Anti-Trust Actions Are Filed Against 2 Top U.S. Makers of Tranquilizers

NEW YORK, Jan. 27 (UPI)—The justice department filed anti-trust actions today against the two leading U.S. tranquilizer manufacturers of conspiracy to fix high prices and monopolize their field. The civil complaint was lodged in U.S. district court against Carter Products, Inc., makers of Miltivan, and American Home Products corporation, manufacturer of Equanil. Both companies' activities were already being investigated by the senate anti-monopoly subcommittee studying drug prices. The government charged the two companies with conspiracy to monopolize the sale and distribution of meprobamate, sole active ingredient in their branded drugs, and with conspiracy to determine who may manufacture the drug and other combinations using it.

The conspiracy has tended to eliminate competition between them in the sale and distribution of the drug and has caused the public has been forced to pay high and noncompetitive prices," the complaint said.

Equanil was the only tranquilizer in the country in the sale of meprobamate. The government is seeking about 4 million dollars, all paid by the defendants, the government said. The suit charges that Carter and American Home Products had in 1952 approximately 95 percent of the tranquilizer market and had divided it between themselves and Carver sold one-third, thereby occupying the whole market.

The government charged that Carter has misused its patent rights on the chemical compound meprobamate which is the sole active ingredient in Miltivan and Equanil drugs. It asked the court to require Carter to offer its patent rights to other manufacturers well as American Home Products.

The suit charged that the two companies had agreed to exclude all others from the manufacture and sale of tranquilizer drugs made with meprobamate, thereby driving up the price of meprobamate tranquilizers and agreed on who will and when to produce in which meprobamate is used.

Symington Says GOP "Juggles" Intelligence Data to Balance Books

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27 (AP)—Sen. Stuart Symington, D., Mo., today charged the Eisenhower administration with misuse and manipulation of intelligence data about the Soviet Union's missiles. "The intelligence books have been juggled so the budget books may be balanced," Symington said in a 2,000 word statement. "The missile gap is greater than 3 to 1," he told a news conference at which he released the statement.

Symington said he realized he would be accused of playing politics "by those who prefer to conceal the facts; and by others who do not know the facts." Soldiers Fire On Algerians For De Gaulle

ALGERS, Jan. 27 (UPI)—Police and soldiers opened fire today on hundreds of Moslems who staged a counter-demonstration at Mostaganem against French soldiers rebelling against their government's Algerian policy. According to unofficial reports, six persons were injured but none was killed. The shooting at Mostaganem, a trading center of 60,000 persons close by the Mediterranean coast, broke out after they threw a dramatic new twist into the drama being enacted in Algeria.

It was the first time the Moslem population had come into the picture in force. And the Mostaganem French soldiers were shot by Algerians. President Charles de Gaulle, not against him as have been the French soldiers who tried to force de Gaulle to sell out France in Algeria.

It was the first shooting incident in Algeria since Sunday, when 37 persons were killed and 125 injured in a riot in Algiers. Because of censorship and communication breakdown caused by French soldiers, who tried to force Algerians first, rioters in Mostaganem were confused.

The rioting originally started in Algiers. It spread to French soldiers, who have been demonstrating for the past three days.

What happened at Mostaganem was that several hundred Arab rioters, some Algerians, some French soldiers, who tried to force them to close down their shops and strikers.

The rioting started along the de Gaulle and "down with (M.A. Gen. Jacques) Massu" the very French soldiers in other cities. Police and troops tried to control the rioting but the rioting started and later police fired a brief volley.

The reports of the riot shooting caused Algerians and French personal representatives in Algiers to "bring to the attention of de Gaulle the situation in Algeria and to urge the government to take steps to bring the rioting to an end and to prevent the government from being their handiwork."

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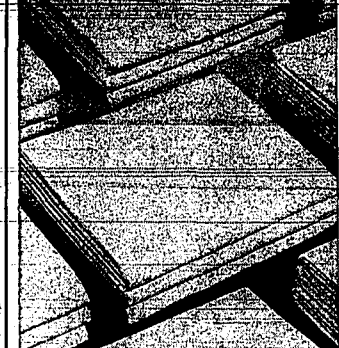

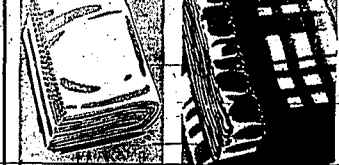

U. S. Steel Is Optimistic as Income Told

NEW YORK, Jan. 27 (AP)—Roger Blough, chairman of U. S. Steel corporation, said yesterday he expected the light steel situation to ease toward the end of the second quarter.

Blough's comments were made as the nation's biggest steel producer reported net income of \$253,975,686 or \$4.24 a share for 1959 compared with \$301,568,251 or \$4.13 a share in 1958.

Blough predicted with the company's current operating rate at 92 per cent of capacity. Though estimated it would be between 90 and 93 per cent in the first quarter and a little less in the second quarter.

"I forecast the country would produce 70 million tons of steel in the first-half year."

"Steel consumption currently is a lot less than the operating rate," Blough said, "and consumers could be putting as much as 20 per cent of their steel into inventory."

Blough added, the company is still optimistic about business conditions for all of 1960, adding, "I don't expect any marked downward change in the second half of 1960."

Blough turned aside all queries on steel prices, saying he had nothing to say on the previous comments.

He said U. S. Steel did not complete an immediate increase in steel prices, but that no agreement had been made with government officials to hold the prices of steel until after this year's election.

Telling About Shrinking U.S. Dollar Bad Idea, Hank Says

BY HENRY MOLESWORTH I don't know about you, but I'd be very happy if the government stopped publishing those facts and figures every month or so which show the purchasing power of the dollar against the dollars of 1929, 1937, 1949, and so on.

These morbid financial facts are a form of psychological warfare against the very people the government wants to be happy and contented, and it is a wonder to me that the august general's office has not frowned on them long ago.

It is the same thing as if a husband kept reminding his wife this data on the decline and fall of

every one of the beauty, talent and charm of the sweetest he could have married, or a wife pointing out the high fellow who once courted her on bedded knees.

Those buxom, well-built dollars of yesterday are long gone, show no signs of coming back, and the sooner forgotten the better.

It can't possibly make a man feel any better to read that the coat he paid \$15 for could have been purchased in 1929 for \$3, or that the same make car he is driving could have been had at one time for about three times the price of its present windfall.

This is teeth-grinding inflation, and instead of being published it should be buried in a bucket under the Washington monument and all traces of the burial carefully stamped out.

of the dollar's purchasing power must be published; then it should be accompanied by a note pointing out that today's commodities, while more expensive, are much better than they were.

You could carry \$5 worth out now in your watch pocket if you weren't afraid of being arrested for shoplifting.
