Snow Blanket Claimed Cause Of More Snow

WASHINGTON, March 11 (U) — Weather experts here today said much of the blame for all the snow we're having on all these snows was laid.

A vast blanket of snow like that covering much of the nation today, they said, is unusual and even more so if it is accompanied by which produced it.

The snow blanket extending from the central and southern plains through the Ohio valley to the Atlantic and from Virginia northward has had a "lock" effect, tending to keep the air cold and stormy.

Other Factors Noted, Too That it is not of course, the whole explanation for the mild March weather which has brought record cold and snow to many parts of the country as a time when the winter should be making way for spring.

In February a high western jet stream, a surface marine layer of air in the upper atmosphere, cut displaced for some reason far to the south of its normal course across the continent.

The result has been what climatologist Robert W. Schindler of the weather bureau called "an upside-down winter," generally warmer than normal in the North and colder than normal in the South.

Weather Said "Unusual" — Cold Arctic air plunged down into the Gulf states and spread eastward across the South to the Atlantic. For most of the country east of the Rockies, the winter has been unusually snowy.

Schindler has just come by some figures for November through February which impelled him to use a word seldom employed weather men accustomed to the ebb and flow of weather of Nature. He said this winter has been "unusual."

His statistics are the kind which will let you win bets. Until March 11, the entire Great Lakes area had enjoyed temperatures averaging two to six degrees above normal.

East Area Is Warmer — Average temperatures in all the Atlantic coast states from North Carolina up to the Canadian border, also were above normal in the winter months of December, January and February, in northeast Maine, the temperatures for that period averaged six degrees above normal.

The whole West coast also had an above-normal winter, but the story was radically different for the southern tier of states. In that area, the November-through-February averages was two degrees below normal. The below-normal region extended down through the Rocky mountain area to Texas and thence east to the Atlantic coast.

BOSTON, March 11—Massachusetts federal court today ruled that \$100 it has illegally collected millions of dollars in income taxes on federal social security payments made to elderly persons.

The state supreme court ruled that such taxes are illegal, are not subject to the taxation levied on pensions under the state's 1921 income tax law. The court said the federal old age payments, on the contrary, are a unique and novel liability by contract for the problem of protecting aged and their families.

The state fought all the way in the supreme court against an 83-year-old man's contention that he was legally owed \$250 on \$220 social security in 1959.

During the wrangle the state contended it stood to lose about four million dollars in revenue yearly if the tax were ruled illegal.

The court said the state's income tax law, in revenue terms, is a contract for the protection of aged persons in which to seek state benefits, the state's total liability was estimated at 12 million dollars.

Supreme Court Justice R. David Card ruled that the citizen, David Gray of Everett, is entitled to receive over his \$250 plus all the money he cost to wage his legal battle.

After the decision, Tax Commissioner Robert Caplan announced that refund application forms will be available at all state tax offices and that the deadline for seeking 1956 abatements is April 15.

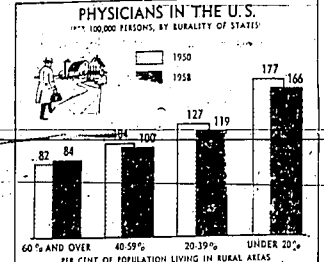

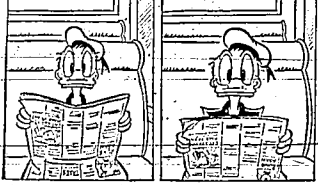

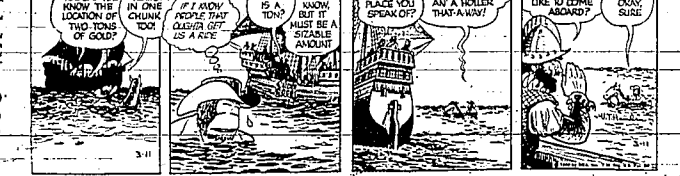
