The spring term at Twin Falls Business College will begin Monday, says Sterling Larson, college president.

Classes on the day schedule will run from 8:15 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. Evening classes are planned from 7 to 10 p.m. Mondays and Thursdays.

Classes will be held in beginning, intermediate and advanced accounting; beginning intermediate and advanced typing; intermediate and advanced Gregg shorthand; business English I and II; spelling and vocabulary building; cost and automobile accounting; shorthand transcription; business law; business correspondence; filing; office practice; payroll and record keeping; office machines instruction on the touch system adding machine, Merchant, Friden and Olivetti calculators, bookkeeping machine, comptometer, electronic electric typewriter and duplicating machines.

Registration is in progress now. Out-of-town students are helped by the college to find suitable living accommodations in Twin Falls. Homes are available where students may stay and help for board and room.

The college is state-approved for training veterans under the GI bill and for students under the vocational rehabilitation program of the state.

Ghost Writer Methods Are Under Probe

NEW YORK, March 3 (UP)—Ghost writers—the scribes who draft and prose under the names of their clients—are under investigation here for reported widespread collusion with candidates for college degrees.

Evidence so far indicates that students at many schools across the country have had college work done by professionals.

One of them, at Indiana University, was suspended yesterday, and another, at Columbia university teachers college, faces similar penalty.

The probe was touched off when the New York World-Journal and Sun last week began printing a series by reporter Alex Bevan, describing how he posed as a ghost writer and did college assignments for paying customers.

Acting on his tip, Manhattan District Attorney Frank D. Hogan's office has raided eight ghost-writing agencies setting files and records of transactions with students.

It was reported that just one firm's books showed "hundreds of checks" necessary for obtaining master's degrees, had been done for students throughout the nation. Names were withheld.

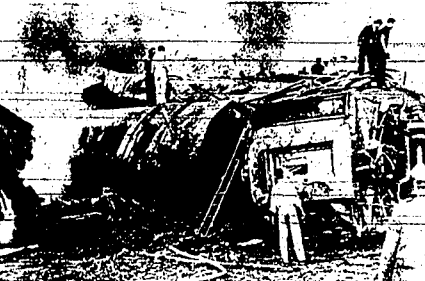

Tax Returns Have Started To Trickle In

BOISE, March 3 (UPI)—The postman brought a mere 2,000 pieces of mail to Tax Collector P. G. Neill's office today. Four or five weeks from now the postoffice will have a couple of trucks to haul it all.

Before the flood of state income tax returns are dumped off by the April 15 deadline, more than 200,000 will have been delivered to the taxpayers' homes of the state house where 50 employes will tackle them.

Neill thinks there will be more mistakes than usual, which translated into figures, means tens of thousands of them. If there are more it will be because of the new law enacted by the last legislature, according to Neill.

He chalked most of the mistakes and "silly" errors and "copy" checking to the fact everybody is going to have to figure his tax three times, when under present law one time would suffice.

They'll have to figure it under the current federal law for their 1958 returns, then under the 1959 law and then re-visit to the Idaho tax law, he explains. That's because the new law is based on the 1958 federal tax code.

Right there, the trouble starts. Congress already has made several major changes out of a total of more than 100 since that code was set up. But Idaho can't conform until the next legislature meets in 1961.

It clarified for an important segment of Latin America's population the position of the United States as a supporter of peace, democracy and economic development. This clarification was conveyed by the most direct means possible to the estimated three to four million people who are the President's best friends on TV or heard him on the radio.

It established Eisenhower's stress that the United States—contrary to some Latin-American thought—does not have inexhaustible financial resources.

He made this point in avoiding as tactfully as possible any formal financial commitments to the host countries. Nevertheless, each of the four states of state with whom he conferred let him know they expect more U. S. help.

T. F. Students—Man's Dream To Reach Ocean Floor Is Reality

To Get Merit Test Tuesday

About 75 Twin Falls high school students will take the National Merit scholarship qualifying test at 9 a.m. Tuesday at the school, according to Principal V. L. LeFevre.

Students who wish to be considered for merit scholarships which will be awarded in 1961 must take the test Tuesday. The test is the first step in the sixth annual competition for merit scholarships provided by about 100 corporations, foundations, professional associations and institutions as well as the National Merit Scholarship corporation itself.

More than 10 million dollars was awarded in the first four years of the program. The number of scholarships awarded in a year depends upon the extent of sponsor participation. LeFevre notes.

Results of the test March 4 will be used to select finalists by the end of the spring semester.

About 10,000 semifinalists, high scorers in each state, will be named early next year and the names will be published in a booklet distributed among colleges and other scholarship agencies. Each semifinalist will take a second examination April if he registers his performance, will become a finalist in the merit program.

Winners of merit scholarships will be selected from the four-year records and recommendations, test scores, extracurricular interests and accomplishments, and other items. Each finalist will be awarded a certificate of merit.

Four-year scholarships are awarded winners with stipends depending on financial need. The maximum award in 1961 will be \$100, and the maximum will be \$1,500. The average stipend of 1959 winners was \$250. An additional 25,000 students selected without regard to financial need will be awarded consideration letters.

More than a million and a half high school students have participated in the merit program since the fall of 1959, more than 3,100 merit winners were enrolled in universities and colleges in the United States.

SACRAMENTO, March 3 (UPI)—Carol Chessman started a new death row countdown today when she was sentenced to die for the conviction of a public hearing on a bill to abolish the death penalty in California.

Chessman, 39, was sentenced to die in the case of Jack Benny, said Chessman, whose 34th birthday is May 7.

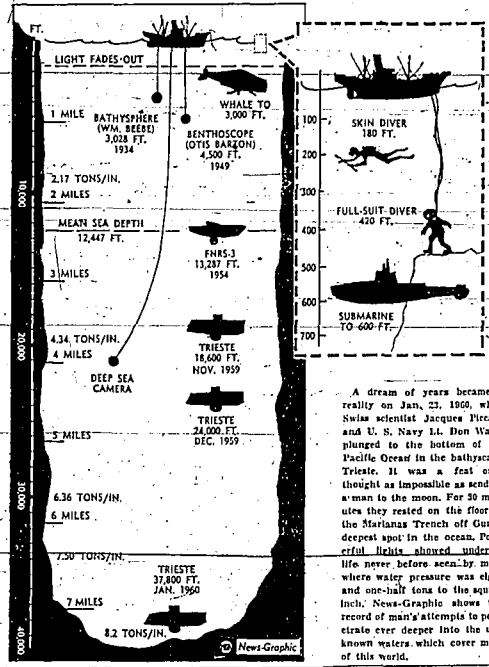
Shopping Mall Is Successful Idea

Experiment on Spud Storage May Revolutionize Methods

MOSCOW, March 3 (AP)—An experiment which a University of Idaho professor believes may revolutionize potato storage methods is now under way at the school's branch experiment station at Aberdeen.

George W. Woodbury, head of the department of horticulture, said a method of storing is needed as a result of the advent of the potato processing industry. More than a third of Idaho's spud crop now is absorbed by the processors.

Woodbury—in an article for a college of agriculture publication—said that it is necessary to store potatoes for long periods in order to keep them in good condition. He pointed out that the current practice is to store at low temperatures, with high relative humidity. The objective was to develop a method of storing with a minimum loss from rot, respiration and sprouting.

Woodbury points out that there is another problem, which has become even more significant since the advent of processing. He explained that "much of the solid content of potatoes is starch. Generally speaking, the more starch the better. Unfortunately, when temperatures get much below 50 degrees Fahrenheit, the starch changes to sugar."

Senator Long Talks Daring Rights Debate

WASHINGTON, March 3 (UPI)—Sen. Russell D. Long, D. La., said today that he will challenge the conservative rights debate early today but he didn't touch the record of his dad's, a former filibuster champion.

The 41-year-old Long, youngest of the 18 southern senators joining to seek civil rights legislation, began speaking at 1:22 p.m. (EST) yesterday. He sat down 11 hours and six minutes later at 12:38 a.m. today.

Speech is longest.

His speech-making was the longest so far in the around-the-clock session that started at noon Monday. He said he will speak on a civil rights bill which he introduced last week, but he will keep his address to about three or four minutes.

But Russell's father, the late Louisiana Sen. Huey P. Long, died in 1935 with a 22-hour and 20-minute speech on the tidelands oil controversy.

Thurmond Champ New Sen. Strom Thurmond, D. S. C., is the current champion. He talked for 24 hours and 18 minutes in 1957 against a civil rights bill which eventually was approved.

Long, who complained of throat trouble last week, popped instant into his mouth occasionally during his long speech. His voice fell to almost a whisper as he neared the end of his speech.

Veteran newsmen who were around in Huey's senatorial heyday said Russell's delivery was measured and calm compared with his father's unbridled style.

40 Million Dollars Left for Panama

The total of \$29,453,404 includes nearly \$1 million paid to Panamanian employees in the canal zone and about 75 million spent for goods and services in Panama.

The balance was made up largely of salaries paid to U. S. service men and civilian employees, much of which was spent locally.

Fires Doused

CARACAS, Venezuela, March 3 (UPI)—Small fires in a Panamanian camp here "practically" succeeded in controlling forest fires in the mountainous region, which caused three million dollars in damage in the Caracas area this week, authorities said today.

Ike Believed Planning to Ask New Aid

WASHINGTON, March 3 (UPI)—President Eisenhower is reported planning to ask congress to step up economic aid to Latin America as a result of his good-will tour of South America.

Informed sources told United Press International yesterday the president would like to bolster the special fund of the new administration and to have the development bank set up last month to help speed the hemisphere's economic development.

Fund may be doubled. Officials believed the original \$100-million fund authorized for the bank to help finance urgent public works would be doubled.

Diplomatic officials, who accompanied Eisenhower on most of his four-nation trip, said the president was deeply impressed with the area's efforts to achieve economic progress.

These other points emerged as immediate results of the trip: Need Urged.—The United States will join Brazil in urging an early meeting of a special nine-nation committee to speed implementation of operation Pan America. This is the broad program launched by Brazilian President Juscelino Kubitschek to combat poverty and strengthen economic cooperation in the western hemisphere.

—The United States will organize an observer of the Organization of American States annual forthcoming meetings of the U. S., Canada and the European trade groups, to meet Latin American concerns over possible discrimination against western hemisphere goods.

—A more sympathetic U. S. policy toward Latin American exports.

Heart Attack Help Stickers Available

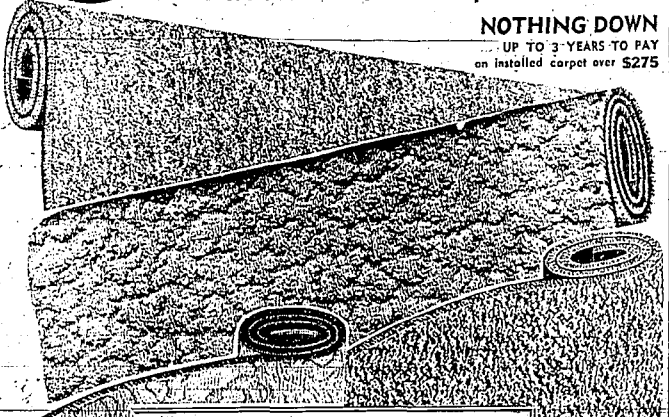
BOISE, March 3.—The Idaho Heart Association said yesterday it has available for free distribution stickers listing steps for giving assistance to heart attack victims.

Pilots Eke Out 60-52 Victory to Oust Kimberly

Fish Forcing Meats to Be Bargain, too

By the Associated Press
Fish here must share the supermarket spotlight this week with the start of the Lenten season.

How active hunting for substitutes for heavier meats and dairy should be planned to know best prices of fish and eggs, generally are lower than a year ago.

From fish choice totaled 223 million pounds, at last count, up 10 per cent from a year earlier. Abundant production has kept prices low for some time.

Hard-to-find items, such as trout, are in short supply, but prices are cheap.

Fish specials include halibut, Mackerel, codfish, smelt, coho, whitefish, and haddock. Leg of lamb is frequently featured in the East and South, while poultry items are popular in the East, South and Midwest.

Forcible prices are up 4 to 12 cents a pound in some places and eggs are up to 10 cents a dozen, a pound over a year ago. Eggs should be higher in some places, down in others.

Sweet Potatoes Are Big Market experts find an unusual amount of business in sweet potatoes this week, with crops from New Jersey, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina and Louisiana piled up on store shelves.

Other outstanding buys among vegetables include cabbage, cauliflower, Florida celery, onion, eggplant, lettuce, collard, kale, peas, potatoes, radishes and spinach.

Fruit bargains are avocado, banana, orange, grapefruit, and apple.

New Plan Is Proposed to License TV

WASHINGTON, March 3 (AP)—A plan for licensing radio and TV stations for less than the usual three-year period was announced yesterday by the Federal Communications Commission.

The commission, which said it proposed to change its rules in this respect, invited comment by April 1.

Tighter Reins Asked
The action is one of a series of moves by FCC to recent measures to put tighter reins on broadcasting outlets short of actual censorship of programs.

The commission has asked Congress to provide criminal penalties for paying, or underpaying, for program records, and for fixed spots shown. It also has endorsed a congressional proposal that its own penalty powers be amended so it can fine broadcast stations for offenses, or temporarily suspend their licenses.

The Communications act provides for licensing broadcasting stations "for a period of not more than three years."

3-Year License Used
Under this, FCC has established a regular three-year period for initial licenses or license renewals.

Yesterday's announcement said the proposed rule change would enable it "to make occasional use of shorter-term licenses in the case of any broadcast station which it does not feel is entitled to a regular three-year renewal and which merits closer observation during a shorter period of operation."
