Sales of Russ Auto in U. S. Under Study

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Lower Sugar Beet Content Drops Prices

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—The lower sugar content in 1959 crops of sugar beets and sugar cane was an important factor in the decline in prices received by farmers, according to the agriculture department.

The preliminary estimate of average prices received for 1959 crops of sugar beets and sugar cane is \$11.30 per ton, down 40 cents from 1958. The season average price for mainland sugar cane at \$1.00 per ton compares with \$1.46 a year earlier.

Government payments in 1959 to mainland growers under the sugar act totaled \$41,188,000, about the same as a year earlier. The payments brought total receipts per ton to \$12.61 for beets and \$8.29 for sugar cane.

U. S. production of sugar beets last year was at a record high, and the mainland sugar cane harvest was the second highest on record. The 1959 sugar-beet crop was estimated at 17,030,000 tons, up 17 per cent from 1958.

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HIGHER AND WEAKER

The United States Steel corporation, in its 1959 annual report released this week, warned the American people once more of the relationship-between-employment-costs-and-inflation.

"This nation cannot prudently accept endless employment cost increases that outstrip increases in national productivity," USSR re-emphasized. "The inevitable consequences are spiraling prices, mounting corporate expenditures, multiplying money supplies and declining confidence in the dollar—in short, a perpetuation of the inflationary excursion on which this nation embarked when it established the legislative and social framework which supports unaided power behind employment cost inflation."

The report made a special point of the difference between the full cost of the steel worker's hour of work and the so-called average basic wage rate of the steelworker receives. Actually, the full cost of an hour's work of a U. S. Steel wage employee rose from 94 cents to \$4.00, an increase equivalent to about 8 percent a year compounded. This \$4.00 is nearly 30 per cent more than the government-supplied wage rate for steel industry production workers.

"The rapid growth of the so-called 'fringe' has made wage rates implicitly uncompetitive with the cost of an hour's work," the report explained. "Widely quoted government data on average hour earnings are no longer representative of total employment cost. Between 1949 and 1959 the total cost of an hour's work for a typical U. S. Steel wage employee rose from 94 cents to \$4.00, an increase equivalent to about 8 percent a year compounded. This \$4.00 is nearly 30 per cent more than the government-supplied wage rate for steel industry production workers."

"The big part of this disparity is due to the government's exclusion of the effects of payments for time-off and payments for employee benefits." The report, issued to the corporation's 316,000 stockholders, stated that income for the year 1959 was adversely affected by the 116-day steel strike which was ended by government injunction. Income was down \$154 million in 1959 as compared with \$101 million in 1958.

The other side of the story—high wages and high costs of manufactured products, which are priced this country out of the world market—was emphasized once more in figures released by the U. S. commerce department.

Foreign countries, according to these figures, are now selling us more than they buy from us for the first time since 1950. "A large proportion of these exports are produced by American firms which have moved abroad to take advantage of low wages, low tariffs and low taxes."

Besides meaning a loss of jobs at home, which some estimate at about 500,000, the narrow margin of the steel industry's home firms. For instance, commerce department officials say that one of every four imported automobiles was made by an American firm overseas, and the value of three in small cars. Imports last year were 668,070 cars.

Incredible as it may seem, the Japanese can afford to—and do buy—sugar in this country, ship it to break-up yards on Tokyo and process it into sugar. It costs more to produce in this country than in Japan. The U. S. tariff on sugar is 10 cents per pound, while the Japanese tariff is 5 cents per pound.

Under licensing and patent agreements, almost every large radio and TV firm in this country imports low-cost transistors and other parts from Japanese firms.

One of this country's leading automobile manufacturers has just negotiated a contract under which the largest appliance firm in the Orient will use the firm's patents to produce for Japan and the Southeast Asia market.

All this has become such a threat that the American electronic industry has charged it jeopardizes our national defense. It has asked Leo A. Hoegh, defense mobilizer, to limit these imports through negotiation with Tokyo.

Meantime, in an editorial entitled "Road to Ruin," Birmingham Finley, editor of American Machinist and Metal Working Manufacturing, points out that the U. S. rate of economic growth is considerably less than Western Europe's. He says that the U. S. needs for modern production equipment in U. S. metalworking plants.

The problem is so critical, he says, that the top talent in government and industry must find an immediate solution. He says that the U. S. output will be hopelessly behind that of Russia during the 60's.

How long will it take this country to take drastic steps to stop this vicious spiral of inflation? With an election coming up, the American people should be seeking an answer to that all important question—an answer without double-talk or political subterfuge.

Decline Noted In Industrial Output in U.S.

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—The nation's industrial output declined last month, the government announced yesterday, and the rise in personal income slowed to a walk.

The figures gave little help to economists who have been trying to decide whether the business advance is faltering—as Wall Street's bears believe—or moving gradually ahead as administration officials contend.

Output Dips

The federal reserve board announced that the output of mines, mills and utilities slipped one per cent in February to a rate of 10 per cent above the 1937 average.

The income of Americans edged up to a record of 22 billion dollars a year, the commerce department announced simultaneously. But the 200-million-dollar rise was the smallest in six months.

Report Isn't Stirring

The case reports were neither very alarming nor very encouraging. The reserve board's monthly said, "Most measures of business activity remained at advanced levels in February and momentum declined."

"Focusing started decreased further but a recent survey of business plans indicated a continuing rise in expenditures for plant and equipment through the year, to a total of 14 per cent more than in 1949."

"Food prices advanced, but the average of industrial commodity prices remained stable."

Farm Income Slumps

The personal income report showed that the wages and salaries of workers advanced by 700 million dollars at an annual rate last month, but this gain was substantially offset by a 600-million-dollar slump in farm income. Other income sources—interest, dividends and rental—rose 100 million.

The income gains were concentrated in the retail, wholesale and service industries. Factory payrolls were down slightly, because of curtailed operations in the auto industry and a resulting decline in overtime wage payments.

2 Attorneys to Appear in Suit

BOISE, March 17 (AP)—District Judge J. Ray Dirlsch has authorized the appearance of two attorneys representing the Idaho State bar in a case involving legality of the 1929 justice of the peace law.

Wills C. Moffitt and Joseph Pezzen, both Boise, asked to appear in the case in friends of the court, representing the State bar.

The suit was brought by commissioners of Boise county against Attila L. Crowley, the county probate judge. Crowley refused to approve appointment of a justice of the peace under the 1929 law, contending it was unconstitutional.

Now pending is a motion by Crowley for summary judgment in the case.

The 1929 law made justices appointive, instead of elective.

LOS ANGELES, March 17 (AP)—The company that builds rocket engines for Thor and Atlas missiles says experience is paying off in dollar savings.

Colder First Week Is Due This Spring

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—The weather bureau says at least the first week of spring will be colder than usual over most of the nation.

The outlook report for the next 30 days said yesterday "unusually cold weather is expected during the first half of April, especially over most of the North. Spring officially begins March 22.

The bureau said temperatures in the next several days would average below seasonal normals over most of the nation. The southwest, the West coast and the extreme Southeast will have normal temperatures.

Greatest departures from normal were forecast for the central and southern plains and the Ohio valley.

Precipitation will be more than normal over the southern two-thirds of the country east of the continental divide, with additional snow forecast in the north-central area.

Lower Rates Proposed for Grain Storage

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—The agriculture department has proposed a 19 per cent slash in the uniform grain storage agreement would save taxpayers an estimated 110 million dollars annually.

Storage costs on grain now are running about 550 million dollars a year, or about 1 1/2 million dollars a day.

The department has been under heavy congressional criticism recently for its grain storage operations and management. Sen. Stuart Symington, D., Mo., chairman of a subcommittee, inquired into grain storage rates, has charged that the profits of some storage operators were excessive.

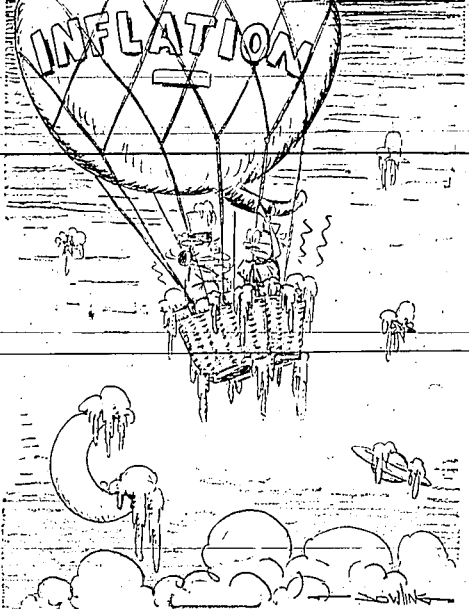
When informed of the department's proposed rate reduction, Symington said, "I understand it is three cents lower and I'm glad."

Representatives of the warehouse industry, who met with department officials Tuesday and yesterday on renegotiation of the storage agreement, expressed disagreement with the department's proposal.

"This proposal is a drastic and substantial reduction in storage and handling rates and... it will be entirely unacceptable to the more than 11,000 warehouse men who will be affected adversely," the industry representatives said.

The industry and department officials will meet again March 20 at Kansas City to discuss the proposals in detail.

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—Congressmen immediately put a four-hour session on President Eisenhower's request yesterday for authority to reduce or raise foreign sugar quotas, including Cuba's.

In the house, the chairman of the agriculture committee, Rep. Harold Cooley, D., W. C. said he saw little chance for approval of the administration's new program, which would authorize the President to revise any foreign country's quota, except that of the Philippines, if he found such action in the national interest.

In the senate, the Republican leader, Sen. Everett M. Dirksen, R., Ill., predicted to newsmen that the request would be the subject of long debate.

The majority leader, Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, D., Tex., said only that he would support the request.

Nevada City Gets Threat From Group

Las Vegas, Nev., March 17 (AP)—The local chapter of the National A. A. C. C. (National Association for the Advancement of Colored People) has threatened a mass demonstration in all public places in this Nevada city.

The action was being taken in defiance of the invitation to the headquarters of the NAACP and in sympathy with 150,000 protesters in the South, said the local chapter.

The threatened "boycott" and "demonstration" was considered by officers to be aimed primarily at the bank hotels and gambling position on the "Strip."

Although most of the demonstrators are Negro performers, some Negroes are being recruited for the "boycott" and "demonstration" at the local clubs and with objections, said an NAACP spokesman.

Nevada prohibits alcohol at hotel facilities, however.

Las Vegas, with its public places, is generally considered an "integrated" city. It has a Negro population of 10,000, said the NAACP spokesman. The total population of Las Vegas is about 260,000.

New Studies Show Moon To Be Flatter

BEDFORD, Mass., March 17 (AP)—Scientists studying the moon's surface have found it is flatter than was generally believed.

Their conclusions, published by the Cambridge research center of the air research and development command, are based on a technical study of the moon's surface in which British, French and American scientists are taking part.

Shadows Measured

The conclusions are based upon measurements of shadows of lunar prominences as the shadows edge forward, or recede, across the moon's surface.

Knowing the relative position of Earth, moon and sun, it is therefore possible to compute the angle of the shadows and, from that, the prominence rising above the surrounding lunar terrain and determine the profile of the surrounding surface.

This is described as the first major step of the face of the moon to show how it will appear to travelers on its surface.

Four Landmarks

The air force scientists say the study shows there is an apparent lack of steep slopes or towering rock faces. In fact, the absence of pronounced landforms makes the moon travel difficulty in identifying its position.

The new technique had its origin in original lunar topography studies made public in February 1959 by Prof. Zdenek Jelenc of the University of Manchester, England, and Dr. Gilbert H. Venter, a student.

Their work came to the attention of Charles F. Campana, chief of the lunar-planet exploration branch of the geophysics directorate, at the Cambridge research center.

Campana met with Dr. Kopal in the following April. The result was a contract between the University of Manchester and the U. S. air force for developing the technique.

Work Is Begun on Dam-Powerhouse

BOISE, March 17 (AP)—Pouring of concrete began yesterday on the powerhouse at Oboe dam on the Snake river, Idaho Power company said the start of powerhouse construction is expected to be the number of large-scale concrete operations in progress at the new power plant.

Already under way was the lining of one of the two 1,000-foot-long powerhouse intake tunnels. Also in progress was the construction of two tanks, each 100 feet high and 20 feet in diameter which will regulate water pressure in the penstocks.

Oboe is the second of three dams Idaho Power company is building on the Snake river, along the Idaho-Oregon border. Brownlee dam is completed and the preliminary work is under way on the third, Hells canyon.

Bids Sought for 3 Highway Jobs

BOISE, March 17 (AP)—Bids were asked yesterday on three projects on the interstate highway system, all in southeastern Idaho. Bids on all three will be opened April 15.

The state highway department said one of the projects involves construction of the roadway on Interstate 15 in Blinnham county and involves the South Blackfoot interchange.

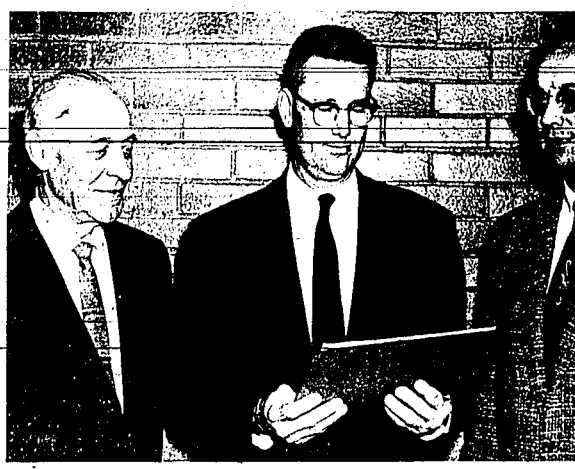
The other two projects are in Coos county and involve construction adjacent to the junction of Interstate 15W with Interstate 80N.

U.S. Officials Take Cautious Look at Adenauer's Proposal

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—U.S. officials have taken a cautiously optimistic view of Konrad Adenauer's plan for a permanent treaty for West Berlin on whether the allies should stay in Berlin.

The West German chancellor launched his surprise suggestion in a speech to the National Press Club yesterday.

The state department, turned Adenauer's Berlin proposal "very interesting" and said it had no doubt West Berliners would welcome any move to keep their government.

It promised consideration of the plan at the pre-summit strategy sessions now under way among the western allies, after the West Germans apply a formal proposal sometime next week.

The 68-year-old Adenauer acknowledged yesterday he had mentioned the idea to President Eisenhower during their lengthy meeting at the White House Tuesday. He said he had thought of it only yesterday morning.

As Adenauer pictured it, a West Berlin plebiscite rejecting Nikita Khrushchev's demand that the big powers pull out of the city would strengthen the U. S., British and French claims when they meet the summit negotiators.

Butler also denied at a news conference yesterday that he had used his party position to favor Sen. John F. Kennedy, Massachusetts, one of Humphrey's rivals for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Butler, however, refused to draw or admit that he predicted last Monday that Kennedy would win the nomination on the first convention ballot.

The chairman was reported to have made the prediction anonymously in a group of reporters at the National Press club in Washington.

Resignation Demanded

The reported statement by Butler Monday was accompanied by a demand his resignation, Humphrey said Butler had "outraged his usefulness" and "has helped neither himself nor our great party."

Party national chairman traditionally are supposed to remain neutral in pre-convention conditions.

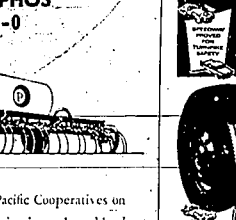

U.S. Gearing For Peaceful Nuclear Shot

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—The United States is gearing up for an underground nuclear blast in New Mexico. It is said it would be the first of a series of tests under cover from other nations.

The atomic energy commission announced it has given the go-ahead to a series of tests in preparation for a proposed detonation of a nuclear explosion deep underground in salt formations 2 1/2 miles southeast of Carlsbad. The project has the code name "Gnome."

Present use of the studied in the AEC's "Gnome" program is designed to explore the possibility of using nuclear detonations for such peaceful uses as producing power, blasting out harbors, tapping oil from oil-bearing strata and for such things as controlling surface and underground water resources.

The commission said that initial detonation to detonate the nuclear explosion—which would pack the force of 1000 tons of TNT—would be the decision of the president.

1961 Date Predicted

But, Sen. Clinton P. Anderson, D., N. M., chairman of the senate subcommittee on atomic energy, said he understood the shot is set for sometime in January, 1961.

The AEC, in its latest announcement, said site construction is estimated to take about a year, and to cost about \$10 million.

The commission said it detailed studies and experiment have been conducted to assure the safety of the planned blast. Anderson said no contamination of the atmosphere with radio-active fission is expected.

Revolutions in Biology and Human Life Brew for 1960's

NEW YORK, March 17 (AP)—Scientists in the 60's are breeding up an astounding revolution in biology and human life.

It will bring a "vaccine" of knowledge to prevent heart attacks, the means of curing or controlling cancer, healing more sick minds, perhaps even give you a little pizzazz to your metabolism.

It promises to create life in the test tube, and open the way to breeding mankind's own designer healthier, stronger than today's man.

It could let you borrow healthy kidneys, lungs or glands when you're sick or fail. Ultimately it could lead to reengineering a lost leg or hand.

It can extend healthy life to an average span of 100 to 125 years, and perhaps revive many persons who keep too early a rendezvous with death.

Science fiction? By no means. Research toward all these goals is under way actively in laboratories around the world. The biological revolution of the science of life—appear about to explode with stunning advances in man's knowledge and control over human life.

Most great breakthroughs in science come from the slow building up of basic knowledge, from hundreds of scientists, until giant leaps become possible.

This has been happening in biology, until now it is as though the world were being reengineered.

Scientists in the United States, the Soviet Union, Europe, England, Japan, all share this expectation of stirring events coming in biology.

There cannot be down a timetable. Some objectives will be achieved in this decade, and others brought closer to reality.

In five to 10 years, some medical scientists think we should know attacks of coronary.

Bits of the puzzle are falling into place.

Food tensions, lack of exercise are now three prime suspects as cause of heart-attacks. Research

Hoover Warns Increases in Crimes Challenge to Nation

Director of Federal Bureau of Investigation

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—Almost daily, newspaper headlines blame forth tales of brutal violence, mass killings, the slaughter of entire families, the battering of children into helpless puppets.

These atrocities are not confined to any one section of this nation. They occur with tragic frequency throughout the country. A feeling of terror is inculcated in the hearts of many citizens.

The most recent FBI statistics concerning crime point up the growing seriousness of these violations. Crimes of violence continued to spiral upward in 1959. Aggravated assaults jumped seven per cent over 1958, murder, five per cent, rape, four per cent. In cities between \$50,000 and \$75,000 in population, murders increased by a shocking 21 per cent.

These vicious crimes present a grave challenge to the nation today. Law enforcement must have the wholehearted cooperation of every citizen.

Effective action must be undertaken by all elements of society. To ignore the threat of these crimes of violence can only lead to disaster.

Here is a summary of the preliminary 1959 FBI crime statistics used last night, on which Hoover based his plea:

As a whole, major crimes went up one per cent over 1958. Robberies and burglaries declined. Violent crimes against individuals
