Loophole for Head Tax Is Now Plugged

BOISE, March 15 (AP)—Taxpayers who think they have found a loophole to evade payment of the \$10 head tax by claiming they were on welfare have a surprise in store for them.

State Tax Collector P. G. Neill has come up with a "loophole" of his own.

The controversial 1959 section law requires payment of a \$10 minimum or head tax on each state income tax return. You're only exempt if:

- You're entire gross income, before expenses or deductions, is less than \$500 for the taxable year.
- You, or your spouse if it's a joint return, were blind.
- You were lawfully receiving public assistance payments from the state of Idaho on the last day of the taxable year.

The last "if" is the one some would-be tax evaders are pointing out with glee. They say that the nature of public assistance recipients is confidential information, that the tax collector can't look into the files to check on them.

Taxpayer Can Get Help
"Absolutely true," says Neill. "But that doesn't prevent the taxpayer from obtaining the information for us."

A check with Public Assistance Director Bill Child shows Neill is right. While such files are restricted to administration of public assistance, the department may give out some of the information if the welfare recipient asks it.

Neill says that not many of the persons getting welfare during the year have taxable income. But those who do are going to have to supply some proof they were on public assistance as specified under the law—if they want to beat the head tax.

Letter Sufficient
Usually a letter or statement from the welfare department will be sufficient. Child says his department sees "no obstacle" to making it out for the taxpayer.

But if you can't get such proof, letter not claim this as an exemption from the head tax. "We'd be inclined to doubt it," says Neill.

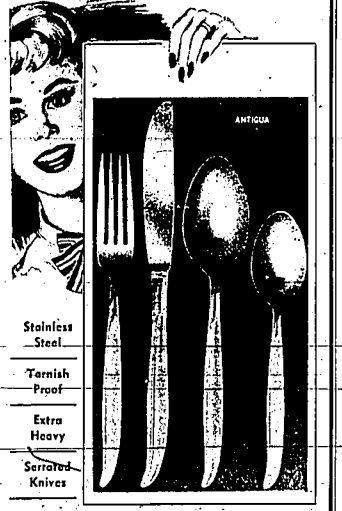

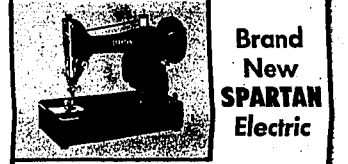

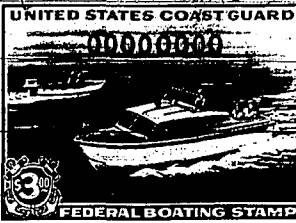

Comet Car to Be Displayed By T. F. Firm

OPEN HOUSE has been scheduled Thursday, Friday and Saturday, by the T. F. firm for the first public showing in Magic Valley of the new compact Comet car produced by Ford.

Manager Emmett Harrison announced Monday the company has added the Comet to its Lincoln and Mercury lines and will continue the Studebaker Line. "The Comet is a little larger than our compact cars, built on a 117-inch wheelbase as compared to the 108-inch wheelbase of other makes. The Comet has a 26-cubic-foot luggage compartment and is powered by a 6-cylinder, 90-horsepower engine which delivers up to 25 miles per gallon of gas. In overall dimensions the Comet is 185 inches long, 70 1/2 inches wide and 54 1/2 inches high. Dual headlamps and foam rubber seats are included as standard equipment. Optional equipment includes a three-speed automatic transmission and power brakes and steering. Harrison said the Comet is priced similar to other compact cars.

Motor Boat Numbering, Fee Payments Will Begin April 1

Federal numbering of powered boats of more than 10 horsepower will begin April 1 in 15 states, including Idaho, which do not have their own numbering systems. The coast guard announced Monday that it will begin receiving applications on April 1, under the federal boating act of 1938. A \$2 fee for a federal boating stamp must be paid at the time that the owner fills out his application form, which can be obtained at any postoffice.

W. W. Franke, Twin Falls postmaster, reported Monday after hearing of the Coast Guard announcement that the local postoffice does not have application forms at the present time. Application forms also may be obtained from any coast guard marine inspection office, but the form must be paid at the postoffice. A temporary certificate will be issued and can be used until the application form is processed by the coast guard, when a plastic card, similar to a gasoline credit card, will be sent to the applicant. This certificate will be good for three years from the date of the owner's birthday next occurring after its issuance.

Whenever the boat is in use on any navigable water, the number must be displayed on both sides of the bow. It can be printed on the boat or placed on a removable board or panel. The regulation applies to any boat having more than 10 horsepower, regardless of whether it is an inboard or outboard engine.

CHARLESTON, S. C., March 15—Police reported yesterday that a 24-year-old white server stationed at a 24-hour drive-in restaurant was beaten and robbed by six Negro youths who made an attempt to cut the initials "KKK" into his back.

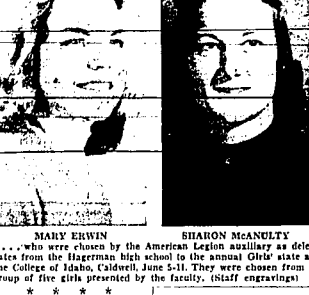

On the surface all was well with the seven women and five men on the jury in the closing days of the trial. But behind the smiles, jurors said, were tensions following nearly three months of intense concentration on a bizarre tale of suburban sea and violent death.

East German Passes Issue Won by West

BERLIN, March 15 (AP)—A stubborn West last night won the issue with the Soviet Union over new travel passes for western military missions in East Germany.

Wordings of the pact implied recognition of the Soviet puppet regime.

The Soviets discarded the passes after a month-long western refusal to accept them and returned to accept Soviet missions in West Germany.

Western Remains Same — The pact would have authorized the United States, Britain and French military missions stationed at Potsdam, East Germany, to travel in the "German Democratic republic" but the passes now back in effect, authorize travel in the Soviet zone of Germany.

The western allies contended use of the passes would imply recognition of the East German regime, which they contend is an illegal, unrepresentative government.

Backlog Is Surprising — The Soviet's surprising about-face came at a meeting of the heads of the western missions and the Soviet chief of staff in East Germany, Lt. Col. Gen. G. V. Kostikov.

The official East German newspaper AD said Kostikov told the western representatives: "Guided by the desire not to worsen relations among the great powers, especially in view of the forthcoming summit conference, the Soviet government has authorized the supreme commander to make no changes until further notice in the passes issued previously."

Nixon Urged to Campaign More

WASHINGTON, March 15 (AP)—Sen. John F. Kennedy, D. Mass., challenged Vice President Richard W. Nixon yesterday to take a more active role in the presidential campaign.

Kennedy, a Democratic presidential candidate, said in an obvious jibe at Nixon that some White House hopefuls feel they should confine appearances to "the Olympics, the Rose Bowl, the sports writers' association, and other similar events."

"That I think that if any candidate is going to win, and is going to represent the people he has to get out of the locker room and out to the streets where the people live and work," Kennedy said.

Kennedy received a rousing reception from more than 3,000 delegates attending the sixth annual legislative conference of the AFL-CIO building and construction trades department. Nixon turned down an invitation to address the same audience.
