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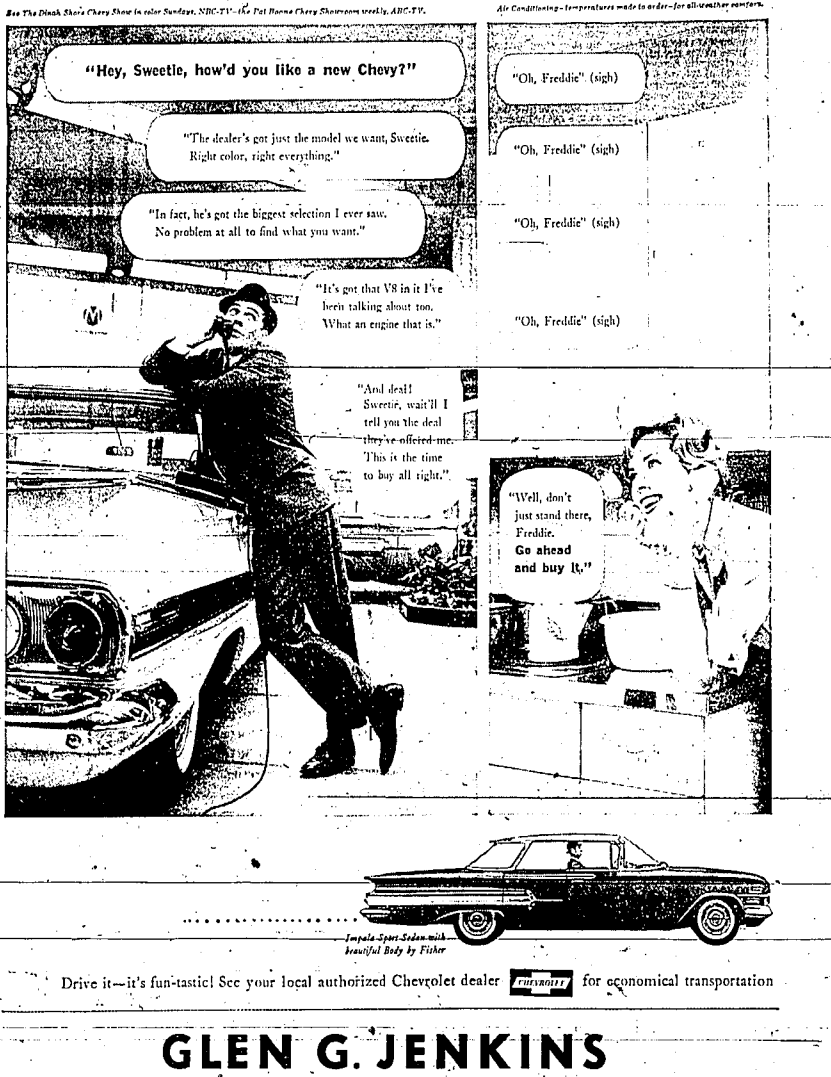

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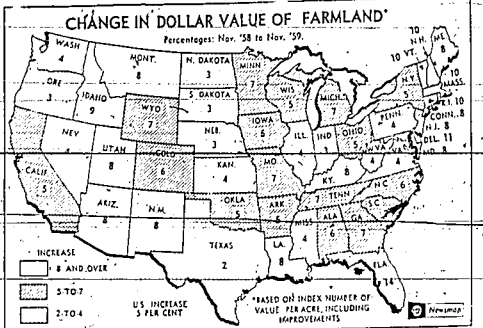
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Farm Real Estate: Rising Market Values

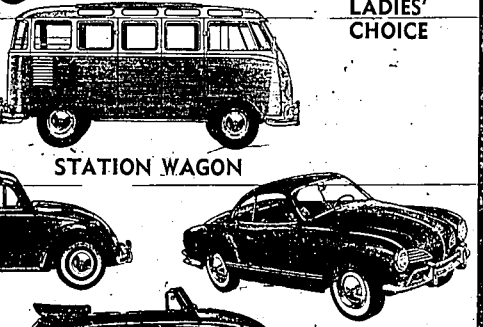

Church Avers Newest Wheat Plan Hopeful

BOISE, March 12 (UP)—Sen. Frank Church, D. Ind., said today a new wheat stabilization program was introduced in the senate "today" in a "bold" promise of bringing prosperity and stability to farmers who grow by bringing a reasonable balance between supply and demand.

Church is one of the sponsors of the bill. An identical measure, he said, is pending from Washington, has been introduced in the house, with 23 sponsors.

"Key feature of this plan," he said, "is a strict control of marketing through allotments measured in bushels instead of acres in present wheat programs."

It is designed to limit wheat production to a "reasonable" level, and permit orderly distribution. Surpluses now stored by the Commodity Credit Corporation.

"Our studies indicate that this plan will require nearly 400 million dollars annually in storage costs and about 225 million each year in support payments."

The Idaho Democrat said the new plan, if approved by congress and the president, would have the effect of similar policies in other major farm commodities.

GENEVA, March 12 (UP)—Dele- disarmament agency to centralize files of the North Atlantic Treaty all records of arms and troops owned by the Soviet bloc.

The plan agreed upon by a 10-membered in Geneva today for a 10-nation disarmament conference, agreed to stop making nuclear weapons, and to convert to peaceful purposes. Unofficially, it was reported that as part of the stage the United States will cut its armed forces to 2,100,000 men if the Soviet agrees to the same.

3. Agreement to end production of nuclear weapons and ballistic missiles for military use. Eventually, the armaments of all nations would be cut to the lowest level needed for security.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Alexander Zorin, arriving earlier in the day as the head of the Soviet bloc, announced the rival plan will be based on Premier Nikita Khrushchev's program for world disarmament.

Khrushchev unfolded his plan last September in a speech before the United Nations general assembly. It calls for total abolition of national military forces and staffs over a four-year period.

For the first time in 14 years of "fraternal negotiations" to reduce the big powers' arms and armed forces, East and West will be represented in equal numbers. On the East side, besides the Soviet Union, are Poland, Czechoslovakia, Bulgaria and Romania.

Each side's plan contains numerous provisions repeatedly described as unacceptable by the other.

The prospects were that each side would present its plan during the first week of the conference. Most western observers said they believe little progress is likely before the four sessions in Paris opens May 10.

Although Berlin and German unification are the principal concerns of the summit conference, the four chiefs of government are sure to discuss the two rival disarmament plans.

If an approach to a compromise plan can be devised at the summit conference, it may help the nations talk their way through the positions of a first step world disarmament.

Gloom Thick For Trapped Men in Mine

LOGAN, W. Va., March 12 (UP)—Gloom as thick as the acid smoke that "has" kept 18 coal miners prisoner since last Tuesday hung over the little community of Holden today.

Hopes that the 18 might be rescued had soared for a brief time as rescue crews worked frantically to rig a makeshift ventilation system that would "blow" the smoke and fumes from the smothering fire deep in the Island Creek Coal company Mine.

But shortly before dawn Crawford L. Wilson, state mine chief, unable to locate the mine's entrance, disclosed the system wasn't clearing the air. It would have to be scrapped. That could take until sometime tomorrow (Sunday).

Then he and company officials went back to start over again.

The 18 were cut off Tuesday morning when a small rockfall behind them snapped an electric cable and ignited some timbers. The timbers in turn ignited the coal.

Fire Contained

The fire has been contained, officials said, but once again the smoke—so poisonous it can kill within minutes—has blocked off all efforts to reach the men.

What chance is there that the 18 are still alive?

It depends on whether the wall, or bulkhead, which is 1800 feet long, built between themselves and the fire has been sufficient to keep out the poisonous smoke.

NEW YORK, March 12 (AP)—Former old Schultz, your friend, neighborhood butcher in the long white apron? Schultz and thousands of neighborhood butchers like him posed from the American scene just before World War II, as the supermarket wave spread across the country. He's gone all right. But not for good. Butcher to Return. In the "supermarket of the 70's," as envisioned by a top industrial design firm, old Schultz will be back at the same stand, selling his meat clever, telling you "good today, maybe even tomorrow." It took a battery of sociologists, economists, public opinion pollsters, market analysts and other specialists to bring the old corner butcher back out of the past and plunk him down squarely in tomorrow's supermarket. In a year-long study commissioned by the Supermarket Institute, which represents 70 percent of the nation's grocery chains, the Hasbrouck-Lewy corporation took a close look at 150 stores in 15 states before blueprinting the store of the future. No Customizable. The researchers found what most housewives have known all these years: that the supermarket, despite its one-stop shopping convenience, has not inspired the kind of customer loyalty that existed in the old neighborhood store. Hinting a bribe and waiting at a little window for the butcher to appear is no substitute for watching old Schultz work while solving him with questions about which is the best cut and how to go about cooking it. In the course of the survey, a psychologist, Dr. Herbert Kruglik, gave housewives a blank piece of paper and asked them to draw their idea of the supermarket of the future. Nine out of 10 drew the meat store.

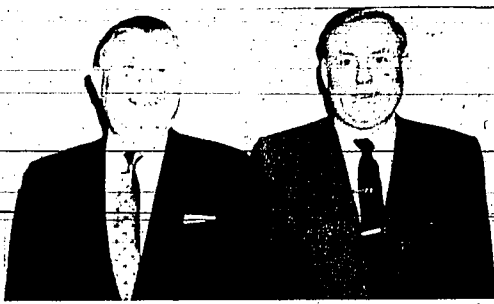

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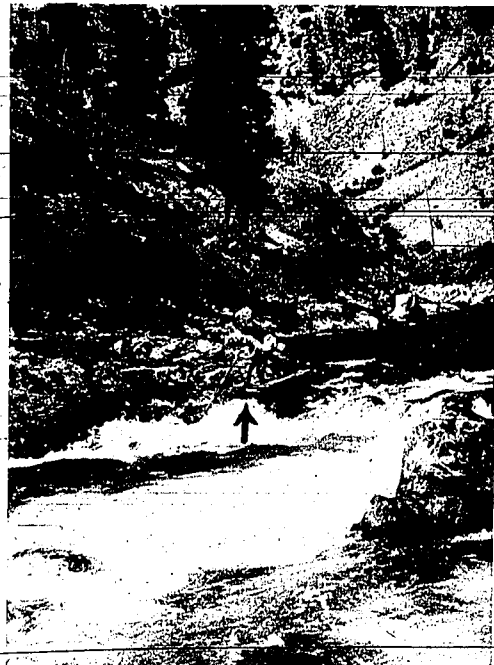

Fish Experts Join "Tourists" on Trip Through Heart of Big Primitive Area

By JIM WIMBIRD
Idaho Fish and Game Association Ninety-two boats carrying 570 fishermen floated through the turbulent heart of Idaho's primitive area last July. That was the big month for white water anglers, but all summer long from April through September the traffic over the 100-mile expanse of the middle fork of the Salmon river was reminiscent of numerous boating resorts around the state on Sunday afternoons.

In recent years, there have been many complaints from guides, outfitters and some sportsmen that the trout fishery on the middle fork of the Salmon river was declining rapidly. Simpson says increased use of the river by pack teams who float down in boats has increased the catch of fish throughout the full length of the river.

Should the facts show too much fishing intensity, several things might be done. These could be shorter seasons, smaller bag and possession limits, restrictions on types of fishing gear and others. Simpson says the cutthroat is unappreciated as a food fish and is much sought by anglers. Although it is more difficult to rear cutthroat in hatcheries, it is native to Idaho and has done well in a majority of waters.

Cutthroat can be distinguished from other trout by the red slash on their underjaw, which led a small boy last summer to tell a conservation officer that he and his daddy were catching "them fish that got the sore necks."

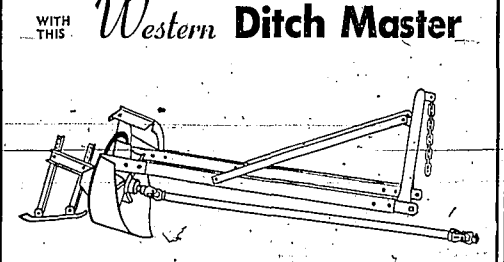

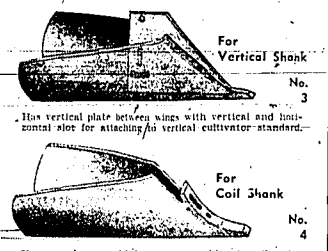

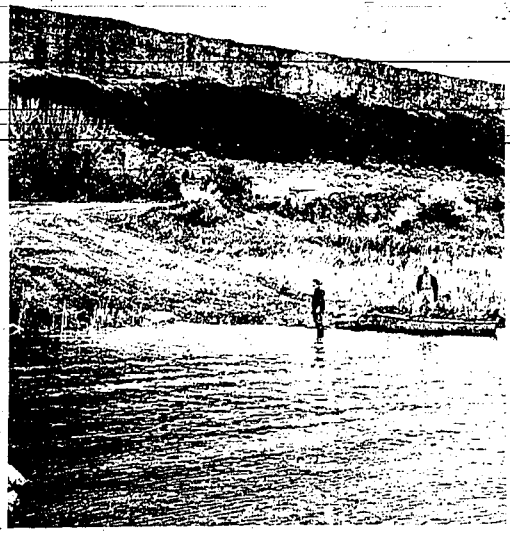

A Magic Valley food tradition is the result of a man's taste for duck soup, so in the past few years duck soup has become somewhat of an institution at two cafes in Twin Falls and Shoshone.

According to Ernest and Thomas Koto, Twin Falls, and Bill Hato, Shoshone, the duck soup dinners have been popular with area people for about 20 years.

The dinners grew out of the irregular duck dinners the late S. Oki, Shoshone, used to prepare for his friends. Ernest Koto says Oki used to talk hunters out of a batch of ducks, borrow the Koto brothers' restaurant kitchen when they were still in Shoshone, and prepare a vast duck dinner for his friends.

The fame of Oki's dinners spread and eventually hunters brought their wild ducks to the restaurant and asked the owners to prepare dinners for them. It is necessary for hunters to supply the ducks because restaurants can't advertise, prepare or sell dinners containing meat from game animals unless they are prepared for the freezer for a long period. For that reason most persons have their duck soup dinners either during the duck season or shortly after it is over.

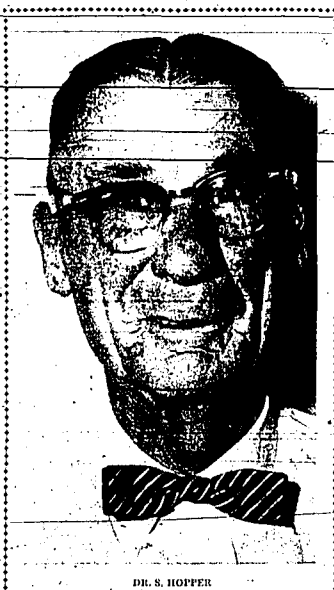
MAGIC VALLEY PORTRAIT Hazelton's Doctor Marking 50th Year Practicing Medicine in Idaho Regions
