House OK's, Sends Its Rights Bill to Senate; Tagged Unsatisfactory

WASHINGTON, March 24 (AP)—The house passed its five-point civil rights bill today and sent it on to the senate where the measure was already being tagged unsatisfactory by both extremes in the big battle there over this issue. A 311 to 109 vote gained final house approval to the bill. Before passing it, the house confirmed W. J. Wallbridge to a 118 roll call vote its decision that threatening letters and communications come under the section making it a felony crime to interfere with school desegregation orders by U. S. courts. Some members had argued this section went so far as to threaten freedom of speech.

On the roll call on passage, 120 Democrats and 132 Republicans voted for the bill, 94 Democrats and 15 Republicans voted against it. In a statement issued within minutes after the passage, noted Attorney General William P. Rogers called the bill "an historic step."

WASHINGTON, March 24 (UPI)—Several members of the house irrigation and reclamation subcommittee today criticized proposals for federal construction of the Burns Creek project in Blaine, Idaho. Assistant Reclamation Commissioner N. B. Bennett insisted that the suggested reclamation project on the Snake river would be a "good project." Reps. John P. Saylor, R., Pa.; Jack Westland, R., Wash.; Odion Langen, R., Minn.; and James A. Haley, D., Fla., questioned the need for Burns creek inasmuch as there is a similar project upstream at the Palisades site. Langen said it appears to him that there must have been some "miscalculation" when Palisades was built if Burns creek was needed to provide sufficient power for the area. Bennett replied that the region has grown considerably in recent years and the need for power consequently has increased. Westland wanted to know why the reclamation bureau supported the power unit at Burns creek in light of the fact that the original proposal introduced by Rep. Homeny at Burns creek that included a re-regulating reservoir for irrigation purposes.

WASHINGTON, March 24 (AP)—Two Democratic candidates filed announced petitions today as Idaho officials launched 1960 election campaign. Ralph R. He is the only announced candidate for the position, now held by Republican Homer Budge, who is expected to seek reelection. A. W. Brunt, Idaho Falls, one of six Democrats who seeks to replace Republican Sen. Henry C. Dworshak, filed his nominating petitions in Portland, Ore., today. He carried in 100 signatures of residents of 29 counties. The minimum for a filing is 50 signatures.

Secretary of State Arnold Williams, who received the petitions, said it was "very unusual" to have two candidates file on the first day of the nominating process. He received the said Harding was waiting when his office opened.

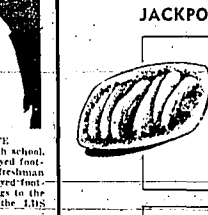

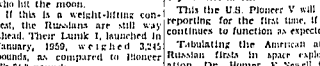

"SACRED" LIBERALISM

"The individual is encouraged to 'live it up' on the assurance that we'll never have another depression. Such free spending," she pointed out, "keeps our economy boom, but if he falls in the spirit of such thinking—if he has saved enough for his own security—he is either branded as a miser or suspected of cheating on his income tax."

"It's the same with school boards, county commissions, city administrations, even states. Unless they are spending up to their limit or going into debt to support every educational, public health and social welfare idea that's advanced, they are backward and unimpressive obstructivists."

There's far more truth to what this woman had to say than the so-called "liberals" would admit. The characteristic of the bureaucrats in all walks of public life is to be carried away with their own selfish interests. They even compete with each other in their high pressure tactics of trying to drain the taxpayer of his last dollar.

What's vicious about all this sort of thing is the false front too often set up to justify its operation. The eager-beaver spenders would have us believe that anything proposed under the name of the above mentioned categories is sacrosanct.

They brand as sacrilege any criticism of the nostrums they advance for education, public health or social welfare, whether they be panaceas or plain old rackets.

The pathetic thing about it is they have been successful in instilling fear in the minds of the people with this type of vilification. The individual hesitates to challenge these nostrums because of possible reprimandations.

One of the biggest scandals of our time is unemployment compensation provided by the "bigger-and-better-welfare" philosophy of the federal bureau of employment security. Up until several years ago, this big bonondage also was regarded as sacrosanct.

When congress enacted social security legislation 25 years ago, requiring every state to set up basic unemployment-compensation laws, the objective had every appearance of being to be a simple, straightforward, common sense program. To qualify, unemployed workers had only to be "ready, willing and able to work."

Benefits were to go to legitimate wage-earners who had clearly lost jobs through no fault of their own. It was to run until they could find employment.

But the "bigger-and-better-welfare" philosophers recognize no limits. Their appetite for spending their way to a better life is insatiable. As a result, unemployment compensation has become a glorified racket.

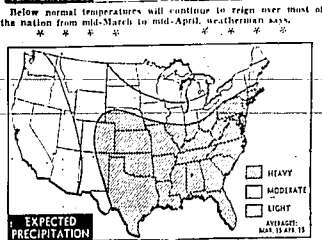
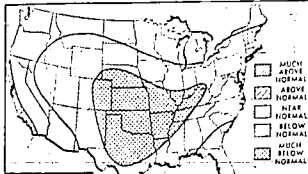

Montana Airbase Picked as First Site for New Missiles

WASHINGTON, March 24 (AP)—The air force has already selected the Montana air force base, Great Falls, Minn., as the first operational site for the new Minuteman missile. The Minuteman is the third intercontinental ballistic missile in the arsenal of the United States. The missile is expected to be ready for use in 1962, will be deployed on the launching pads at the base and Vandenberg air force base, Calif. Plans for a total of 1,500 Minuteman missiles for a dozen Atlas squadrons have already been selected and construction of those bases is well under way. The location of the first five bases to handle Titan missiles has been announced and construction is under way. Both Atlas and Titan use liquid fuel, but Atlas uses a more powerful engine. 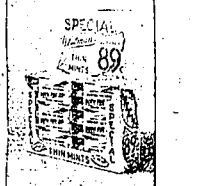

Kennedy Said Leading Race In Wisconsin

RACINE, Wis., March 24 (AP)—Pollsters, politicians and public opinion-makers have generally agreed that Sen. John F. Kennedy, D.-Mass., is running a close race for votes in the Wisconsin presidential primary.

Kennedy is battling Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D. Minn., in the election set for April 5.

At this stage of the campaign, most observers are giving Kennedy the edge. A few go so far as to say he will sweep all 19 of the state's congressional districts.

Others feel that Humphrey will win only two districts in the northwest, adjoining his home state.

"They might be right, but there are other things to consider. A doorbell-ringing tour and telephone canvassing in areas where Kennedy is supposed to be strongest, brought some surprising results. A recent survey in Racine, Kenosha and suburbs of Milwaukee indicated:

1. An unexpected number of voters have not yet decided between Humphrey and Kennedy.

2. Although Humphrey comes from a neighboring state, Kennedy seems to be better known in Wisconsin.

Four out of five of those questioned said they had seen Kennedy's picture in newspapers or magazines, or had their attention drawn to him by numerous appearances here of members of his family. The public image of Humphrey appears less well defined.

3. Kennedy is a Roman Catholic and the discussion of his religion in relation to the presidency has focused considerable attention on him.

4. Humphrey ran slightly ahead of Kennedy in checks among factory workers in Racine and Kenosha.

Southwest U. S. Also Drawn Into Campaign by Negroes

A dramatic plea for continued operation of public schools in Atlanta, Ga., was placed before a special committee of the Georgia legislature. Atlanta schools are under federal court orders to desegregate, despite a state law forbidding race mixing in schools.

Spokesmen pleading for continued public schools, even if integration is the price, outnumbered de-segregationists 3 to 1. Educational leaders told the committee that closing the schools would be catastrophic in the Atlanta metropolitan area of one million persons. In Montgomery, Ala., four Negroes applied for admission to the University of Alabama center, where six others sought enrollment Tuesday. The four filed out application blanks and left.

The center is a night school for part-time students and is a branch of the University of Alabama which is under court orders to refrain from discriminating against Negroes.

The air force reports that racial violence erupted at an integrated air force radar station near Albuquerque, N. M., last week-end.

The air force statement was released after the incident was reported in the Albuquerque Tribune by newspaper editors.

Meanwhile new demonstrations were staged by northern college students over discrimination against southern Negroes.

The public information officer for the Albuquerque air defense sector, Kirtland air force base, said there was a spontaneous demonstration following a dance at West Mesa air force station early Sunday morning. Both white and colored students were present.

One student told the Tribune that friction between white and Negro students had been brewing for some time.

Seven white girls, students at Southern College, picketed P. W. Woolworth's store in Atlanta Springs, N. Y., protesting discrimination against Negroes at the company's stores in the South.

The girls were taken to police headquarters by a white police officer and returned to the college.

Transients to Be Counted in Special Check

Special steps are being taken in the 1960 census of population and housing, which starts April 1, to make sure that all transients are counted. Census Supervisor Arthur Wilson said today.

Places such as large hotels, motels and other accommodations for transient guests will be canvassed under a different procedure than the one used for regular household dwelling units. Prior to March 31, census takers will visit each of these units to make a complete record of the rental units in those special dwelling places. At the same time, they will determine which units are occupied by permanent residents and which are for transients.

Transients will be counted on the night of March 31. This census operation is known as "T-night." A supply of individual census report forms will be left at hotels, motels and other large transient places to be distributed to transient guests staying at these places during the night of March 31. Census Bureau employees will be on hand during that evening to assist transients in filling out the forms. The purpose of the special census is to account for every person staying in such places on the census date.

After the individual report forms have been collected, they will be screened to determine what names should be included in the special census. Persons enumerated on "T-night" will be counted as part of the local population only if they have no usual place of residence elsewhere. Names of transients will be allocated back to their usual place of residence.

Information on permanent residents of these special dwelling units also will be obtained by

means of individual census report forms and the information about their housing accommodations will be furnished by the resident managers of these places.

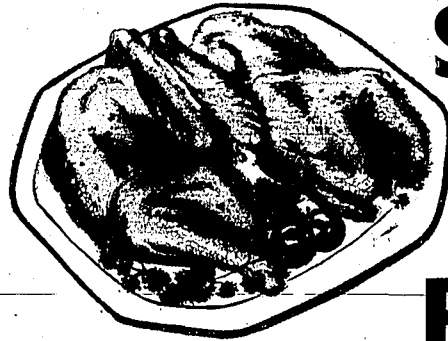

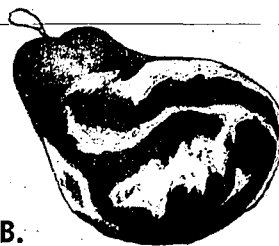

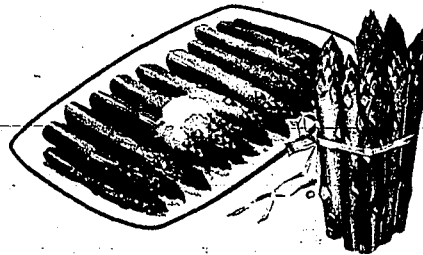

Coalition for House Solons Seems Ended

WASHINGTON, March 23—The coalition of Republicans and Southern Democrats which had ruled the roost in the House has reached a parting of the ways over civil rights legislation.

Whether the estrangement will be smoothed over or there will be a complete divorce remains to be seen.

Southerners bristled at a vote yesterday on a bill to give a \$100 million federal grant to the states to help pay the cost of the desegregation of public schools.

Southern Democrats fought the proposal with everything they had. They had counted on substantial GOP support. The vote was 252 to 177 in favor of the provision, the opposition coming from 100 southern Democrats and 21 Republicans.

On the "pro-union" side were 174 Democrats and 123 Republicans.

Southerners also have included the GOP majority upon the southern Democrats — including votes to sustain numerous Eisenhower vetoes — were vocally bitter about the coalition.

LONDON, March 23—It was cozy and friendly down in the subway and William McCullough loved it.

For eight months the 62-year-old McCullough lived there, shuttling from Waterloo to Elephant and Castle, from Watford to Piccadilly.

Money was no problem. Pensions were always dropping coins during the rush hour. Food was no problem either. Hurred commuters left lunches behind and the platform vending machines were full of candy bars.

There were no habits, however, and that led to the downfall of the human groundhog.

The search for McCullough began last August when commuters began complaining about a unwashed, raggedy man riding on trains all over London's 227-mile

underground system. Finally police caught up with McCullough and brought him to the surface. First he was told to bathe. Then he was charged with trespassing and taken before a magistrate who kicked him in the count down to his story.

McCullough said that he rode every subway line and explored all 289 subway stations several times.

He had his choice each day of any of London's 10 morning newspapers abandoned by commuters

on seats and in trash cans. He slept on the seats at the subway cars, and knew which lines and the correct seats.

As for a job, McCullough told the judge, he was never lonely. Fellow passengers loved to talk. The judge was sympathetic. He could have had McCullough locked up for the spring and summer season. But the trespassing charges were dropped. And the judge handed him \$10 from the court poor box.

Burley Notes Future Plans For Sewerage

BURLEY, March 23—Paul E. Swanson, Boise, consulting engineer for a firm contacted to make a study and discuss various treatment possibilities for Burley's sewage needs, talked with members of the city council this week.

Feasibility reports will be completed early in June and at that time the firm can make final recommendations, he said.

The firm is predicting Burley's sewer planning on an anticipated city of 20,000 in the year 2000.

He discussed the lagoon type oxidation pond which is becoming widely used in the Northwest. This does not require a separate sewage treatment plant, is more economical to develop and there is no odor.

Western Machinery company, Idaho Falls, had the low bid of \$5,238 for a pneumatic roller for the street treatment. There were seven bidders.

The council approved \$100,000 worth of building permits. Standard Oil company of California received a construction permit for South Overland avenue.

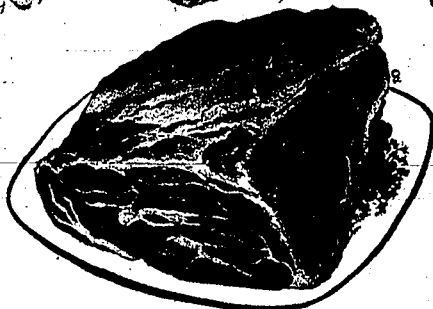

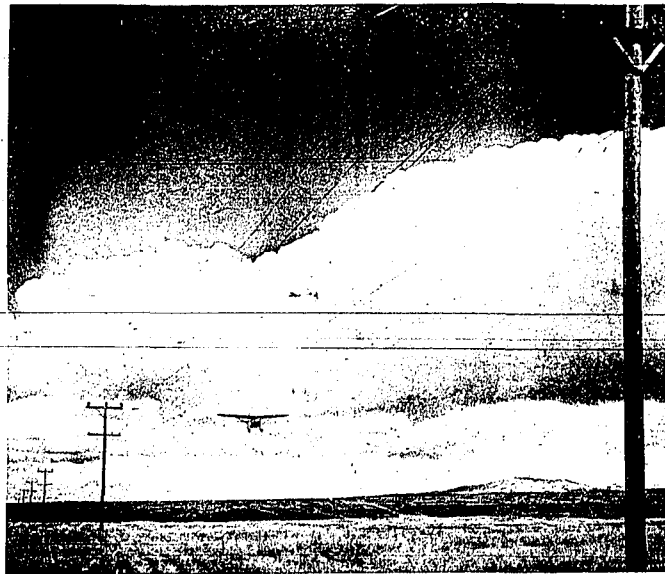

Burley

Light Plane Used to Check Firm's Transmission Lines



Billed out against billowing storm clouds, a chartered plane carrying an Idaho Power company division maintenance foreman skims across the desert east of Boise on a patrol of one of the utility's transmission lines. Foreman J. Harry Anderson, flanked on such missions by an experienced low-level pilot, makes routine patrols over the more than 200 miles of lines in company's central division at least once a month and emergency flights whenever necessary.

"Strictly for Birds" Notes Observer Of Idaho Power Line-Checking Flight

BOISE, March 24—It's strictly for the birds — and men with strong stomachs and good eyes. Such was an observer's conclusion recently as his feet touched steady, solid earth at Idaho's main aerial ground-skimming patrol of Idaho Power company transmission lines.

Taken along for a first-hand look at line checks trouble-spotting missions are performed, he has watched J. Harry Anderson, transmission line maintenance foreman for Idaho Power's central division, carry out a painstaking route extending to Hagerman valley and back to Boise south by way of the utility's Strike and Swan Falls generating plants.

Similar patrols are performed in Idaho Power's southern, eastern and western divisions to prevent service interruptions on the utility's network of high-voltage lines, which now total more than 3,000 miles. Low-flying aerial missions enable maintenance men to make close inspection of pole-connections and wire-in-such-substituted-line-than-ground patrols. At top of photo, in center, may be seen short vapor trail of high-flying plane.

Agreement Made

BOISE, Idaho, March 24—The American and West German have agreed in principle to set up supply bases for each other's armies on their territory, the defense ministry said yesterday.

"Not long after that, I got a letter from the father thanking me and saying the one had been interesting for two or three days."

Back in Boise after the three-hour patrol, Anderson told the observer that he already had been on two other flights that day. One had taken him north of Hagerman to pinpoint the source of an outage, while the other had taken him east of Boise to check a false report of a fallen pole.

And later the same day, Anderson and Douglas took off for the fourth time to make a patrol east of Mountain Home. It brought their flying time for the day to six hours and 30 minutes and their distance-covered total to 675 miles.

Anderson beams steadily out the window as Douglas, while the patrol's light plane flies a parallel course 25 feet above the ground, as he saw the observer look nervously at the poles flashing by just off the wingtip.

"We can tell much more about the condition of the pole crossarms and insulators from the air than from the ground," Anderson explained at the start of the patrol as Pilot Harold Engstrom piloted the chartered plane from the Boise runway and turned east.

Sitting above the engine's throbbing roar, the utility foreman reported that he tries to fly routine patrols over the central division more than 1,000 miles of transmission lines at least once a month. Similar regular aerial inspections are performed in Idaho Power's southern, eastern and western divisions to prevent service interruptions, or "outages," on the utility's far-flung complex of high-voltage lines which now total more than 3,000 miles.

Anderson continued speaking as the plane tilted eastward above Idaho Power's sprawling Hobe Bench substation to start patrols on the east toward Mountain Home.

"We make emergency patrols whenever there is bad weather that might have damaged the lines or other things from all directions like whenever we get a 'rip-out' or re-arranging lines, and then zoomed

upward to hurdle the sheer bluff to a trouble spot much faster than a crew on the ground."

In 1959 alone, the foreman flew nearly 100 routine and emergency patrols totaling 7,200 miles. Frequent ground patrols also are made in each of the company's four divisions.

Anderson pointed to a walkie-talkie radio on the cabin floor. "When I spot something wrong with the lines, I use this to call the dispatcher in Boise and he sends out a crew to make repairs."

Pilot Douglas, an old hand at low-level patrols throughout the Northwest, now had reversed the plane into position about 25 feet to one side of the transmission line. For the next 200 miles, constantly adjusting the plane's throttle and flap, he would follow every dip and rise in the terrain.

"Don't worry," said Anderson as he saw the observer look nervously at the poles flashing by just off the wingtip.

"We fly line and line—no matter what march across the land like soldiers on single-file parade."

Anderson turned his full attention to the line, and the observer looked around him.

Below, the sage-dotted desert lay almost a blur as the plane leaned eastward. To the south the sun was playing peek-a-boo in billowing storm clouds, pointing the land with light and shadow resembling a patchwork quilt.

As he eyed the great miles stretching frantically as the plane approached, snored away from its perch on a pole covered the plane.

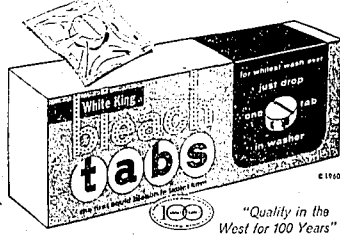
"Birds that nest in the eucalyptus are one of our biggest problems," Anderson said. "They dig their nests into the lines during wet weather and cause which now total more than 2,000. It justifies a special permit from the federal aviation agency."

Rain suddenly drummed on the windshield, just as the plane moved down into Snake river canyon near Grandview. The plane moved across the canyon floor where a network of Idaho Power lines fan out from all directions like re-arranging lines, and then zoomed

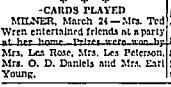

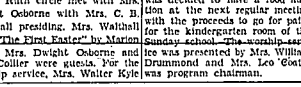

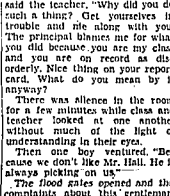

133 Deer Caught, Tagged by State Fish, Game Men

BOISE, March 21—Around the clock deer trapping operations in southeastern Idaho have led to the tagging and releasing of 133 animals during the recent cold weather, the Idaho fish and game department said today. Game biologist Dale Jensen reports from Soda Springs that the trapping and tagging in that area "has progressed very well, considering the lack of snow until February," adding that only 63 were caught and marked last year. "Unless the weather suddenly turns to spring, another 20 days of operation should be possible," Jensen declared.

State chief of game management Leo Moller pointed out in Boise that live-trapping, tagging and releasing deer is one phase of the management program; and that similar operations this winter have been under way in several other areas.

Other details in Jensen's report include an experience in which two clover type traps were placed by side—and deer were caught in both for 19 consecutive days. Deer have little or no powers of

Chicken and Cuts of Beef Are Best Bet

Chicken and roast beef bought last week for Sunday dinner, judging from specials advertised by supermarkets and neighborhood grocery stores this week-end.

Broods and fryers, once largely a summer item, have become a year-round staple in recent years. This week's bargain item, from a six per cent increase in this placement in January and the February gain of about five per cent over a year earlier.

The number of eggs set in incubators in mid-January was around 43 million, which compared with a September low of 22 million.

Beef Buys Told
Specials in beef center on rib roasts and top or bottom round roasts. Prices are marked down four to 12 cents a pound from last week. In some southern and mid-western areas, leg of lamb is higher in the East and South and, therefore, only infrequently offered as the special feature.

Eggs advanced in price reflecting the small shipments caused by recent extensive strikes in Iowa. Prices are up two to six cents a dozen over a wide area.

While this week's hardening of these necessities, including meat substitutes, during Lent, alternate suggestions are shrimp and rice, both of which are on the government's March list of plentiful and inexpensive foods. Cottage cheese also is suggested for meatless meals.

Vegetables Listed
Vegetables on the outstanding buy list this week are broccoli, cabbage, carrots, celery, green onions, iceberg lettuce, mushrooms, medium yellow onions, potatoes, aluminum slightly higher than last week, radishes, sweet potatoes and rhubarb.

Good buys are asparagus, beets, cauliflower, endive, escarole, parsley, spinach, rutabagas, eggplant to medium peppers and "celtios" straight-necked squash. You'll pay slightly more for artichokes, asparagus, cucumbers, eggplant, and zucchini.
