WASHINGTON, March 4 (AP) — The government's investment in price-supported wheat, corn, cotton, tobacco and other surplus farm commodities at \$2,230,469,000 as of Jan. 31.

The agriculture department said the total included \$1,294,948,000 in commodities owned outright by the Commodity Credit Corporation and \$935,521,000 in outstanding loans on farm products still held by producers.

The investment on Jan. 31, 1959, was \$2,020,101,000.

Wheat held its long-time title as the most costly government farm investment. The government owned 1,200,000,000 bushels valued at \$2,000,000,000. Loans on 21,000,000 bushels were valued at \$564,000,000.

The corn investment of more than \$2,200,000,000 covered about 1,600,000,000 bushels.

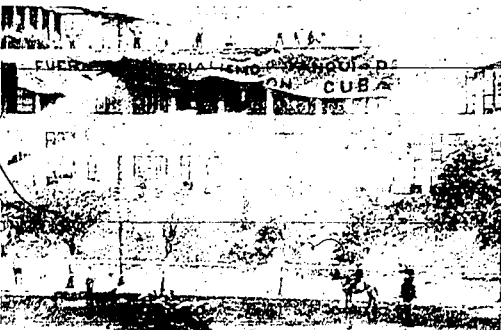

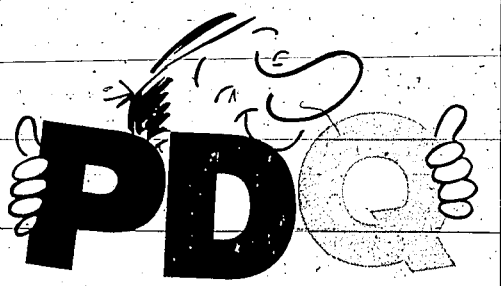

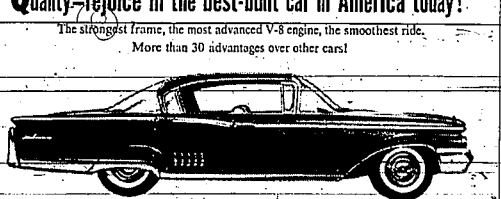

Agadir Said Near Earth's Major Fault

PARIS, March 4.—The ancient city of Agadir, shattered by an earthquake earlier this week, is near one of the earth's major fault lines, where quake disasters have occurred for at least 100 centuries.

The crack in the earth's shell runs through the northern tip of Morocco, the toe of Italy, through Greece and Turkey and on across Iran.

Agadir is south of the line, about 300 miles. Lisbon, where a 1755 quake killed 50,000, is a little farther to the north of the fault. Clocer ar—Orleansville, Algeria, where 70,000 died in 1903, and Malvina, Italy, scene of a 1603 quake which killed 32,000.

Fast earth and rock shifts in the area of the earth's fault lines are responsible for some of the quakes. Other causes are the riving in of subsurface-earth pockets and volcanic eruptions.

Prof. Jean Rothe, Strasbourg, director of the International Bureau of Seismology, believes the Agadir quake was due to a giant slitting of earth and rock. Agadir is located on a coastal plain between two mountain ranges.

Morocco has not been the scene of many earth shocks in recent years, Prof. Rothe said. But at present the Grand Atlas range is in the process of a readjustment, often the cause of quakes.

Then they go to a ball park, and for no more than three hours out of every 24 they exercise the few unneeded muscles that remain in their bodies.

What I am wanting to say, with my bull-pen type of writing, is that the proudest of all athletes are baseball players. For some reason or another they have built their bodies to stand a tough game. Truth is it is no more rigorous than the May polo match or the spirited bean-bag contest.

I covered baseball for more years than the shrouding side of my life. I have yet to see anything very rugged about the game. Baseball fans read about the bruises between the players, and many an 20 players take part, and I have yet to see so much as one solid punch thrown — as of today.

Baseball fights of the past and of the future are as harmless as a rabbit buttering. I have seen those fights in every town where major league baseball is played and I have yet to see one which could be called a fight with a good left hook.

Real Estate Men Advise Sale Of Home Without Agent Help

DETROIT, March 4 (AP)—Three Detroit real estate agents, who have advised many homeowners to sell their own homes without involving in the sale of a real estate agent.

The trio, tired of complaints about the cost of their services, developed a "do-it-yourself" kit designed for homeowners.

They formed a company to market the kits and then withdrew from the company, although still retaining royalties on the kits.

The kit consists of a sign advertising the house for sale, a contract to support the sign on the front lawn, and a booklet giving the owner advice on the various facets of selling a home.

The booklet tells the homeowner what to do and how to do it. It says the first step is to decide on the "asking price" of the home.

The homeowner must be sure to base the price on the market value of the home, not upon any sentimental value or because the owner needs a specific amount of money, the booklet advises.

The market value can be determined in several ways, it says. A homeowner can inquire in his neighborhood to find out what similar type houses have sold for recently. There have been about 100,000 such houses sold in the last few years.

Or he can hire an appraiser to appraise his home. This costs for below that of handling the sale through a real estate agent.

The contract even uses the value placed on the house by a tax appraiser.

"The homeowner should get the house ready to show to prospective buyers. A letter is prepared which will help sell itself, the booklet says.

"It advises the homeowner to clean up his yard, mow the lawn and repair, touch up places where paint is peeling and make other minor repairs.

"It also advises a general house cleaning, especially cleaning out closets, before showing the house.

"If you tell a prospect there is plenty of closet space and then open your closet to show him, you're lost another round," the booklet says.

It advises the homeowner to place an ad in a newspaper and tell the whole story. "Who you will attract are those interested in what you have to offer but will not buy."

Information that should be carried in the ad includes the type of house, the number of rooms, the construction, type of heat, location, size, size of lot, extra price, reason for moving, and address and phone number along with home and office addresses.

Authorization also was granted for bids for painting the basement corridor and a portion of the children's room and for investigating the possibility of including library employees in the city employers' health and insurance plan.

Librarian Arthur L. DeVolder reported all current projects are complete and the display wall donated by the Twentieth Century club, the shelving donated by the Scouptinist club, and the frames donated by the Mentor club are all in use.

Acknowledgment plates have been attached to the display wall and to the display wall. A report was made on the record and music books purchased by the Twin Falls Music club in memory of A. Mae Johnson, treasurer. Music books also donated money to purchase four LP records.

Monthly library statistical reports showed that 116 adult and 41 young adult books were purchased for a total of 157, and 28 and seven young adult books were donated.

Books loaned out and withdrawn were 132 adult and 126 juvenile for a total of 258. Books and magazines returned were 118 juvenile and 104 adult.

New readers registered numbered 257. Circulation for the month was 921 books and related items, with adults checking out 47,770 fiction, 1,187 non-fiction, 371 non-fiction and 69 pamphlets.

The juvenile department circulated 2,251 items of fiction, 818 non-fiction, 10 magazines and 10 pamphlets. A total of 2,251 readers took home 588 fiction, 209 non-fiction, 76 magazines and 25 pamphlets.

The library was open 24 days for the month of books, with an average daily circulation of 468. The largest daily circulation was 600 and the smallest was 259. Percentage of non-fiction circulation was 39.

Photograph records added were 10 to the adult collection. Records withdrawn were two adult and two juvenile. Records circulated were 64 adult and 54 juvenile.

During the month overdue notifications were sent to 241 adult and 113 juvenile and 24 young adults for a total of 258. Bills sent by the library were 104 and 104 notices to non-readers brought in 168 and 168 notices from rentals. City appropriation for the month was \$3,000. Non-readers amounted to 23,316.

Youngsters attending the story hour in the library were 104 and 104. DeVolder, made a report on the governor's conference on library problems which he attended in Boise on Feb. 19-20.

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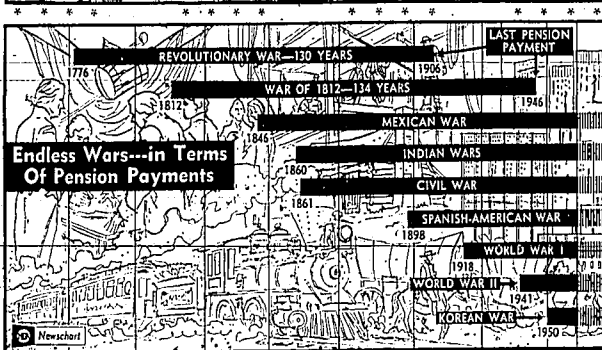
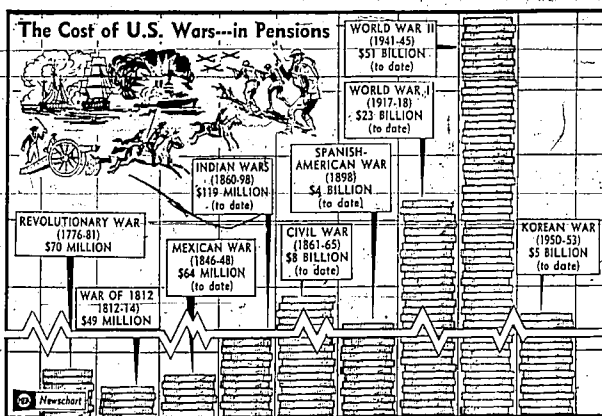
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Wars Are Over but Pension Costs Still Must Be Paid

SALT LAKE CITY, March 4 (AP)—Utah health workers are posing a health problem for Utah, the state health director said yesterday.

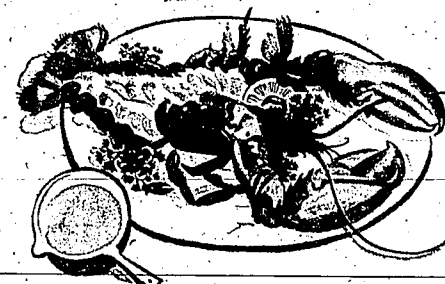

Buhl Council Gives Lease To Oil Firm
BUHL, March 4 — Permission was renewed for the Utah Oil Refining company to sub-lease at the Buhl airport for gas tanks and pumps when the city council met Tuesday evening in regular session.

A discussion was held in strict enforcement of the dog ordinance, which was brought up because of numerous complaints in recent weeks against the large number of stray dogs in the vicinity.

It was felt the ordinance should be enforced rather than have a more stringent control such as a leash law. The present ordinance requires every dog in the city to be licensed with an metal tag or license to be attached to a collar around the dog's neck.

Persons refusing to license their dogs may be fined to \$100 or given a 30-day jail sentence or in some cases both a fine and jail confinement.

Does not licensed may be seized and impounded, and if the owner is known, he will be contacted and notified and given 48 hours to redeem the dog by purchasing a license and paying an additional fee of \$2.50.

At the expiration of 48 hours the chief of police is authorized to sell a dog to any person for \$1 and any dog not redeemed in the period of time specified will be destroyed. All dangerous or vicious animals must be kept chained or confined.
