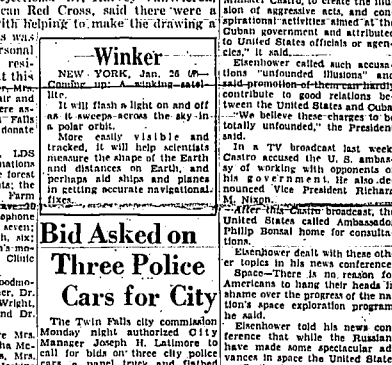

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Writer Tells Reasons for Missile Feud

 WASHINGTON, Jan. 26 (UPI)—The year 1960 started off with a grand gala on how this country competes militarily with the Soviet Union. It probably is the result of a not-so-clear explanation by Thomas S. Gates, Jr., secretary of defense.

Gates and the Eisenhower administration after his testimony before several congressional committees, were accused by critics of trying to paint a too-rosy picture of American defenses in this election year.

Gates' meaning told to all seems to come in the form of a book, "The Soviet Union is working hard on intercontinental ballistic missiles, the administration doubts the USSR would start a war because this country's own defenses are strong enough to discourage an attack."

Sen. Richard B. Russell, D. Ga., chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, after listening to Gates and Gen. Nathan F. Twining, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said last week, "At present I think we are strong enough to prevent any attack, except by a madman."

Space Missiles Separate
 A Soviet defense minister, in order to understand what the present has to be, must keep a close watch on the missile. The difference between space development and military missile development are strong enough to discourage an attack.

Man's Mind Nets Trouble For Library

 NEW YORK, Jan. 26 (UPI)—The remarkable mind of Peter Kavannah has the New York Public Library in a tizzy.

When the library accepted the unpublished letters of John Quinn, an attorney who died in 1924, it agreed that copies would be published until 1988. The letters include correspondence with American writers.

But Kavannah, 42, a lawyer described by friends as a man of robust convictions, felt the papers deserved wider circulation. He spent weeks in the library painstakingly rewording them. Then he wrote it all down outside the library.

On a luminous press in his east side apartment room, Kavannah printed 120 copies. He sent one copy to the British Museum, London, gave nine copies to a man named Patric Forrester, and planned to sell the others at \$35 each.

When the library heard how Kavannah was, it sued to stop him.

In state supreme court yesterday, the learned chief Justice, Justice Aaron Steiner, "I wish to enter a plea of non contumacia to the court."

119 Copies Bought
 Kavannah lifted a bulging briefcase and dumped out 119 hard copies of the Quinn papers. He said he would keep the other halves to secure this, they were not published.

Justice Steiner ruled the library would have to get back the remaining 119 copies the best way it could.

In accepting the ruling, the library's attorney, Frederick Shreffler, unwittingly paid Kavannah a compliment. He said the printed fragments were "almost verbatim" the original papers.

Man Is Jailed for Ignoring Charges

 Failure to appear in Buhl justice court in July, 1959, on a citation for having noisy neighbors on his automobile netted Robert Cantrell, Buhl, 10 days in Twin Falls County Jail Monday and fined court costs totaling \$41. Cantrell, who has cited last year by State Patrolman Richard Burns, was apprehended Monday by Buhl by Juro and Deputy Sheriff, Curtis Evans, and taken before Buhl Justice of the Peace C. E. Rudy. Rudy ordered Cantrell jailed for 10 days and fined him \$25 and \$3 costs on the failure to appear charge and fined him \$10 plus \$3 costs on the old citation on noisy neighbor.

Officers said that Cantrell is wanted by Arkansas authorities on a warrant charging 500 checks and will be turned over to the authorities there after serving the 10 days.

Rose Winner Of National Flower Vote

 WASHINGTON, Jan. 26 (UPI)—The rose was a national flower election yesterday with a margin that would make every prospective presidential candidate green with envy.

According to the Florists' Telegraph Delivery association, the rose polled over a third of the more than one million votes cast in the contest and led its nearest competitor, the carnation, by a better than 150 to one score.

The poll reportedly was taken through congressional housework when flower growers in 1959 submitted official national horticultural emblem.

Here is the balloting: Rose—289,841; carnation, 171,591; chrysanthemum, 73,720; lily-of-the-valley, 60,023; orchid, 40,681; tulip, 21,025; gladiolus, 30,569; cannella, 21,500; black-eyed susan, 22,240; mountain laurel, 20,846; geranium, 11,171; pansy, 10,671; goldendrod, 10,631; rhododendron, 10,678; cornflower, 10,675; peony, 15,857; anemone, 14,242; gerbera, 12,614; coral, 12,238; and marigold, 10,747.

The poll carried all but two states—Colorado and Hawaii which allowed the carnation as their choice.

France's Algerian Crisis Is Also Issue of Whole World

There are of course, communist elements and communist propaganda, seeking to capitalize on Arab nationalism and interested primarily, for some time to come, in sustained chaos. Without some measure of peace in Algeria, De Gaulle will be difficult for NATO partners to deal with in matters affecting unified command for the defense of western Europe.

There are the supporters of Gen. De Gaulle, who believe there is a possibility that Algerians and the French can find a way to live together in peace under some form of local autonomy falling short of the eviction of all French authority.

There are millions of moderate non-European Algerians, weary of the six years of cruel warfare and apparently willing to seek at least a temporary accommodation with the French.

And there are the "colons." They are of French extraction, but they call themselves Algerians. They believe dogmatically in the doctrine that Algeria is not a place apart but actually part of metropolitan France. The colons were born in Algeria, and their fathers and grandfathers before them. They rally to the slogan "sons live French Algeria." They have built their homes and their futures in Algeria, sunk their roots there.

Associated Press News Analysis

France's crisis in Algeria is also a world crisis.

What happens there will have a decided impact upon the future fortunes of France's Fifth republic under President Charles de Gaulle. It can have grave meaning on the course of the North Atlantic Treaty organization.

The Algerian situation also is bound up with the future of the Middle East. Peace in Algeria would tend to deprive eastern Arab nationalists of one of the clubs they hold over the economies of western Europe. Expulsion of North Africa off in an atmosphere of peace could change the politics of the whole Middle East area.

Many elements are at work in the Algerian crisis. There are the Pan-Arab nationalist followers of Gamal Abdel Nasser, whose election last year, six years ago, gave added momentum to the developing Algerian nationalist revolt. Nasser has a stake in opposition to any terms short of total independence from France.
