## 14 Persons Die in Fiercy Rail Wreck

**BAKERSFIELD, Calif., March 2 (UPI)—**Rescue crews delicately pried apart crumpled steel cars of a cracked passenger train today in search of additional persons feared killed in a flaming collision with a fuel truck tanker. Fourteen bodies have been removed from the charred steel. A first once was a grimacing streamer. Deputy Coroner John Ross said he believed that number would stand as the total death toll but could not say how many bodies were still in the wreckage. He began replacing sections of the twisted tracks to clear the line for traffic.

The ailing Chicago-bound Santa Fe Chief smashed through the hooded tanker at a speed of 40 mph yesterday. The 8,000 gallons of fuel oil leaked through the hole and ignited a path of fire along the right-of-way. The 11 passenger cars were derailed. Some jacked back each other under a train of burning oil.

At least 40 of the 83 persons aboard the train were injured seriously enough to be hospitalized. Screaming passengers clawed their way out of the burning wreckage as flames shot 100 feet into the evening sky.

Fire crews quenched the flames two hours after the crash. The wreckage still steams, and rescue crews from throughout the California are on hand.

## Burned Man Critical After Truck Mishap

**BUHL, March 2—**Willie Dierig, 51, Castleford, ditcher for the Twin Falls Cannal company, was reported in critical condition this noon at Magic Valley Memorial hospital from burns received when the pickup truck he was driving overturned and burst into flames in the Fairview district southwest of Healdsburg, today. Attendants said Dierig was first to third degree burns on 90 to 95 per cent of his body. The 1949 Chevrolet pickup truck Dierig was driving failed to negotiate a turn on a county road four miles south and two miles west of Buhl, State Patrolman Richard Burns said. It slipped sideways, then overturned twice through the lava rock and landed on its side.

The patrolman and Deputy Sheriff Curtis Pryor, investigating the accident, said they believed the fire pipe on the gas tank broke when the truck overturned. The tank leaked and the back of the seat in the cab, apparently, was the cause of the fire.

## White Group Joins Negro Race Actions

White students from Duke University in North Carolina joined Negroes today in a "sit-down" protest against segregation at a Durham restaurant at Durham, N.C.

Deputies were called to the restaurant and told the demonstrators they had no right to trespass if they did not leave. The demonstrators left the restaurant and gathered in a nearby playground and threw snowballs at photographers.

Students at C. C. Negro college students staged a sit-down and freezing rain in at least lunch counters at two variety stores.

A city court judge at Winston-Salem today ordered the Negro and white students demonstrators of trespassing charges but suspended the charges for 30 days.

The demonstrators in Nashville, Tenn., were released after most of the Negro defendants chose jail terms of dramatize their "non-violent" campaign against segregation.

## Red Cross Says 5,000 More Are Hurt; Airlift Operates

**AGADIR, Morocco, March 2 (UPI)—**Stunned survivors streamed from earthquake-ravaged Agadir today. A Red Cross official estimated the total number of 8,000 dead and more than 5,000 injured. The grim casualty prediction—2,000 more dead than the initial Moroccan government estimate—was made by Dr. Albert A. Reinhardt, who flew to Agadir from International Red Cross headquarters in Geneva. The U.S. air force, making these estimates public, said they were conservative.

Bleeding cries rose from the rubble of Agadir, and rescue workers probed the ruins for untraced survivors and bodies.

Rescue efforts were in progress, carrying the injured northward to hospitals in other African cities.

Europe, America and North Africa mobilized aid for the Atlantic coast coast shattered Monday night by two earthquakes and a tidal wave.

### Ike, Khrushchev Trips Said OK but Follow-up Necessary

WASHINGTON, March 2 (AP)—Two closely met—President Eisenhower at 60 and Premier Nikita Khrushchev almost 65—were expected to have a great physical boost in the hope it will benefit their countries.

Are their trips worth the expense in present punishment and pressure in the future there will be. This question is still unanswered, despite the big receipts both men get.

The ovation given them by millions of people in the backward countries doesn't necessarily imply any more than a superficial, polite and curious response to the visit.

The polite and often platitudinous statements by the two leaders when they are not whizzing through the crowd with big grins and waving arms, can hardly do more than create a momentary impression of good will.

"After all, neither man is going to anger his hosts with antagonistic statements or tough talk, although the explosive Khrushchev has done more in this direction than Eisenhower.

Both men are doing a selling job. In the end their customers, the people of the backward nations, will base their future attitudes on how much follow-up electricity they get from the two leaders. Khrushchev started these trips to western Europe and Asia. At the time he had a practical reason: The tyrant Stalin was newly dead and the world-wide sinister implications of the Soviet Union he created remained.

Eisenhower must have felt he could do no less than Khrushchev. He, too, became a world-traveler: To Europe, Asia, North Africa and now South America. Now the two most important world-leaders are out beating the good will bushes at the same time.

In the past, when much slower travel meant the top men would have to be waded from house base to house base, it was natural for their foreign ministers to do the traveling while the No. 1 men stayed at home.

That picture has changed. It's good, but since travel is now easy and often not much more than a

shining generalities. It remains to be demonstrated that these individual good will trips by the top — and again leaders do any more than shorten their lives and use up time that could be better spent at home, thinking.

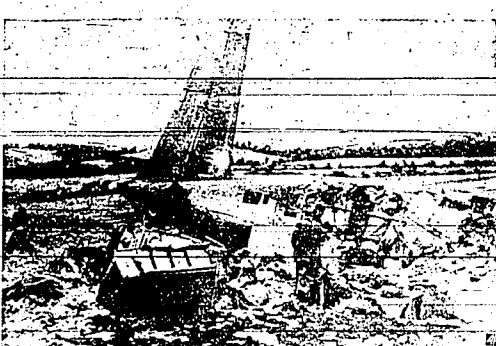

### 6 U.S. Soldiers Are Convicted

SEOUL, Korea, March 2 (UPI)—A U. S. Army special court-martial convicted today six American soldiers on charges of rape, theft and the slitting and beating of seven Korean youths last Feb. 12.

Korean police authorities brought the case to the attention of U. S. authorities on Feb. 22. The court said soldiers of company three, 4th Army unit, Washington, arrested seven Koreans who allegedly stole discarded canned foods and other supplies from the camp.

The six soldiers were charged with wrongfully slitting and beating Korean civilians, relieving them of their clothes, scalps and battery and assault with dangerous weapons. All entered pleas of guilty before their court martial.

The court sentenced them to six months confinement at hard labor, reduction to the lowest enlisted grade and forfeiture of from \$30 to \$50 a month for six months.

The sentences are subject to review by the commanding officer of the Pusan area.

### 3-Way Attack On Bad West Weed Is Made

WASHINGTON, March 2 (UPI)—The agriculture department reported today that a three-way research attack on halogenated herbicides to control this weed is being made that intrudes about 10,000,000 acres in the semi-arid West.

The agency said herbicides so far offer the most promise in controlling the strongly competitive weed in small areas. Research is under way to develop sprays and herbicides to reach ranges after halogenated herbicides are used.

Department scientists also are trying to find insects that attack the weed. Other studies still preliminary are aimed at finding weaknesses in the weed that may offer new possibilities for several control methods.

The department said halogenated herbicides which slightly retard growth of the weed, is spreading into an estimated 700,000-acre area of grazing land each year.

### Problems of Junior High Brought Out

PORTLAND, Ore., March 2 (AP)—The junior high school is an American invention more than 60 years old, but it's still a part of our life in the educational field.

It isn't really a part of the grade school. And it isn't really a part of the high school, except that it is really a part of both.

About 4,000 high school principals meeting here spent most of yesterday talking about the junior high, what it is and what it ought to be. And there was general agreement that there are many problems yet to be solved.

Cousins said "The junior high school has been considered of little value and that we have let pupils wander across a vast range of content, giving it the force over heavily, with the result that our courses have often been dull and motivation has been stifled.

This, Barnes said, is a situation that needs to be improved.

Teachers Not Trained

Christine Young, principal of the Miami Springs, Fla., junior high, said one pressing problem is that so few teachers are especially trained for junior high work.

"We have filled our classrooms with elementary teachers with good basic education, but without specialization in any subject, or with teachers trained for senior high schools without any contact with the growth and development of the pre-adolescent," she said.

Break in School Discipline

The first junior high school opened in Richmond, Ind., in 1888 when a separate building and separate program were set up for the seventh and eighth grades. This was the first break with the traditional eight years of grade school and four years of high school.

The junior high provides a needed break between the grade school, where pupils have one teacher for different subjects.

But just where should that break be? Educators can't agree.

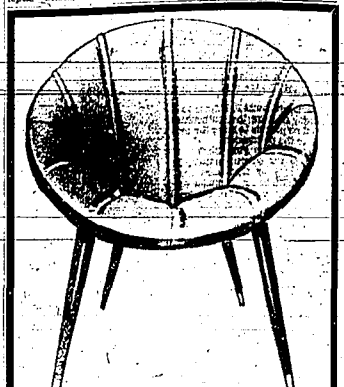
BOISE, March 2 (AP)—Idaho went through the first two months of 1960 with less than half the traffic deaths it marked up a year ago.

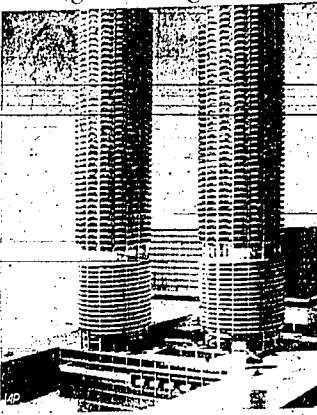



### Standards for Grading Lamb Are Lowered

WASHINGTON, March 2 (UPI)—Lower government standards for grading lamb and mutton are being used this year, according to the industry.

One official said that as long as the housewife depends on government grades in buying meat, she will care how the standards are set, but that few persons are qualified to judge meat accurately and expertly.

No Cheating Expected—The housewife is not going to be cheated, the official said. Any agricultural department aide pointed out that beef standards have been lowered since 1954 and there was no reaction to the buying public's knowledge that the standards had been lowered.

More Prime Lamb Due—The department said a large number of the lambs graded as choice now will be identified as prime. The choice grade will consist largely of lambs formerly would have been graded as good or sold without a federal grade.

In general, lambs in the prime and choice grades should, under the new standards, carry less fat and external fat.

U. S. Standards are based on an evaluation of the quality of the meat and conformation of the carcass—no indication of the yield of lean meat, in relation to the amount of bone and fat.

Under the new standards, the housewife won't be paying for a lot of fat but will get more lean meat.

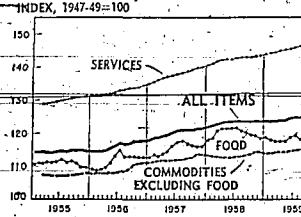

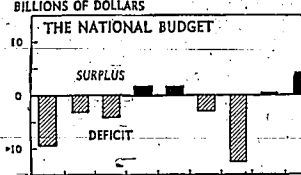

The committee, named last November, is headed by Secretary of State Christian A. Herter, Assistant Secretary of State Roy R. Hubertson, Jr. is vice chairman.

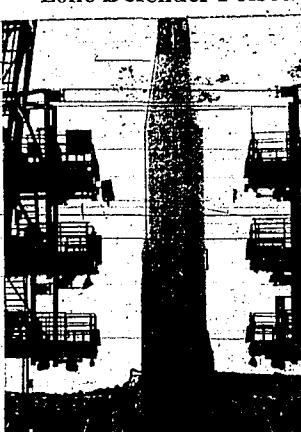

With solid-fuel propellant, the Hawk is rated as capable of seeking out and destroying planes or enemy missiles traveling at 1,500 miles per hour at levels ranging from 100 to more than 30,000 feet.

It has a homing guidance system.
