Johnson Can't Win in 1960's Rights Battles

WASHINGTON, March 7 (AP)—Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, D. Tex., is in the unhappy position of a presidential hopeful in line for some political disaster, "not because of his best friends in the senate, or let it continue to delay action on a bill."

It will cost Johnson "whichever way Johnson votes to assist in cost him some political favor."

If he is recorded against limited debate, he will receive much of the southern support that has been drifting away but he will get a shattering vote from the party's liberals.

If he votes to cut off talk—as he personally is mighty reluctant to do under the circumstances—Johnson probably will be sacrificing a big chunk of the Dixie support.

South Help Needed He is counting on that support to help make him one of the leaders in the early balloting at the Los Angeles nominating convention.

In the end, Johnson may wind up with a bill won Sen. John F. Kennedy, D. Mass.; Stuart Symington, D. Mo.; and Hubert H. Humphrey, D. Minn., will have the voting records pleasing to the delegations from the large states with heavy Negro registrations.

Algiers Talk By De Gaulle Said Puzzling

PARIS, March 7 (AP)—The French people were confused today over President Charles de Gaulle's "talk tough" orders to the French army in Algeria.

De Gaulle's aides were reported urging him to go on television once more to explain his Algerian policy to a nation stunned by statements he made on a three-day tour of army outposts in Algeria.

In the course of the trip he declared he no longer believes the Algerian National Liberation Front (FLN) will negotiate a cease fire with France—the army must defeat the rebels militarily.

The Algerian war may drag on for a long time. He believes Algerians eventually must choose an Algerian Algeria linked to France; intervention would be technically impossible and complete independence would be madness.

Only a few weeks ago de Gaulle, touring southern French provinces, appeared optimistic about an early end to the five-year-old Algerian war.

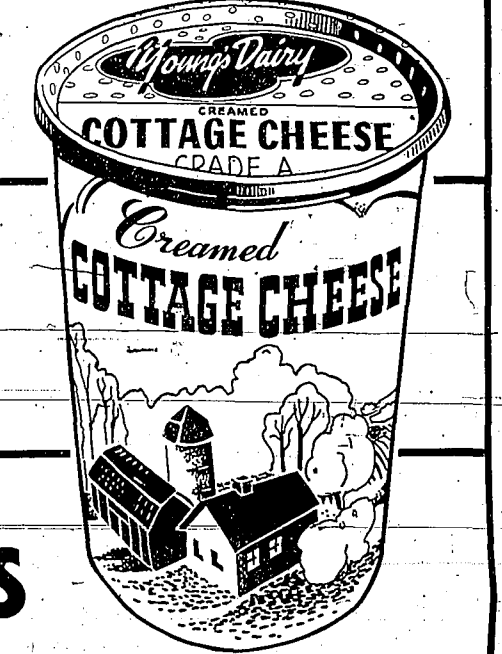
