**Eisenhower, Nixon Are Praised by Senator for Utah at 'Salute' Dinner**

Sen. Wallace F. Bennett, R., Utah, described President Eisenhower as "the greatest leader in the world today and a symbol of peace," when he addressed members of the Republican party Wednesday night at the "Salute to Eisenhower" dinner held in the American Legion hall. The senator, in the course of his praise for Eisenhower, also took a solid plug for Vice President Nixon as the 1960 GOP presidential candidate, terming him "a worthy successor" who has been especially prepared for the post by Eisenhower. Senator Bennett told the group that "Eisenhower is not a man who is content with mere accomplishments under troublesome conditions."  
 Bennett said he said, "only come to those who overcome handicaps and triumph in spite of major obstacles and so it has been with Eisenhower."  
 The senator said that the Eisenhower eight years as the nation's leader has had two major phases, and that during the periods of physical infirmities he never made a decision to mental and spiritual weakness. Bennett added that the people's trust in Eisenhower "is a pointed fact that his public attitude toward his predecessor at the same point in his career."  
 The senator pointed out that for all of Eisenhower's years in office he has been forced to work with congress controlled by his political opponents.  
 "During all this time," Bennett said, "Eisenhower has scrupulously respected the constitution and the responsibilities of congress, which his last two predecessors would not do during his office. He has shown the people's will, his help in winning victories for sound legislation."  
 Bennett told the group, "Eisenhower came to office when peace seemed to have been attained by prudent policies, and left it while he was here." Truman's "policy," Bennett said, "was to bring down our war to another level. Eisenhower's philosophy was to dedicate his term to world peace, and against great odds he has done so."  
 Bennett pointed to world conditions as the "symbol of peace."

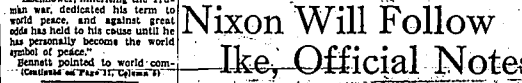
**Forest Service Studies Say Top Development Of Sawtooths 'Urgent'**

BOISE, Jan. 28 (UPI)—A report from the U. S. forest service said today that a full-scale development of the Sawtooth Mountain region in central Idaho is an "urgent need." The analysis of both short- and long-range multiple-use development of the area said that grazing, mining and to some extent, recreation and timber, comprise the "use management" has been the "an inadequate transportation system and the remoteness of the area from major population centers," the report, released by Howard E. Ahlbeck, Boise national forest supervisor, said.  
 "However, the recent completion of highway 21 through Sawtooth valley and the Stanley basin and the probable construction of a highway link from Boise to Stanley, now will result in much greater use."  
 "As population increases, use of the resources will increase. This, particularly in the case of recreation and timber."  
 "A major problem must be developed and the rapidly growing needs of the people are met."  
 "In addition to development for recreation, timber and grazing, the area is depleted watershed and timber lands. The full potential of the area is not being realized only through cultural treatment of rangelands."  
 "The development plan for the area includes long-range objectives to be reached within 10 to 40 years. A short-term program to be completed within the next 10 to 15 years," the report said.  
 "According to Ahlbeck, the multiple use program for development of the mountain region was based on a national forest plan submitted to congress last March 24 by Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Taft.

**De Gaulle's Troops Wait New Orders**

ALGERIA, Jan. 28 (AP)—French troops who have faced a RIGHTS French settlers' insurrection passively since Monday were notified today that they should not be obeyed. A cryptic broadcast by Delegate General Paul Delouvrier, President Charles de Gaulle's top civil representative in Algeria, hinted he expected a friendly showdown that would unconditionally return Algeria "to any ultimate status involved. It was deeply welcomed by the 500,000-man army, Delouvrier said, will be issued by Gen. Maurice Challe, the military commander in chief. "Without saying what those orders might be, Delouvrier then announced he would be returning to Algeria for a command post in the countryside."

**Union Ends Talks With Rail Firms**

CHICAGO, Jan. 28 (UPI)—The 60,000-member Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers (BLFE) today broke off wage talks with the nation's railroads.

**Frank Benson Creates Issue On Insurance**

BOISE, Jan. 28 (AP)—Attorney General Frank Benson cast doubt today on the status of group insurance contracts which now are being regulated by Idaho courts and agencies.

 "I did not so state," Benson's letter said. "I sincerely regret that you have misinterpreted my opinion."

**Ike Claims He Has Built Up Mighty U.S.**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28 (AP)—Half a continent apart, Dwight D. Eisenhower and Richard M. Nixon launched the GOP political campaign last night with the President claiming his administration has made America the world's strongest military and economic power. For his part, Vice President Nixon promised to defend the Eisenhower record with all his strength although he refused to stand pat on it through the years in which he, himself, hopes to occupy the White House.  
 The President in Los Angeles and Nixon in Chicago spoke at \$100-a-plate dinners staged by the Republican party to raise campaign cash and put out America's best executive. Other "Dinners with Ike" called out the party faithful into his leadership in both defense and domestic areas. But there was no mistaking that he was swinging hard at both.  
 "Because of our insistence on adequacy and efficiency," he said, "militarily and economically our country is, over-all, the strongest power on Earth, both militarily and economically."  
 As domestic and other party speakers across the nation, Eisenhower stressed the peace and prosperity theme — a theme the national media and prestige of our country has become an obsession with military extremists.  
 "And then again," "Republicans flatly reject the notion of a permanent pro-pump it up to permanent prosperity by an outpouring of federal cash," he said.

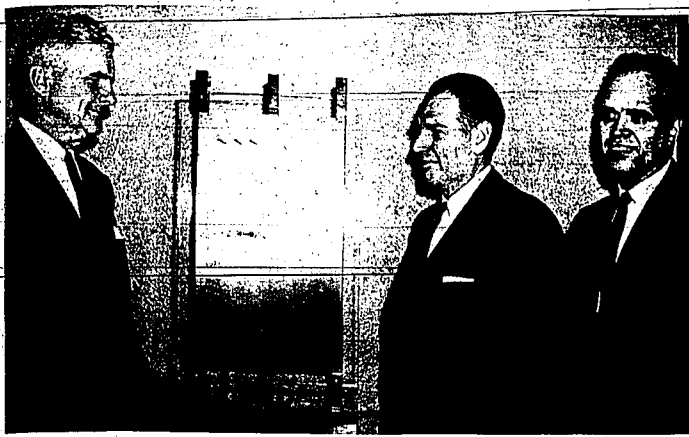

### Cancer Talk, Sign, Flemming Don't Affect Smokers at Meet

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28 (UPI)—Seldon have I seen so much tobacco consumed under a "No smoking" sign during a discussion about cancer.

People were firing up cigarettes, cigars and pipes all over the house, commerce committee room.

No one paid the slightest heed to the "no smoking" sign that hung on one wall. Neither did the fact that Arthur B. Flemming, secretary of health, education and welfare, was the witness deter them.

One of Flemming's agencies, the public health service, has on occasion called attention to such things as health, education and lung cancer.

On this occasion, however, he was talking about cancer in relation to cranberries, chickens, lipstick and oranges. Worrying about things like that may be one of the reasons people are smoking more.

The secretary was before the committee asking a stronger law to protect us against cancer-causing chemicals in foods, drugs and cosmetics. The bill would give him more power to ban the use of artificial coloring agents that might be harmful.

Flemming first gave a long discourse on the things that science knows about the cause of cancer. Then he gave a longer discourse on the things it doesn't know.

Until there is more clear information on the subject, he told the committee, it is best not to take chances.

That is all very well, agreed Chairman Owen Harris, D., Arkansas, but neither, he added, should Flemming's agency keep the nation in a constant state of alarm.

Flemming replied that he was trying hard not to create any undue concern, but I gather some of the lawmakers still were concerned about the great cranberry panic, as well as the lesser upsurges over chicken hormones, orange-tinted oranges and new lipstick shades.

There seems to be no doubts now that we can eat cranberries, chickens and oranges with impunity. But I am not so sure that kissing is safe.

Flemming, you may recall, put lipstick colors on the blacklist last year. This made the lipstick makers see red.

The order banning the sale of

lipstick has been set aside until Feb. 1 to give the lipstick makers time to make objections. Presumably the outcome, the ladies are free to use it at their own discretion.

Flemming said it was a question of developing a cancer-proof lipstick. I wonder why Flemming didn't repeat the warning about lung cancer. Somebody said this was because tobacco is neither a food, drug nor cosmetic.

Take your pick between two popular favorites—ribs of beef or frisky chickens next Sunday's dinner.

Both are featured specials in many supermarkets and neighborhood groceries this week. Beef as low as 50 cents a pound compares with a minimum of 65 cents a pound a year ago, while fryers are 30 cents a pound against 45.

Beef ribs are the No. 1 item in many stores along the East coast, in the Midwest and Far West, while chicken is top in the South, East and Midwest.

Fish lovers will find scallops at bargain levels along the East coast, while halibut is marked down in the mid-Atlantic states and Midwest.

Beef steak and leg of lamb are more expensive in a few areas and eggs are down two cents or so to others.

Vegetable prices up  
There are prospects of higher tags for some winter vegetables due to another cold snap in Florida growing areas.

Hardest hit, growers said, were beans, cucumbers, squash, tomatoes, sweet corn and peppers. Artichokes are more expensive this week.

Bargain hunters are advised to turn to outstanding buys such as carrots, medium onions, potatoes, parsley, spinach, mushrooms and cooking greens like collard, kale, mustard greens and turnip greens.

Florida citrus fruit generally came through the cold weather with only spotty damage, so oranges, grapefruit and lemons are included on the best buy list. Eastern apples and California avocados are also outstanding buys.

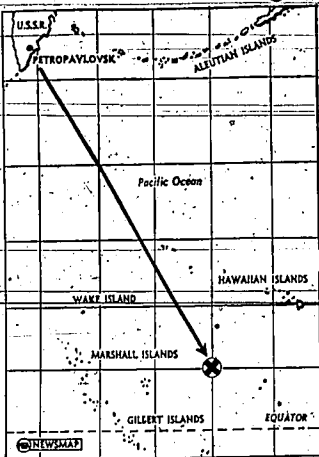
