

Many Americans share this view, concentrating on the "gain" in their incomes—if they were that lucky—even while gambling about the rising cost of living.

Inflation is a naughty word. But unless it gallops, few seem to pay much heed to what causes it—unsound government fiscal policies and the wage-price spiral with its self-generating power.

Speculation also is a naughty word. But it usually is applied to the other fellow.

That is the way Eisenhower's aides sum up his outlook on this new anniversary of his taking over as president.

Eisenhower planned no formal observance of his inauguration anniversary.

It has been apparent for some time that Eisenhower is tucking off the days until his second term ends. He has been contented and on other occasions he has remarked that he has "only six more months to go."

Despite all that, close friends of Eisenhower say he has enjoyed his second term more than the first. Much of the first year was marked by frustrations of various kinds—international, domestic, and personal.

Against bidding for another four years in the White House.

At the start of this term, friends report, Eisenhower made up his mind to two things:

1. He would not be labeled as a "lame duck" president at the start of playing a passive role and dedicating to the Democratic-controlled congress.

2. He concluded the fact he could not run again could work to his advantage rather than otherwise.

And popular polls report the President is riding high these days—much higher than at some other points in his seven years.

Quite likely nothing has done more to boost his popularity than his recent world traveling in behalf of peace and friendship.
