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## Victim Of Slide Isn't Recovered

DRIGGS, March 10 (UPI)—Fourteen men of avalanche rescue workers probed gingerly into the skirts of a huge snowslide 12 miles west of here today to find the body of one of its two victims.

Meanwhile, authorities set up an avalanche expert and Gov. Toboak is expected to announce a guard unit to help in the search.

Forest Ranger Joe Peters, Driggs, said a huge sheet of snow was perched precariously above the operation and that it "could come down at any time."

A. K. Wagoner, the avalanche expert, was en route from Jackson today to see up the distance and advise the rescuers when it would be safe to conduct a full-scale search for the body.

The slide—a quarter-mile-wide—reared down a three-quarter-mile stretch of Horze-bow canyon in the Targier national forest yesterday afternoon.

Three men checking power circuits on an Idaho state police radio circuit—Clay Howard, 45; Robert Philbert, Ashton; and Bill Pickett, 28, Ashton—were caught in its path.

Pickett snatched a tree on the edge of the avalanche and managed to survive and summon help for Collett. Aftermaths at Ashton hospital said his condition today was fair but he was still in shock. His injuries include a fractured lower leg, a dislocated elbow, a cracked skull and a bruised chest.

Collett died last night just as the medical aid after surviving for six days.

Howard's body was believed buried in the snow.

## Senate Rejects Move to Cut Off Filibuster but House OK's Rights Talk

WASHINGTON, March 10 (UPI)—The senate today rejected a move to choke off the long southern filibuster against civil rights legislation. The roll call vote was 35 to 42 against imposing the gag rule in the debate. Supporting the cloture move were 130 Democrats and 12 Republicans. Opposed were 33 Democrats and 20 Republicans.

This was 22 votes short of the two-thirds needed to impose cloture. As senate leaders urged their colleagues to vote, a bare majority of those voting. The senate action came after the house launched its own long-winded rights debate and showed in an immediate vote that it was willing and able—but not yet ready—to pass legislation to bolster Negro voting and school desegregation.

The house vote was 312 to 103 on the cloture rule for calling up and debating the civil rights bill recommended by the Judiciary committee. The bill was passed after a 20-minute filibuster by the Eisenhower administration.

The senate debate limitation motion carried, every senator still would have had an additional hour in which to debate the whole pending civil rights matter.

Sponsors favoring civil rights legislation argued to advance the bill's showdown offered the "best chance" to get an effective rights bill. Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D-Minn., put it more strongly. He said defeat of the gag motion would succeed at the legislative "backroom" writing of civil rights legislation dominated by Southerners.

But not even the proponents of the cloture move had expected it to succeed at this time. Sen. Everett L. Ross, D-Iowa, said it was "premature."

The senate, meeting at 9 a.m. today, had debated the gag rule for five hours.

House Southerners—unable to filibuster—conducted the Dixie bloc in the senate—apparently had some success in getting the bill being possible efforts to stall through parliamentary tactics.

## New Winter Outbreak Is Building up, May Strike Snow-Wasted Area Anew

A crippling March snowstorm which gave the Midwest and South one of the worst weather Thrashings of the winter—blizzards of light snow and blizzards across the East today. But still another late-season outbreak of winter built up in the plains. The weather bureau issued heavy snow warnings for parts of Kansas, Oklahoma and Missouri. It forecast four inches or more of snow and said the storm might roll eastward through the already snow-bombed lower Ohio valley.

Earlier storm tumbled its hardest punch at Kentucky and Tennessee. For Kentucky, it was heavy winter-sleet pasting in history.

From the central plains into the midwest region, the storm left a 15-state path of misery, inconvenience and hardship.

Before it began to taper off at midday, the storm dumped staggering depths of snow across Kentucky and Tennessee. It dumped snow in North Carolina, Virginia and West Virginia. Hazardous driving was reported northward into Maryland.

State highway crews worked roughly 24 hours to clear roads north of a foot of snow from roads in northern North Carolina. Portions of the interstate highway were snarled overnight snow which ranged up to 30 inches in places in the northern part of the state. It said guardrails were needed to take food and medicine to snow-bound communities.

The storm that fanned across the middle Mississippi and Ohio valleys appeared to have lost much of its fury as it moved northward across the Appalachians. But it fell through Maryland and Delaware, with falls from 10 to six inches. Lesser amounts were reported in southern North Carolina.

Gov. Luther Hodges alerted the national guard for possible emergency duty in the western part of the state. He said guard units were needed to take food and medicine to snow-bound communities.

Total construction in Twin Falls during February was valued at \$162,400 and was last 87 per cent below last year's \$153,000, according to statistics released by the Twin Falls Bank and Trust company.

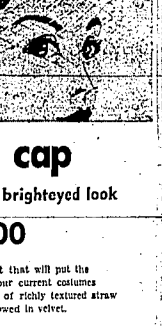
Permits for 11 new dwelling units were valued at \$98,000 compared with \$72,000 for 10 units in 1959. New commercial construction valued at \$16,000 fell 52.2 per cent short of reaching the 1959 total of \$71,000. Alterations and repairs valued at \$19,400 also were just under the 1959 total of \$39,000.

According to the Twin Falls Bank and Trust company, the value of construction in February reported in nine leading Idaho cities totaled \$152,500. This was 62 per cent above that reported in January, but 2.8 per cent below February of last year.

Humphrey's bill would prohibit discrimination in the hiring, promotion, or discharge of any person by a federal contractor or subcontractor.

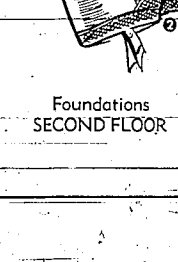

### Two Seniors Are Selected as Merit Scholarship Finalists

Mitzi Gerrish and Donald Hoffman, seniors at Twin Falls high school, have been named finalists in the 1959-60 competition of the National Merit Scholarship Foundation program and have been awarded certificates of merit, according to V. L. Letcavage, principal.

Hoffman and Mitzi Gerrish received high scores on two college aptitude tests used in the competition. The scores of one percent of the seniors in each state received the award. A national total of 10,000 students was honored.

More than 550,000 students were tested in the 1959-60 national merit scholarship competition which began last April. Ten months have passed the competitors down to 10,000 finalists from which the merit scholars will be selected and announced about April 27.

The scholars and fellows they have chosen will share in the several million dollars in merit scholarship funds to be offered by more than 10 different organizations and individuals and by the corporation itself.

Names of persons who qualified as semi-finalists were published in a booklet widely distributed to colleges, universities and other scholarship agencies for consideration of other scholarships offered outside the merit program.

Finalists will be offered about 2 million dollars worth of freshman-year scholarships and awards from these sources, in addition to awards made to those selected as merit scholars.

Finalists are selected by the merit scholar selection committee, a panel of experts in academic selection, and by special judging teams convened by various donors of merit scholarships.

Merit scholarships are four-year awards, and carry stipends that range from \$100 to \$250 annually based on individual need. The amount is based upon family resources, summer earnings and college costs, all of which vary for each winner.

Merit scholar may accept other major scholarship assistance in addition to his merit scholarship stipend, a rule followed by most private scholarship donors. The aim is to distribute available funds to as many outstanding students as possible. The corporation gave assistance to 37,000 in 1959 by sending without charge test scores to their first and second choice colleges. But gaining admission to college is the responsibility of the student.

The National Merit Scholarship corporation was established in 1956 with grants of 20 1/2 million dollars from the Ford foundation and the Carnegie corporation of New York.

The current program is the fifth that has been conducted. More than one and one-half million students have participated.

From approximately 3,000 merit scholars selected in the first four programs, 26 already have been graduated, completing their studies in three or four and all had distinguished records.

The sixth program began March 8 with the national merit scholarship qualifying test to be given in an estimated 15,000 high schools.



DETROIT, March 10 (AP)—It's about time car buyers start looking "off hours" in the month-end.

James E. Mitchell, Jr., appointed chairman of the National Automobile Dealers Association's advertising ethics committee, says the conditions are ripe for a few unscrupulous car dealers to start crawling out of the woodwork.

Beware of Ads

"It's a very prospective car-buyer to be aware of advertising that is full of too many promises," Mitchell says. "But there's always a rotten apple or two in every barrel and the business of selling cars is no exception."

Mitchell points out that the advent of compact cars and accelerated production following the steel strike have built up dealer inventories considerably. This means competition to move the cars is increasing.

Competition Grows

And as competition grows is increased a small minority of the nation's car dealers have a tendency to resort to advertising which does not conform with generally accepted ethical.

The auto industry cleaned up the 1959 models remaining in dealer showrooms in the first order of selling in years last fall and as a result there has been few serious advertising problems for a while, but the situation could change with the increased pressure to sell cars gathering dust in the back rooms of dealerships.

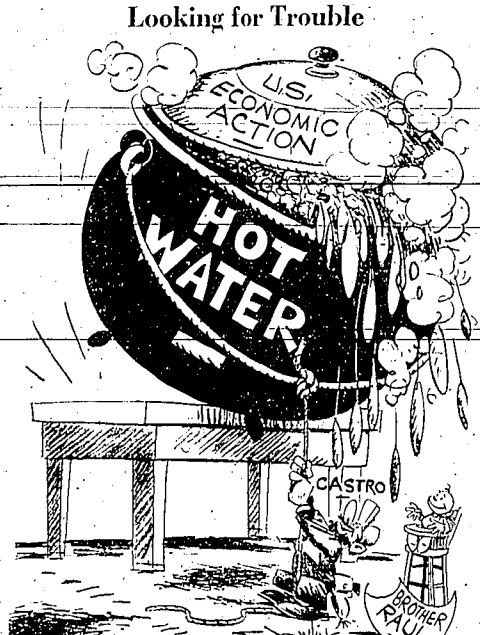
### Panel Reports Weed Trouble For Murtaugh

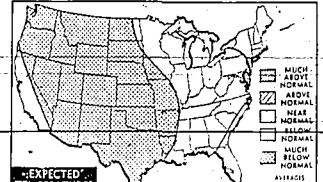
The check was given to the University of Oregon Medical School hospital by the Donor's Children's Hospital fund, active many years in underwriting medical care for children.

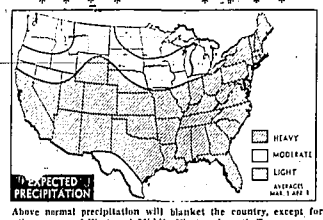

BOISE, March 10 (AP)—Idaho's rocketeers, a legion of Cape Canaveral-inspired space students, are "firing" .000 in their launching to date.

The fact only one home-made missile has been put under the heavens and that one failed before it left the desert floor naturally has a lot to do with it.

A Twin Falls group made the attempt and as of now the group's pending launching is the only one planned in the state.

In the Gen state these days, you can't take any Jerry-built, pint-sized missile out into the back yard and fire it off. The department of aeronautics not only seems it unsafe but says it's illegal.

Two years ago a law was put on the books requiring licensing for every launching. Field requirements make it pretty difficult to get a permit in the first place. Finding someone to have the test firing is almost impossible.

"Director Chet. Mention of the department says the National Rocket society, parent of the other clubs, discourages amateur launching in any form. So does the military.

"For all the precautions and regulations in Idaho, which promise special action against parents of minors caught trying to set off rockets without a license, a few manage to get away with it.

Not too long ago police in Boise arrested a group of boys preparing to set off an eight-foot-long piece of stainless steel pipe with a permit in the first place. The "missile" was pointed toward the center of the city.

"There's no telling where it might have landed if it didn't explode before it got off the ground," says Bingham.

Right there is one of the toughest parts of the license requirement.

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### Snow Depths Reported for Hailey Areas

**HAILEY, March 10**—Snow depths are more than last year on the lower slopes, but considerably short of the higher altitudes, according to measurements taken on several courses, Floyd Davis, of the soil conservation service, reported today.

The snow depth on the Miller-Jones summit course is 412 inches, against 362 inches last year. Water content is 117 percent, against a usual 175 inches last year. Average water content over a nine-year period is 202 inches.

At Galena's Horse creek course the snow depth is 310 inches against 30 inches last year. Water content is 87 percent, against 116 inches last year. Over an average of 12 years the average water content is 194 inches.

On Galena summit the snow depth is 288 inches, against 105 inches last year. Water content is 105 percent, against 109 inches for 1959. Over an 11-year average the water content was 213 inches.

At the Marsden mine course on the headwaters of the East fork of the Big Wood river the snow depth is 294 inches against 36 last year. The water content is 72 percent, against 91 inches for 1959. Over a 22-year average the water content was 145.

On the Bald mountain run west of Richmond the snow depth is 101 inches, compared to 56 last year. The water content of this year's snow was 69 inches, with 132 for 1959. Over an 18-year average water content was 102 inches.

At Snake's peak the snow depth on the Little Wood river drainage the snow depth this year is 205 inches against 27 for last year. Water content is 78 inches compared to 72 for last year. The average over a seven-year period is 92 inches.

At the Laddish ranch course the snow depth is 218 inches, against 23 for last year. Water content for both years is 54 inches. Over a seven-year average the water content is 56 inches.

In the Muldoon course the snow depth is 208 inches, against 23 last year. Water content this year is 64 inches against 58 last year. For seven years the average water content is seven inches.

At Snake's peak the snow depth is 208 inches against 44 last year. Water content this year is 101 inches, against 41 for last year. A two-year average is 120 inches.

At the Teller ranch the snow depth is 126 inches, against 10 inches last year. Water content this year is 67 inches with 58 inches last year. The seven-year average is 63 inches.

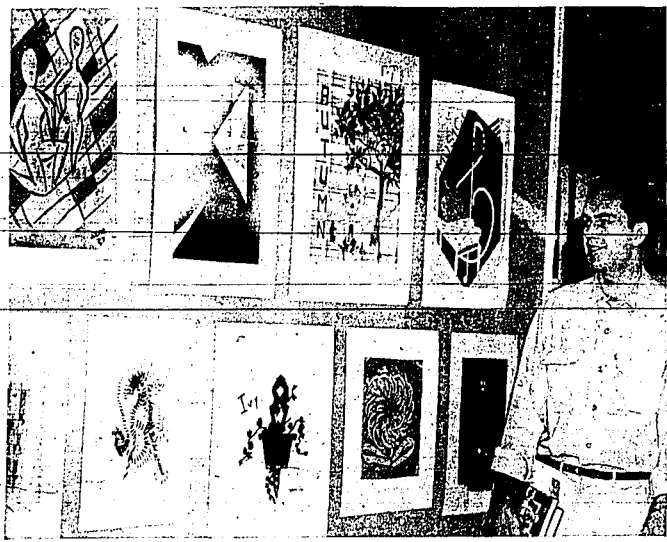

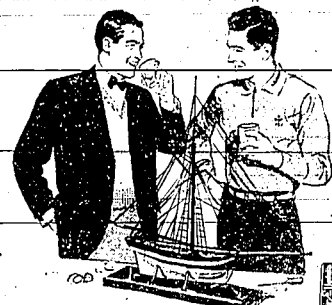
Artistry of high school students on display at the University of Idaho draws the attention of Halp May, student from Twin Falls. This particular part of the exhibit came from Lewiston high school.

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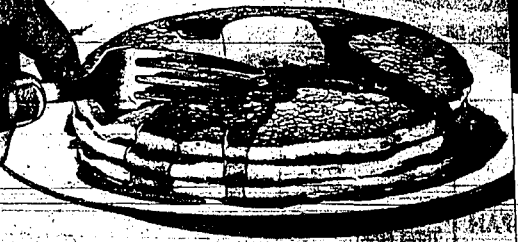

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

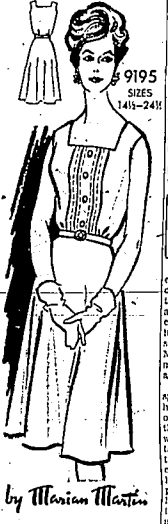

### Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

Young mothers, anxious to do every possible thing to rear their children in good health, try to get them to eat more than they want at a time. Children differ in their eating habits because they differ in their ways of growth and consequently in their needs for food. Many little children do not want much to eat at a time. They want a small amount and that often.

When a little one accepts several handfuls of cereal and then turns his head away, tries to get hold of the spoon, indicating either he wants no more, the thing to do is wait a minute, let him take time out, then offer the spoon once more. If he refuses it, let him go, without coaxing or reproaching. Once a child learns that his eating is a matter of concern to his mother he will make the jump of it and his mother is on a bad time.

If these young mothers could but understand, believe, that a "healthy child" will "starve" in this country of plenty, they could save themselves time, nervous exhaustion and a fussing youngster. It may seem headless to allow a child so much time for eating his meal, and then, cheerfully remove it, unattended, but that is the best way to train a child to good eating habits.

Some young children need to be fed small portions about every two hours.

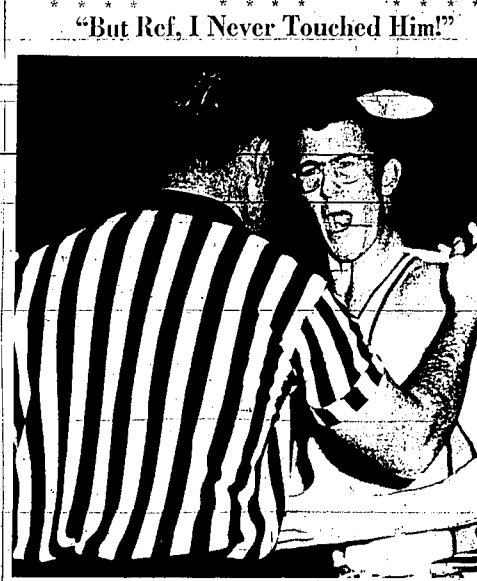

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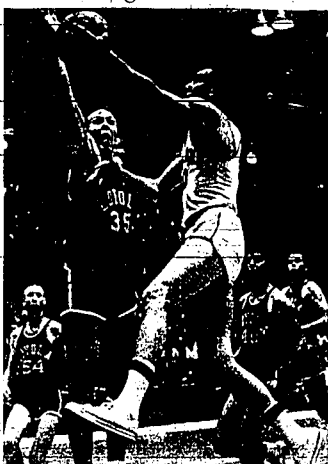

## Top Offense To Meet Best Defense Soon

What happens when a basketball team which gives up an average of only 48 points a game runs against a team accustomed to scoring 50 or more?

One of the questions which will be answered during the next 10 days in the NCAA championship basketball tournament.

Official statistics, released Wednesday, show that the California team, the defending national champion, has the best defensive unit in the country. They have given up an average of 48 points a game.

Among the list of nine of the five leading offensive teams—Ohio State, West Virginia, Cincinnati and Utah—all averaging from 84.4 to 91.5 points a contest.

The national collegiate athletic bureau, which keeps check on such matters, says this is the first time so many of the country's leading offensive teams have been ranked under one roof.

Ohio State tops offensive rankings with a 91.5 average. It averages better than the Miami (Fla.) average. West Virginia, runner-up to California for the tournament crown last year, follows with 89.1.

Then come Cincinnati, 88, and Utah, 84.4.

Cincinnati's Oscar Robertson is headed for his third straight scoring crown with a 32.4 average.

Robertson needs only to average 17 points a game in the tournament to break the all-time career average-per-game record of 32.2 set by Frank Brady of Purdue.
