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### Woman Falls To Death Off Oregon Cliff

OTTER ROCK, Ore., March 21 (AP)—A woman watching sea lions through binoculars lost her balance and plunged 450 feet tall, rocky cliffs in the pounding surf below. Oregon coast near here yesterday.

She was Mrs. Troy Derrberry, 31, Silet, Ore.

Husband Louis Hold, 47, her mortified husband, lunged for her, grabbed her coat and pulled her in his hands as she tumbled down the nearly sheer cliff.

The couple had been sitting on the second floor of a cabin that perched at the very edge of the bluff drop. The ground at first fell away steeply, then down vertically. Derrberry said she first stood up to get a better view of a pair of sea lions on a rock far below, lost her balance and fell.

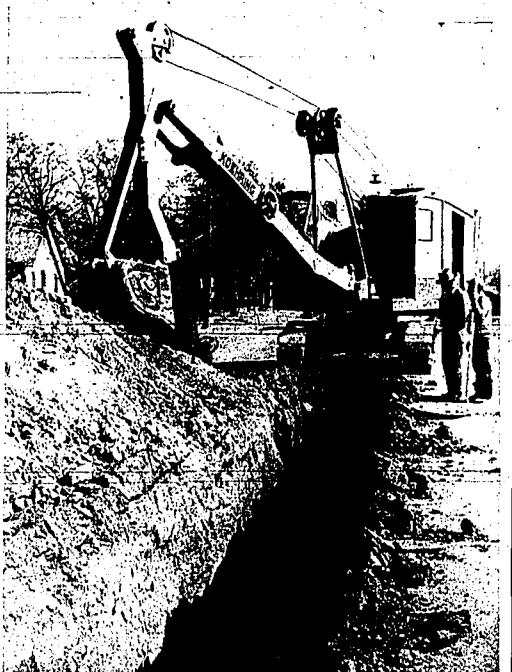
Lands in Pool

### Excavation for Kimberly Road Project Starts This Week Near Wrecking Yard

Excavation for the \$699,775 Kimberly road project will begin this week near the Twin Falls Wrecking yard and proceed west until the mile and a half job is completed.

Completion date is Oct. 1. A highway department spokesman said the project will be completed by the contractor, Duffy Reed Construction company, said all pipe has not been received and completion of that portion of the project depends on the supply of materials.

Highway engineers said the drain will begin one-half mile east of Five Points west on Minidoka avenue, continue up Minidoka to Second avenue south, up Second avenue to Fifth street, turn left

into Snake river canyon. A second part of the drain system will begin at Five Points east and continue along Kimberly road to the Twin Falls Wrecking yard where it will enter the Perrine couler. A third section will commence at the east edge of Sunset Memorial park, cut across vacant land and dump into the Perrine couler at Eastlund drive.

The project includes a 200-foot bridge over the Perrine couler, the storm drain system, re-paving of one and one-half miles of Kimberly road and a gravel access road to Fifth street, turn left

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### Plane Crash Alters Life for Residents of Nearby Home

TWIN FALLS, Idaho, March 21 (AP)—Until last Thursday, Acres W-10 had lived quietly with her husband and two children in a Northside home. Then a plane crashed into her home, killing the pilot and the two children.

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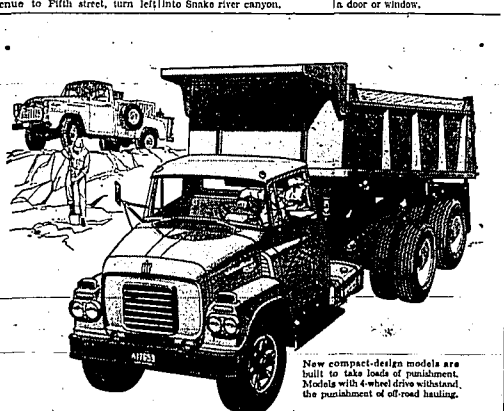

### Chou Will Visit India April 19

NEW DELHI, March 21 (AP)—Premier Chou En-lai, communist China, will arrive in New Delhi April 19 for talks with Prime Minister Nehru on the border dispute between India and red China.

Nehru told the lower house of parliament Chou would remain in New Delhi until April 25.

Nehru had suggested April 20 as a suitable date to begin the talks on the 21,000 square miles of disputed territory in the Himalayas.

Nehru said the lower house will decide that the conference will postpone any immediate solution of the border dispute.

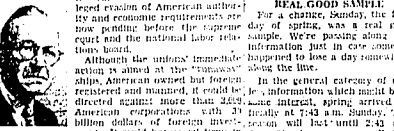

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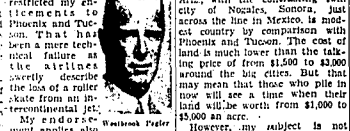

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## Drinking Abuse, Hotter Sun Discussed in Hal's Column

 NEW YORK, March 21 (AP) — Things a columnist might never know if he didn't open his mail.

WE HADN'T noticed it ourselves, but the sun grew two per cent brighter and correspondingly warmer during the last five years.

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### THE LONG NOSE OF THE LAW

Every now and again a new cabinet position is proposed to take care of some problem or other, and if all of them had been adopted in the past like would today hold his cabinet meetings in the Washington ballpark. No place else in the capital has such seats.

LATEST proposal of a new government department with a head of cabinet rank is a "Department of Urban Affairs," recommended by the National Housing conference.

IT IS a particularly odious one. Its very title suggests that all the mayors, city managers, city councils and city officials over the nation are somehow incompetent, to meet their responsibilities. And sure enough, the nation calls for more "authority" to be exercised by the federal government over the bumbling cities.

THERE IS no doubt that many of our cities are a mess. There is also no doubt that the people and the officials of any city can straighten this out any time they have mind. There is considerable doubt that the federal government, noted for its failed-up farm program, its scandalous foreign aid decisions, its wacky military spending, is likely to improve the cities much by taking them in hand.

DALLAS, Texas, undertook a whole of an urban renewal program without even federal assistance. Baltimore, Philadelphia, Hartford and a host of other cities have been doing over their cities to their own taste.

GET a cabinet department into the act, holding the money bags and making the rules and America's cities will have as much straighten this out any time they have mind. There is considerable doubt that the federal government, noted for its failed-up farm program, its scandalous foreign aid decisions, its wacky military spending, is likely to improve the cities much by taking them in hand.

THE PROBLEMS of our cities are as varied as the cities are numerous. Only the citizens can possibly know all the elements involved in each. Some should not be redeveloped at all until corrupt local machines can be voted out or much of the money spent merely line the pockets of crooks, and incidentally give the ugly "ins" more job security.

CITIES are governments themselves, and they are chartered by the states. For the federal government to "take jurisdiction" would be nothing but a power grab.

### THE "PIONEER V"

Perhaps we have reached the stage in space exploration where the emphasis will be on quality of efforts rather than quantity.

Certainly the interest in the newest U. S. space satellite is not in the fact we have added one more to our space score. It lies in the uniqueness of the venture. With the soaring Pioneer V, we will test for the first time whether it is practical to maintain radio communication over interplanetary distances up to 50 million miles. We will be exploring the path of space travel before mankind.

OUR space program calls for unmanned exploration of both Venus and Mars. Pioneer V is intended to show whether we can get within their range and still transmit vital scientific data back to Earth.

THE powerful radio equipment aboard the satellite will, it is hoped, keep contact with Earth for at least five months. By that time much valuable information will have been gained. With luck radio link might be re-established in 1959, when Pioneer V should again come within 50 million miles.

THIS space vehicle will also conduct several other important scientific experiments. In many ways it could prove to be the most valuable single space device we have ever launched.

YET while we can be very proud of this achievement, we dare not overlook the fact it is the first successful space launching we have had since last October. We are making headway, but slowly.

OBVIOUSLY we have many talented men devoting themselves with dedicated spirit to the success of our space programs. For what they have done and are doing we should give the fullest credit and honor.

STILL unclear, however, is the question whether this dedicated effort began soon enough, and is even today large enough to give us the leadership we should have in space. Pioneer V may provide part of the answer.

NEW YORK, March 21—Soon the man's sick heart will be fixed. So surgeons take it out. Good replacement with the healthy heart of another person. The man killed by an automobile.

A woman dying of blood poisoning receives a healthy kidney from a kidney bank. A boy gets a new hand or leg for the one he lost.

Such miracles may come in five to 10 years, by the most optimistic estimates. Longer, in the view of other experts working to foil nature's law forbidding your keeping living skin, glands or organs from another person.

The dream foresees a steady supply of even banks of spare-parts human organs known from accident victims, or persons whose fatal diseases do not impair those organs needed by other persons.

Grafts of bone, blood vessels, and blood transfusions, of course, are possible today.

But the bones and blood vessels apparently serve only as scaffolds for new growth of your own bone or artery. Your own liver, not the other borrowed blood cells.

But you will deliberately, unwillingly, use the skin, kidney or heart borrowed from someone else, unless it is your identical twin.

You apparently create antibodies against some substances—antibodies which attack and destroy them.

It is the same natural reaction through which, unfortunately, you create antibodies to destroy some researchers' stocks of temporary life-defending anti-preventive body tissue before it is transplanted.

Most are seeking means of preventing your body from reacting against the foreign kidney tissue.

Some few researchers are trying to remove the offending anti-preventive body tissue before it is transplanted.

Some few researchers are raising hopes this can be done.

Just a year ago, a young man, whose life his diseased kidneys had perhaps only one more week to live.

Today he's back in college. He got a healthy kidney grafted from his brother, a twin but not identical twin. His own sick kidneys were removed.

The "borrowed kidney" took the "borrowed" physicians' surprise and amazement at Peter Bent Brigham hospital in Boston had recovered, perhaps it would be reasonable the foreign kidney tissue.

It has worked at least temporarily.

Great doses of X-rays, though, can hold hazards. Some researchers are seeking other means of curtailing the body's immune reaction.

American and other researchers have transplanted hearts, lungs, kidneys, livers, into other animals, and the transplants survived for short times.

Such experiments may yield clues to hindering nature's transplant barrier. Other researchers are seeking chemical means of curtailing organs in special banks, ready for use.

Names Not Known

"They didn't know our names," recalled Leon Kravitz, who now owns a butcher shop in Brooklyn.

Kravitz's mother, father, six brothers and two sisters were exterminated in Nazi concentration camps.

The gathering was the first—and probably the last—reunion of the former prisoners. Some of them carried photo showing young men, each with a number tattooed on his hand and white striped uniforms. The pictures were taken at Auschwitz slave laborers in 1945.

Only Young Lived

Most of the men had entered the concentration camp as teenagers.

"Those who survived had to be young," said Ernest W. Michael, chairman of the dinner. "If you were old, you didn't stand a chance."

The group—almost 1,000 men and their wives—plans to start a drive for a scholarship fund for their children.
