Changed Red Leader Might Attend Meets

WASHINGTON, March 8 (AP)—When he goes to the summit and to Moscow in the next few months, President Eisenhower may find a changed Nikita Khrushchev, softened in some ways and hardened in others toward the United States.

The Soviet premier was reported to be greatly impressed with the American standard of living, cars, driveways, ice boxes and housing during his trip here last September.

Though he has boasted Russia will "overtake" the United States economically in a few years, Khrushchev was said to feel privately that this will be a tremendously difficult task.

It was believed to have high respect for U. S. military strength and to concede that this country could devastate Russia in any war. It is said that one man who does not attach great weight to the "missile gap" is Nikita Khrushchev.

But Khrushchev is firmly convinced that U. S. officials are anxious at "the art of revolution," a phrase which refers to the struggle between East and West to win the opinion of the world to their side.

Kremlin officials boast that Russia recently invited several thousand Africans to Moscow to study medicine and other subjects while the U. S. state was busy having a filibuster over a civil rights bill.

Don't Give up Berlin Rights, German Says

BONN, Germany, March 8 (AP)—Chancellor Konrad Adenauer believes it would be a catastrophe for the free world if the western powers yield any rights in West Berlin, informed sources said today.

The West German leader files to the United States this week-end to talk with President Eisenhower and influential leaders of Congress. This is the theme he will stress at every opportunity.

The 84-year-old Adenauer, whose hunched posture reflects his political staid, considers that not only the United States, Britain

NATO is committed to maintenance of the present status of West Berlin until West Germany is freed by treaty.

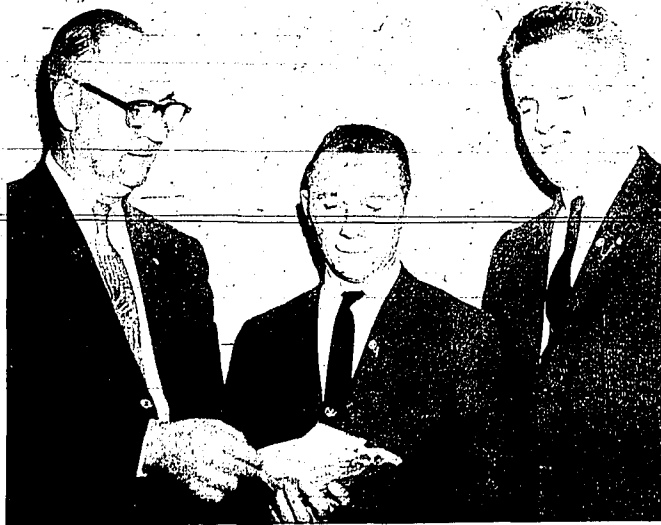
He argues that the three western allies won their rights in West Berlin by conquering that nation in wartime and those rights cannot be changed until reunification and the end of four-power responsibility for Germany.

The NATO powers, he points out, also have committed themselves publicly to guaranteeing the presence of western troops in Berlin and their right of unhindered access to the former German capital.

The informant sources said Adenauer feels that Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev is trying to humiliate the western powers and NATO by insisting they give up accepting a reduction of their rights in Berlin.

The sources said Adenauer believes that if this came about the people of Asia and Europe would be convinced that Stalin is what it claims to be, the strongest nation on Earth.

Schools in Idaho Get Six Million

BOISE, March 8 (AP)—More than six million dollars will be spent on Idaho school buildings, construction under public law 81-600 in 1959, the state department of education reported yesterday.

Harold Parley, director of federal districts in the state, said federal funds for school construction in the past nine years.

Public law 815 provides funds for schools when five per cent of the children attending the school are black. False Alert Sends Some Into Cellars

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP)—A false alarm today sent three to four dozen residents of this coastal community into panic. Some went into cellars, others into their homes.

An "atomic attack" is imminent. This is no drill.

It happened seven minutes after the station broadcast the alert at 11:10 p.m. when an engine emitting civil defense material accidentally set a red alert light through master control and it was broadcast.

Reaction is quick among listeners.

The alert broadcast, urging people to take cover on an enemy attack, was interrupted by dozens of phone calls from alarmed residents, a spokesman said.

The station said its "barometer" was "overcast" because of questions like:

"I'm an apartment owner and I've checked my friends' houses to the basement. What do I do now?"

"Can I get dressed?"

"I've got my children down in the cellar but I'll still be in my undies. Will I have time to get dressed?"

The station added, "Upon taking to the air again this morning, radio host apologized for any mis-guess caused by the erroneous message. It was broadcast in that the instructions broadcast by the civil defense announcer were followed by most of those hearing the message."

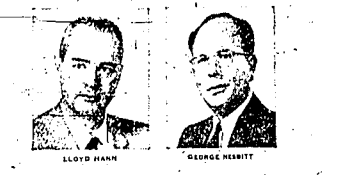

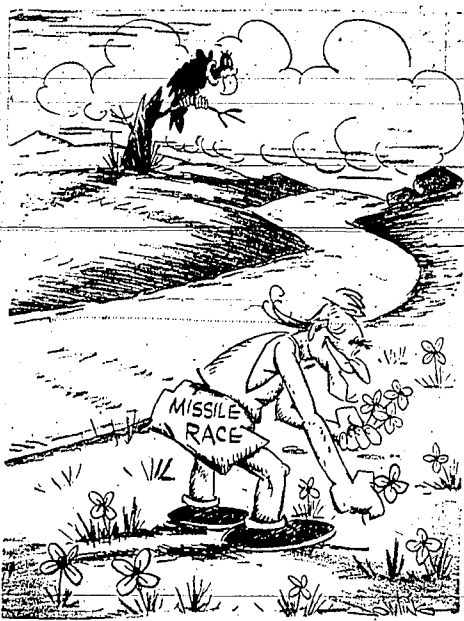

WASHINGTON, March 8 (AP)—Arthur H. Motley, a dynamic magazine publisher, has been named as the next president of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce. It was announced today.

Motley, president of Parade Publications, was elected by the Chamber's board of directors to the post when Motley assumes office for a one-year term on May 4.

The new president, a publishing executive for 32 years, summed up his personal business philosophy this way: "seek opportunities for all business men and favor-for-tune."

On international affairs, he says this: "Support our friends, oppose our foes."

As Chamber president, Motley will represent nationally some 3,000 local Chambers of Commerce, 24,000 member firms and a total of 150 million individuals.

The 50-year-old Minnesota native is relatively unfamiliar to the general public but is well known to business groups, especially sales organizations.

One associate described him as "a salesman's salesman." He is reported to be in constant demand as a speaker to sales groups.

Motley is known to his friends as "the editor." "Support our friends, oppose our foes," he says in a statement issued today.

He has a salesman's rapid-fire, buzz method of talking. A frigid character, he is "not an intellectual," but as an intelligent person who can quickly break in on a statement, he is a well-known figure in the industry.

Motley's views on legislative and economic matters were spelled out in a statement issued today.

He viewed the 1960 balance outlook favorable "despite the political uncertainties of a red year." Specifically, he saw moderate rises in automobile production, expenditures for new plants and equipment and both exports and imports.

Motley confided, however, that there would be some dark areas to this year's economic picture.

"While total construction is likely to equal the 1959 level," he commented, "housing starts may be somewhat lower. Farm income also may be slightly lower. Consumer credit will expand, but perhaps not as rapidly as in 1959."

Turning to "the problems facing congress and the administration," Motley reflected the Chamber's emphasis on "individual action at all levels, and in all areas of government and public fiscal policy."

The new president-elect of the Chamber of Commerce has been directing Parade—a Sunday newspaper supplement—since 1948, during the preceding four years.
